Reports from San Francisco, Cal.—Status of plague.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Blue reports:

September 20. Complete record to date, 35 cases; 21 deaths.

September 22. Report to date: Cases, 38; deaths, 22.

September 25. Cases to date, 43; deaths, 26.

Reports from San Francisco Quarantine, Angel Island, Cal.—Examination of rats for plague infection—Outgoing quarantine transactions.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Hobdy reports, September 10 and 11:

August 29 I inspected a building at Meigg's Wharf. The building was found to swarm with rats, and dead rats were scattered over the floor. I examined 3 rats bacteriologically. Two presented nothing suspicious, but the third had typical lesions of plague and smears showed a bacillus that morphologically and in its reaction to staining reagents could not be distinguished from the *Bacillus pestis*.

At the time of examination these rats had certainly been dead at least forty-eight hours. They literally swarmed with fleas, of which two distinct varieties were present on the same rat.

A piece of the spleen from the third rat was used to inoculate a guinea pig. On post-mortem examination, September 6, the pig showed all the lesions of plague; his buboes swarmed with bacilli like those of plague, and pure cultures obtained at the time grew in a manner characteristic of plague.

Week ended September 7, 1907. Number of outgoing vessels disinfected and certified, 40.

Smallpox on steamship Vienna at Delaware Breakwater Quarantine, Delaware.

A case of smallpox removed September 24 from the steamship *Vienna*, from Tagal, Java, died the same day at Delaware Breakwater Quarantine Station. Directions were wired September 24 to the Acting Assistant Surgeon in charge to vaccinate such of the personnel of the ship as were unprotected and remand the vessel to Reedy Island for disinfection and detention.

CALIFORNIA—*San Diego*.—Month of August, 1907. Estimated population, 30,000. Total number of deaths, 41, including enteric fever 1, and 11 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 1 and measles 3.

San José.—Month of August, 1907. Estimated population, 30,000. Total number of deaths, 33, including 1 from enteric fever. Cases: Diphtheria 4, enteric fever 5, and scarlet fever 1.

Stockton.—Month of August, 1907. Estimated population, 23,000. Total number of deaths, 18, including 2 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 2.

CONNECTICUT—*New Haven*.—Month of July, 1907. Estimated population, 125,000. Total number of deaths, 195, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 1, scarlet fever 1, and 13 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 14, enteric fever 6, and scarlet fever 5.

Month of August, 1907. Total number of deaths, 192, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 6, whooping cough 1, and 30 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 4, enteric fever 47, and scarlet fever 3.

FLORIDA.—Reports to the State board of health for the week ended September 14, 1907, show as follows: Diphtheria—*Jacksonville*, *Tampa*, and *St. Augustine*, each 1 case. Enteric fever—*Jacksonville*, *Tyler*, and *Daytona*, each 1 case. Malarial fever—*Jacksonville*, 4 cases. Tuberculosis—*Jacksonville*, 1 case; *Tampa*, 2 cases.

ILLINOIS—*Rockford*.—Month of August, 1907. Estimated population, 45,000. Total number of deaths, 27, including scarlet fever 2 and 2 from phthisis pulmonalis. Cases: Diphtheria 1, scarlet fever 6.

INDIANA.—Month of July, 1907. Estimated population, 2,648,549. Total number of deaths, 2,986, corresponding to an annual death rate of 13 per 1,000 of population, including 14 from diphtheria, 53 from enteric fever, 14 from measles, 9 from scarlet fever, 15 from whooping cough, and 354 from tuberculosis.

Morbidity: Diphtheria, 74 cases in 26 counties; enteric fever, 312 cases in 64 counties; smallpox, 74 cases in 21 counties. In the same month last year 31 cases of smallpox were reported from 6 counties, with 3 deaths.

Anderson.—Month of July,^a 1907. Estimated population, 25,398. Total number of deaths, 28. Cases: Enteric fever 3, measles 3, and tuberculosis 2.

IOWA—*Keokuk*.—Month of August, 1907. Estimated population, 16,000. Total number of deaths, 15, including 1 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria, 3.

KANSAS.—Month of July, 1907. Reports to the State board of health show as follows: Diphtheria, 43 cases, 8 deaths; enteric fever, 163 cases, 25 deaths; measles, 74 cases, 4 deaths; scarlet fever, 14 cases, 2 deaths; smallpox, 76 cases, 1 death; tuberculosis, 75 cases, 51 deaths.

Contagious diseases were distributed in the cities as follows:

Coffeyville.—Smallpox, 2 cases; tuberculosis, 3 cases, 2 deaths.

Kansas City.—Diphtheria, 5 cases; enteric fever, 21 cases, 9 deaths; measles, 10 cases, 3 deaths; smallpox, 2 cases; tuberculosis, 10 cases, 9 deaths.

Leavenworth.—Diphtheria, 2 cases; enteric fever, 4 cases; measles, 2 cases; tuberculosis, 1 case, 1 death.

Parsons.—Enteric fever, 3 cases; tuberculosis, 6 cases, 4 deaths.

Topeka.—Enteric fever, 1 case, 1 death; scarlet fever, 2 cases, 1 death; tuberculosis, 6 cases, 6 deaths.

MINNESOTA—*Minneapolis.*—Year ended December 31, 1906. Estimated population, 285,000. Total number of deaths, 2,824, including diphtheria 62, enteric fever 97, measles 21, scarlet fever 11, whooping cough 20, and 329 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 672, enteric fever 252, scarlet fever 263, and smallpox 85.

Stillwater.—Month of August, 1907. Estimated population, 12,435. Total number of deaths, 7. Cases: Smallpox 3.

NEW JERSEY—*Phillipsburg.*—Month of August, 1907. Estimated population, 13,500. Total number of deaths not reported. One death from diphtheria. Three cases of diphtheria reported.

NEW YORK—*Buffalo.*—Month of May,^a 1907. Estimated population, 400,000. Total number of deaths, 529, including diphtheria 3, enteric fever 8, measles 14, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 7, and 53 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 35, enteric fever 21, measles 376, scarlet fever 74, whooping cough 43, and tuberculosis 38.

Month of June, 1907. Total number of deaths, 474, including diphtheria 4, enteric fever 1, measles 13, scarlet fever 6, whooping cough 5, and 42 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 51, enteric fever 11, measles 263, scarlet fever 107, whooping cough 49, and tuberculosis 40.

Month of July, 1907. Total number of deaths, 504, including diphtheria 4, enteric fever 6, measles 5, scarlet fever 4, whooping cough 3, and 45 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 34, enteric fever 13, measles 54, scarlet fever 57, whooping cough 48, and tuberculosis 59.

Saratoga Springs.—Month of August, 1907. Estimated population, 14,000. Total number of deaths, 29, including 1 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 7, enteric fever 2, measles 1, whooping cough 2, and scarlet fever 1.

PENNSYLVANIA—*Butler*.—Month of July, 1907. Total number of deaths, 18, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 1, and 2 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 4.

York.—Month of April,^a 1907. Estimated population, 49,000. Total number of deaths, 49, including diphtheria 2 and 4 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 8, enteric fever 1, whooping cough 1, and scarlet fever 3.

Month of May, 1907. Total number of deaths, 79, including 11 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 10, enteric fever 9, measles 9, whooping cough 3, and scarlet fever 3.

UTAH—*Salt Lake City*.—Month of August, 1907. Estimated population, 75,000. Total number of deaths from all causes, 82, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 3, whooping cough 1, and 3 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 7, enteric fever 19, smallpox 3, measles 4, scarlet fever 15, and whooping cough 1.

CHINA.

Report from Newchwang—Quarantine against Amoy, Foochow, and Hongkong.

Information is received from the Department of State that a dispatch, dated September 4, 1907, from the consul-general at Newchwang, China, states that that port has now established a quarantine against the ports of Hongkong, Amoy, and Foochow, the matter having been first submitted to the consular body, which concurred with the local authorities in the enforcement of the same.

Report from Shanghai—Inspection of vessels—Smallpox—Epidemic cholera—Smallpox at Chefoo—Typhus fever at Hankow.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, August 16:

Week ended August 10, 1907. One original and 3 supplemental bills of health were issued. Two steamers were passed upon medical officers' certificates and inspection of passengers at the tender; 2 were inspected and 1 was disinfected. There were also inspected 101 members of crews, 3 cabin and 6 steerage passengers; 2 cases of illness were investigated and found nonquarantinable. Manifests were viséed for 29,774 pieces of freight, and there were disinfected 76 pieces of crew's and 9 pieces steerage passengers' baggage. Two emigrants for San Francisco per steamship *Hongkong Maru* were inspected and passed.

The weekly report of the municipal health department shows that there were reported during the week among foreigners 2 new cases of smallpox and 3 new cases of cholera; and among natives 18 deaths from smallpox, 90 deaths from cholera.

With regard to cholera, the disease seems to be of a fulminant character, having jumped into prominence in an astonishingly short time, and is killing many people every day. The mortality is rapidly on the increase. The health officer informed me that he thought there were upward of 300 deaths last week, and the Chinese say there were nearer 600.

Chefoo reports 1 case of smallpox and Hankow 1 case of typhus fever.

Quarantinable diseases in the city, yellow fever and leprosy.

Notwithstanding the efforts of the sanitary service to prevent the spread of yellow fever, the disease has invaded the whole city and vicinity. Almost every house has a reservoir for water, furnishing good breeding places for the *Stegomyia calopus* mosquitoes and rendering it very difficult to eradicate the disease.

Medical inspectors have been appointed to examine daily all outgoing passengers to the river Damuji and also those that go by rail, taking temperatures and making note of them, with a view to preventing the spread of the disease outside the city. The situation with respect to yellow fever is becoming grave, the disease having appeared in the villages in the vicinity.

The fumigation of houses continues in the central part of the city where cases have appeared.

September 18. Two new cases confirmed to-day; 1 death. Total cases to date, 52; recoveries, 30; deaths to date, 14; under treatment, 8.

September 19. One new case confirmed to-day; no deaths. Total cases to date, 53; recoveries, 33; deaths, 14; under treatment, 6.

September 21. One new case confirmed to-day; deaths, none. Total cases to date, 54; recoveries, 33; deaths to date, 14; under treatment, 7.

A new focus of yellow fever appeared during the week at Palos, a small railway station about 40 miles southeast of the city of Habana, and in the neighborhood of Nueva Paz and Alacranes where occasional cases have been reported since the month of June. Travel between these localities is unrestricted.

The first case was that of a Spaniard, age 27, 2 years in Cuba, who developed suspicious symptoms on September 9; was removed to hospital in Habana on September 10, and died September 12, autopsy confirming diagnosis.

The second case appeared in the person of a Spanish emigrant, age 20, living in a house adjoining that of the first case. He was stricken September 12 and at once removed to Dependientes Hospital, Habana, where he is now under treatment.

The most determined effort is being made to confine the disease at Palos to this one focus.

The case of V. R., the first originating in Habana for some time, has gone on to recovery.

For the current year there were reported up to September 14, 77 cases of yellow fever in the Republic of Cuba, with a mortality of over 20 per cent. Of these, 53 cases are recorded for the city of Cienfuegos, where the epidemic is still in progress, and the remaining 24 cases are scattered throughout Matanzas, Santa Clara, and Habana Provinces.

September 18. One case yellow fever officially reported Santa Clara.

September 19. One case yellow fever Habana.

September 24. One case Habana confirmed to-day as yellow fever; Spaniard, living in Cerro district.

GERMANY.

Report from Berlin—Cholera in Russia.

The following is received from Consul-General Thackera under date of September 9:

According to the official bulletin issued by the imperial health office at Berlin there were registered in the city of Astrachan during the period from August 22 to 25, inclusive, 213 cases of cholera and 61 deaths. Since the outbreak of the disease the total number of cases amounted to 354, with 123 deaths, in that city. Furthermore, in the Government district of Astrachan there occurred 1 case in the district of Jenotajewsk; in the district of Astrachan 19 cases, and in the Zarew district 3 cases, with 12 deaths. Most of the cases occurred on board ships. In Baku 2 fatal cases of cholera occurred on August 25. Two cases of cholera were reported in Nizhni-Novgorod on August 26 and 2 cases in the village of Jurino on the same date.

The total number of cholera cases in the city of Samara up to August 25 amounted to 202, with 92 deaths. In the village of Melekes 6 cases have occurred, with 2 deaths. In four villages of the district of Nikolajewsk there were registered 12 cases of cholera, with 8 deaths.

According to a telegraphic report dated August 31 a case of cholera occurred in Moscow, the patient having arrived in that city from Saratow.

In Bengal and India, during the week ended August 3, 1907, there were 54 cases and 33 deaths, and 2,548 cases and 1,959 deaths from plague, respectively.

Status of plague in Burma.

The following is received from Consul-General Michael, under date of August 15:

An official note on the status of plague in Burma during the month of July, 1907, says: There was an increase of plague during the month of July, the figures showing 721 cases and 662 deaths as compared with 597 cases and 548 deaths in June. The most marked increases occurred in the Myaungmya and Tharrawaddy districts, where the number of deaths rose from 29 and 6, respectively, in June, to 74 and in July to 34. In the Amherst district there were 106 cases and 84 deaths in the month as compared with 83 cases and 77 deaths in June. Increases also occurred in Pegu, Toungoo, and Thaton districts. In Rangoon plague remained almost stationary. The most marked decrease occurred in the Bassein district, where there were 52 cases and 46 deaths as compared with 85 cases and 80 deaths in June. With the exception of the Myingyan and Shwebo districts, from which 4 and 5 cases, respectively, were reported in July, upper Burma remained free from plague. Exclusive of Rangoon, plague occurred in 11 districts in lower Burma during the month.

JAPAN.

Report from Yokohama—Inspection of vessels—Cholera situation at Moji, Shimonoseki, and other localities—Quarantine station opened at Suminoye port, near Nagasaki.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Cumming reports, August 26:

Week ended August 24, 1907. Bills of health were issued to 7 vessels having an aggregate personnel of 3,688 crew and 594 passengers. All steerage passengers, 574 in number, were bathed and their effects disinfected. The steamship *Satsuma*, bound hence via oriental ports and the Suez Canal, was granted a clean bill after fumigation by the local authorities.

No further cholera has occurred here, but the situation in Moji is alarming, many cases occurring daily. Some cases have been found at Shimonoseki, across the strait, but a quarantine between the two was started yesterday.

Cholera has been found in other towns in Fukuoka Ken, which is the prefect in which Moji lies and is north of Nagasaki.

A quarantine station has been opened at Suminoye port, in Saga Ken, near Nagasaki, and quarantine officers appointed for the prefectures (kens) of Tottori, Shimane, Saga, Kumamoto Miyazaki, and Kagoshima.

Emigrants recommended for rejection.

Number of emigrants per steamship *Tosa Maru* recommended, August 21, 1907, for rejection: For Seattle, 17. These rejections were all for trachoma.

Report from Nagasaki—Fatal cholera cases imported from Shanghai—Quarantine of vessels from Shanghai.

Sanitary Inspector Bowie reports, August 20:

August 16 I was summoned to a local hotel to see a man who had arrived August 12 from Shanghai. I found him suffering from Asiatic cholera. He had already passed into a state of collapse and in three hours was dead. He had come on the steamship with a friend who went to a summer resort and who also died of cholera

two days before. Since then the steamship *Mongolia*, of the Eastern Asiatic Company, also from Shanghai, has been quarantined with a case on board. The steamship *Monteagle*, of the Canadian Pacific Line, is at present held up with 2 suspicious cases. The duration of the period of quarantine at the ports of Japan is five days from the appearance of the last case. There have been 37 cases at Moji up to August 19, with 26 deaths.

Emigrants recommended for rejection.

In the "outer ring" the deaths included 3 from measles, 1 from diphtheria, and 6 from whooping cough.

Portsmouth.—Five weeks ended August 17, 1907. Estimated population, 208,291. Total number of deaths, 221, including diphtheria 5, measles 2, scarlet fever 1, and whooping cough 2.
