UNITED STATES.

[Reports to the Surgeon-General, Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service.]

Plague prevention work at Oakland, Alameda, and Berkeley, Cal.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Blue reports:

October 2.—Two plague-infected rats were found in Oakland October 1.

October 3.—Long reports organization of suppressive and protective measures in the Bay cities progressing satisfactorily. The councils of Oakland, Alameda, and Berkeley will accept Service direction and pay expenses. Oakland is divided into 7 districts; Alameda and Berkeley into 3 each. Medical and sanitary inspectors, disinfectors, and rat catchers, sufficient numbers. Two infected rats found in Oakland October 2.

Report from San Francisco, Cal.—Status of plague.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Blue reports:

October 3.—Plague record to date, 51 cases; 30 deaths.

October 4.—Record to date, 54 cases; 30 deaths.

October 8.—Cases to date, 58; deaths, 33.

STATISTICAL REPORTS OF MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY, STATES AND CITIES OF THE UNITED STATES—UNTABULATED.

CALIFORNIA—*Oakland*.—Month of August, 1907. Estimated population 225,000. Total number of deaths, 158, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 2, and 11 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 15, enteric fever 4, measles 3, scarlet fever 6, whooping cough 1, and tuberculosis 3.

FLORIDA.—Reports to the State board of health for the week ended September 28, 1907, show as follows: Diphtheria—*Jacksonville* and *Tampa*, each 1 case. Enteric fever—*Jacksonville*, 2 cases; *Newberry* and *Pensacola*, each 1 case. Tuberculosis—*Jacksonville*, 2 cases; *Tampa*, 3 cases; *Cocoa* and *Lloyd*, each 1 case.

INDIANA—*Anderson*.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 25,398. Total number of deaths, 23, including 3 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 2, diphtheria 1, scarlet fever 1, smallpox 2, and tuberculosis 3.

Marion.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 27,000. Total number of deaths, 15, including 3 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 3 and enteric fever 14.

IOWA—*Davenport*.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 45,000. Total number of deaths not reported. Two deaths from diphtheria and 1 from whooping cough. Cases: Diphtheria 29, enteric fever 19, measles 1, scarlet fever 6, smallpox 2, and whooping cough 6.

KENTUCKY—*Henderson*.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 17,500. Total number of deaths, 16, including enteric fever 2 and 2 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 15 and tuberculosis 3.

MICHIGAN.—Month of August, 1907. Estimated population, 2,611,792. Total number of deaths returned to the State department for the month was 2,735, including enteric fever 45, diphtheria 28, scarlet fever 4, measles 6, whooping cough 23, and 178 from tuberculosis. The total number of deaths from all causes corresponds to an annual rate of 12.4 per 1,000 estimated population.

MONTANA—*Helena*.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 21,000. Total number of deaths, 15. Cases: Enteric fever 7.

NEW HAMPSHIRE—*Concord*.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 20,000. Total number of deaths, 39, including 2 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 11, enteric fever 2, and tuberculosis 2.

Franklin.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 6,000. Total number of deaths 8, including 1 from tuberculosis. One case of tuberculosis reported.

NEW YORK.—*Schenectady*.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 77,666. Total number of deaths, 82, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 1, scarlet fever 1, and 6 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 15, enteric fever 7, measles 2, scarlet fever 7, and tuberculosis 1.

OREGON—*Portland*.—Month of August, 1907. Estimated population, 175,000. Total number of deaths, 132, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 1, whooping cough 1, and 16 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 16, enteric fever 25 (6 brought to city for treatment), measles 5, scarlet fever 4, and whooping cough 9.

PENNSYLVANIA—*Beaver Falls*.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 12,000. One death from scarlet fever reported. Cases: Enteric fever 2, and scarlet fever 3.

Highspire.—Three months ended September 30, 1907. Estimated population, 1,500. Total number of deaths, 5. One case of tuberculosis reported.

New Castle.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 38,000. Total number of deaths, 51, including enteric fever 2, whooping cough 1, and 3 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 7, enteric fever 19, whooping cough 1, scarlet fever 2, measles 2, and tuberculosis 3.

CHINA.

Report from Newchwang—Plague at Kaiping.

Information is received from the Department of State that a dispatch, dated August 21, 1907, from the consul-general at Newchwang, China, states that the first cases of plague at Kaiping, a walled city about 25 miles south of Newchwang and near the South Manchurian Railway Company, appeared several weeks ago and the local authorities at once communicated with the Mukden officials. The viceroy immediately dispatched to the infected district Major Shikuma, a Japanese military doctor, with a corps of 30 Chinese and Japanese assistants. The Japanese doctor and assistants through hard work managed to check the spread of the disease, but owing to the largeness of the infected region more assistants and medicines were applied for. The viceroy at Mukden being unable to comply with the request has urged them to do the best they can with the force at their disposal.

The local Japanese consul has suggested that the local authorities (Newchwang) send medical assistance to the infected district, but the taotai claims that his men are fully engaged in preventing the spread of the epidemic to Newchwang and that it would be dangerous to withdraw any of the force. No vegetables are allowed to enter Newchwang from the infected district and all passengers and baggage are subjected to examination and fumigation before being allowed to enter the port. The deaths from plague up to the present number 30, and the authorities are confident that the spread of the disease has been stopped and Newchwang need have no fear of infection from Kaiping.

COLOMBIA.

The chief surgeon of the United Fruit Company has directed that all sick persons from banana farms and railroad camps in that section of the country be sent to the company's hospital at Cartago, 15 miles from San José, and not to their hospital in Limon as formerly. There is no yellow fever in Limon.

A cablegram from the consul-general at Yokohama, Japan, states as follows:

“Cholera.”

Passed Assistant Surgeon Cumming reports, September 10:

Week ended September 7 bills of health were issued to 3 steamships having an aggregate personnel of 777 passengers and 472 crew. All steerage passengers embarking here were, as usual, bathed and their effects disinfected.

No further cases of cholera have been reported in this city since the case already reported as removed from a vessel.

This city has instituted maritime quarantine against Moji and Kobé on account of cholera. The steamship *Empress*, instead of being held as other vessels to complete five days from Shanghai upon arrival at Nagasaki, was allowed to take aboard a quarantine physician and spend her observation en route here.

To September 9 there have been 408 cases of cholera reported at Moji; 21 new cases during the past two days.

Cholera cases have been reported so far this month as follows: Oita ken, 4; Hiroshima ken, 2; Fukuoka ken (in which is Moji), 491; Hyogo ken (in which is Kobé), 2; Yamaguchi ken (just across Shimonoseki Strait from Moji), 122. A telegram from Okugori, Okayama ken (away down in the islands south of Kiushiu), says cholera has broken out in a severe form there and is spreading, 27 cases having occurred.

Cholera is attacking Europeans and Americans in the foreign concessions at Shanghai. Two officers in the American consulate have been attacked and the manager of the Chartered Bank in Hankow has died from infection on a vessel leaving Shanghai. I can recall no epidemic in which so many vessels and places have been so quickly infected by one place as during the present outbreak in Shanghai.

During the month of August there were examined 908 would-be steerage passengers for the United States or their possessions, of whom 657 were passed and 562 finally certified, in addition to which 284 steerage for Victoria were bathed; a total of 852 bathed and 1,545 pieces of baggage disinfected.

Report from Seoul—Cholera.

Report from Progreso—Inspection and fumigation of vessels.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Harrison reports, September 22:

Period from September 7 to 21: Seven steamships, carrying 401 persons in crews and 119 as passengers from this port received bills of health. Two of the vessels were fumigated. Health conditions are unchanged.

September 19.—Inspected the American steamship *Monterey*, bound for New York via Progreso and Habana, with 98 in the crew, 114 cabin and 33 steerage passengers; vessel sails in a general cargo.

September 21.—Fumigated the Mexican steamship *Oaxaca*, bound for Mobile, with 27 in the crew; vessel sails in ballast with time of last exposure at 12.50 p. m. Inspected the German steamship *Armenia*, bound for New Orleans via Coatzacoalcos and Progreso, with 45 in the crew; vessel sails in the remainder of a European cargo. A bill of health was issued to the British steamship *Alexandrian*.

No quarantinable disease was reported during the week.
