UNITED STATES.

[Reports to the Surgeon-General, Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service.]

Report from Evansville, Ind.—Measles.

Surgeon Stoner reports, May 16:

Three hundred and fifteen cases of measles have been reported since May 1. Three deaths are reported, two with complication. The first case was observed in the latter part of February in a child of a family recently arrived. There were 12 cases reported in the month of February, 30 in the month of March, and 356 in the month of April, which is 10 more cases than has ever before been reported during the same month.

Report from Indianapolis, Ind.—Measles.

Reports received from the board of health at Indianapolis, Ind., show, for the week ended May 5, 690 cases; week ended May 12, 702 cases, 6 deaths. Census population, 169,164.

Report from Vanceboro, Me.—Smallpox in Nova Scotia extinct—Train inspection.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Young reports, May 13:

Six days ended May 10, 1907. Inspected 15 trains, carrying about 800 passengers; vaccinated 10. Health officers of Nova Scotia report that smallpox is completely stamped out.

Report from Galveston, Tex.—Smallpox on steamship Hannover.

The following is received from Passed Assistant Surgeon Corput: May 20. Several cases smallpox aboard ship *Hannover*. These to be isolated, and all other passengers showing recent successful vaccination to be discharged. All sick have been isolated. Living quarters to be disinfected, where necessary. One thousand passengers on board.

The steamship *Hannover* left Bremen April 26 for Baltimore, arriving May 11, and sailing May 13 for Galveston.

STATISTICAL REPORTS OF MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY, STATES AND CITIES OF THE UNITED STATES—UNTABULATED.

CALIFORNIA—*San Jose*.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 30,000. Total number of deaths, 32, including enteric fever 1,

and 1 from measles. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Enteric fever 1, measles 3, scarlet fever 1.

Stockton.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 23,000. Total number of deaths, 26, including 7 from tuberculosis.

CONNECTICUT.—Month of April, 1907. Reports to the State board of health from 168 towns, having an aggregate population of 1,005,854, show as follows: Total number of deaths from all causes, 1,414, including diphtheria 31, enteric fever 5, measles 9, scarlet fever 8, whooping cough 19, and 125 from phthisis pulmonalis. Cases of contagious diseases were reported as follows: Diphtheria, 159 in 41 towns; enteric fever, 29 in 16 towns; measles, 355 in 47 towns; scarlet fever, 162 in 41 towns; whooping cough, 48 in 13 towns, and phthisis pulmonalis, 49 in 22 towns.

New Haven.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 120,000. Total number of deaths, 200, including diphtheria 3, enteric fever 2, measles 2, whooping cough 3, and 18 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 25, enteric fever 6, and scarlet fever 26.

FLORIDA.—Reports to the State board of health for the week ended May 11, 1907, show as follows: Diphtheria—*Jacksonville*, 2 cases; *Tampa*, 1 case. Enteric fever—*Jacksonville*, 5 cases; *St. Petersburg* and *Tampa*, 2 cases. Malarial fever—*Jacksonville*, 1 case. Smallpox—*Tampa*, 2 cases. Tuberculosis—*Tampa*, 2 cases; *Bayard*, *Jacksonville*, *Ocala*, and *Sanford*, each 1 case.

GEORGIA—*Augusta*.—Year ended November 30, 1906. Estimated population, 48,000. Total number of deaths, 874, including measles 8, whooping cough 2, and 99 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 8, measles 324, and scarlet fever 4.

ILLINOIS—*Belleville*.—Two weeks ended May 11, 1907. Estimated population, 23,000. Total number of deaths, 7, including 1 from diphtheria. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 2 and scarlet fever 2.

Rockford.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 43,000. Total number of deaths, 50, including scarlet fever 1, and 10 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 4 and scarlet fever 22.

INDIANA—*Michigan City*.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 23,000. Total number of deaths, 19, including 3 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Enteric fever 10, smallpox 1, and tuberculosis 1.

IOWA—*Davenport*.—Two weeks ended May 15, 1907. Estimated population, 45,000. Total number of deaths not reported. One death from scarlet fever. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 4, measles 1, and scarlet fever 9.

KANSAS—*Lawrence*.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 14,000. Total number of deaths, 19, including enteric fever 4, and 6

from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 5, enteric fever 4, measles 172, whooping cough 12, tuberculosis 6, and smallpox 2.

MINNESOTA—Stillwater.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 12,435. Total number of deaths, 13. Eight cases of smallpox and 1 of tuberculosis reported.

Winona.—Year ended March 31, 1907. Estimated population, 23,000. Total number of deaths, 234, including diphtheria 3, enteric fever 1, measles 2, whooping cough 2, and 29 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 6, scarlet fever 3, and smallpox 3.

NEW YORK—Troy.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 76,861. Total number of deaths, 136, including 30 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 7, measles 5, scarlet fever 3, whooping cough 39, and tuberculosis 32.

NORTH CAROLINA.—Month of March, 1907. Estimated population, 1,893,810. Reports to State board of health from 79 counties show as follows: Measles in 50 counties, whooping cough in 26 counties, scarlet fever in 7 counties, diphtheria in 17 counties, enteric fever in 19 counties, malarial fever in 2 counties, hemorrhagic malarial fever in 2 counties, pernicious malarial fever in 1 county, and smallpox in 31 counties, viz: Alamance, 12; Bertie, 4; Chatham, 12; Cherokee, 1; Chowan, several; Cleveland, 4; Currituck, 1; Davidson; Duplin, 3; Durham, 35; Forsyth, 13; Franklin, 10; Gaston, 6; Granville, 5; Guilford, 4; Halifax, 1; Harnett, 2; Hertford, 8; Hyde, 1; Lincoln, 4; Mecklenburg, 1; Nash, 1; New Hanover, 1; Orange, 13; Pitt, 8; Richmond, 3; Robeson, 8; Vance, 6; Wake, 27; Warren, 4, and Washington, a few cases.

Reports for the month from 21 towns having an aggregate population of 193,100—white, 116,450; colored, 76,650—show a total of 299 deaths—white, 136; colored, 163—including measles, 5; malarial fever, 1; whooping cough, 3, and 40 from phthisis pulmonalis.

OHIO—Columbus.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 185,000. Total number of deaths, 229 (31 nonresidents), including enteric fever 7, whooping cough 1, and 33 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 4, enteric fever 18, measles 48, scarlet fever 8, smallpox 11, whooping cough 12, and tuberculosis 24.

OREGON.—Month of January, 1907. Reports to the State board of health from 33 counties show as follows: Total number of deaths, 369, including diphtheria 5, enteric fever 7, and 35 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 28, enteric fever 8, measles 14, scarlet fever 10, smallpox 14, and tuberculosis 5.

Month of February, 1907. Total number of deaths, 367, including diphtheria 4, enteric fever 3, and 15 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 21, enteric fever 20, measles 56, scarlet fever 15, smallpox 11, and tuberculosis 2.

PENNSYLVANIA—*Newcastle*.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 36,500. Total number of deaths, 61, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 1, and 3 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 8, enteric fever 9, scarlet fever 1, smallpox 1, whooping cough 1, and tuberculosis 2.

SOUTH CAROLINA—*Charleston*.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 65,000. Total number of deaths, 102, including whooping cough 1, and 14 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 1, enteric fever 4, scarlet fever 1, and smallpox 1.

VIRGINIA.—Reports to the State board of health for the month of February, 1907, show as follows:

Bedford City.—Population, 3,000. Total number of deaths, 2.

Fredericksburg.—Population, 5,500—white, 3,600; colored, 1,900. Total number of deaths, 3—white, 2; colored, 1—including 1 from measles.

Lynchburg.—Population, 30,000. Total number of deaths, 41—white, 21; colored, 20—including enteric fever 3, and 3 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Manchester.—Population, 10,678—white, 7,076; colored, 3,602. Total number of deaths, 17—white, 11; colored, 6—including measles 11, and 2 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Newport News.—Population, 26,000—white, 16,000; colored, 10,000. Total number of deaths, 35—white, 16; colored, 19—including whooping cough 1, and 5 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Norfolk.—Population, 66,931—white, 37,779; colored, 29,152. Total number of deaths, 123—white, 47; colored, 76—including enteric fever 1, and 16 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Petersburg.—Population, 27,000—white, 14,000; colored, 13,000. Total number of deaths, 56—white, 22; colored, 34—including diphtheria 1, and 7 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Richmond.—Population, 100,000—white, 62,250; colored, 37,750. Total number of deaths, 226—white, 105; colored, 121—including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 2, measles 6, and 21 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Roanoke.—Population, 30,000—white, 22,500; colored, 7,500. Total number of deaths, 38—white, 19; colored, 19—including diphtheria 1, and 9 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Elizabeth City County, including *Hampton* and *Phoebe*.—Estimated population, 17,775—white, 8,925; colored, 8,850. Total number of deaths, 33—white, 13; colored, 20—including 3 from phthisis pulmonalis.

MORBIDITY.—Reports from 100 counties show contagious diseases as follows: Diphtheria present in 21 counties, enteric fever in 30, measles in 44, scarlet fever in 14, whooping cough in 48, smallpox in 14, and tuberculosis in 71.

CURRENT QUARANTINE MEASURES.

[From the Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes. Berlin. April 24 and May 1, 1907.]

BRITISH EAST INDIES.—April 3. Port of Verawal in Kathiawar declared plague infected.

KOREA.—March 11. Vessels arriving at the port of Chemulpo from Niuchwang and Yinkou are subject to sanitary police inspection under provisions of the Korean quarantine regulations.

DUTCH INDIES.—March 24. Quarantine measures against arrivals from Niuchwang suspended.

AUSTRALIA.

Plague in Queensland and New South Wales—Examination of rodents for plague infection.

The following information is taken from plague bulletins received from Consul-General Bray at Melbourne:

QUEENSLAND.

Brisbane.—Week ended March 16, 1907. One case of bubonic plague reported. Total number of rodents destroyed, 595; examined, 441; found infected, 1. Week ended March 23, 1907. One case was reported, occurring in the locality in which the two previous cases occurred. A plague-infected rat was found in this locality on February 12. Rodents destroyed, 593; examined, 369; found infected, 0. Five days ended March 28, 1907. Rodents destroyed, 697; examined, 417; found infected, 0.

Port Douglas.—Week ended March 16, 1907. Six new cases admitted to hospital; type bubonic. Sick and dying rats have been seen in the cane fields of the district in which Port Douglas is situated. Week ended March 23, 1907. No further cases.

Townsville.—One fatal case occurred on March 17.

NEW SOUTH WALES.

Sydney.—Week ended March 16, 1907. Two cases of plague reported, occurring in different localities. Rodents destroyed, 1,947; examined, 797; found infected, 3. Week ended March 23, 1907. Four cases reported from different localities. One case was connected with a case previously reported. Rodents destroyed 2,224; examined, 848; found infected, 11. Week ended March 30, 1907. One case, 3 deaths reported. Rodents destroyed, 1,763; examined, 532; found infected, 4.
