*Report from Mobile, Ala.—Mortality from pellagra in Mobile County.*

Acting Assistant Surgeon Goldthwaite, at Mobile Quarantine, reports, June 5:

The registry of deaths in the office of the Mobile County health officer shows that deaths from pellagra occurred as follows at Mount Vernon, Mobile County, Ala., on premises of Alabama Insane Hospital (department for colored insane):

*Report from Evansville, Ind.—Abatement in epidemic measles.*

Surgeon Stoner reports, June 7:

There is a slight abatement in the epidemic measles present in this city. The disease is now confined mostly to the west end. A total of 545 cases was reported to the city board of health in May, with 6 deaths. So far in June 35 cases have been reported, against 79 for same date in May.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Small reports, June 6:

Measles in epidemic form prevails in Eastport. There are many cases, mostly of mild type.

### STATISTICAL REPORTS OF MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY, STATES AND CITIES OF THE UNITED STATES—UNTABULATED.

CONNECTICUT—*Stamford*.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 20,000. Total number of deaths not reported. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 1, measles 4, and scarlet fever 1.

FLORIDA.—Reports to the State board of health for the week ended

June 1, 1907, show as follows: Diphtheria—*Tampa*, 1 case. Enteric fever—*Arcadia* and *Nocatee*, 4 cases; *Jacksonville*, 4 cases; *Plant City*, 2 cases; *Ocala* and *Datona*, each 1 case. Malarial fever—*Tampa*, 1 case. Tuberculosis—*Jacksonville*, 4 cases; *Tampa*, *Lloyd*, and *Ocala*, each 1 case.

*Pensacola*.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 22,256. Total number of deaths, 67, including enteric fever 1, measles 5, whooping cough 5, and 5 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases not reported.

ILLINOIS—*Quincy*.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 43,000. Total number of deaths, 58, including diphtheria 3 and 4 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 36, measles 39, and enteric fever 2.

INDIANA—*Anderson*.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 25,000. Total number of deaths, 16, including 2 from tuberculosis. No cases of contagious diseases reported.

*Jeffersonville*.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 10,818. Total number of deaths, 21, including enteric fever 2 and 1 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Enteric fever 3, measles 13, and tuberculosis 1.

*Marion*.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 27,000. Total number of deaths, 23. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 7, enteric fever 3, and smallpox 4.

IOWA—*Cedar Rapids*.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 30,000. Total number of deaths, 35, including diphtheria 1, measles 1, and 1 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 5, measles 31, scarlet fever 6, and smallpox 3.

MINNESOTA—*Minneapolis*.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 285,000. Total number of deaths, 260, including diphtheria 5, enteric fever 10, scarlet fever 2, and 21 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 28, enteric fever 21, scarlet fever 60, smallpox 38, and tuberculosis 23.

MONTANA.—Year ended June 30, 1906. Estimated population, 280,000. Total number of deaths, 3,014, including diphtheria 61, enteric fever 89, measles 9, scarlet fever 12, smallpox 1, whooping cough 58, and 229 from tuberculosis.

*Helena*.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 21,000. Total number of deaths not reported. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 1, measles 30, scarlet fever 2, and smallpox 3.

NEW HAMPSHIRE—*Concord*.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 20,000. Total number of deaths, 42, including diphtheria 1 and 1 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 7, measles 18, scarlet fever 4, and tuberculosis 1.

*Franklin*.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 6,000. Total number of deaths, 4. Case of contagious disease reported: Scarlet fever 1.

**NEW JERSEY.**—Reports to the State board of health for the month ending May 15, 1907, show a total of 2,988 deaths, including diphtheria 55, enteric fever 17, measles 12, scarlet fever 25, whooping cough 15, and 420 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases not reported. The number of deaths reported shows a decrease of 665 from the number for the previous month.

*Morristown.*—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 12,500. Total number of deaths, 18. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Enteric fever 1, measles 3, and scarlet fever 8.

**NEW YORK.**—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 8,340,600. Reports to the State department of health show as follows: Total number of deaths, 12,447, corresponding to an annual death rate of 17.9 per 1,000 of the population, includes enteric fever 125, measles 83, scarlet fever 115, smallpox 2, whooping cough 81, diphtheria 219, and 1,394 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 2,292, enteric fever 651, measles 3,749, scarlet fever 2,774, smallpox 27, and tuberculosis 2,298.

*Auburn.*—Year ended December 31, 1906. Estimated population, 40,000. Total number of deaths, 550, including diphtheria 5, enteric fever 4, scarlet fever 2, whooping cough 3, and 63 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 95, enteric fever 35, measles 6, scarlet fever 46, whooping cough 120, and phthisis pulmonalis 67.

*Middletown.*—Year ended November 30, 1906. Estimated population, 15,914. Total number of deaths, 295, including diphtheria 3, enteric fever 2, whooping cough 1, and 30 from phthisis pulmonalis. Cases: Diphtheria 32, enteric fever 33, measles 12, scarlet fever 15, and smallpox 9.

**OHIO**—*Newark.*—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 28,500. Total number of deaths not reported. One death from enteric fever and 6 from tuberculosis reported. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 1 and scarlet fever 6.

*Springfield.*—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 45,000. Total number of deaths, 49, including measles 1 and 3 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Enteric fever 2, measles 76, and scarlet fever 1.

**PENNSYLVANIA**—*Dunmore.*—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 17,500. Total number of deaths, 15. No deaths from contagious diseases reported. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 2, measles 1, and scarlet fever 1.

*Homestead.*—Ten days ended May 31, 1907. Estimated population, 16,000. Total number of deaths, 8, including 1 from measles. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 1, measles 25, and smallpox 2.

*Newcastle.*—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 38,000. Total number of deaths, 48, including enteric fever 2 and 1 from

tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 4, enteric fever 5, scarlet fever 2, smallpox 1, and measles 3.

*Warren.*—Four weeks ended April 28, 1907. Estimated population, 10,000. Total number of deaths, 9. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Enteric fever 2 and diphtheria 1.

**RHODE ISLAND.**—Month of February, 1907. Total number of deaths reported to the State board of health, 883, including 72 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases not reported.

**SOUTH CAROLINA.**—*Charleston.*—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 65,000. Total number of deaths 149, including enteric fever 3, and 17 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 1 and enteric fever 14.

## FOREIGN AND INSULAR.

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### AFRICA.

#### *Reports from Cape Colony—Plague at King Williams Town—Examination of rodents for plague infection.*

The following reports on the outbreak of plague at King Williams Town are received from the medical officer of health for the colony, under dates of April 29 and May 6:

A male native living in King Williams Town, who died suddenly on the 22d instant, was, after post-mortem examination, found to have died of plague, and a female native living at the same address, admitted to the Grey Hospital, died of plague on the 27th idem.

During the week ended May 4, 1907, no further case of plague was discovered in man at King Williams Town, but on the 5th instant a European girl, aged 11, residing at King Williams Town, in the neighborhood of the premises on which the previous cases occurred, was found suffering from bubonic plague and removed to the local plague hospital.

At King Williams Town 35 rats, of which 11 were found dead, and 8 mice, of which 2 were found dead, have been examined, and 1 rat found to be plague infected and 10 rats and 2 mice probably plague infected.

#### *Report from Portuguese Guinea—Epidemic of sleeping sickness.*

Official reports, dated April 30, 1907, show that a severe epidemic of sleeping sickness is prevailing in the island of Principe, Portuguese Guinea.

### AUSTRALIA.

#### *Examination of rodents for plague infection at Brisbane and Sydney.*

The following information is taken from plague bulletins received from Consul-General Bray, at Melbourne:

#### QUEENSLAND.

*Brisbane.*—Week ended April 6, 1907. Number of rodents destroyed, 662; examined, 305; found infected, 0.

#### NEW SOUTH WALES.

*Sydney.*—Week ended April 6, 1907. Number of rodents destroyed, 1,731; examined, 625; found infected, 1.

ARABIA.

*Report from Maskat—Sanitary conditions—Quarantine against ports in India.*

Consul Coffin reports, May 5:

No official record of vital statistics is kept by the authorities of Maskat. The appearance of any contagious disease would, however, become known at once to the British medical officer, and through his report to this office.

There have been in the past outbreaks of cholera and plague at Maskat. A quarantine of seven days, which is not enforced in the case of European passengers, is maintained against Indian ports.

From November 1 to April 1 a form of malarial fever, sometimes called Persian Gulf fever, is very prevalent in all the towns along the coast of Oman and in the Persian Gulf, and is always endemic in Maskat during that period. Leprosy exists in Maskat, a colony of perhaps twenty or thirty lepers living segregated outside the walls of the city. The disease does not seem to be on the increase.

In January, 1907, a small outbreak of blackwater fever occurred in Maskat. The origin of the infection is not known, this being the first appearance here of the disease. There were 8 cases and 5 deaths, all among the foreign population—i. e., white people and Goanese—during a period of about 2 weeks.

A doctor of the Indian medical service is attached to the British consulate here and is the only foreign physician in Maskat. Until recently he was the head of a hospital maintained by the Sultan, with accommodations for a few patients. The hospital building has been abandoned and a dispensary has been opened.

BRITISH HONDURAS.

*Report from Belize, fruit port.*

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, May 1:

Week ended April 27, 1907. One supplemental and 2 original bills of health issued to 3 steamships, and 3 vessels, 372 crew, 21 cabin and

106 steerage passengers inspected. One case of illness was investigated. Manifests were viséed for 7,649 pieces of freight; 62 pieces of crews' baggage disinfected by steam; vaccination certificates issued to 45 Asiatic crew bound to Manila.

The weekly report of the municipal health department shows among foreigners 1 new case of smallpox and among natives 14 deaths from smallpox.

Tientsin reports a few cases of smallpox among natives, while Hankow reports 3 cases among foreigners.

*Tuberculosis in Cuba—Free sanitarium for tuberculous patients to be established.*

The following is received from Minister Morgan, under date of May 25:

There has been a gratifying progressive decrease in contagious diseases throughout the island. Tuberculosis, however, is an exception, and, while the mortality from it has diminished, the following table indicates that from 1900 to 1905, inclusive, deaths from this disease have proportionally increased in each 1,000 deaths from all causes, and are greater in number than from all other infectious diseases combined:

Under the government of intervention, in addition to the organization of dispensary treatment for individuals in the early stage of tuberculosis unable to leave their families or occupations, together with instruction in the importance of living and sleeping in the open air, special wards were set apart in the hospitals for advanced cases. In order still further to check this disease and to extend facilities for fighting it, the provisional governor has recently appropriated the sum of \$60,000 for the construction of the necessary machinery and equipment for the establishment of a free tuberculosis sanitarium for the poor of both sexes, to accommodate 50 persons, the number to be doubled when the capacity of the institution has been enlarged. The site selected is near the village of Arroyo Arenas, 12 miles from Habana.

In Habana there already exists a "League against Tuberculosis" which has done good work, the president of which is, ex officio, a member of the superior board of health.

*Report from Matanzas—Inspection of vessels—Sanitary conditions—Summary, month of May, 1907.*

Acting Assistant Surgeon Nuñez reports, June 4:

Week ended June 1, 1907. Bills of health issued to 11 vessels leaving this port for the United States in good sanitary condition, and 6 health and acclimation certificates granted to passengers bound to southern ports via Habana. No vessel left directly for any port requiring fumigation.

Since May 21 no new cases of yellow fever nor any other quarantinable diseases have been reported within this province. The case of yellow fever above referred to recovered.

The health of the city during the past week was good, but I am classifying the sanitary condition of this port as suspicious as a precautionary measure.

*Summary.*—During the month of May, 1907, 36 bills of health were granted to vessels bound for United States ports, having an aggregate number of 882 crew and 52 passengers in transit for Cuban and American ports; 3 sailing vessels and 1 steamship destined for Gulf ports were fumigated, and 5 health and acclimation certificates and 1 of protection from smallpox issued to passengers going to the United States by way of Habana.

No ship arrived in this harbor during the month with any quarantinable disease on board.

One case of yellow fever directly traceable to the town of Union de Reyes, this province, was detected May 21 at the Quinta de Covadonga, a Spanish sanatorium in Habana.

German Government reports a case of plague discovered May 28 on board British steamer *Wharfedale*, from Buenos Aires, in the Elbe at Groden, near Cuxhaven, 2 of the crew having died at sea during the voyage, and the present case, being that of a Lascar steward on board the ship, has been officially determined to be plague. The patient is apparently improving. The rest of the crew are quarantined, and the ship and cargo will be fumigated. The harbor of Hamburg is free of disease.

Two weeks ended May 11, 1907. Bills of health issued to 12 vessels having an aggregate personnel of 920 crew and 1,366 passengers.

Of these vessels, 2 were bound to San Francisco via Honolulu, 1 to San Francisco direct, 3 to Manila, 1 each to Tacoma and Guam (via Yap), and 4 to New York via Suez Canal.

The *Mongolia*, from Hongkong to San Francisco, arrived here with a case of smallpox, as previously reported, and, after detention at the quarantine station for disinfection and vaccination, sailed.

The holds, forecastles, etc., of 4 steamships were fumigated, under supervision of this office, for the purpose of destroying vermin. Two of these vessels, the *Montrrose* and *Erroll*, were bound for New York, and the *Nikko Maru* was bound for Manila.

No quarantinable disease has been reported in this vicinity.

Smallpox is reported prevalent in the city of Nagoya, 27 cases having been reported in one day; 5 more cases of plague are reported in Osaka, and plague is reported epidemic in Taipeh, Taiwan (Formosa).

The steamship *Empress of Japan* arrived here from Vancouver with 7 cases of smallpox among her crew. The same vessel is said to have arrived at Victoria quarantine with a case on the previous trip and was disinfected and released, and it is possible that these cases had been infected on the vessel previous to her disinfection there.

Number of emigrants per steamship *Doric*, sailing May 15, 1907, recommended for rejection: For San Francisco or Honolulu, 13.

Per steamship *Kaga Maru*, May 15: For Seattle, 37.

These rejections were all for trachoma.

## TURKEY.

*Report from Constantinople—Plague at Djeddah—Plague epidemic on island of Bahrein.*

Doctor Post, American representative on the International Sanitary Board, reports, May 22:

The epidemic of plague at Djeddah appears to have stopped suddenly, as is usual with the commencement of very hot weather. The record of the epidemic has been as follows: May 6-11, 13 cases, 12 deaths. Total since January 8, 1907, 365 cases, 350 deaths.

An epidemic of plague is raging at Bahrein, in consequence of which, since May 18, arrivals from Bahrein are subjected to 5 full days' quarantine and strict disinfection, with destruction of rats and mice on board the ships. These measures are executed at some one of the quarantine stations of the Empire.

At a recent meeting of the sanitary board provision was made for the construction of a new supplementary cordon at Camaran. The new construction is expected to be ready for use by the beginning of the next pilgrimage, in August. One hundred and thirteen thousand Ottoman subjects, an unprecedented number, visited Mecca during the pilgrimage just ended.

## WEST INDIES.

*Plague on island of Trinidad.*

Information was received by the Bureau, June 11, from the Department of State, reporting plague, 2 deaths, at Trinidad.

This information was sent on the same date by the Bureau to Chief Quarantine Officer Foster, at San Juan, P. R., Passed Assistant Surgeon Stansfield, at Habana, Cuba, Surgeon White, at New Orleans, La., and to quarantine officers at Atlantic and Gulf ports, the State health officers of Florida, Louisiana, and Texas, and the commissioners of health at Baltimore, Md., and Boston, Mass.

## FOREIGN AND INSULAR STATISTICAL REPORTS OF COUNTRIES AND CITIES—UNTABULATED.

AUSTRALIA—*Sydney*.—Month of March, 1907. Estimated population, 538,800. Total number of deaths, 411, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 6, plague 2, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 15, and 48 from tuberculosis.

CANADA—*Quebec—Sherbrooke*.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 14,000. Total number of deaths, 21, including 6 from tuberculosis.

CUBA—*Matanzas*.—Thirty days ended May 20, 1907. Estimated population, 49,990. Total number of deaths, 102, including whooping cough 1, and 25 from tuberculosis.

GERMANY—*Munich*.—Month of March, 1907. Estimated population, 548,000. Total number of deaths, 912, including diphtheria 15, measles 36, scarlet fever 2, whooping cough 12, and 152 from tuberculosis.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales*.—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended May 18, 1907, correspond to an annual rate of 15.1 per 1,000 of population, which is estimated at 16,024,458.

*London*.—One thousand three hundred and eighty-three deaths were registered during the week, including measles 51, scarlet fever 12, diphtheria 11, enteric fever 1, whooping cough 59, tuberculosis 205, and 21 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 15.2 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,908 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 5 from measles, 3 from scarlet fever, and 15 from whooping cough.

*Ireland*.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended May 18, 1907, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 22.0 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,117,547. The lowest rate was recorded in Sligo, viz, 9.6, and the highest in Galway, viz, 27.2, per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 208 deaths were registered, including diphtheria 1, measles 2, whooping cough 4, and 49 from tuberculosis.

*Scotland*.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended May 18, 1907, correspond to an annual rate of 19.7 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,812,171. The highest rate of mortality was recorded in Glasgow, viz, 21.8, and the lowest in Perth, viz, 12.0 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 685, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 2, measles 8, scarlet fever 3, and 52 from whooping cough.

ITALY—*Florence*.—Month of March, 1907. Estimated population, 225,621. Total number of deaths, 551, including diphtheria 16, enteric fever 9, measles 8, whooping cough 15, and 63 from tuberculosis.
