Report from Indianapolis, Ind.—Measles.

Reports received from the board of health at Indianapolis, Ind., show, for the week ended May 19, 540 cases, 1 death of measles; week ended May 26, 1907, 419 cases, 3 deaths. Census population, 169,164.

Report from Portsmouth, N. H.—Measles.

The health officer reports, May 26, for the week ended May 25, 1907, 248 cases. Census population, 10,637.

STATISTICAL REPORTS OF MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY, STATES AND CITIES OF THE UNITED STATES—UNTABULATED.

California.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 1,882,846. Total number of deaths reported to the State board of health, 2,694, corresponding to an annual death rate of 16.4 per 1,000 population. Deaths from contagious diseases were as follows: Diphtheria 25, enteric fever 34, measles 19, scarlet fever 2, whooping cough 27, and 409 from tuberculosis.

Colorado.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 615,570. Reports to the State board of health show as follows: Diphtheria, 38 cases, 9 deaths; enteric fever, 16 cases, 8 deaths; scarlet fever, 268 cases, 27 deaths; smallpox, 163 cases, 1 death. Total number of deaths from all causes, 835.

FLORIDA.—Reports to the State board of health for the week ended May 25, 1907, show as follows: Diphtheria—Jacksonville, 2 cases; Fernandina, 1 case. Enteric fever—Arcadia and Nocatee, 4 cases; Jacksonville and Tampa, each 2 cases. Smallpox—Bluff Springs, 1 case; Pensacola, 2 cases; Tampa, 4 cases. Tuberculosis—Jacksonville, 3 cases; Tampa, 4 cases.

Iowa—Burlington.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 26,000. Total number of deaths, 27, including measles 1, and 1 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Measles 75 and scarlet fever 2.

Massachusetts.—Reports from the State board of health for the month of April, 1907, show as follows: Week ended April 6, 1907. Forty-three cities and towns, having an aggregate estimated population of 2,215,229. Total number of deaths, 772, including diphtheria 17, enteric fever 2, measles 1, and 76 from phthisis pulmonalis. Cases: Diphtheria 155, enteric fever 24, measles 204, scarlet fever 154, whooping cough 3, smallpox 37, tuberculosis 96. Week ended April 13, 1907. Number of localities reporting, 43. Estimated population, 2,234,548. Total number of deaths, 748; diphtheria 9, enteric fever 3, measles 2, phthisis pulmonalis 76. Cases: Diphtheria 167, enteric fever 21, measles 185, scarlet fever 147, smallpox 20, whooping cough 7, tuberculosis 95.

Week ended April 20, 1907. Number of localities reporting, 44. Estimated population, 2,246,196. Total number of deaths, 717; diphtheria 11, enteric fever 3, measles 2, phthisis pulmonalis 83. Cases: Diphtheria 247, enteric fever 20, measles 175, scarlet fever 195, small-pox 12, whooping cough 22, tuberculosis 94.

Week ended April 27, 1907. Number of localities reporting 44. Estimated population, 2,246,196. Total number of deaths, 838; diphtheria 17, enteric fever 3, measles 1, phthisis pulmonalis 69. Cases: Diphtheria 165, enteric fever 25, measles 208, scarlet fever 144, small-pox 17, whooping cough 5, tuberculosis 84.

MICHIGAN.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 2,530,016. Total number of deaths returned to the State department for the month was 3,212, including enteric fever 36, diphtheria 27, scarlet fever 19, measles 56, whooping cough 18, and 270 from tuberculosis. The total number of deaths from all causes corresponds to an annual rate of 15.1 per 1,000 estimated population.

New Jersey--Phillipsburg.—Two weeks ended May 18, 1907. Estimated population, 13,500. Total number of deaths not reported. One death from diphtheria. Two cases of diphtheria and 1 of enteric fever reported.

New York—Cohoes.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 24,183. Total number of deaths, 36. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 2 and enteric fever 17.

OREGON—Portland.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 175,000. Total number of deaths, 153; including diphtheria 5, enteric fever 3, measles 1, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 2, and 15 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 19, enteric fever 11 (including 5 brought to city for treatment); measles 43, scarlet fever 6, smallpox 1, and whooping cough 6.

PENNSYLVANIA—Bewer Falls.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 12,000. One death from scarlet fever reported. Cases: Enteric fever 1, measles 1, and scarlet fever 1.

Highspire.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 1,500. Total number of deaths 3. Seven cases of measles and 1 case of tuberculosis reported.

A case of yellow fever was reported at San Nicolas, Habana Province,

May 27, 1907.

The patient was a Spanish boy, 14 years old, who arrived in Cuba six months ago. He has been living in San Nicolas for some time (just how long I was not able to find out), and received his infection there. He was taken sick May 21, and was reported as suspicious May 26, and a board of experts was sent to decide upon the case. They arrived in San Nicolas on May 27 and reported him positive the same date. The boy died during the night of May 27.

San Nicolas is 15 miles this side of Nueva Paz, and Union de Reyes is situated 15 miles the other side. Habana can be reached by electric car in one hour and a half or two hours from San Nicolas, and passengers

can reach Tampa from the infected district in forty hours.

May 31. One case yellow fever in Benefica Hospital, Habana, infected in San Nicolas. Taken sick May 24, entered Benefica May 25. Official diagnosis May 31. Two suspects in Guines.

Report from Matanzas—Inspection of vessels—Precautions taken at Union de Reyes to prevent spread of yellow fever.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Nuñez reports May 28:

Week ended May 25, 1907.

Bills of health issued to 9 vessels leaving for United States ports; 2 sailing vessels were fumigated, the British schooner *Prosperare*, bound for Mobile, and the American schooner *Lizzie B. Willey*, for Pensacola. Both vessels left on the morning of May 24, being towed out of the harbor immediately after the fumigation was completed, with all well on board. Two breeding places of mosquitoes, in barrels containing rain water, were detected on the *Lizzie B. Willey*, and their

content was dumped overboard.

On May 21, late in the evening, I was notified that a case of yellow fever was reported in Habana as originating from the town of Union de Reyes, this province. The report was cabled to the Bureau the same evening. On the following morning a telegram was received from Passed Assistant Surgeon Stansfield reporting the case to this office. I am informed that the case occurred in a young Spaniard who has been in the island seven months, and resided in that town since his arrival in Cuba, without being recently in Habana. It is presumed by the Cuban sanitary authorities that the origin of the infection in this case is to be attributed either to the neighboring town of Los Palos, where the previous case of that disease was reported, or to the 3 cases ending in death reported in that town on December last.

A sanitary squad has been ordered from Habana to Union de Reyes, and I am informed that every precaution is being taken to preclude

the dissemination of the disease.

Report from Santiago-Inspection of vessels.

History of yellow fever cases at Gualan—Quarantine declared at Puerto Barrios against interior—Passenger traffic suspended.

I have, since last report, made another visit of inspection to Zacapa, Gualan, and other points on railroad, induced by continued bad condition and rumors of fever. The yellow-fever patient reported by cable is convalescent and will leave his room to-day. The hospital, which has been occupied only since December, was built in accordance with recent sanitary advancement. The patient was promptly isolated and protected, and no other case has occured. The hospital has, at the present time, only 12 or 14 patients, a large diminution since my last visit, indicating a decided improvement in general sanitary conditions. As to the town of Zacapa my investigations were entirely negative. It is currently reported that there is an unusual number of cases of sickness and deaths.

At Gualan I found that there had occurred, 2 days before my visit, a death which, from information obtained, leaves no doubt of its having been due to a fulminant case of yellow fever, attacked, attended with the characteristic features of such cases, and terminating with black vomit on the third day. A case occurred in a person of the better class, a native of Guatemala, who lived through the epidemics of 1905 and 1906 in Gualan, and immediately in the center of infection of those years, and who is now occupying a house in which 4 cases of fever occurred in 1905. The death alluded to also occurred in a house in the infected center. This patient has an exceptionally good sanitary history, has always enjoyed good health; indeed, does not know of ever having had a malarial attack. Her case was well defined, and she was already convalescing.

The second case, an English woman, who has until recently lived at Guatemala City, 5,000 feet altitude; has never before been exposed to yellow fever, and as far as she knows has been free from malaria. None of the characteristic symptoms so prominent in chronic malaria in the tropics are apparent. I saw her first on the afternoon of the fifth day of her attack, and gathered the following history: Conditions—Attacked at night with chill, severe headache, backache, nausea and

vomiting, first of contents of stomach mixed with bile; nausea continued; ejecta white and mucous; eyes injected, tongue red, narrow, clean, but soft and moist; gums clean, free from sordes, and intensely red; in fact the entire fauces participated in this livid color; intense epigastric tenderness, with tenderness over splenic region; no perceptible enlargement. Bowels constipated, urine very scant; could not obtain specimen for examination at this visit. Temperature 102° F. Pulse 86.

On the following day, accompanied by Doctor Lytle, from railroad hospital, we saw the patient at 11 a.m. General condition showing progressive march of disease. Temperature, 995°; pulse, 84, weak and small; nausea continued, gums bleeding; show of hemorrhage from vagina; conjunctiva and skin of face perceptibly yellow; urine almost suppressed, but scant amount obtained showed albumin; heart failure threatening. Being compelled to return to port to meet steamer, and train being delayed, could not stop to see patient on vesterday, eighth day of the fever. Saw her attendant at depot, who reported slight improvement with increased urinary secretion.

This port so far continues free from infection. Conditions in cuartel have materially improved. No medical officer in port. ties have established quarantine against interior by proclamation.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Eakins reports, May 9:

Week ended May 4, 1907. Bill of health issued to the steamship Goldenfels, hound for Philadelphia and New York, with a total crew of 45, and to the steamship Swazi, bound for Boston and New York, with a total crew of 51. The usual precautions were taken, holds fumigated, rat guards placed on wharf lines, and lascars' effects disinfected.

Week ended April 27, 1907. Thirty-three deaths from cholera,

423 from plague, and 67 from smallpox in Calcutta.

In Bengal and India during the same week, 3,811 cases and 3,527 deaths from plague, and 87,394 cases and 76,711 deaths, respectively.

Reports of the ravages of plague in the Punjab continue. From Peshawar the disease is spreading to the outlying districts. Hundreds

of people are leaving the city.

Notwithstanding the extreme heat plague still rages at Delhi, where over 100 deaths are reported daily. About 40,000 Hindus have fled from the city. Meerut, a town much smaller than Delhi, reports over 200 deaths daily.

Reports describe Aligarh as a city of the dead. The Hindus there seem generally to distrust inoculation in spite of official assurances.

Report from Colon—Sanitary conditions good—Water supply and sewerage system—Quarantine service.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Scales reports, May 18:

Present sanitary conditions at Colon are very good. Several of the streets are paved with brick and macadam; the buildings are being raised and filled in underneath to elevate the surface to the level of the streets. Oil barrels are placed wherever there are pools of water, and immediately after rainfalls the surface of the pools is covered with oil to kill the larvæ of mosquitoes. Stegomyia, Culex, and Anopheles are very scarce.

The most prevalent disease is malarial fever. There are a few cases of enteric fever. The last case of yellow fever occurred in May, 1906. The city is supplied with cisterns and waterworks. The source of water for the latter is distant about 3 miles from Colon. The water

is good and plentiful.

Colon has also a very good sewerage system.

The rainy season has just commenced. It attains its greatest precipitation in July and August.

The death rate for the month of April is said to be lower than ever

before in the history of Colon.

Panama City enjoys the same approximate freedom from mosquitoes as Colon. Its sanitary condition is very satisfactory, and the same precautions are practiced against the propagation of mosquitoes.

Along the Canal Zone the different varieties of mosquitoes are more abundant. This is due to the more numerous breeding places, but excellent work is being done in filling low places and in the distribution

of oil.

The system of sanitation is carried out in a practical manner. Daily and weekly reports are sent to the department of sanitation, and the increase or decrease of infectious diseases is noted. If an increase, a sanitary officer is immediately detailed to the place in question and steps are taken at once to improve the condition existing.

The general work of sanitation is carried on at all times.

Strict quarantine is maintained, both at Panama and Colon, against all infected places. Quarantine officers board vessels immediately on their arrival, and all persons with a temperature above normal are sent to the quarantine station; also all persons not previously successfully vaccinated are vaccinated before being allowed to land.

During the month of April 1 case of smallpox occurred in a passenger from Cartagena. He was sent to the quarantine station at

Golon.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

Reports from Manila—Inspection of vessels—Smallpox—Issuance of bills of health for vessels engaged in interisland traffic discontinued; circular—Quarantine detention of vessels from ports in China on account of plague.

Chief Quarantine Officer Heiser reports, April 1, 12, 17, and 26 and May 3:

On April 8, British steamship *Indrapura*, with 67 crew, en route from Kobe and Cebu to Boston and New York, granted a supplemental bill of health after the usual inspection of crew and cargo.

On April 11, American steamship Lyra, with 58 crew, granted a consular bill of health for Tacoma via China and Japan ports. All persons on board inspected at hour of sailing. Cargo inspected and passed, or disinfected during the process of loading, and certified on the manifests.

Week ended April 20, 1907. Smallpox, 1 case; 1 death.

Vessels granted consular bills of health as follows:

On April 15, United States army transport *Thomas* granted a bill of health for San Francisco via Nagasaki and Honolulu. Crew and steerage passengers bathed and their effects and baggage disinfected. Cargo and baggage either disinfected or inspected, and so certified. All persons on board inspected at Mariveles at the hour of sailing.

On April 20, British steamship Jesseric granted a consular bill of health for Boston and New York via Cebu. Cargo inspected and passed

and manifests viséed.

Week ended April 27, 1907. No quarantinable diseases reported. Vessels clearing for the United States granted bills of health as follows:

On April 27 the British steamship Saint George, with 37 crew, en route from Shanghai to New York, granted a supplemental bill of

health after the usual inspection of cargo and personnel.

Issuance of bills of health discontinued.—Owing to the improved health conditions in the Philippine Islands, and in accordance with the spirit of act 1340 of the Philippine Commission, which has for its object the reduction of restrictions upon interisland vessels, commencing May 1, 1907, bills of health are no longer required for vessels pro-

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ceeding from one port in the Philippine Islands to another port in the Philippine Islands. The circular letter putting this order into effect is inclosed herewith.

Following the usual custom of the service which has been observed in the Philippines since 1900 to enforce a quarantine at the season of the year at which plague is most likely to be conveyed from near-by foreign countries to the Philippines, the following letter, which is self-explanatory, has been sent to the American consul at Amoy and the shipping firms most interested and published in the Manila daily papers:

To the owners and agents of vessels and others concerned:

After May 1, 1907, it will not be necessary for masters of vessels commencing a voyage at one port in the Philippine Islands to another port in the Philippine Islands to obtain the bill of health issued by the officers of this Service, which heretofore has been the case.

Sir: In view of the appearance of plague at a number of different places in China, I have the honor to state that after May 10, 1907, vessels proceeding from China to the Philippines, and which carry steerage passengers, or passengers who ordinarily travel as such, upon entering ports of the Philippine Islands will be subject to a quarantine detention of seven days, which is to date from the time the disinfection of the vessel is completed in the Philippines. Vessels from ports at which regular officers of the United States Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service are stationed, and at which adequate facilities exist for the treatment of steerage passengers, will not be subject to detention in the Philippines, unless quarantinable disease makes its appearance on board during the voyage.

Nice.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 130,000. Total number of deaths, 238, including enteric fever 1 and 4 from smallpox.

GERMANY— Weimar.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 31,127. Total number of deaths 33, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 1, and 4 from tuberculosis.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended May 11, 1907, correspond to an annual rate of 15.7 per 1,000 of population, which is estimated at 16,024,458.

London.—One thousand four hundred and thirty-one deaths were registered during the week, including measles 39, scarlet fever 9, diphtheria 15, enteric fever 4, whooping cough 63, tuberculosis 205, and 9 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 15.7 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,996 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 3 from measles and 12 from whooping cough.

Portsmouth.—Four weeks ended April 13, 1907. Estimated population, 208,291. Total number of deaths, 321, including diphtheria 3, measles 45, and whooping cough 10.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended May 11, 1907, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 22.3 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,117,547. The lowest rate was recorded in Galway,

viz, 3.9, and the highest in Newtownards, viz, 34.3, per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 195 deaths were registered, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 1, measles 6, whooping cough 8, and 27 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended May 11, 1907, correspond to an annual rate of 19.3 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,812,171. The highest rate of mortality was recorded in Perth, viz, 24.0, and the lowest in Aberdeen, viz, 12.9, per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 671, including diphtheria 4, enteric fever 5, measles 12, scarlet fever 3, and 40 from whooping cough.

RUSSIA—Riga.—Month of February, 1907. Estimated population, 320,000. Total number of deaths, 658, including diphtheria 10, enteric fever 2, measles 54, scarlet fever 19, smallpox 6, and 71 from tuberculosis.

SPAIN—Barcelona.—Ten days ended May 10, 1907. Estimated population, 600,000. Total number of deaths, 356, including diphtheria 5, enteric fever 2, measles 2, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 1, smallpox 3, and 20 from tuberculosis.

Cadiz.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 69,382. Total number of deaths, 174, including diphtheria 3, enteric fever 2, smallpox 3, and 25 from tuberculosis.

Huelva.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 22,000. Total number of deaths, 72, including diphtheria 1, smallpox 4, and 8 from tuberculosis.

Seville.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 148,315. Total number of deaths, 490, including diphtheria 4, enteric fever 2, measles 3, whooping cough 7, smallpox 3, and 81 from tuberculosis.

SWITZERLAND.—Week ended May 4, 1907. Reports from 18 cities, having an aggregate population of 867,056, show as follows: Total number of deaths, 255, including diptheria 1, measles 1, scarlet fever 3, and 59 from tuberculosis.

West Indies—St. Christopher.—Three weeks ended May 4, 1907. Estimated population, 49,289. Total number of deaths, 81, including measles 1 and 5 from tuberculosis.

St. Thomas.—Three months ended March 31, 1907. Estimated population, 11,002. Total number of deaths, 127, including leprosy 1, enteric fever 1, and 15 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Trinidad—Port of Spain—Two weeks ended May 11, 1907. Estimated population, 60,000. Total number of deaths, 43, including yellow fever 2 and 9 from tuberculosis.

Cholera, yellow fever, plague, and smallpox from December 28, 1906, to June 7, 1907.
