UNITED STATES.

[Reports to the Surgeon-General, Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service.]

Plague at San Francisco, Cal.

Surgeon Austin reports:

August 31. Interne and female nurse city and county hospital plague. Total cases to date, 11. Total deaths to date, 6.

September 1. One case city and county hospital and 1 case Seventeenth and Harrison streets. Total, 13 cases. Total deaths, 6.

September 2. One case Lombard street September 1. Total cases to date, 14. Total deaths, 6.

September 2. Case plague died hospital in Berkeley September 1. Had been at Point Richmond, across bay. Total cases to date, 15, including Berkeley. Total deaths to date, 7.

September 3. New case plague Lombard street; one case Francisco street. Total cases to date, 17; total deaths, 7.

September 4. No new cases. One death to-day. Total cases to date, 17; total deaths, 8.

Measures for preventing spread of plague at San Francisco.

In order to prevent the spread of bubonic plague from San Francisco to coastwise cities of California and other States on the Pacific coast and to foreign ports, a plan has been arranged, after consultation with the authorities in San Francisco, for fumigation with sulphur for the destruction of rats on all outgoing vessels from San Francisco, the work to be carried on by the quarantine officers of the Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service. By direction of the Secretary of the Treasury the revenue cutters *Golden Gate* and *Hartley* are to aid in carrying men and material for the fumigation of vessels in San Francisco Harbor.

Under date of September 4 Passed Assistant Surgeon Hobdy wires that the work of disinfection begun September 2 was in full operation September 3.

STATISTICAL REPORTS OF MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY, STATES AND CITIES OF THE UNITED STATES—UNTABULATED.

• CALIFORNIA.—Month of July, 1907. Estimated population, 2,001,193. Total number of deaths reported to the State board of health, 2,540, corresponding to an annual death rate of 14.2 per 1,000 population. Deaths from contagious diseases were as follows: Diphtheria 34, enteric fever 54, measles 17, scarlet fever 7, smallpox 2, whooping cough 22, and 367 from tuberculosis.

FLORIDA.—Reports to the State board of health for the week ended August 24, 1907, show as follows: Diphtheria—*Branford*, 1 case. Enteric fever—*Jacksonville* and *Daytona*, each 2 cases. Malarial fever—*Jacksonville* and *Daytona*, each 1 case. Tuberculosis—*Jacksonville*, 3 cases; *Palatka* and *Stuart*, each 1 case.

ILLINOIS—*Aurora*.—Month of June, 1907. Estimated population, 30,000. Total number of deaths, 53, including enteric fever 1, scarlet fever 3, and 2 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 1, measles 3, scarlet fever 22, and smallpox 18.

IOWA—*Keokuk*.—Month of July, 1907. Estimated population, 16,000. Total number of deaths, 26, including measles 1, and 2 from tuberculosis. Cases: Smallpox 2.

MICHIGAN.—Month of July, 1907. Estimated population, 2,611,792. Total number of deaths returned to the State department for the month was 2,591, including enteric fever 37, diphtheria 15, scarlet fever 8, measles 10, whooping cough 18, and 227 from tuberculosis. The total number of deaths from all causes corresponds to an annual rate of 11.7 per 1,000 estimated population.

MINNESOTA.—Month of June, 1907. Estimated population, 1,979,658. Reports to the State board of health show as follows: Total number of deaths, 1,125, including diphtheria 29, enteric fever 5, measles 8, scarlet fever 10, smallpox 2, whooping cough 5, and 122 from tuberculosis. Deaths reported from State institutions during the month numbered 27, including 3 from tuberculosis.

Minneapolis.—Month of July, 1907. Estimated population, 285,000. Total number of deaths, 194, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 5, whooping cough 2, and 28 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 26, enteric fever 8, scarlet fever 12, smallpox 18, and tuberculosis 18.

NEW YORK—*Troy*.—Month of July, 1907. Estimated population, 76,861. Total number of deaths, 136, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 2, scarlet fever 2, and 20 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 13, enteric fever 4, measles 1, scarlet fever 5, and tuberculosis 32.

OHIO—*Columbus*.—Month of June,* 1907. Estimated population, 185,000. Total number of deaths, 184 (24 nonresidents), including enteric fever 2, diphtheria 2, and 21 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 7, enteric fever 15, measles 82, scarlet fever 11, smallpox 3, whooping cough 17, and tuberculosis 22.

PENNSYLVANIA—*Scranton*.—Month of June, 1907. Estimated population, 125,000. Total number of deaths, 121, including diphtheria 6, measles 1, enteric fever 1, and 6 from tuberculosis. Cases: Tuberculosis 9. Month of July, 1907. Total number of deaths 180, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 2, measles 1, scarlet fever 1, and 12 from tuberculosis. Cases: Tuberculosis 5.

FOREIGN AND INSULAR.

CURRENT QUARANTINE MEASURES.

[From the Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes, Berlin, August 21, 1907.]

CHINA.—July 6. The German consul at Chefoo, in concert with the consular representatives of the treaty powers and with the co-operation of the local maritime customs officers, has issued an ordinance for preventing the importation of plague from Hongkong into Chefoo.

RUSSIA.—August 8. The plague commission has suspended the special measures adopted on account of the presence of 8 plague suspects at Peschtschanka, district of Zarizyn, government of Saratow, but enforces rigorous sanitary inspection in the district and government named.

ROUMANIA.—August 8. Measures against arrivals from Odessa suspended.

TURKEY.—August 10. Arrivals from Beirut subject to medical inspection.

AFRICA.

Report from Cape Colony—Plague at King Williams Town—Examination of animals for plague infection.

The following report on the outbreak of plague at King Williams Town is received from the medical officer of health for the colony under date of July 22:

No case of plague in man was discovered during the week. Two cases were discharged cured, and 3 cases now remain under isolation and treatment.

During the week 96 rats (including 46 found dead), 20 mice (including 14 found dead), and 4 cats (including 3 found dead) were examined, of which 3 mice and 2 cats were found to be plague infected and 45 rats, 10 mice, and 2 cats to be probably plague infected.

The report of the municipal health department shows among foreigners 1 new case of smallpox; among natives 26 deaths from smallpox.

No quarantinable diseases were reported from outports, but Foo-chow and Amoy have been declared plague infected by the authorities here.

The British steamship *Min*, from Manzanillo, bound for Mobile, and the Spanish steamship *Juan Forgas*, from Manzanillo, and bound for New Orleans, were both fumigated. On inspection, all temperatures of their crews were found normal. There was one passenger by steamship *Juan Forgas* for New Orleans in transit and in good sanitary condition.

There are now more cases of yellow fever among Spaniards than among Americans. Only one man remains ill among the American troops.

August 28. One death, Spaniard, to-day. Total cases to date, 30; recoveries, 15; total deaths to date, 6; under treatment, 9.

Report from Habana—Yellow fever.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Amesse reports:

August 28. One case yellow fever officially reported at Campo Florida, about 10 miles from Guanabacoa, across bay from Habana. Has been ten months in the island and whole time at Campo Florida.

August 30. One case yellow fever, Spaniard, officially reported city of Habana. Six years in Cuba. Has been living in Vives street. Now in Benefica Hospital. Taken sick August 23.

August 31. Further note case yellow fever Habana. Patient has not been out of city. Stricken August 23; removed to Benefica Hospital August 24.

Report from Matanzas—Inspection of vessels—History of yellow fever cases—Sanitary measures.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Nuñez reports, August 20:

Week ended August 17, 1907. Bills of health granted to 4 vessels leaving for United States ports; 1 vessel was fumigated, and 2 health and acclimation certificates were issued to passengers bound to New York via Habana. The vessel fumigated was the Norwegian steamship *Ole Bull*, destined to Mobile, Ala., having a crew of 20, and no passengers. This vessel left August 15 for its port of destination with all well aboard.

August 15–17, 3 new cases of yellow fever were reported, of which 2 contracted the infection at Mocha, within this district, and 1 at Alacranes, a town close to Union de Reyes. The history of these 3 cases is as follows:

(1) G. D., 24 years of age, born in the province of Leon, Spain, arrived in Cuba from his native country one year and nine months ago and at Mocha one month ago, joining the gang of workers at the public road which is being laid at that place. He states not having had any other serious sickness since he came to Cuba. He was taken sick August 11 and was isolated from the rest of his companions and placed under a mosquito net. On the following morning the patient, well protected with a mosquito bar and blanket, was transferred from the camp at Mocha to the civil hospital of this city, where he was lodged in the isolation room for further observation and treatment. This room has been renovated since the recent fatal case of yellow fever occurred, with the installation of new wire netting so as to be mosquito proof.

August 15 the diagnosis of yellow fever was unanimously agreed upon by all the members of the commission. This case recovered and is now convalescing.

(2) R. L., 22 years old, born in the province of Corunna, Spain, arrived in the island from his native country about two years ago and at Mocha but one month ago. During the previous three months and up to the time he came to Mocha he lived in the neighborhood of Union de Reyes. He also joined the same gang of laborers at the new road at Mocha, and roomed with the case just described. He was taken sick August 12 and ordered the same morning, together with his companion, to the city hospital of Matanzas for treatment. L, from the onset, showed a more severe type of the disease, and at the time the commission convened the diagnosis of yellow fever was determined. This case became gradually worse and the patient died August 17. A necropsy was held on the day of death, and the pathological lesions found fully confirmed the diagnosis of yellow fever.

(3) The case of yellow fever reported August 17 at Alacranes occurred in a man, D. M., native of the Canary Islands, living in a plantation colony called Segundo, in the vicinity of the town referred to, being discovered August 16. The case was detected on the fifth day of the disease, and was transferred from the colony to Alacranes, where it is at present isolated in a protected room. The case previously reported in that town, under date of August 9, recovered and has been discharged since. M. is said to have contracted the disease at Alacranes.

An extra sanitary force was ordered to Alacranes, both from Habana and Matanzas, in order to carry out such sanitary measures as are recommended in those cases.

The work of fumigation in the city was discontinued after these sanitary measures were complied with in the infected block of houses where the Hotel Europa is located, and the row of buildings on the opposite side of the street facing the hotel. All the neighborhood surrounding the civil hospital is being fumigated, and the latter building is to be refumigated as soon as the one case of yellow fever, still under treatment at the place, is discharged.

A whole ward of the civil hospital is being protected with wire netting so as to meet properly any emergency that may arise.

The Cuban quarantine officer has been directed to inspect all the coastwise vessels arriving in this harbor, besides those from foreign ports, and to report to the local health officer the nonimmune crews and passengers landing and their stopping places in town, so as to hold them under medical supervision during the period of incubation of yellow fever. Restrictions are also being enforced on travel by land from places known to be infected with the disease.

Report from Santiago—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Inspection of coastwise vessels and trains arriving from Habana.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Wilson reports, August 20:

Week ended August 17, 1907. Bills of health issued to 9 vessels bound for the United States. The steamship *Niceto*, bound for Tampa, was fumigated to kill mosquitoes.

No quarantinable disease reported.

Since the outbreak of yellow fever at Cienfuegos, the Cuban quarantine service at this port has had orders to inspect all coastwise vessels and to give a list of passengers landed to the chief of municipal sanitation so that he may be able to follow them up.

The trains arriving from Habana are also inspected. For this purpose a medical inspector has been appointed who goes daily to San Luis (30 miles away) to meet the incoming train. He examines passengers and takes temperatures and makes note of them. This will be kept up while the epidemic lasts.

Since the beginning of this month the death rate at Santiago de Cuba has been reduced to normal.

GERMANY.

Report from Berlin—Measures to prevent introduction of cholera from Russia.

The following is received from Consul-General Thackara, under date of August 16:

A conference has just been held at the imperial office of the interior, in which all the interested departments of the Empire and of Prussia participated, with the object of discussing what special regulations, if any, were necessary to prevent the introduction of cholera from Russia into the German Empire. It was decided to adopt such

precautions as will enable the immediate putting into effect of the regulations successfully employed at the time of the outbreak of cholera in the autumn of 1905, especially the supervision of the rivers near the frontier.

Report from Bremen—Quarantine of emigrants from Russia on account of cholera in the trans-Volgian districts.

Consul Fee reports, August 14:

Owing to the epidemic outbreak of cholera in the trans-Volgian districts of Russia, and especially in the cities of Samara, Saratoff, and Astrachan, the board of health of the city and State of Bremen has issued an order whereby all emigrants coming directly or indirectly from Russia are put under quarantine for five days. Their baggage is disinfected, and every precaution is taken to prevent a spread of the disease.

General sanitary conditions have been satisfactory and measures against yellow fever appear to be carried out systematically and persistently here and in Merida. Rains continue, but there is no apparent increase in the number of mosquitoes.

During the period of this report 8 steamers and 1 sailing vessel, carrying in crews 415 persons and as passengers 103 persons, were dispatched from this port. Of these vessels, 4 sailing for Gulf ports were fumigated.

London.—One thousand and fifty-two deaths were registered during the week, including measles 46, scarlet fever 13, enteric fever 3, diphtheria 11, whooping cough 27, tuberculosis 132, and 18 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 11.5 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,511 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 4 from measles, 4 from scarlet fever, 4 from diphtheria, and 12 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended August 3, 1907, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 16.5 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,117,547. The lowest rate was recorded in Sligo,

viz, 4.8, and the highest in Waterford, viz, 23.4 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 138 deaths were registered, including diphtheria 2, measles 6, whooping cough 4, and 28 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended August 3, 1907, correspond to an annual rate of 12.8 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,812,171. The highest rate of mortality was recorded in Dundee, viz, 17.3, and the lowest in Leith, viz, 10 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 445, including diphtheria 4, enteric fever 1, measles 6, scarlet fever 2, and 12 from whooping cough.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales.*—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended August 10, 1907, correspond to an annual rate of 11.8 per 1,000 of population, which is estimated at 16,024,458.

London.—One thousand and ninety-seven deaths were registered during the week, including measles 36, scarlet fever 19, diphtheria 11, whooping cough 24, tuberculosis 158, and 24 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 12.0 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,537 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 6 from measles, 1 from scarlet fever, 2 from diphtheria, and 8 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended August 10, 1907, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 15.5 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,117,547. The lowest rate was recorded in Clonmel, viz, 5.1, and the highest in Newtownards, viz, 34.3 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 118 deaths were registered, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 1, measles 5, whooping cough 1, and 30 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended August 10, 1907, correspond to an annual rate of 13.8 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,812,171. The highest rate of mortality was recorded in Greenock, viz, 16.1, and the lowest in Paisley, viz, 8.8 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 479, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 3, measles 6, scarlet fever 2, and 30 from whooping cough.
