

PUBLIC HEALTH REPORTS.

UNITED STATES.

Passengers from Habana admitted at southern ports on certificate of five days' medical observation at Tricornia quarantine station.

Passed Assistant Surgeon von Ezdorf, at Louisiana quarantine, was instructed June 12 by the Bureau:

Passengers arriving from Habana bearing certificates service officer that they have been detained under medical observation at Tricornia for five days preceding embarkation, and all well on arrival, may be passed without detention at southern quarantines.

This information was sent on the same date to the service quarantine officers at Mobile, Ala.; Tampa, Fla.; Cape Charles, Va.; Key West, Fla.; Charleston, S. C.; Savannah, Ga.; Brunswick, Ga.; Biloxi, Miss.; and to Surgeon White at New Orleans, La., the State health officers of Florida and Texas, and the health officer at Mobile, Ala.

Correspondence relative to plague death at Marine Hospital, San Francisco, Cal.

The following is received from Surgeon Austin:

May 26. Patient from local steam tug admitted to hospital evening May 23, died suddenly this morning. Autopsy and microscopic examination, very suspicious, plague. Long and Currie confirm this report.

May 28. Surgeon Austin was directed by the Bureau:

If case proves to be plague, trace as far as possible. The tug should be fumigated at quarantine.

May 29 the following was received from Surgeon Austin:

Investigation of the antecedents of O. T., the patient who died at this hospital of suspected plague, has developed the following facts:

O. T. was employed as a sailor on the steam tug *Wizard* from March 7 to May 23, and the vessel was in the harbor at San Francisco from April 27 to May 27. During this time O. T. and other members of the crew took their meals ashore. This information I immediately reported to the board of health, and I have been informed by the board that they have disinfected the building where the patient took his meals, and also that they are destroying rats in the neighborhood, at pier 15, where the boat lay, and at certain resorts in Chinatown, which it is known that the patient frequented.

They also state that they officially requested Passed Assistant Surgeon W. C. Hobdy, the commanding officer at Angel Island Quarantine, to investigate the steam tug *Wizard* when she returned from Coos Bay. A full report will be made to the Bureau of the bacteriological examination as soon as it is completed.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Hobdy, at Angel Island Quarantine, reported May 30:

Surg. H. W. Austin, Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service, called on me on the afternoon of the 26th instant in regard to a case removed from the tug *Wizard* and sent to the hospital suffering with what was presumed to be a simple bubo. On the same day the man had died, and autopsy and microscopic findings are positive of plague. Doctor Currie is now engaged in making a bacteriological examination.

I learned the following facts concerning the *Wizard*: She plies regularly between this port and Coos Bay, Oregon, towing lumber schooners. About May 4 she started on her regular round trip from this port and returned on the 12th. She lay on the night of the 12th at Howard No. 2. On the 13th instant she proceeded up Oakland Creek to haul scows, tying up at night at Boole's Wharf. She was engaged on this work on the 13th, 14th, 15th, 16th, 17th, and 18th, returning on the 18th to Howard No. 2, her regular wharf in San Francisco, where she lay for some days making repairs. She left this port again on the 24th instant for Coos Bay with a lumber schooner in tow, after which she was to proceed to Seattle. (See page 827, report of Dr. Hobdy, June 11.)

The seaman in question had been sleeping continuously on the *Wizard* for the last six weeks. At intervals he had taken his meals at a boarding house in San Francisco.

The owners of the vessel, who gave me most of the above information, could not tell me whether the vessel had yet arrived at Coos Bay or not. In view of these facts, I sent the following telegram to Passed Assistant Surgeon Oakley and Acting Asst. Surg. E. E. Straw, at Port Townsend, Wash., and Marshfield, Oreg., respectively:

Tug *Wizard*, hence 24th instant for Coos Bay, had sick sailor removed here who died of plague 25th instant. Vessel should be disinfected.

I will disinfect the vessel on her return to this port, if this has not been done in the north. I have suggested to the executive officer of the board of health that an investigation into the mortality of rats in the vicinity of Howard No. 2 would be of interest, and also suggested that he take the necessary steps to determine whether the rats in this vicinity were infected with plague. The vessels of the Matson Navigation Company from Hilo and Honolulu berth at Howard No. 2.

June 8. Surgeon Austin reported:

Bacteriological examination confirms plague case.

In confirmation of this telegram Surgeon Austin reported, June 10:

Passed Assistant Surgeon D. H. Currie informs me that he has completed the bacteriological examination in the case of plague which terminated fatally at this hospital May 26, and he confirms the provisional diagnosis reported.

The San Francisco board of health has been informed of the result of the bacteriological examination.

June 11. Dr. Hobdy telegraphed:

Tug *Wizard* struck on the 29th May. Sank ten minutes later. Crew escaped and were all caught and examined by me nine days later. All were well and were released.

The following is received from Doctor Hobdy, June 11:

May 29, while towing the barkentine *Northwest* at sea, the *Wizard* struck at 2.20 in the afternoon, sinking at 2.30, the crew, 12 in number, escaping to the barkentine *Northwest*. They remained on board the *Northwest* until the 5th instant when, owing to shortness of provisions, half of the crew, 6 in number, were transferred to the schooner *Henry Wilson*, bound to this port with a lumber cargo. On the morning of the 6th instant, for the same reason, the remaining 6 members of the crew were transferred to the steamship *Atlas*, bound for Port Harford for oil. On the morning of the 7th instant, at 9 o'clock, the *Atlas* transferred these 6 men to the steamship *City of Puebla* bound for San Francisco. We boarded the latter vessel 2 hours later and gave the shipwrecked sailors a thorough examination, using both the thermometer and the glandular method. It was then 9 days from the date of the sinking of the tug *Wizard*. None of the men had high temperature, none had enlarged glands, and all were passed. Owing to the suddenness with which the catastrophe occurred, these men had to leave the *Wizard* in the clothing they happened to have on at the moment. In only one or two instances did any escape with as much as an extra suit of underwear. For this reason it is not believed that there was any danger of infecting the vessel to which they subsequently transferred.

The same precautions were taken in the examination of the remainder of the crew that arrived at this port on the schooner *Henry Wilson* late in the afternoon of the 7th instant. None of these men were sick, none had high temperature, none had any dunnage, and all were passed.

No man was taken ill in any way while on the vessels named; all arrived here in perfect health, and their dunnage was practically nil.

An examination of the crew and officers showed that there had been some slight mistakes in the statement made by her owners as to the whereabouts of this vessel prior to her sailing for Coos Bay on the 24th ultimo. She did dredging work in Oakland Creek only on the 13th, 14th, and 15th of May, returning on the latter date to Howard No. 2, and during the period when the man was infected was lying at that dock.

The bacteriological circle has been completed in the examination of the case itself, and the diagnosis is now absolutely confirmed. This was completed by Passed Assistant Surgeon Donald H. Currie on the 9th instant.

Report from Indianapolis, Ind.—Abatement in measles.

Reports received from the board of health at Indianapolis, Ind., show, for the week ended June 2, 1907, 326 cases, 3 deaths from measles; week ended June 9, 221 cases, 2 deaths, showing decrease from the numbers reported for the two preceding weeks.

Report from Philadelphia, Pa.—Enteric fever for the three months ended June 1, 1907.

The following report, supplemental to one published in Public Health Reports, March 1, 1907, page 217, is received from Surgeon Gassaway under date of June 14:

The weekly reports furnished by the board of health of the city of Philadelphia give the number of cases and of deaths of communicable diseases, and the amount of precipitation for each week. A careful examination week by week and ward by ward of the figures given, which include the reports from February 16 to June 1, 1907, both inclusive, shows a decrease in the number of cases and deaths reported.

Making a total for the quarter ended May 18, 1907, of 2,294 cases, 354 deaths. Precipitation, 10.37.

These figures are somewhat lower than those of the corresponding period of 1906, the statistics of which are not readily obtainable for the reason that the annual report for that year is not yet out of press. A careful comparison, however, would seem to indicate that on that basis the number of cases reported during the quarter under consideration would show a decrease for the quarter of 110 cases, but an increase of 90 in the deaths for the same period.

The tabulated records made by the bureau of health of this city since April 20, 1903, seem to show, as remarked in the previous report, that this disease is mostly water borne, and that by far the larger percentage of the cases occurring are due to the unfiltered water of the Schuylkill and Delaware rivers which is furnished for domestic purposes in this city. On consulting the table given above it will be seen that a progressive decrease in the number of cases reported is observable from the top of the column to the foot, with a single exception. On examining the third or precipitation column it will be observed that during the period in question an enormous quantity of water fell upon the watershed of this city.

The city of Philadelphia is supplied with water through 6 reservoirs for domestic purposes. Of these, 5 reservoirs are supplied from the Schuylkill River and 1 from the Delaware River. Of these 6 reservoirs only 1, that at Roxboro, serving an estimated population of 100,000, is furnished with filtered water. The sixth (Belmont) dis-

trict, with an estimated population of 260,000, is furnished with unfiltered and filtered water from the Schuylkill River. In the Roxboro district the number of deaths from enteric fever to 100,000 population, estimated, is 35 for this year. In the Belmont district, 260,000, it is estimated at 105.

It is the practice of the board of health to closely scrutinize reports of cases with reference to the locality, and particularly with regard to the milk supply of the families concerned. This has shown that in several cases the milk furnished may well be suspected of conveying the disease. One notable instance was a series of cases in families patronizing the same milkman, which, on investigation, showed that the bottles of the individual milk supply were filled at a certain dairy from tanks by means of a rubber tube used as a siphon, the flow in this siphon being started by the simple but somewhat objectionable practice of exhausting the air with the mouth. This particular operator being recently convalescent from enteric fever, cultures from the end of this rubber tubing produced colonies of the *Bacillus typhosus*.

CALIFORNIA—*Oakland*.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 200,000. Total number of deaths, 183, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 2, and 17 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 12, enteric fever 4, measles 21, scarlet fever 12, whooping cough 1, and tuberculosis 1.

Stockton.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 23,000. Total number of deaths, 26, including diphtheria 2 and 1 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 6.

CONNECTICUT—*Stamford*.—Month of April,^a 1907. Estimated population, 20,000. Number of deaths not reported. No deaths from contagious diseases reported. Cases of contagious diseases: Diphtheria 3, enteric fever 3, measles 9, scarlet fever 2, and tuberculosis 3.

FLORIDA.—Reports to the State board of health for the week ended June 8, 1907, show as follows: Enteric fever—*Jacksonville*, 10 cases; *Safety Harbor* and *Tampa*, 4 cases; *River Junction* and *Tallahassee*, each 1 case. Tuberculosis—*Fort Myers* and *Ocala*, each 1 case.

ILLINOIS—*Alton*.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 17,000. Total number of deaths not reported. One death from diphtheria and 8 from tuberculosis reported. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 1 and tuberculosis 8.

INDIANA.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 2,648,549. Total number of deaths, 2,813, corresponding to an annual death rate of 15.0 per 1,000 of population, including 25 from diphtheria, 38 from enteric fever, 42 from measles, 6 from scarlet fever, 1 from smallpox, 10 from whooping cough, and 424 from tuberculosis.

Morbidity: Diphtheria, 160 cases in 21 counties; enteric fever, 280 cases in 37 counties; smallpox, 91 cases in 20 counties. In the same month last year 97 cases of smallpox were reported from 11 counties, with no deaths.

IOWA—*Davenport*.—Two weeks ended June 15, 1907. Estimated population, 45,000. Total number of deaths not reported. One death from whooping cough. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 4, measles 9, scarlet fever 10, and whooping cough 1.

***Keokuk*.**—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 16,000. Total number of deaths not reported. One death from enteric fever and 1 from measles reported. Three cases of smallpox reported.

KANSAS.—Month of April, 1907. Reports to the State board of health show as follows: Diphtheria, 79 cases, 11 deaths; enteric fever, 30 cases, 12 deaths; measles, 1,904 cases, 18 deaths; scarlet fever, 113 cases, 12 deaths; smallpox, 272 cases, no deaths; tuberculosis, 113 cases, 78 deaths.

Contagious diseases were distributed in the cities as follows:

***Coffeyville*.**—Diphtheria, 5 cases; smallpox, 17 cases.

***Kansas City*.**—Diphtheria, 6 cases, 1 death; enteric fever, 8 cases, 6 deaths; measles, 458 cases, 11 deaths; scarlet fever, 1 case; smallpox, 1 case; tuberculosis, 25 cases, 23 deaths.

***Leavenworth*.**—Diphtheria, 5 cases; enteric fever, 1 case, 1 death; measles, 25 cases; tuberculosis, 6 cases, 6 deaths.

***Parsons*.**—Measles, 4 cases; tuberculosis, 6 cases, 4 deaths.

***Topeka*.**—Diphtheria, 8 cases, 1 death; measles, 99 cases, 1 death; scarlet fever, 2 cases, 1 death; tuberculosis, 2 cases, 2 deaths.

***Lawrence*.**—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 14,000. Total number of deaths, 20, including measles 2, and 1 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 3, measles 55, whooping cough 9, and tuberculosis 1.

KENTUCKY—*Henderson*.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 15,000. Total number of deaths, 9, including 4 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 1, enteric fever 3, measles 18, smallpox 1, and tuberculosis 4.

MASSACHUSETTS—*Somerville*.—Year ended December 31, 1906. Estimated population, 72,000. Total number of deaths, 1,004, including diphtheria 15, enteric fever 11, measles 2, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 11, and 108 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 236, enteric fever 95, and scarlet fever 154.

MINNESOTA—*Duluth*.—Year ended December 31, 1906. Estimated population, 77,500. Total number of deaths, 940, including diphtheria 19, enteric fever 30, measles 8, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 7, and 96 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 217, scarlet fever 51, and smallpox 22.

Month of January, 1907. Total number of deaths, 72, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 3, scarlet fever 1, and 8 from tuberculosis. Month of February, 1907. Total number of deaths, 66, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 3, and 10 from tuberculosis. Month of March, 1907. Total number of deaths, 79, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 2, and 5 from tuberculosis.

NEW YORK.—*Rome*.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 18,000. Total number of deaths, 32, including 1 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 2, enteric fever 2, measles 5, scarlet fever 1, and tuberculosis 1.

Saratoga Springs.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 14,000. Total number of deaths, 21, including 1 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 1, measles 100, and whooping cough 4.

NORTH CAROLINA.—Month of April, 1907. Estimated population, 1,893,810. Reports to State board of health from 80 counties show as follows: Measles in 49 counties, whooping cough in 29 counties, scarlet fever in 4 counties, diphtheria in 14 counties, enteric fever in 25 counties, malarial fever in 10 counties, hemorrhagic malarial fever in 2 counties, pernicious malarial fever in 3 counties, and smallpox in 22 counties, viz: Alamance, 17; Chatham, 2; Cherokee, 2; Chowan, several; Cumberland, 3; Davidson; Durham, 15; Forsyth, 9; Franklin, 8; Gaston, a few; Granville, 5; Guilford, 8; Halifax, 1; Harnett, 5; Lincoln, 13; Nash, 8; Orange, 20; Pitt, 3; Rowan, 5; Vance, 11; Wake, 74, and Warren, 4.

Reports for the month from 24 towns having an aggregate population of 219,500—white, 131,750; colored, 87,750—show a total of 289 deaths—white, 138; colored, 151—including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 3, measles 6, malarial fever 2, whooping cough 5, and 34 from phthisis pulmonalis.

NORTH DAKOTA.—Two years ended July 1, 1906. Estimated population, 440,000. Total number of deaths, 2,990, including diphtheria 78, enteric fever 105, measles 13, scarlet fever 40, smallpox 7, whooping cough 16, and 316 from tuberculosis.

OHIO.—*Columbus*.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 185,000. Total number of deaths, 191 (35 nonresidents), including enteric fever 1, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 1, and 20 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 3, enteric fever 14, measles 106, scarlet fever 18, smallpox 18, whooping cough 18, and tuberculosis 23.

PENNSYLVANIA.—*Scranton*.—Month of February, 1907. Estimated population, 125,000. Total number of deaths, 130, including diphtheria 5, enteric fever 8, scarlet fever 3, whooping cough 5, and 10 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 50,

enteric fever 30, measles 4, scarlet fever 58, whooping cough 10, tuberculosis 10. Month of March, 1907. Total number of deaths 118, including diphtheria 5, enteric fever 4, scarlet fever 6, and 6 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 48, enteric fever 14, measles 14, scarlet fever 42, whooping cough 2, and tuberculosis 9.

UTAH—*Ogden*.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 25,000. Total number of deaths, 24, including diphtheria 2 and scarlet fever 1. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 11, measles 3, scarlet fever 10, and smallpox 2.

Salt Lake City.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 75,000. Total deaths from all causes, 87, including diphtheria 3 and 6 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 19, enteric fever 1, smallpox 5, measles 16, scarlet fever 8, whooping cough 9, and tuberculosis 1.

VERMONT.—Cases of contagious diseases reported to the State board of health from 14 counties from February 21, 1907, to May 10, 1907, are as follows: Diphtheria 111, enteric fever 37, measles 79, scarlet fever 72, smallpox 44, and whooping cough 312.

WASHINGTON—*Bellingham*.—Month of May, 1907. Estimated population, 29,000. Total number of deaths, 23, including enteric fever 1, and 1 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Enteric fever 2, measles 151, and tuberculosis 1.

WISCONSIN.—Reports to the State board of health show as follows: Month of January, 1907. Ninety-three cities and towns in 42 counties report: Diphtheria, 182 cases, 23 deaths; enteric fever, 92 cases, 13 deaths; measles, 89 cases, no deaths; scarlet fever, 109 cases, 6 deaths; smallpox, 144 cases, no deaths; whooping cough, 71 cases, 2 deaths; phthisis pulmonalis, 75 cases, 38 deaths.

Month of February, 1907. Eighty-nine cities and towns in 42 counties report: Diphtheria, 180 cases, 24 deaths; enteric fever, 88 cases, 15 deaths; measles, 105 cases, 2 deaths; scarlet fever, 84 cases, 2 deaths; smallpox, 109 cases, no deaths; whooping cough, 24 cases, 3 deaths; phthisis pulmonalis, 60 cases, 43 deaths.

Month of March, 1907. Eighty-nine cities and towns in 44 counties report: Diphtheria, 110 cases, 11 deaths; enteric fever, 30 cases, 7 deaths; measles, 165 cases, 2 deaths; scarlet fever, 59 cases, 2 deaths; smallpox, 122 cases, no deaths; whooping cough, 40 cases, 1 death; phthisis pulmonalis, 78 cases, 73 deaths.

FOREIGN AND INSULAR.

AUSTRALIA.

Plague in New South Wales and Queensland—Examination of rodents for plague infection.

The following information is taken from plague bulletins forwarded by Consul-General Bray, at Melbourne:

NEW SOUTH WALES.

Sydney.—Week ended April 13, 1907. Three cases were admitted to the plague hospital. They occurred at different localities and no connection was shown to exist among them. Number of rodents destroyed, 2,166; examined, 712; found infected, 6. The infected rodents were found at 8 different places in the city. Week ended April 20, 1907. Two cases, 1 death. Rodents destroyed, 1,815; examined, 706; found infected, 11, at 8 different localities. Week ended April 27, 1907. Rodents destroyed, 2,307; examined, 891; found infected, 8, at 4 different localities.

QUEENSLAND.

Brisbane.—Week ended April 13, 1907. Three cases, 1 death. The second case was a contact of the first. All the infected localities showed signs of rat infestation. Rodents destroyed, 405; examined, 301; found infected, 1. Week ended April 20, 1907. One plague death. Rodents destroyed, 458; examined, 339; found infected, 2. Week ended April 27, 1907. Rodents destroyed, 468; examined, 366; found infected, 1.

Port Douglas.—Week ended April 13, 1907. Two cases from a cane farm. Rats are numerous in all the cane fields. The health officer of the Department has gone to Port Douglas for the purpose of investigation.

BRAZIL.

Report from Manaus—Decrease of yellow fever—Sanitary measures.

The following is received from Dr. H. Wolfersham Thomas, representative of the Liverpool Tropical School of Medicine, under date of May 24:

The present state of health is excellent. There are no yellow fever cases in the hospitals. Yellow fever was epidemic from September, 1906, to February, 1907, but since that date very few cases have occurred. Few endemic cases have developed.

The sanitary authorities are taking measures to combat yellow fever and are becoming more stringent in prophylactic measures.

BRITISH HONDURAS.

Report from Belize, fruit port.

Smallpox has existed here for the past two years and is still present. Leprosy is also an endemic disease, and a leper asylum exists in the bay of this city; only lepers belonging to the poorer classes are confined to the asylum; others reside in the city. Yellow fever never attacks the natives of this city, but the soldiers, who mostly come from the cold highlands, are often attacked by the disease with much fatality.

Report from Santa Marta—Inspection of vessels—Proposed campaign for exterminating mosquitoes and improving conditions.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Mengis reports as follows: Week ended June 3, 1907. Estimated population, 6,000; general sanitary condition of this port and the surrounding country during the week, very good. The municipal authorities have requested my services in organizing a line of campaign for exterminating mosquitoes and improving the hygienic conditions of Santa Marta.

On request of the agent and captain, the Spanish steamship *Ernesto*, from Santiago, and bound for Pascagoula, Miss., was fumigated by this office on June 5. On inspection all temperatures of her crew were found normal.

The Norwegian steamship *Trafalgar*, from Santiago, bound for Mobile, was fumigated by this office during the week. On inspection all her crew were found well except one with a little higher temperature than normal. This fact was mentioned on the bill of health. The vessel landed one member of crew and took on another at this port in good sanitary condition.

On June 7 an original bill of health was granted to the United States protected cruiser *Des Moines*, from Habana, with 256 persons all told on board, and bound for Boston.

The British bark *Alexander Black*, originally from Mobile and bound for the same port, was fumigated by this office, and on inspection all temperatures were found normal on board the ship. She has taken on 1 of crew here in good sanitary condition, and 2 more of her crew had slight traumatic injuries.

The sanitary condition of this city is satisfactory.

On the 8th instant a case of yellow fever was erroneously reported at Cruces. It was not confirmed. The case occurred at Ranchuelo, and was taken to Habana, where it was confirmed as yellow fever. Ranchuelo is a small town in this province about 9 miles above Cruces. It is a railway station between Cruces and Santa Clara and about 33 miles distant from this city. A disinfecting brigade has been sent from Habana to Ranchuelo and Cruces, and the usual precautionary measures against yellow fever have been taken here by order of the superior board of health on arrival of nonimmunes from infected places.

No quarantinable disease entered this port during this week, but leprosy from the interior of the country is present.

Report from Habana—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Further relative to yellow fever cases in Habana and Santa Clara provinces—Sanitary conditions at Habana satisfactory.

On June 6 one case of yellow fever was reported in Benefica Hospital, Habana. This case received infection at Ranchuelo, Santa Clara Province. The patient is a Spaniard and had been in Ranchuelo continuously for about four months before he was taken sick.

Two cases of yellow fever were reported in San Nicolas, on June 7. The history of these cases is not obtainable at the present writing. Sanitary measures are being carried on in all the infected places under the direction of the superior board of health.

The sanitary condition of Habana remains fairly good and no yellow fever has been reported in the city.

June 19. One case yellow fever confirmed San Nicolas June 18. Spaniard in Cuba seven months; taken sick June 12.

History of yellow fever at Union de Reyes, 1906 and 1907.

May 23 Doctor Stansfield was directed by the Bureau to report on yellow fever at Union de Reyes, Matanzas Province. The following is received from him under date of June 10:

The source of infection at Union de Reyes in 1906 is not known, but yellow fever was present in a number of neighboring towns. Immediately after the cases were reported in November, 1906, measures were taken by the board of health to stamp out the infection. A brigade of oilers and disinfectors was sent there for that purpose. No more cases appeared.

On May 15, 1907, a Spanish boy was taken sick and the case was diagnosed as yellow fever by the official contagious-disease board in Habana. The case was regarded as suspicious and precautionary measures were taken to combat a spread of the disease the day before the official diagnosis was made. Dr. Lopez del Valle, who has had large experience in fumigating and oiling and who has been in charge of that work in Habana, was sent to Union de Reyes, and to assist him a brigade of men trained to the work was sent from Matanzas and placed under his charge. The plan pursued was a general oiling of all breeding places for mosquitoes to prevent their propagation and the sulphurizing of all inclosed spaces which were suspected of harboring adult infected mosquitoes. The work is still being carried on there.

No cases of yellow fever occurred in Union de Reyes for a period of six months after the work was undertaken. On March 31, this year, a case occurred in Nueva Paz, Habana Province. Union de Reyes is about 20 miles from that town, with railroad communication. It is unofficially reported that a sick man went from Nueva Paz to Union de Reyes about the time the yellow-fever case occurred in Nueva Paz. It is of course impossible to determine now whether he had yellow fever or not. The case reported is the only one that has occurred in Union de Reyes.

Report from Matanzas—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Precautionary examination of cases of suspicious fever in native children and foreign nonimmunes.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Nuñez reports, June 10:

Week ended June 8, 1907. Bills of health issued to 8 vessels leaving for United States ports. Of these the British steamship *Min*, bound for New Orleans, with 26 crew and no passengers; the schooner *E. M. Roberts*, British, and *Mexico*, Norwegian, the former bound for Fernandina, Fla., and the latter for Mobile, Ala., with a crew of 7 and 8, respectively, no passengers, and the Norwegian steamship *Gotthard*, destined for Galveston, with 23 crew and no passengers, were fumigated when about to sail for their respective destinations. There was no sickness on board any of these vessels up to the time of their inspection. Seven health and acclimation certificates and 3 of protection from smallpox were granted to passengers bound for the United States by way of Habana.

Since May 21 no new cases of yellow fever have been reported within this district or province. There were no contagious diseases officially reported in town during the week just ended.

By direction of Major Kean, adviser of the superior board of health of Cuba, all cases of fever occurring in native children below 16 years of age showing any albumin in the urine or any other symptom suspicious of yellow fever, besides those cases among the foreign nonimmune element, should promptly be reported to the local health officer in order that proper sanitary measures may be adopted in time to prevent the dissemination of the disease.

GUATEMALA.

Report from Livingston—Inspection of vessels.

Report from Calcutta—Cholera, plague, and smallpox—Increased mortality from plague.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Eakins reports, May 16:

Week ended May 11, 1907. No transactions.

Week ended May 4, 1907. 35 deaths from cholera, 344 deaths from plague, and 47 from smallpox in Calcutta. In Bengal, during the same week, 3,730 cases and 3,511 deaths from plague.

The rise in mortality from plague in India was maintained until the end of April. This is the first instance of such rise since plague reappeared in India ten years ago. The returns of last month show that the increase is considerably less than during the two previous months. The total number of deaths during the last week of April was over 76,000. That for the week ended May 4 was 77,776. The returns show a decline of about 3,000 deaths in the Punjab, but a serious rise in the central provinces. For three weeks in succession the deaths there were about 15,000; the number has now risen to 19,982. The returns since March have surpassed all previous records.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

Report from Manila—Inspection of vessel.

Chief Quarantine Officer Heiser reports, May 8:

Week ended May 4, 1907. No quarantinable diseases. Vessel bound for United States port treated as follows: On May 1 the American steamship *Shawmut*, with 143 crew and 67 passengers, was granted a consular bill of health for Tacoma via China and Japan ports. Personnel inspected at the hour of sailing. Cargo and baggage either disinfected or passed after inspection, and so certified.

WEST INDIES.

Report from Castries, St. Lucia Island—Sanitary conditions—Disposal of sewage.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Maylie reports May 27 and June 3:

Weeks ended May 25 and June 1, 1907.

Nearly all the houses at Castries are built on wooden pillars, large stones, or cement foundation, permitting a free flow of air between the flooring and ground beneath. The natural incline of the ground facilitates the rapid and complete drainage of water into the gutters and prevents the retention of same or the formation of cesspools. The houses and premises surrounding them are regularly visited by inspectors permanently employed for the purpose by the town board, and nothing is permitted to remain thereon that is in any way detrimental or dangerous to sanitation or public health.

Garbage, refuse, and street sweepings are collected daily in metallic containers, carried out in a barge, and dumped at sea.

Although I am assured that mosquitoes exist in this place, I have seen none.

London.—One thousand three hundred and sixteen deaths were registered during the week, including measles 53, scarlet fever 13, diphtheria 12, enteric fever 3, whooping cough 36, tuberculosis 191, and 14 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 14.4 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,809 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 6 from measles, 2 from scarlet fever, 5 from diphtheria, and 7 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended May 25, 1907, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 21.8 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,117,547. The lowest rate was recorded in Ballymena viz, 4.8, and the highest in Galway, viz, 38.8 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 203 deaths were registered, including enteric fever 1, measles 6, whooping cough 10, and 44 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended May 25, 1907, correspond to an annual rate of 17.5 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,812,171. The highest rate of mortality was recorded in Perth, viz, 21.0, and the lowest in Paisley, viz, 12.9 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 607, including diphtheria 4, measles 9, scarlet fever 3, and 39 from whooping cough.
