Owing to the prevalence of yellow fever in certain ports of the island of Cuba, the season of close quarantine will be maintained against Cuban ports until November 30, 1907.

SEATTLE, WASH., October 22, 1907.

SURGEON-GENERAL, PUBLIC HEALTH AND MARINE-HOSPITAL SERVICE.

Washington, D. C:

Mayor of Seattle advises me that one death from bubonic plague has taken place there, and forwards request of city board of health that I ask your service to take charge of the prophylactic measures that may be necessary to stamp out the disease at its inception, which request I respectfully and earnestly make.

October 24. The following telegram was sent to Governor Meade:

"After consultation with Assistant Secretary Treasury, in response to your telegram 22d received this morning, Passed Assistant Surgeon Cofer will be ordered to Seattle as representative of Service in Seattle and Puget Sound territory. Doctor Cofer has had large experience with plague at Honolulu. Passed Assistant Surgeon White, already in Seattle, has also had large experience with plague. Pending Cofer's arrival, Doctor White has been directed to confer with mayor in advisory capacity and to make known to Bureau necessities of situation. Additional officers will be sent if needed. Same arrangements will be necessary with regard to expense as have been made in San Francisco and Oakland and in New Orleans during yellow fever epidemic. That is, labor and material required will be furnished by State or local authorities, the Department furnishing necessary professional force, including laboratory if required." Under date of October 24, Passed Assistant Surgeon White, at Seattle, was directed to confer with the mayor and health authorities and to wire specific recommendations as to assistance to be rendered by the Public Health and Marine-Hosptal Service, together with a full statement of what has been done to the present time by the local authorities and their plan for the immediate future.

STATISTICAL REPORTS OF MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY, STATES AND CITIES OF THE UNITED STATES—UNTABULATED.

CALIFORNIA.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 2,001,193. Total number of deaths reported to the State board of health, 2,292, corresponding to an annual death rate of 13.9 per 1,000 population.

Oakland.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 225,000. Total number of deaths, 157, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 4, plague 2, and 18 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 19, enteric fever 12, plague 2, scarlet fever 1, smallpox 3, and tuberculosis 3.

CONNECTICUT—Bridgeport.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 95,000. Total number of deaths, 107, including diphtheria 4, enteric fever 2, measles 3, and 11 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 15, enteric fever 18, scarlet fever 7, whooping cough 2, and phthisis pulmonalis 5.

FLORIDA.—Reports to the State board of health for the week ended October 19, 1907, show as follows: Diphtheria—Jacksonville, 3 cases; St. Augustine, 2 cases; Manatee, 1 case. Enteric fever—Plant City and Tampa, each 1 case. Tuberculosis—Tampa, Jacksonville, St. Petersburg, Morriston, and Newberry, each 1 case.

ILLINOIS—Quincy.<sup>a</sup>—Month of August, 1907. Estimated population, 43,000. Total number of deaths, 60, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 1, and 7 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 19 and enteric fever 7.

Iowa-Keokuk.-Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 16,000. Total number of deaths, 12, including 4 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria, 2.

PENNSYLVANIA—Butler.—Month of September, 1907. Total number of deaths, 23, including diphtheria 2, and 4 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 23 and tuberculosis 1.

UTAH.—Month of September, 1907. Reports to the State board of health from 27 counties, having an estimated population of 346,873, show as follows: Total number of deaths, 289, including diphtheria 6, enteric fever 6, whooping cough 2, and 9 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 46, enteric fever 172, measles 55, scarlet fever 46, smallpox 11, whooping cough 94, and tuberculosis 12 (incomplete).

WASHINGTON—Seattle.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 240,000. Total number of deaths, 206, including diphtheria 5, enteric fever 23, scarlet fever 1, and 14 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 30, enteric fever 90, measles 4, scarlet fever 8, smallpox 5, and tuberculosis 3.

WISCONSIN.—Reports to the State board of health show as follows: Month of July, 1907. Forty-eight cities and towns in 29 counties report: Diphtheria, 84 cases, 7 deaths; enteric fever, 39 cases, 4 deaths; measles, 23 cases, no deaths; scarlet fever, 34 cases, 3 deaths; smallpox, 53 cases, no deaths; whooping cough, 33 cases, no deaths; phthisis pulmonalis, 63 cases, 29 deaths.

Month of August, 1907. Sixty-one cities and towns in 39 counties report: Diphtheria, 103 cases, 6 deaths; enteric fever, 32 cases, 9 deaths; measles, 16 cases, no deaths; scarlet fever, 33 cases, 5 deaths; smallpox 40 cases, no deaths; whooping cough, 16 cases, 5 deaths; phthisis pulmonalis, 56 cases, 32 deaths.

Month of September, 1907. Forty-two cities and towns in 31 counties report: Diphtheria, 81 cases, 7 deaths; enteric fever, 58 cases, 9 deaths; measles, 28 cases, no deaths; scarlet fever, 27 cases, 1 death; smallpox, 26 cases, no deaths; whooping cough, 22 cases, 6 deaths; phthisis pulmonalis, 45 cases, 30 deaths.

No case of plague was discovered during the week. Thirty-four rats (including 13 found dead) and 19 mice (including 3 found dead) were examined, of which 1 rat proved to be plague infected, and 12 rats and 3 mice probably plague infected.

## Report from Cape Town.

The following report on the status of plague at King Williams Town is received from the medical officer of health for the colony under date of September 2:

# Report from Tangier—Quarantine against Oran on account of plague.

The following is received from the Department of State under date of October 25:

The Department is in receipt of a dispatch, dated the 2d instant, from the American minister at Tangier, in which he reports that the French minister having announced to the sanitary council of Morocco the presence of plague in the town of Oran, Algiers, the council

on that day declared the port of Oran to be infected and instituted a rigid quarantine against all vessels and passengers arriving therefrom.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Stewart reports, September 25:

Week ended September 15. The following-named vessels were issued bills of health from this consulate general, and all steamships were inspected.

September 10. The British steamship *Phidias*, for New Orleans, with cargo of coffee, no passengers, and no change in the personnel of the crew. On the same date the German bark *Baden*, for Gulfport, Miss., in stone ballast, with no passengers, and no change in the personnel; the Danish bark *Ellen*, for Pensacola, Fla., in stone ballast, with no passengers, and no change in the crew personnel; and on the same date the Norwegian steamship *Rauma*, for New York, in cargo of coffee, no passengers, and no change in the crew personnel. September 14, the British steamship *Grecian Prince*, for New York, with a cargo of coffee, no passengers, and no change in the personnel of the crew while in this port.

All vessels lay in the open bay while here and had no other than the necessary communication with the shore.

Mortality in Para, Brazil.—Month of June. Total estimated population of the city, 185,000. Total deaths, 293. Yellow fever caused 9 deaths, smallpox 13, and leprosy 2.

Mortality in Rio de Janeiro.—Week ended September 15. Census population, 625,678. Total deaths, 224. Yellow fever caused no deaths with no new cases reported, plague caused 1 death with 6 new cases reported, and smallpox caused 5 deaths with 5 new cases reported. At the close of the week there were in the Hospital São Sebastião no cases of yellow fever, 9 cases of smallpox, and 4 cases of plague under treatment.

Week ended September 22. During this period the followingnamed vessels were inspected by me (with exceptions noted below) and bills of health were issued: September 16, the Italian bark Pasquale Laura, for Gulfport, Miss., in stone ballast, no passengers, and 1 new member of the crew taken on in this port; on the same date, the British steamship *Crusader*, for Philadelphia, in a cargo of manganese ore, no passengers, and no change in the personnel of the crew; September 17, the British steamship Buffon, for New Orleans, with a cargo of coffee, no passengers, and with 1 new member of the crew signed on here; on the same date, the German steamship *Gunther*, for New York, with a cargo of coffee, no change in the crew, and with 6 steerage passengers from this port; September 19, the British steamship Thespis, for New York, with a cargo of coffee, no change in the crew personnel, but with 7 cabin and 19 steerage passengers from this port (including some transferred from a steamship from the river Plate in this port without contact with the shore); on the same date, the German steamship Dacia, for New Orleans, with a cargo of coffee, no passengers, and no change in the crew; and September 21, the British steamship Harlech, for Baltimore, with a cargo of manganese ore, no passengers, and no change in the crew personnel while here.

The steamers *Crusader* and *Harlech*, leaving here respectively September 16 and 21, were not inspected.

Report from Valparaiso—Statistics of plague in Chile during the six months ended June 30, 1907—General sanitary conditions at Valparaiso good.

Consul Winslow reports, August 28:

There were 695 cases of bubonic plague at Taltal during the first 6 months of 1907, with a death rate of 46 per cent; at Antofagasta, 216 cases, with a death rate of 42 per cent; at Iquique, 154 cases, with a death rate of 41 per cent, and at Pisagua, 105 cases, with a rate of 45 per cent of deaths. Nearly all the cases were among the very poor natives. I have not heard of a single foreigner being attacked by the disease in that time. The Government has taken the matter in hand.

The general health conditions of Valparaiso have been exceptionally good during the past year.

#### CHINA.

# Reports from Newchwang—Quarantine against Moji on account of plague—Status of plague at Kaiping.

The following are received from Vice and Deputy Consul-General Pontius under dates of September 8 and 12:

The consular body have concurred with the local customs officials in the establishment of a quarantine against the port of Moji, Japan, owing to the prevalence of cholera at that place.

Up to the present time 200 deaths have resulted from plague at Kaiping. The disease is confined to one section of the walled city, and every effort is being made to stamp out the epidemic. From reliable sources I have learned that but 40 new cases have appeared in Kaiping during the past two weeks, as these cases are mild in form.

Newchwang has not experienced an outbreak of either plague or cholera.

The yellow fever situation has improved somewhat since my last report. There have been no further cases reported from Campo Florido and the 2 noted last week have been discharged, recovered. At Palos, where conditions were very disquieting, there were no new cases, and but 1 case remains under treatment. A new focus appeared, however, near the border of Habana Province, at Trinidad plantation, adjoining Union de Reyes, and another at Alacranes, where the disease has been reported at intervals throughout the summer. The 2 cases at Trinidad have been discharged.

In Habana 1 new case was announced, October 14, in the person of a Spanish woman who had not been out of the city for several months. The case was considered a grave one from the beginning, and death resulted on October 16. On the same date the diagnosis of yellow fever was made in the case of a patient at Las Animas Hospital, this city, from Cienfuegos.

A résumé of all fever reports to date for the current year shows: For Habana, 5 cases and 1 death; for the interior, 117 cases and 32 deaths; total, 122 cases and 33 deaths. There are 5 cases under treatment.

Quarantine against Veracruz was lifted on October 15 by the national sanitary department. The detention camp at Triscornia is, in consequence, used exclusively for passengers bound for southern ports.

October 25. Fatal case of yellow fever at Jaruco, Habana Province, near Campo Florido—Cuban boy, aged 10.

October 26. Second fatal case of yellow fever at Jaruco, Cuban child in same family as case reported yesterday.

October 28. One new case of yellow fever from Bermeja, Matanzas Province, isolated at Alacranes; Spaniard, taken sick October 24.

There is a severe epidemic of smallpox in the interior of Ecuador, affecting chiefly the towns of Ambato, Cajabamba, Riobamba, Latacunga, and Chasqui. It is estimated that there are 1,000 cases at present along the line of the railroad.

No deaths from yellow fever were reported during the month of July. In the month of August 5 deaths occurred in Guayaquil.

Certificates of immunity issued by officers of the Service are being accepted by the Peruvian authorities.

#### GERMANY.

#### Report from Berlin-Status of cholera in Russia.

The following is received from Consul-General Thackera, under date of October 17:

Cholera in Russia.—According to official statistics published in the organ of the Russian Government, and reprinted in the bulletin of the Imperial Health Office at Berlin, there were registered during the period from September 21 to 24, inclusive, 535 fresh cases of cholera in the Russian Empire, with 251 deaths.

During the period from September 25 to 29, inclusive, there were registered in the whole of the Russian Empire 482 cases of cholera and 225 deaths.

#### INDIA.

## Reports from Calcutta—Transactions of Service—Cholera, plague, and smallpox.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Eakins reports, September 26:

Week ended September 21. A bill of health was issued to the steamship *Rotenfels*, bound for Boston and New York, with a total crew of 72. The usual precautions were taken, holds fumigated, rat guards placed on wharf lines, and Lascars' effects disinfected.

During the week ended September 14 there were 38 deaths from cholera, 6 from plague, and 1 from smallpox in Calcutta. In Bengal and India there were 114 cases and 111 deaths and 9,556 cases and 6,390 deaths from plague, respectively.

# Plague in the Northern Shan States, Burma—Virulent type of cholera at Serampur.

The following is received from Consul-General Michael, under dates of September 19 and 26:

The first case of plague ever known in the Northern Shan States occurred very recently. The victim was a Chinaman. The case has occasioned much alarm, although the superintendent and civil surgeon were present when the case developed and took immediate steps to prevent the spread of the disease. It is not reported whether plague rats have found their way into the community or not.

*The plague's reappearance.*—Åfter a long absence plague has made its reappearance in the Ocreguam Mine camp. There have been 2 European victims. Reports from Serampur of the continued spread of a virulent type of cholera are somewhat alarming. Numerous fatal cases are reported, the majority of the victims not living for more than 12 hours after the first attack. The disease is of the most fatal type. The street drains are almost choked with undesirable accumulations, while the roads are generally in an extremely bad condition.

Serampur is situated about 13 miles down the Hooghly from Calcutta and contains, perhaps, 50,000 people, most all of whom are natives.

Cholera cases are increasing in Lucknow, and one European died September 22.

#### JAPAN.

## Report from Yokohama—Inspection and fumigation of vessels— Cholera at Yokohama—Measures to prevent spread of cholera— Water supply, good.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Cumming reports, October 3:

Week ended September 28. Bills of health were issued to 5 steamships, having an aggregate personnel of 614 members of crews and 767 passengers. Two of the passengers were bound to Puget Sound ports and one each to Manila, New York, and San Francisco via Honolulu.

The steamship *Indrawadi*, from this port to New York, having been at plague ports, was fumigated while empty here to destroy vermin.

To the present time there have been only 25 cases of cholera at Yokohama. They have been connected with the cargo handlers of vessels from infected ports.

The authorities are using strenuous measures to prevent an epidemic. The disease has apparently spent its force in the ports to the west of Yokohama. The water supply here is not contaminated. The water supply of this city comes from the mountains 30 miles away and so far as I have heard has never been infected with cholera.

#### Emigrants recommended for rejection.

Number of emigrants per steamship *Nippon Maru* recommended, October 2, for rejection: For Honolulu, 2. Advised to wait, 7. Of these rejections all were for trachoma.

**Report from Kobe—Inspection of vessels—Examination of emigrants—Exportation of certain foodstuffs suspended**—Cholera and plague at Osaka—Summary of cholera at Kobe.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, September 25:

Week ended September 21. Five vessels, 472 members of crews and 338 steerage passengers, were inspected. Two hundred and fortyeight steerage passengers were bathed and their effects disinfected. Commencing with the steerage passengers of the steamship *Tremont*, 80 were held 5 days under observation here and inspected each day prior to embarkation. The number of pieces of baggage disinfected was 525. Manifests were viséed for 18,793 pieces of freight, while certain articles, such as salted radishes, dried vegetables, dried mushrooms, salted plums, dried shrimps, and fresh vegetables, were held up pending the disappearance of cholera from this port. Samples of the articles named were examined, and their condition was such that I decided it would not be safe to ship them at present.

The shipping people were also cautioned against allowing shore liberty to crews or steerage passengers while in this port and against taking fresh supplies or water.

Emigrants were examined as follows:

Steamship Tango Maru for Seattle, 41 passed, 27 recommended for rejection; steamship Tremont for Seattle, 9 passed, 17 recommended for rejection.

In Kobe, during the week, there were 114 cases of cholera with 34 deaths.

Reports from Osaka show 5 cases of plague with 5 deaths, and 43 cases of cholera with 31 deaths. The total number of cases of cholera reported in Kobe so far this month is 199 with 67 deaths. In Osaka there have been 70 cases of cholera with 52 deaths, and 7 cases of plague with 7 deaths.

Report from Nagasaki—Emigrants recommended for rejection.

Sanitary Inspector Bowie reports:

September 25. Number of emigrants per steamship Nippon Maru recommended for rejection, 8.

#### KOREA.

## Report from Seoul—Quarantine to be enforced against Antung on account of cholera.

The following is received from the Department of State, under date of October 21:

A dispatch has been received from the consul-general at Seoul, dated September 13, 1907, in which he states that the consuls of the treaty powers in Korea having received notice through the residency general of the existence of cholera at the port of Antung, Manchuria, have agreed that quarantine regulations shall be enforced against vessels arriving from that port, and that the same should commence from September 12.

#### MEXICO.

## Reports from Progreso—Sanitary conditions good—Inspection and fumigation of vessels.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Harrison reports, October 7 and 12: October 4 to October 12, 1907. Sanitary conditions continued good. No yellow fever was reported. Four steamships received bills of health. They carried 195 persons in crews and 71 passengers from this port. Of the steamships one was fumigated.

September 20 to October 5. Health conditions continue good. The port and the country generally are free of yellow fever. During the period covered by this report 8 steamships received bills of health. They carried crews of 408 persons, and 110 passengers from this port. Three of these vessels were fumigated for Gulf ports and Baltimore.

Report from Veracruz-Inspection and fumigation of vessels.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Frick reports, October 14:

Week ended October 12. October 6: Fumigated the British steamship *Coniston*, bound for Port Arthur with 25 in the crew; vessel sails in ballast with time of last exposure at 7.50 a. m. Fumigated the Norwegian steamship *City of Mexico*, bound for New Orleans via Tampico with 25 in the crew and 6 passengers; vessel sails in the remainder of an American cargo with time of last exposure at 9 a. m.

October 8: Fumigated the French steamship *Bordeaux*, bound for New Orleans via Tampico with 49 in the crew; vessel sails in the remainder of a European cargo with time of last exposure 8.40 a. m. The steamship *Planet Venus* was not fumigated.
