## PUBLIC HEALTH REPORTS.

## UNITED STATES.

[Reports to the Surgeon-General, Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service.]

Report from Eastport, Me.—Smallpox in lumber camps in New Brunswick.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Small reports, February 21, as follows: Smallpox of a mild type has been discovered in two lumber camps at Musquash, New Brunswick.

Reports from Vanceboro, Me.—Smallpox on Canadian border—Train inspection.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Young reports, February 11 and 16, as follows:

Week ended February 9, 1907. Inspected 18 passenger trains, carrying about 850 passengers; 58 passengers vaccinated; accepted official certificates of vaccination and nonexposure to smallpox infection in the case of 46. The epidemic is reported to be widespread in Victoria County, Nova Scotia. Two cases developed February 10 in Truro, Nova Scotia, 1 of which came from Maitland.

Week ended February 16, 1907. Inspected 18 passenger trains, carrying about 900 passengers; vaccinated 60; accepted official cer-

tificates of vaccination and nonexposure to infection for 30.

An outbreak of smallpox is reported at Kennetcook, Nova Scotia, on the Dominion Atlantic Railway. Glasgow, which was considered free from the disease, has developed 17 cases. Several new cases have occurred in Truro. The situation in the other infected districts remains about the same.

Report from Philadelphia, Pa.—Enteric fever; statistics of mortality, 1862-1906—Water supply.

Surgeon Gassaway reports, February 23, as follows:

Health statistics of the city of Philadelphia, beginning with 1862, show that from that time enteric fever has been present. The percentage of cases and resultant deaths has not increased in proportion to the population, as will be seen from the following figures:

These figures for brevity's sake are mostly taken in decades beginning with the year of the earliest available statistics, 1862; but within these named are years of apparently unusual mortality of this disease, e. g., 1863, when the great drain of troops to the civil war had begun. 485 deaths; 1865, on the return of thousands of citizen soldiers, 773; the Centennial Exposition year (1876) furnished 761 deaths; in 1899. 948 deaths were followed next year by 449.

A series of tabulated records made by the bureau of health, organized by act of the general assembly of Pennsylvania of April 8, 1903, and which commenced its present labors as a distinct organization on April 20 of that year, indicates that the disease is water-borne. The virulence of the enteric poison is shown to be in direct ratio with

its concentration.

The city of Philadelphia is supplied with water for domestic use through 6 municipal reservoirs. Of these, 5 reservoirs are supplied from the Schuylkill River and 1 from the Delaware River. venience of investigation the health board has divided the city into 6 sanitary districts, named from the reservoirs supplying them, thus:

A. Wentz Farm, wards 23, 25, 33, 35, 41, 42, and part of 43.

B. Roxboro, wards 21, 22, and part of 43.

C. Queen Lane, wards 15, 20, 28, 29, 32, 37, 38, and part of 43.
D. East Park, wards 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 16, 17, 18, 19, 31.

E. Fairmount and Corinthian, wards 1, 2, 3, 4, 26, 30, 36, 39.

F. Belmont, wards 24, 27, 34, 40.

The Wentz Farm district is supplied with unfiltered Delaware River The East Park district sometimes with Schuylkill, sometimes Delaware, both unfiltered, and occasionally both at once, the mains from each of these 2 reservoirs leading into those of the other. The Roxboro district is supplied entirely with filtered Schuylkill water, which is also supplied to the greater portion of the Belmont district while the Queen Lane, Fairmount, and Corinthian mains furnish unfiltered Schuylkill water. The population and the apportionment of deaths are necessarily estimated, as the exact statistics (calendar year 1906) are in the hands of the printer and are not available. These estimates are made, however. upon a very careful dissection of the health bureau report for 1905. and after comparison with the weekly reports for 1906.

The population along the Schuylkill River above this city, beginning no farther away than the city of Reading (about 40 miles), and including Norristown, Manayunk, Roxboro, and many villages and detached homes, use this river as a common sewer for the disposal of

offal and waste of every description. A dam across the river at this city affords water power for the pumps which drain from the dam the water to be stored in some of the reservoirs. From a series of close and somewhat extended observations in detail made by the chief of the bureau of health it appears that the amount of overflow at the dam is frequently, if not invariably, in inverse proportion to the deaths from enteric fever; that is to say, that the concentration of the sewage in the basin or dam, resulting from a diminution of the volume of water brought down by the river, is followed within twenty to thirty days by an increase of the number of cases reported. The Delaware River on the east side of the city opposite the Schuylkill receives the sewage from several large towns in this and the neighboring State, e.g., Bristol, Burlington, Camden, and some others, besides a large amount of sewage from the city itself. An act of the Pennsylvania assembly of April 20, 1905, requires, under penalty, that (among other diseases) enteric fever be reported promptly to the bureau of health, and immediate supervision be then given to prevent, so far as possible, communication to others. No legislation to prevent contamination of the water supply by other communities seems feasible. An extensive system of water filtration is now in process of construction at this city.

Iowa—Burlington.—Month of January, 1907. Estimated population, 25,000. Total number of deaths, 22, including 2 from tuberculosis. Three cases of scarlet fever reported.

Davenport.—Two weeks ended February 14, 1907. Estimated population, 42,000. Total number of deaths not reported. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 5 and scarlet fever 3.

MICHIGAN—Ann Arbor.—Month of January, 1907. Estimated population, 20,000. Total number of deaths, 20, including 4 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 1, measles 2, smallpox 1, whooping cough 12, and phthisis pulmonalis 3.

Montana.—Month of January, 1907. Estimated population, 280,000. Reports to the State board of health from 27 counties show as follows: Total number of deaths, 325, including diphtheria 9, enteric fever 5, measles 2, and 26 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases were reported as follows: Diphtheria 48, enteric fever 19, measles 126, scarlet fever 16, and smallpox 3.

Total number of deaths reported, 124, including diphtheria 4, enteric fever 1, whooping cough 3, and 12 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 27, enteric fever 3, measles 1, and scarlet fever 5.

NEW YORK—Auburn.—Month of January, 1907. Estimated population, 38,500. Total number of deaths, 46, including diphtheria 1, and 3 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 10, enteric fever 1, measles 1, scarlet fever 3, phthisis pulmonalis 7.

Rochester.—Month of June, 1906. Estimated population, 182,000. Total number of deaths, 212, including diphtheria 6, enteric fever 4, scarlet fever 2, whooping cough 1, and 22 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 40, enteric fever 2, and scarlet fever 37. Month of July, 1906. Total number of deaths, 231, including diphtheria 3, enteric fever 3, and 25 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 24, enteric fever 4, and scarlet fever 25. Month of August, 1906. Total number of deaths, 242, including diphtheria 3, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 1, and 20 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 48, enteric fever 16, and scarlet fever 30.

Total number of deaths, 155—white, 73; colored, 82—including diphtheria 3, whooping cough 2, and 24 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 26, enteric fever 25, scarlet fever 2, and small-pox 12.

Month of December, 1906. Total number of deaths, 199—white, 111; colored, 88—including diphtheria 3, enteric fever 2, whooping cough 1, and 19 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 25, enteric fever 23, scarlet fever 6, smallpox 18.

Washington—Tacoma.—Month of January, 1907. Estimated population, 85,000. Total number of deaths, 63, including enteric fever 3. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 4, enteric fever 8, measles 5, scarlet fever 6, and phthisis pulmonalis 5.

Report from Santa Cruz de Teneriffe—No further cases of typhus fever.

Consul Berliner reports for the week ended February 2. as follows: No typhus fever cases have been taken to the lazaretto for the past 2 All houses from which cases were removed have been burned or otherwise destroyed. The lazaretto will be closed on February 6, as the patients have recovered.

## HAWAII.

Report from Honolulu—Plague death on steamship America Maru from oriental ports.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Ramus, in temporary charge, reports,

February 11, as follows:

The steamship America Maru from the Orient, arrived January 29, having had 1 death at sea among the crew. As the case had some suspicious features, the body was taken to the quarantine station, and post-mortem and microscopical examinations were made. A provisional diagnosis of plague was made, and the vessel and personnel were subjected to the usual quarantine measures. Culture tubes inoculated from liver, spleen, and lung developed growths of typical bipolar bacilli. A guinea pig was inoculated from one of the cultures, and died 3 days later from plague. Smears and cultures from the pig's tissues showed pure cultures of the same bipolar bacilli.

#### INDIA.

Reports from Calcutta—Transactions of Service—Cholera, plague, and smallpox.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Eakins reports, January 24 and Feb-

ruary 1, as follows:

Week ended January 19, 1907. Bill of health issued to the steamship Neidenfels bound for Boston and New York with a total crew of 63. The usual precautions were taken, holds fumigated, rat guards on wharf lines, and Lascars's effects disinfected.

Week ended January 12, 1907. One hundred and four deaths from cholera, 12 deaths from plague, and 16 deaths from smallpox in Calcutta.

In Bengal week ended January 12, 1907. Nine hundred and fortyfive cases and 690 deaths from plague.

India, general, week ended January 12, 1907. Twelve thousand nine hundred and forty-five cases and 10,343 deaths from plague.

Week ended January 26, 1907. Bill of health issued to the steamship Oriel, bound to Boston and New York, with a total crew of 31. The usual precautions were taken, holds fumigated, and rat guards on wharf lines.

Week ended January 19, 1907. Four hundred and twenty-two deaths from cholera, 14 deaths from plague, and 25 deaths from smallpox in Calcutta.

In Bengal, week ended January 19, 1907: 834 cases and 697 deaths

from plague.

#### JAPAN.

Report from Yokohama—Inspection of vessels—Plague in Japan— Proposed refuges for lepers.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Cumming reports, January 14, as follows: Week ended January 12, 1907. One sailing vessel and 8 steam vessels granted bills of health. These vessels had an aggregate personnel of 1,097 passengers and 873 crew.

The health of this port continues good, but several new cases of plague have been reported at Osaka, and at Matsuyama on the island

of Shikoku, near Kobe.

The Imperial Diet, now in session, has been requested, with the approval of the Government, to make an appropriation for the establishment of 8 refuges for the lepers of the islands. There is now apparently no attempt made to isolate these unfortunates and they are constantly met with, even in this city.

A private home for lepers exists in Kumamoto.

#### MEXICO.

Report from Veracruz—Inspection of vessels—Fatal cases of smallpox and yellow fever previously reported—Stegomyia—New yellow fever case.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Frick reports, February 11, as follows: Week ended February 9, 1907. February 6, inspected and passed the German steamship Dania, bound for New Orleans via Tampico, with 56 in the crew, 6 cabin and 6 steerage passengers; vessel sails in the remainder of an European cargo. February 7, inspected and passed the American steamship Vigilancia, bound for New York via Progreso and Habana, with 81 in the crew, 77 cabin and 22 steerage pas-

sengers; vessel sails in general cargo.

February 9, inspected and passed the British steamship Wm. Cliff, bound for New Orleans via Tampico, with 47 in the crew and 11 cabin passengers; vessel sails in the remainder of an European cargo. Inspected and passed the Norwegian steamship Cecilia, bound for New York via Laguna, Campeche, and other Mexican ports, with 23 in the crew; vessel arrived here from New Castle, England, with a cargo of wood pulp, and sails from here in ballast, intending to take a full cargo of "hard woods" for New York. Inspected and passed the French steamship Louisiane, bound for New Orleans via Tampico, with 62 in the crew, 6 cabin and 8 steerage passengers; vessel sails in the remainder of an European cargo. Inspected and passed the Norwegian steamship Molina, bound for Texas city, with 20 in the crew and 4 passengers; vessel sails in ballast. Inspected and passed the British steamship Sandhurst, bound for an American port via Habana, with 39 in the crew; vessel sails in the remainder of a cargo of American railway rails.

Inspected and passed the Norwegian steamship City of Tampico, bound for New Orleans, with 21 in the crew and 32 cabin passengers; vessel sails in ballast. Inspected and passed the German steamship Martha Russ, bound for Galveston, with 21 in the crew; vessel sails

in ballast.

March 1, 1907 234

During the week one fatal case each of yellow fever and smallpox were reported. The yellow-fever case was imported from Paraje Nueva, a small station located on the Mexican railway, 5 miles this side of Cordoba. There are many American and other foreign residents in that section. The place is a large market center for an extensive district, which renders it difficult to determine the original focus of the disease.

February 26.—Yesterday San Sebastian Hospital reported one case yellow fever. Focus Vera Cruz.

#### PERU.

Report from Callav—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Plague—Yellow fever on steamship Limari—Plague and smallpox in Chilean ports.

Assistant Surgeon Wightman reports, January 20 and 28, as follows:

Week ended January 19, 1907. Vessels dispatched by this office as follows:

The American whaling tug St. Lawrence, on the 14th, for San Diego, Cal., with a crew of 15. The vessel called here for coal only, did not dock and made no change in her personnel at this port.

The British steamship *Dalblair* on the 17th, for New York, with general cargo and a total personnel of 54, of whom 1 cabin passenger was from this port. The vessel was fumigated and her personnel inspected.

A new case of plague was discovered in Callao on the 19th. the

only case during the week.

On the 17th the Chilean steamship Limari arrived from Panama, via Guayaquil, with a case of yellow fever on board. The vessel left Ancon, Canal Zone, on the 7th instant and arrived at Guayaquil early on the 10th, leaving that port on the 13th at 1 a. m. The case developed on the 15th, according to the ship's surgeon, on the 16th, according to the Peruvian sanitary officer on board. The patient was a member of the crew and did not go ashore in Guayaquil. He was removed to the lazaretto near Lima, after being isolated on board to cover the infective period. The Limari and her personnel are detained in quarantine for observation after fumigation.

bers of crew, 75 cabin and 20 steerage passengers were from this

port.

The British steamship Capac, on the 23d, for San Francisco, Cal., with general cargo and a total personnel of 38, of whom 2 cabin passengers and 3 new members of crew were from this port.

The Chilean steamship Palena, on the 26th, for Ancon, Canal Zone, with general cargo and a total personnel of 169, of whom 43

cabin and 28 steerage passengers were from this port.

The Capac was well fumigated by the Peruvian quarantine officers on arrival, did not lie at wharf, and took only coal and ores here. The other steamships were fumigated before departure, steerage baggage was inspected and passed or disinfected, and steerage passengers for Panama were vaccinated when necessary.

The Chilean steamship Limari was released from quarantine on the

25th, no further cases of yellow fever having occurred.

No official report on plague in Peru has been received since my last

report.

Bills of health from Chile state as follows: Coquimbo, 26 cases of smallpox with 1 death, in 2 weeks ended January 12; Antofagasta, 6 cases of plague, with 4 deaths, in 2 weeks ended January 15; Iquique, smallpox still present.

#### PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

Report from Manila—Cholera in the provinces—Inspection of vessels.

Chief Quarantine Officer Heiser reports, January 18, as follows: Week ended January 12, 1907. No quarantinable diseases reported for the city of Manila.

During the same period cholera was reported from the provinces as

follows: Negros Occidental, 2 cases; 2 deaths.

During the week United States consular bills of health were issued as follows:

On January 7 the British steamship Lyra, with 58 crew, was granted a consular bill of health to Tacoma, after the usual inspection of cargo

On January 10 the British steamship Muncaster Castle, with 43 crew, en route from New York to Cebu, was granted a supplemental bill of

health.

On January 10 the British steamship Changsha, with 72 crew and 8 passengers, en route from Japan to Zamboanga, was granted a supplemental bill of health.

# Yellow fever at La Guayra.

Chief Quarantine Officer Foster, at San Juan, P. R., reports, Feb-

ruary 18, as follows:

The steamship *Philadelphia*, which arrived here on January 9, brought a bill of health from La Guayra which stated that there were 2 cases of yellow fever in that city. This bill of health was signed by the consul.

#### WEST INDIES.

Report from Port of Spain, Trinidad -- Yellow-fever case.

Consul Handley reports, February 6, as follows:

One case of yellow fever appeared in this town on the 4th instant, and the patient died the following morning. He arrived here a month ago. He was taken ill 5 days before his death. The origin of the infection has not been determined. All sanitary precautions have been taken by the authorities, and the contacts have been segregated and are under medical observation.

British Guiana—Demerara, Georgetown.—Five weeks ended December 29, 1906. Estimated population, 36,567. Total number of deaths, 262, including diphtheria 1 and 34 from tuberculosis.

Canada—British Columbia, Victoria.—Year ended December 31, 1906. Estimated population, 24,000. Total number of deaths from all causes 246, corresponding to an annual death rate of 10.29 per 1,000 population, including enteric fever 6, scarlet fever 1, and 23 from tuberculosis. Month of January, 1907. Total number of deaths, 29, including 3 from tuberculosis.

France—Roubaix.—Month of January, 1907. Estimated population, 124,660. Total number of deaths not reported. One death from diphtheria, 1 from enteric fever, 3 from measles, and 2 from whooping cough reported during the month.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended February 2, 1907, correspond to an annual rate of 19.8 per 1,000 of population, which is estimated at 16,024,458.

London.—One thousand eight hundred and ninety-five deaths were registered during the week, including measles 20, scarlet fever 8, diphtheria 21, enteric fever 8, whooping cough 51, and 17 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 20.8 per 1,000. In Greater London 2,677 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 6 from diphtheria, 2 from measles, 7 from whooping cough, and 2 from scarlet fever.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended February 2, 1907, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 22.5 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,117,547. The lowest rate was recorded in Tralee, viz, 5.3, and the highest in Lurgan, viz, 48.7 per 1,000. In Dublin and suburbs 193 deaths were registered, including whooping cough 2, and 36 from tuberculosis.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended February 2, 1907, correspond to an annual rate of 20.5 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,812,171. The lowest rate of mortality was recorded in Greenock, viz, 13.9, and the highest in Paisley, viz, 24.7 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 712, including diphtheria 10, enteric fever 5, scarlet fever 1, measles 9, and 21 from whooping cough.

HAWAII—Honolulu.—Month of January, 1907. Estimated population, 39,306. Total number of deaths reported, 106, including measles 1, and 14 from tuberculosis.
