UNITED STATES.

[Reports to the Surgeon-General, Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service.]

Reports from San Francisco, Cal.—Status of plague.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Blue reports:

October 9. Record of plague at Oakland, 3 cases, 3 deaths.

October 13. Plague to date, 65 cases; deaths, 38. Situation at Oakland unchanged.

Plague prevention work—Outgoing quarantine transactions.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Hobdy reports, October 1 and 8:

During the week ended September 28, 80 outgoing vessels were disinfected and certified.

An acting assistant surgeon has been assigned to the duty of patrolling the water front. He corrects errors in rat funnels, fenders, etc., warns the refractory, and makes a daily report of the conditions found.

I have arranged to begin disinfecting all river craft, including all vessels that ply on San Francisco Bay and its tributaries. The addresses of about 150 of these vessels which have no schedule and no regular run have been secured in addition to the 25 or 30 stern-wheelers that run up the rivers on frequent scheduled trips as far as Sacramento and Stockton.

The harbor commissioners have given me an anchorage and all vessels, except the regular liners, will have to come out and anchor and take their turn at fumigation. The revenue cutter *Golden Gate* has been secured for patrol duty, and those vessels attempting to evade the fumigation will be escorted back to the quarantine anchorage (off Mission Rock) where in due time they will receive treatment. This plan contemplates treating all vessels—ferryboats, scow schooners, barges, stern-wheelers—that ply on the waters of San Francisco Bay and its tributaries as often as every 14 days and oftener if necessary. Every vessel must have a certificate of fumigation before leaving.

The State board has passed a resolution conferring authority over these intrastate vessels.

For the week ended October 5, 1907. Outgoing vessels disinfected and certified, 105.

NOTE.—An additional officer was ordered October 12 to San Francisco to assist in the inspection and fumigation of outgoing vessels.

CALIFORNIA—*San Jose*.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 30,000. Total number of deaths, 26, including diphtheria 1, and 3 from enteric fever. Cases: Diphtheria 1, enteric fever 6, and scarlet fever 5.

Stockton.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 23,000. Total number of deaths, 32, including 4 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 1 and tuberculosis 4.

COLORADO.—Month of August, 1907. Estimated population, 615,570. Reports to the State board of health show as follows: Diphtheria, 49 cases, 6 deaths; enteric fever, 676 cases, 71 deaths; scarlet fever, 192 cases, 11 deaths; smallpox, 29 cases and no deaths. Total number of deaths from all causes, 975.

CONNECTICUT—*Bridgeport*.—Month of July,^a 1907. Estimated population, 95,000. Total number of deaths, 168, including measles 1 and 8 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 16, enteric fever 2, measles 7, scarlet fever 8, whooping cough 1, and phthisis pulmonalis 3.

Stamford.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 20,000. Total number of deaths not reported. Cases: Enteric fever 3, measles 2, scarlet fever 1, and diphtheria 1.

FLORIDA.—Reports to the State board of health for the week ended October 5, 1907, show as follows: Diphtheria—*Jacksonville* and *Manatee*, each 1 case. Enteric fever—*Jacksonville*, *Tampa*, and *Wauchula*, each 1 case. Tuberculosis—*Tampa*, 3 cases; *Daytona*, 1 case.

Pensacola.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 22,256. Total number of deaths, 40, including enteric fever 2, and 5 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases not reported.

ILLINOIS—*Quincy*.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 43,000. Total number of deaths, 53, including diphtheria 6, and 7 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 26 and enteric fever 2.

INDIANA—*Marion*.—Month of July,^b 1907. Estimated population, 27,000. Total number of deaths, 23. Cases: Diphtheria 1, enteric fever 7, scarlet fever 2, smallpox 3, and tuberculosis 4.

IOWA—*Cedar Rapids*.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 30,000. Total number of deaths, 39, including scarlet fever 1, and 2 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 10.

KANSAS.—Month of August, 1907. Reports to the State board of health show as follows: Diphtheria, 30 cases, 4 deaths; enteric fever, 267 cases, 38 deaths; measles, 10 cases, no deaths; scarlet fever, 9

cases, no deaths; smallpox, 60 cases, no deaths; tuberculosis, 80 cases, 59 deaths.

Contagious diseases were distributed in the cities as follows:

Atchison.—Diphtheria, 2 cases; enteric fever, 10 cases; smallpox, 6 cases.

Coffeyville.—Enteric fever, 6 cases, 1 death; measles, 1 case.

Kansas City.—Diphtheria, 3 cases, 1 death; enteric fever, 50 cases, 9 deaths; measles, 1 case; smallpox, 1 case; tuberculosis, 16 cases, 7 deaths.

Leavenworth.—Diphtheria, 2 cases; enteric fever, 10 cases, 1 death; scarlet fever, 1 case; tuberculosis, 4 cases, 2 deaths.

Parsons.—Enteric fever, 5 cases; tuberculosis, 4 cases, 4 deaths.

MINNESOTA.—*St. Paul*.—Month of August, 1907. Estimated population, 210,000. Total number of deaths reported to the department of health, 173, including diphtheria 4, enteric fever 1, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 2, and 29 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 40, scarlet fever 9, and smallpox 4.

MONTANA.—Month of August, 1907. Estimated population, 280,000. Reports to the State board of health show as follows: Total number of deaths, 311, including diphtheria 19, enteric fever 11, measles 2, whooping cough 4, and 13 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 103, enteric fever 111, measles 29, scarlet fever 17, and smallpox 7.

NEW JERSEY.—*Morristown*.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 12,500. Total number of deaths, 16, including 1 from diphtheria. Cases: Enteric fever 1, diphtheria 2, measles 1, and scarlet fever 2.

Phillipsburg.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 13,500. Total number of deaths not reported. Two deaths from enteric fever. Six cases of enteric fever reported.

NEW YORK.—Month of August, 1907. Estimated population, 8,227,000. Reports to the State department of health show as follows: Total number of deaths, 13,429, corresponding to an annual death rate of 19.6 per 1,000 of the population, includes enteric fever 149, measles 70, scarlet fever 42, whooping cough 121, diphtheria 163, and 1,126 from phthisis pulmonalis. Cases: Diphtheria 1,193, enteric fever 819, measles 968, scarlet fever 646, smallpox 12, and tuberculosis 1,701.

Rome.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 18,000. Total number of deaths, 25, including 1 from enteric fever. Cases: Diphtheria 3, enteric fever 3, and scarlet fever 5.

Saratoga Springs.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 14,000. Total number of deaths, 24, including 3 from tuberculosis.

NORTH CAROLINA.—Month of August, 1907. Estimated population, 1,893,810. Reports to State board of health from 84 counties show as follows: Measles in 19 counties, whooping cough in 23 counties, scarlet fever in 19 counties, diphtheria in 24 counties, enteric fever in 79 counties, malarial fever in 23 counties, pernicious malarial fever in 6 counties, hemorrhagic malarial fever in 1 county, and smallpox in 16 counties, viz: Alamance, 29; Cabarrus, 1; Camden, 7; Chowan, 1; Davie, 1; Guilford, 3; Madison, 15; Martin, 1; Mitchell, many; Nash, 1; Orange, 6; Pitt, 1; Rockingham, 9; Warren, 3; Watauga, 6, and Wayne, 1.

Reports for the month from 23 towns having an aggregate population of 224,800—white, 135,450; colored, 89,350—show a total of 328 deaths—white, 141; colored, 187—including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 26, measles 4, malarial fever 11, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 5, and 43 from phthisis pulmonalis.

OHIO—Columbus.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 185,000. Total number of deaths, 188 (nonresidents 26), including enteric fever 5, and 24 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 8, enteric fever 60, measles 2, scarlet fever 18, whooping cough 5, and tuberculosis 1.

Newark.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 28,500. Total number of deaths, 24, including enteric fever 1, and 1 from measles. Cases: Diphtheria 3, enteric fever 8, scarlet fever 3, and measles 1.

Zanesville.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 26,000. Total number of deaths, 15, including 1 from diphtheria. Cases: Diphtheria 5, and scarlet fever 3.

PENNSYLVANIA—Dunmore.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 17,500. Total number of deaths, 20, including 2 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 8, measles 1, and tuberculosis 2.

UTAH—Salt Lake City.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 85,000. Total number of deaths from all causes, 85, including diphtheria 3, enteric fever 4, whooping cough 1, and 7 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 19, enteric fever 39, smallpox 5, measles 3, scarlet fever 16, and whooping cough 8.

VIRGINIA.—Reports to the State board of health for the month of August, 1907, show as follows:

Diphtheria present in 18 counties and 1 city; enteric fever in 78 counties and 1 city; measles in 16 counties and 1 city; scarlet fever in 6 counties and 1 city; whooping cough in 37 counties; smallpox in 4 counties and 1 city; and tuberculosis in 65 counties and 1 city.

WASHINGTON—Bellingham.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 29,000. Total number of deaths, 19, including 1 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 1, and tuberculosis 2.

AFRICA.

Report from Port Elizabeth—Plague at King Williams Town and in vicinity.

Consul Mosher reports, August 30:

The following is the report of the department of public health upon the plague at King Williams Town for the week ended August 24:

During the week outbreaks of disease were reported on a farm near Izinyoka, King Williams Town district, at Wartburg Mission Station, Stutterheim district, and at Thomas River, Cathcart district.

Investigation proved the disease in all of these outbreaks to be pneumatic plague and to have been derived from the outbreak at Izeli location in the King Williams Town district. * * * The disease was conveyed by a native female, who was infected by one of the above-mentioned cases and died at Izinyoka August 5. The daughter of this case went to Wartburg Mission Station August 10, dying there August 14. This case infected a native male, who went to Thomas River on the 11th instant, dying there August 14, and a native female, who died at Wartburg August 21.

The last case remaining under treatment at the plague hospital, King Williams Town, was discharged during the week.

Eighty-four rats (including 3 found dead) and 45 mice (including 3 found dead) were examined, of which 3 rats and 3 mice were probably plague infected.

Report from Cape Town—Plague in the Colony—Examination of rodents for plague infection.

The following report on the outbreak of plague at King Williams Town is received from the medical officer of health for the colony under date of September 2:

Week ended August 31, 1907.

Cathcart.—During the week an outbreak of disease was discovered at Cathcart native location, which on investigation proved to be plague. It was discovered that the body of the native male reported in Government Notice No. 948, for the week ended August 24, 1907, as having died of plague at Thomas River on the 14th idem, was brought into the location and there infected one native male and three native females (two adults and one child), who sickened, respectively, on August 23, 24, 27, and 28. These cases and one native male suspect have been isolated on the spot.

King Williams Town.—No further case of plague has been discovered during the week.

Eighty-two rats (including 11 found dead) and 56 mice (including 10 found dead) were examined, of which 11 rats and 9 mice were probably plague infected.

ALGERIA.

Report on plague at Oran.

Information is received from the Department of State, under date of October 5, that the following cablegram, dated October 1, has been received from the American ambassador at Paris:

In accordance with terms of sanitary convention, minister for foreign affairs informs me 6 cases of plague, 2 fatal and 2 doubtful, observed at Oran. They have been isolated. Attendants inoculated with serum and placed under observation. Houses disinfected. Destruction of rats ordered.

BRAZIL.

Report from Rio de Janeiro—Inspection of vessels—Plague, smallpox, and yellow fever.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Stewart reports, September 13:

Week ended September 8. Bills of health were issued to vessels sailing for United States ports, after inspection, as follows:

On September 2, the German steamship *Seigmund*, with a cargo of coffee, for New York, with no passengers and no change in the personnel; September 3, the British steamship *Canning*, with a cargo of coffee, for New York, with no passengers and no change in personnel, and the Portuguese bark *Segona*, for Mobile, Ala., with no passengers, in stone ballast, and with no change in the crew personnel while here; September 4, the British steamship *Tennyson*, for New York, with a cargo of coffee, no change in crew, and with 35 first-class and 40 steerage passengers for New York, and the Brazilian steamship *Acre* for New York, with a new crew, 53 cabin and 13 steerage passengers, and a general cargo; and September 5, the British steamship *Titania*, for Newport News, Va., in water ballast, with no passengers and 1 new member of the crew, signed in this port.

Mortality report from Pernambuco.—Two weeks ended July 31. Total deaths, 375. Total estimated population, 210,000. Smallpox caused 121 deaths.

Mortality in Rio de Janeiro.—Week ended September 8. Total deaths, 235. Yellow fever caused no deaths, nor were there any cases of that disease reported. Bubonic plague caused 3 deaths, with 8 new reported cases, and smallpox caused 3 deaths, with 8 new cases. At the close of the week there were in the Hospital São Sebastião 1 case of yellow fever, 8 cases of smallpox, and 5 cases of plague under treatment.

BRITISH HONDURAS.

CHILE.

Report from Valparaiso—Plague in Chile.

The following information is received, under date of October 5, from the Department of State, contained in a dispatch from the American consul at Valparaiso, dated August 28:

According to the best obtainable information bubonic plague still continues to quite an extent in some of the northern ports of Chile. The latest report given out shows, for the first six months of 1907, for Taltal, 695 cases, with a death rate of 46 per cent; Antofagasta, 216 cases, with a death rate of 42 per cent; Iquique, 154 cases, with a death rate of 41 per cent, and Pisagua, 105 cases, with a death rate of 45 per cent. The nearest of these ports is about 500 miles distant from Valparaiso. All shipping in these ports anchor out in the open bay, and so far as I am able to learn there have been no cases of plague developed on any of the steamers plying between Valparaiso and Ancon, or vice versa. Nearly all the cases are among the very poor natives. I have failed to learn of a single foreigner being attacked by the disease during the time.

The Government has made an effort to clean up these ports so as to stamp out the disease, but from present indications it will be some time before it is thoroughly carried out.

The general health conditions of the port are good.

CHINA.

At Rodas, 24 miles from here, a Cuban child has died of yellow fever. The case was confirmed by the chief of local national board of health of Rodas. A post-mortem examination was held, confirming the diagnosis.

Week ended October 5. Bills of health issued to 4 vessels going to ports in the United States; 3 of these vessels were fumigated and 1 only was inspected. Members of crews inspected, 150; passengers inspected and landed here, 3. No immune certificate was issued this week.

The British steamship *Lugano*, from Manzanillo, bound for Galveston, Tex., and the British steamship *Tewan*, from Cartagena, Colombia, destined to Galveston, were fumigated October 3.

The Spanish steamship *Puerto Rico*, from Santiago de Cuba for New Orleans, was fumigated October 4.

There have been cases at Cannao, Manacas, Guaos, Camarones, Castillo de Jagua, Central Soledad, and Rodas; all of these localities except Castillo de Jagua, are interior rural towns, and places in the surrounding country.

The nationality of the cases to date are: Fourteen from the United States, 48 from Spain, and 2 from Cuba.

Nationality of persons who have died of yellow fever: Four from the United States, 10 from Spain, and 2 from Cuba.

No yellow-fever cases have appeared among American troops during the week.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Nuñez reports, September 30:

Week ended September 28. Three bills of health were granted to vesels leaving for the United States; 5 health and acclimation certificates granted to passengers bound for the United States via Habana, and the following vessels were fumigated: The Norwegian schooner *Mexico*, with 8 in crew, no passengers, bound for Mobile, Ala.; the Norwegian steamship *Ole Bull*, having a crew of 19, no passengers, destined also for Mobile, and the Norwegian steamship *Gotthard*, bound for Galveston, with 20 in the crew, and 6 passengers, of which 5 were taken on at Habana and 1 at this port.

The case under treatment at Jovellanos recovered and was discharged during the past week. No new cases have been reported from that place.

Report from Santiago—Inspection of vessels—Changes in sanitary organization—Summary of transactions for the month of September, 1907.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Wilson reports, October 1:

Week ended September 28. Bills of health issued to 5 vessels bound for the United States. No vessel was fumigated.

No quarantinable disease has been reported.

Radical changes have been made in sanitary matters. The following offices have been abolished: Medical inspector of the province, the local board of health, and the committee on infectious diseases. The duties of the last two have been given to the local chief of sanitation, with his three municipal medical inspectors. In case of doubt in the diagnosis of infectious diseases a physician from private practice may be called in consultation.

The title of medical inspector of the province has been changed, but his territory has been extended to include the adjoining province of Camagüey.

GERMANY.

Reports from Berlin—Cholera in Russia.

The following are received from Consul-General Thackara, under dates of September 24 and October 2:

During the period from September 5 to 9, in the city of Astrakhan there were registered 230 new cases of cholera and 153 deaths, and in the governmental district of Astrakhan 432 cases with 275 deaths. To September 9 the total number of cholera cases in that region amounted to 1,663 cases with 849 deaths. In the city of Samara, to September 9, the total number of cases had increased to 267 with 127 deaths; in the city and district of Nizhni Novgorod 70 cases with 21 deaths, and 70 cases with 21 deaths, respectively, this being an increase since September 3 of 78 cases and 32 deaths. In Saratov from September 4 to 9 there occurred 38 new cases of cholera and 9 deaths. According to a report dated September 11 there were registered 4 cases of cholera in Baku with 1 death, together with 6 cases and 3 deaths on a steamer arrived from Astrakhan, so that the Russian Government has declared Baku as suspicious of cholera infection. In the government district of Kazan 3 cases of cholera were notified September 9. The cities of Saratov, Kamishin, and Kazan have been declared to be infected with cholera, and the governmental districts of Riazan, Tobolsk, and Viatka have been declared to be threatened with cholera.

In Moscow the nurse who attended the cholera patient, whose case has already been reported [see Public Health Reports, October 4, 1907, page 1407], became infected and died September 8. At the

railway station of Kursk, south of Moscow, a laborer who had arrived from Astrakhan died of cholera September 9. In Jaroslav, during the period from September 1 to 8, there were registered 7 cases of cholera. Sporadic cases were also reported from Simbirsk, Syzran, Jurino, and other parts of the Russian Empire.

According to official statistics published by the imperial health office at Berlin (Kaiserliche Gesundheitsamt), there were registered in the whole of the Russian Empire during the period from September 11 to 16, 837 fresh cases of cholera and 422 deaths, including 226 cases in the city of Astrakhan with 131 deaths.

On September 15 the plague commission issued a statement declaring the following places to be infected with cholera: Baku, Nikolajevsk (district of Samara), and the district of Zaritzyn.

According to a report of September 8 a case of cholera has occurred also in Lodz. On September 19, according to an official report, 2 persons died of cholera in Rostov on the Don.

JAPAN.

Report from Yokohama—Inspection of vessels—Spread of cholera—Outbreak of cerebro-spinal meningitis at Osaka and Tokyo—Regulations enforced against cholera-infected ports.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Cumming reports, September 18:

Week ended September 14. Bills of health were issued to 4 vessels having an aggregate personnel of 553 passengers and 460 crew. One vessel, the steamship *Glenfarg*, en route from Hongkong to Callao with Chinese coolies, was granted an original bill of health, as she was not originally intended for an American port, but found she had to stop for coal at Honolulu.

The cholera introduced only a short time ago from Shanghai is spreading very rapidly in the southern kens along the Inland Sea.

September 13 the following cholera statistics were collected: Fukuoka ken, 687 cases; Yamaguchi ken, 225; Hyogo ken (Kobé), 102; Osaka-fu, 42; Suma and Rokkasan, both suburbs of Kobé, 2; Hiroshima ken, 7; Ohita ken, 57; Okayama, 9; Ehime ken, 2; Nagasaki ken, 25; Kagawa, 1; Saga ken, 1; Wakayama ken, 1; Kanagawa ken, in which Yokohama is situated, 1, tally clerk on the steamship *Glamorganshire* from London via Moji and Kobé.

A very severe outbreak of cerebro-spinal meningitis is reported from Sakai, a manufacturing town south of Osaka and across the bay from Kobé. About 120 cases have been reported. This disease has also suddenly appeared in violent form at Tokyo. The sanitary authorities have issued a circular informing the people of the seriousness of the disease and the probability that it is spread by bacteria contained in the nasal and oral secretions spreading to the brain. Simple instructions as to prophylactic measures are given in the circular.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom, under date of September 16, writes that there have been 118 cases of cholera, with 45 deaths, in Kobé from September 5 to 16.

He is enforcing regulations against persons and things embarking from cholera-infected ports.

A circular from this office puts into force regulations relating to persons and things from infected ports or places embarking at a clean port, and, should cholera prevail here, five days' detention will be required of intending steerage passengers previous to embarkation upon vessels bound to the United States or their possessions, regardless of whether their destination be Canada or the United States.

Emigrants recommended for rejection.

Number of emigrants per steamship *China* recommended September 19 for rejection: For Honolulu, 4; for San Francisco, 2. Advised to wait: For San Francisco, 11.

Report from Kôbé—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Rejection of emigrants—Cholera at Moji and Shimonoseki.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, September 10:

Week ended September 7. Two original and 2 supplemental bills of health were granted to 4 steamers with an aggregate personnel of 832, and there were inspected 4 vessels, 489 members of crews, 1 cabin and 223 steerage passengers, while 1 vessel was fumigated with sulphur dioxide to kill vermin, and 114 crew and 39 steerage passengers were bathed and their effects disinfected with steam. The number of pieces of baggage steamed was 259. Manifests were viséed for 11,656 pieces of freight, and signature was refused for 2,230 cases of fresh vegetables for Manila, origin and condition being unknown to this office.

The emigration inspections were as follows: Steamship *America Maru*, for San Francisco and Honolulu, 39 passed, and 89 recommended for rejection; steamship *Prinz Sigismund*, for Manila, 2 passed and none recommended for rejection.

The local health authorities report that there have been up to the present time this month in Kôbé but 5 authenticated cases of cholera, all among the shipping people, and said to have been imported from Shanghai. The especial restrictions as to cholera will be put in force at this port if the disease continues.

At Moji there have been reported 339 cases of cholera, with 305 deaths and 14 recoveries. The authorities of the port informed me this morning that there had actually been about 450 cases, with a mortality of 90 per cent. The disease is also present at Shimonoseki, across the strait, and numerous other places near Moji.

No quarantinable disease was reported during the week from Osaka.

Report from Nagasaki—Emigrants recommended for rejection.

MADAGASCAR.

Report from Tamatave—Quarantine against plague at Majunga.

Consul Carter reports, September 5:

Plague, which was reported in my dispatch of August 2, 1907, is still confined to the province of Majunga, on the northwest coast of Madagascar, and the strictest quarantine regulations have been in effect since the first appearance of the disease, on July 28 last.

MEXICO.

Report from City of Mexico—Proposed improvement in water-supply system—Statistics from city of Guanajuato.

The following is received from Consul-General Gottschalk, under date of September 13:

Gratifying progress is being made in the work of providing the City of Mexico with an adequate water supply. The water is to be

piped to the city from the lake and springs of Xochimilco, some 32 kilometers away, and the work will, it is expected, be concluded by the end of this year.

Before the lapse of another twelvemonth it is anticipated that the great reservoirs beyond Chapultepec (on the hills of Tacubaya) will be completed, and that new mains and pipes will have been placed throughout the streets of the City of Mexico. Admitting a population of 500,000 souls for the city and its suburbs, this system of water supply will provide the city with an average of 6,000 liters a day per person.

Statistics furnished the Consejo Superior de Salubridad by the governor of the State of Guanajuato, a State the capital city of which, Guanajuato, has a population of 40,000, showed 600 deaths from enteric fever for the ten years prior to the opening of the waterworks at La Presa. The supply of water was then 7 liters per person. Within the ten years which have now elapsed since the opening of the new water supply the records show only 27 deaths from enteric fever.

The activity of the board of health has recently been manifested in the City of Mexico by a series of visits to all of the hotels and restaurants, where there is a rigid restriction upon the water consumed by the patrons. The water must be properly filtered.

Report from Salina Cruz—Inspection and fumigation of vessel.

Acting Assistant Surgeon McPherson reports, September 30:

During the period from September 16 to 30, inclusive, one vessel cleared from this port for the United States, the steamship *Nebraskan*, which left this port September 24, bound for San Francisco, Cal., and was fumigated throughout while in the roadstead outside the harbor. Owing to the necessity for repairs the vessel put back to this port after having been several days at sea, and is at present here.

Report from Veracruz—Inspection and fumigation of vessels.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Frick reports, September 30:

Week ended September 28. September 22, inspected the British steamship *Alexandrian*, bound for New Orleans via Coatzacoalcas, with 45 in the crew and 2 passengers; vessel sails in the remainder of a European cargo.

September 24, fumigated the French steamship *Verginie*, bound for New Orleans via Tampico, with 64 in the crew and 4 passengers; vessel sails in the remainder of a European cargo; with time of last exposure at 10.45 a. m.

September 25, inspected the Swedish steamship *Disa*, bound for Galveston via Mexican ports, with 16 in the crew; vessel sails in the remainder of a cargo of American lumber.

September 26, fumigated the British steamship *Cliftonhall*, bound for Mobile, with 29 in the crew; vessel sails in ballast; with time of last exposure at 7.45 a. m. Fumigated the Norwegian steamship *Norheim*, bound New Orleans, with 20 in the crew and 1 passenger; vessel sails in a small cargo of coffee; with time of last exposure at 10.10 a. m. age passengers; vessel sails in general cargo. TURKEY.

Report from Beirut—Medical inspection of passengers discontinued—Quarantine against Alexandria, Egypt, on account of plague.

Consul Ravndal reports, September 5:

A case of plague was officially reported as having occurred in Beirut August 9. In consequence passengers leaving Beirut were subjected to a medical inspection. This restriction has since been removed. Sporadic cases of bubonic plague have been discovered in Beirut during the past seven years, but the cases have been exceedingly rare and the disease never appeared in epidemic form. On account of the continued presence of plague in Egypt, all arrivals from Alexandria are compelled, for about nine months of the year, to undergo quarantine at Beirut before being admitted here or allowed to proceed to Jaffa, Haifa, or other Syrian ports.

The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 13.0 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,641 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 5 from measles, 2 from diphtheria, 3 from scarlet fever, and 9 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended September 21, 1907, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 16.1 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,117,547. The lowest rate was recorded in Galway, viz, 3.9, and the highest in Tralee, viz, 31.7 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 145 deaths were registered, including diphtheria 2, whooping cough 1, and 33 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended September 21, 1907, correspond to an annual rate of 13.3 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,812,171. The highest rate of mortality was recorded in Glasgow, viz, 15.2, and the lowest in Leith, viz, 7.5 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 462, including diphtheria 3, scarlet fever 1, measles 4, and 10 from whooping cough.

MALTA.—Two weeks ended September 21, 1907. Estimated population, 206,689. Total number of deaths, 150, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 1, measles 1, and 5 from tuberculosis.
