Report from Los Angeles—Service officers to fumigate vessels and perform other sanitary duties.

Surgeon Brooks reports, October 26:

At a recent visit of Dr. N. K. Foster, secretary of the State board of health of California, to this city, the officers at this station, myself, and the acting assistant surgeons at Santa Barbara, Santa Monica, and San Pedro were appointed by Doctor Foster "agents of the California State board of health for the purpose of fumigating vessels and craft and controlling their movements while at the dock, so

as to prevent the transfer of vermin from vessels to land or land to vessels and for the performance of other sanitary duties." Doctor Foster desired to make these appointments in order to expedite business in case it was necessary to take action against any vessel for violation of present intrastate quarantine regulations.

Report from Seattle, Wash.—No further cases of plague.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Cofer reports:

November 5. No further developments in plague. Will start work Thursday with 4 acting assistants and 45 laborers; latter to be increased.

Report from Santa Rosa Quarantine, Pensacola, Fla.—Malarial fever on steamship Hazlewood from Tampico.

Acting Assistant Surgeon White reports, October 31:

The British steamship *Hazlewood*, 4 days out from Tampico, arrived at this station late on the 29th instant, with 5 of the crew taken ill during the passage with fever, accompanied with high temperatures. Since arrival, 3 more of the crew have sickened, having high temperatures, and to-day 2 more have reported sick, in each case accompanied with high temperatures. Seven of the cases have improved and the men have returned to duty, while the captain and 2 of the crew are still sick.

The vessel has been made clean and has been thoroughly fumigated. The water tanks have been cleaned and fresh water has been ordered from Pensacola.

Microscopical examination will be made from blood smears.

STATISTICAL REPORTS OF MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY, STATES AND CITIES
OF THE UNITED STATES—UNTABULATED.

FLORIDA.—Reports to the State board of health for the week ended October 26, 1907, show as follows: Diphtheria—*Jacksonville*, 1 case; *St. Augustine*, 2 cases. Enteric fever—*Jacksonville*, 2 cases; *Clearwater*, 1 case. Tuberculosis—*Jacksonville*, 3 cases; *Tallahassee*, 1 case.

INDIANA—*Marion*.—Month of October, 1907. Estimated population, 27,000. Total number of deaths, 19, including enteric fever 1 and 1 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever, 8, and tuberculosis 1.

MICHIGAN.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 2,611,792. Total number of deaths returned to the State department for the month was 2,882, including enteric fever 57, diphtheria 34, scarlet fever 5, measles 2, whooping cough 13, and 178 from tuberculosis. The total number of deaths from all causes corresponds to an annual rate of 13.5 per 1,000 estimated population.

MINNESOTA.—Month of August, 1907. Estimated population, 1,979,658. Reports to the State board of health show as follows: Total number of deaths, 1,329, including diphtheria 44, enteric fever 26, scarlet fever 5, whooping cough 5, and 155 from tuberculosis.

Deaths reported from State institutions during the month numbered 35, including enteric fever 1, and 10 from tuberculosis.

MONTANA.—Month of July, 1907. Estimated population, 280,000. Reports to the State board of health show as follows: Total number of deaths, 320, including diphtheria 13, enteric fever 13, measles 2, scarlet fever 4, whooping cough 3, and 28 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 115, enteric fever 34, measles 68, scarlet fever 16, and smallpox, 12.

Month of September,^a 1907. Total number of deaths, 314, including diphtheria 17, enteric fever 26, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 3, and 16 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 131, enteric fever 255, measles 14, scarlet fever 21, and smallpox 5.

NEW JERSEY—Morristown.—Month of October, 1907. Estimated population, 12,500. Total number of deaths, 21. Cases: Diphtheria 1, whooping cough 1, and scarlet fever 4.

OHIO—East Liverpool.—Month of September, 1907. Estimated population, 20,000. Total number of deaths, 29, including 1 from enteric fever. Cases: Enteric fever 7 and diphtheria 1.

PENNSYLVANIA—Beaver Falls.—Month of October, 1907. Estimated population, 12,000. No deaths reported. Cases: Diphtheria 2, enteric fever 1, measles 1, and scarlet fever 2.

Highspire.—Month of October, 1907. Estimated population, 1,500. Total number of deaths, 2. Five cases of enteric fever reported.

VIRGINIA.—Reports to the State board of health for the month of September, 1907, show as follows:

Diphtheria present in 18 counties; enteric fever in 73 counties; measles in 16 counties; scarlet fever in 8 counties; whooping cough in 26 counties; smallpox in 3 counties; and tuberculosis in 69 counties.

FOREIGN AND INSULAR.

CURRENT QUARANTINE MEASURES.

[From the *Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes, Berlin*, October 16, 1907.]

CHOLERA.

BULGARIA.—September 17: Arrivals from the provinces of Astrachan, Saratow, Simbirsk, Ufa, Kasan, Nizhni-Novgorod, and Stavropol, and the districts of the Don and Daghestan are subject to medical inspection and disinfection of baggage, and remain five days under medical supervision.

EGYPT.—October 3: Arrivals from Novorossysk are subject to requirements of cholera regulations. Special precautionary measures to be applied to Russian pilgrims to Mekka.

JAPAN.—August 27: Shanghai district declared cholera infected; arrivals held and disinfected. Vessels destined for Kuchihotsu are remanded to the quarantine station near Nagasaki and similarly treated. Passengers of the first and second class, if not found suspicious after medical inspection, may go on shore; also ships' officers.

RUSSIA.—October 9: The city of Rostow, on the Don, and the districts of Semipalatinsk and Pavlodar, in the province of Semipalatinsk are declared cholera infected, and the government of Jenisseisk, the district of Lepinsk in Semiretschje Province, and the Siberian railroad for its entire length are declared threatened with cholera.

SPAIN.—October 2: Epidemic cholera declared to exist at Shanghai.

PLAGUE.

EGYPT.—October 3: Arrivals from Oran subject to plague regulations at ports.

FRANCE.—October 1: Oran declared plague infected from September 29.

HOLLAND.—October 9: Oran declared plague infected; five days' quarantine.

RUSSIA.—October 1: The stations of Charanor and Sharassun and the junction on the branch line of the Transbaikal railroad and the settlement of Nadarowski, in district Akschinsk, declared plague infected, and the Manchurian branch line of the Transbaikal railroad threatened with plague. October 9: Manchuria station, on the Chinese Eastern Railroad, declared threatened with plague.

SPAIN.—October 1: Plague case declared at Oran. October 3: Pleasure boats, fisher boats, and small coast craft leaving Oran, and all vessels more or less regularly engaged in traffic between Oran and the Peninsula, the Balearic and Canary Islands, and Spanish possessions in Africa must have sanitary police certificates signed by the respective Spanish consuls. October 7: Importation of rags, soiled clothing, mattresses, pillows and covers, soiled laundry, and old bedsteads prohibited unless forming part of passengers' baggage or being goods in transit.

AFRICA.

Report from Cape Colony—Plague at King Williams Town—Examination of rodents for plague infection.

The following is received from the medical officer of health for the colony under date of September 23:

Week ended September 21:

Cathcart.—No case of plague was discovered during the week.

At the plague hospital 1 native male was discharged, leaving 2 cases under treatment.

King Williams Town.—No case of plague was discovered during the week.

Ninety-eight rats (including 49 found dead) and 55 mice (including 13 found dead) were examined, of which 35 rats and 8 mice proved to be probably plague infected. Five rats and 5 mice remain under bacteriological examination.

BRAZIL.

Report from Rio de Janeiro—Inspection of vessels—Mortality—Plague, smallpox, and yellow fever.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Stewart reports, October 2: Week ended September 29. The following-named vessels were issued bills of health and were inspected, with the exception of the last-named vessel: September 23, the Italian ship *Warrior*, for Pensacola, Fla., in stone ballast, with no passengers, and with 3 new members of the crew taken on in this port. September 28, the British steamship *Welsh Prince*, for New Orleans, with a cargo of coffee, no passengers, and no change in the personnel of the crew. On the same date the British steamship *Chaucer*, for New Orleans, with a cargo of coffee, no passengers, and no change in the personnel, and the Spanish bark *San José*, for Apalachicola, Fla., in stone ballast, no passengers, and no change in the crew personnel. No other vessels left this port for United States ports during the week.

Mortality report of City of Rio de Janeiro.—Week ended September 29. Total deaths during week, 233. Yellow fever caused no deaths nor were any cases reported during the week. Bubonic plague caused no deaths, but 1 new case was reported. Smallpox caused 3 deaths, with 7 new reported cases. At the close of the week there were, in the Hospital São Sebastião, no cases of yellow fever, 10 cases of smallpox, and 3 cases of plague under treatment.

During the week 2 deaths from yellow fever were reported from the province of Habana. These cases appeared in a Cuban family at Jaruco near Campo Florido, and were of unusual severity, native children not commonly succumbing to this disease.

On the whole, however, the situation shows improvement. At the close of the week there were but 3 cases under treatment in the island of Cuba, 2 of these being isolated at hospitals in Habana.

October 31: One case yellow fever, Guines, Habana Province.

November 1: One case of yellow fever at Habana, Spaniard living corner Concordia and Marquez Gonzalez street, taken sick October 27; isolated at La Benefica Hospital.

November 4: Case at Guines resulted in death to-day.

November 5: Fatal case yellow fever Ciego de Avilla, Province of Camaguey. American troops at that point removed to Ceballos. Doctor Tomasson and sanitary brigade ordered to proceed from Cienfuegos.

Reports from Matanzas—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Yellow fever.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Nuñez reports, October 22 and 28 and November 2: Week ended October 19. No transactions. Week ended October 26. Bills of health issued to 6 vessels leaving for ports in the United States, of which 2 were fumigated when about to leave this port. These were the Norwegian steamships *Ole Bull* and *Gotthard*, the former with 20 in the crew, no passengers, bound for Mobile, and the latter having a crew of 20 and 5 passengers in transit, taken on in Habana, destined for Galveston. There was no sickness on board either vessel up to the time of its inspection.

Since October 18, when one case of yellow fever was reported at Alacranes, no cases have been reported within this province.

November 2: Yellow fever case, originating in this city, died this morning at the Civil Hospital.

Yellow fever reported October 28 at Alacranes died yesterday.

MEXICO.

Report from City of Mexico—Instructions to Mexican consuls relative to Asiatic immigrants.

The following is received from Consul-General Gottschalk, under date of October 17:

The foreign office of Mexico sent out under date of October 8 a circular instruction to all Mexican consuls abroad stating that by reason of the frequency with which Asiatic immigrants bring trachoma into the country there has been passed an order prohibiting immigrants afflicted with this disease to land within the Republic.

During the period October 1-15, inclusive, 2 vessels cleared from this port for the United States—the steamship *Mexican*, of the American-Hawaiian Steamship Company, which left this port October 6 for San Diego, Cal., and the steamship *Nebraskan*, of the same company, which had had to put back to this port for repairs, and left October 8 for San Francisco, Cal.

Both vessels were fumigated throughout while in the roadstead outside the harbor.

Assistant Surgeon Wightman reports, October 7: Week ended October 5. Vessels dispatched as follows:

The British steamship *Quillota*, October 5, for Ancon, Canal Zone, with general cargo and a total personnel of 261, of whom 19 members of crew, 90 cabin, and 57 steerage passengers were from this port. The British steamship *Dalblair*, October 5, for New York, with ores and a crew of 56, none from this port. The *Quillota* was fumigated before departure. The *Dalblair* was fumigated on arrival by the Peruvian authorities and dispatched without further fumigation.

Smallpox continues in Lima. October 3 there were 43 cases there in the smallpox hospital. During the month of September 53 houses were disinfected in Lima for that disease and 15 on account of plague or the finding of dead rodents. During the same month 5 houses were disinfected in Callao for plague. No case of smallpox has been reported recently in Callao.
