

PUBLIC HEALTH REPORTS.

Correction in Hygienic Laboratory Bulletin No. 41.

Assistant Surgeon-General J. W. Kerr, in a report dated March 23, 1908, refers to the articles on "Infants' milk depots," contained in Hygienic Laboratory Bulletin No. 41, as follows:

Hygienic Laboratory Bulletin No. 41, page 581, contains the statement that the first infants' milk depot appears to have been founded in St. Gertrude's district in Hamburg, in 1889; that the second of which there is record was established by Doctor Variot in connection with the Belleville Dispensary, Paris, in 1892, and that the first depot in the United States was established in New York in 1893 by Mr. Nathan Straus.

It appears from articles by Dr. Henry Koplik, published in the New York Medical Journal January 31, 1891, and February 4, 1893, that prior to that time he had advocated the establishment of milk laboratories for the preparation and dispensing of milk for infant feeding. It is also shown that he had opened such a laboratory at the Eastern Dispensary, New York, the apparatus used having been exhibited to the County Medical Society in May, 1890. In 1891 and subsequently this work was continued under his supervision at the Good Samaritan Dispensary, a more thoroughly equipped laboratory having been provided for the purpose. The preparation and dispensing of milk at this institution thus antedated the work in Paris and New York, to which reference is made in Hygienic Laboratory Bulletin No. 41, as quoted above.

In a published circular dated April, 1891, issued by the patronesses of the milk laboratory referred to, there are set forth the objects of this institution, and it is stated that the plan was initiated by Doctor Koplik.

It is necessary, therefore, to recognize Doctor Koplik's influence in the development of this important movement, and that the plan was adopted by him for the successful treatment of infants in dispensary practice.

STATISTICAL REPORTS OF MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY, STATES AND CITIES
OF THE UNITED STATES—UNTABULATED.

CALIFORNIA—*San Diego*.—Month of February, 1908. Estimated population, 40,000. Total number of deaths, 62, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 1, and 9 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 1, scarlet fever 1, and measles 7.

San Jose.—Month of February, 1908. Estimated population, 34,000. Total number of deaths, 41, including diphtheria 2 and 2 from enteric fever. Cases: Diphtheria 6, enteric fever 3, scarlet fever 4, and smallpox 38.

CONNECTICUT.—Month of February, 1908. Reports to the State board of health from 167 towns having an aggregate population of 1,020,044 show as follows: Total number of deaths from all causes, 1,511, including diphtheria 18, enteric fever 14, measles 13, scarlet fever 8, whooping cough 6, and 118 from phthisis pulmonalis. Cases: Diphtheria, 119 in 31 towns; enteric fever, 36 in 16 towns; measles, 434 in 52 towns; scarlet fever, 197 in 55 towns; whooping cough, 35 in 11 towns; smallpox, 3 (*New Britain* 2, *Middletown* 1); phthisis pulmonalis, 54 in 19 towns.

Bridgeport.—Month of February, 1908. Estimated population, 100,000. Total number of deaths, 144, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 1, measles 1, and 17 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 15, enteric fever 1, measles 3, scarlet fever 9, and phthisis pulmonalis 12.

FLORIDA.—Reports from the State board of health for the week ended March 14, 1908, show as follows: Diphtheria—*Jacksonville* and *Tampa*, each 1 case. Enteric fever—*Jacksonville*, 4 cases; *Quincy* and *Tampa*, each 1 case. Smallpox—*De Funiak Springs*, 4 cases; *Jacksonville*, 1 case. Tuberculosis—*Jacksonville*, *Espinola*, *Manatee*, *Jennings*, and *Plant City*, each 1 case; *Tampa*, 2 cases.

MASSACHUSETTS.—Reports from the State board of health for the month of January, 1908, shows as follows: Week ended January 4, 1908. Forty-six cities and towns, having an aggregate estimated population of 2,291,297, report 863 deaths, including diphtheria 12, enteric fever 5, measles 7, and 64 from phthisis pulmonalis. Cases: Diphtheria 182, enteric fever 23, measles 421, scarlet fever 143, whooping cough 12, and tuberculosis 105.

Week ended January 11, 1908. Number of localities reporting, 46. Estimated population, 2,305,090. Total number of deaths, 859; diphtheria 9, enteric fever 2, measles 9, phthisis pulmonalis 74. Cases:

Diphtheria 168, enteric fever 19, measles 359, scarlet fever 127, whooping cough 22, smallpox 1, and tuberculosis 86.

Week ended January 18, 1908. Number of localities reporting, 46. Estimated population, 2,305,360. Total number of deaths, 817; diphtheria 10, enteric fever 1, measles 8, phthisis pulmonalis 65. Cases: Diphtheria 143, enteric fever 17, measles 513, scarlet fever 199, whooping cough 18, and tuberculosis 97.

Week ended January 25, 1908. Number of localities reporting, 45. Estimated population, 2,292,566. Total number of deaths, 796; diphtheria 13, enteric fever 3, measles 11, phthisis pulmonalis 61. MINNESOTA.—Month of December, 1907. Estimated population, 1,979,658. Reports to the State board of health show as follows: Total number of deaths, 1,505, including diphtheria 42, enteric fever 36, measles 6, scarlet fever 12, whooping cough 7, smallpox 3, and 151 from tuberculosis. Deaths reported from State institutions during the month numbered 31, including diphtheria 2 and 6 from tuberculosis.

NEW YORK—*Rochester*.—Month of January, 1908. Estimated population, 200,000. Total number of deaths, 277, including diphtheria 14, enteric fever 4, scarlet fever 3, and 26 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 91, enteric fever 25, and scarlet fever 57.

Troy.—Month of February, 1908. Estimated population, 76,861. Total number of deaths, 139, including measles 2, enteric fever 1, and 20 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 8, enteric fever 7, measles 72, scarlet fever 7, whooping cough 1, and tuberculosis 35.

PENNSYLVANIA—*York*.—Month of February, 1908. Estimated population, 49,000. Total number of deaths, 75, including 1 from enteric fever. Cases: Diphtheria 7, enteric fever 2, whooping cough 4, scarlet fever 2, and measles 99.

TEXAS—*Fort Worth*.—Month of January, 1908. Estimated population, 70,000. Total number of deaths reported, 83, including 1 from measles. Cases: Diphtheria 1, tuberculosis 2, measles 9, scarlet fever 2, and smallpox 56.

UTAH—*Salt Lake City*.—Month of February, 1908. Estimated population, 85,000. Total number of deaths from all causes, 115, including diphtheria 3, scarlet fever 2, and 6 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 23, enteric fever 2, measles 47, scarlet fever 49, smallpox 2, and phthisis pulmonalis 3.

VIRGINIA.—Reports to the State board of health for the month of January, 1908, show as follows:

Diphtheria present in 21 counties; enteric fever in 50 counties; measles in 43 counties; scarlet fever in 13 counties; whooping cough in 38 counties; smallpox in 18 counties, and tuberculosis in 73 counties.

CURRENT QUARANTINE MEASURES.

[From the Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes, Berlin, March 4, 1908.]

CHOLERA.

BULGARIA.—February 19. The city of Sinope declared free of cholera.

EGYPT.—February 9. Cholera regulations against arrivals from Constantinople no longer applied. Until further notice said arrivals are subject to medical inspection and disinfection.

GERMAN EMPIRE.—February 25. The governments of the maritime states are directed to discontinue medical inspection of arrivals from Constantinople.

ITALY.—February 19. Quarantine measures against arrivals from Constantinople suspended.

TURKEY.—January 30. On account of the increase of cholera in the Hedjaz the traffic by means of small craft on the Jordan and the Dead Sea is restricted as follows: Inspection stations are established on the banks of the Jordan and on the south border of the Hebron district and Ghaza, in order to prevent traffic between the east Jordan country and Akaba. Quarantine stations are established at the crossing of the Jordan and at Ituani in the Hebron district.

PLAGUE.

BRITISH EAST INDIES.—Quarantine measures against arrivals from Djeddah enforced at ports of Orissa.

Togo.—February 15. Quarantine measures prescribed by the imperial governor of Lome on account of suspect plague cases in Anamaboe and Brewe are extended to include all the ports from Cape Coast Castle to Prampran.

ARABIA.

Sanitary conditions of the pilgrimage to the Hedjaz.

The following information is taken from reports of the delegate of the Quarantine Council of Egypt to the Hedjaz, published in the Bulletin Quarantenaire, Cairo, February 13:

The total number of pilgrims who have left Djeddah by maritime routes was, to February 5, 29,000. All pilgrims who left for Yambo after January 22 remained there until February 2 on account of insufficient transportation to convey them to Medina. The sanitary

conditions at Yambo are not satisfactory, many cholera cases and deaths occurring daily. The pilgrim vessels carry double the number allowed by measurement. Such overcrowding is necessarily deleterious to the sanitary conditions at the port of disembarkation. During the first week in February many hundreds of Hindu pilgrims arrived to remain in the Hedjaz until the next pilgrimage. Thus the arrival of new pilgrims has begun before the repatriation of the pilgrimage of this year is complete. The general sanitary condition of Djeddah has commenced to improve. Cholera diminishes as the pilgrims leave, though a daily average of 15 cases and deaths was reported January 31. Plague and smallpox were also reported present. Cholera was reported still present at Mecca February 6, with a total of about 30 fatal cases. According to decision of the Ottoman Sanitary Council, the baggage of all pilgrims destined for Ottoman ports is disinfected on board ship.

AUSTRALIA.

Plague at Brisbane, Cairns, and Sydney—Examination of rodents for plague infection.

The following information is taken from plague bulletins issued by the departments of health of Queensland and New South Wales, and forwarded by Consul-General Bray at Melbourne:

QUEENSLAND.

Brisbane.—Week ended January 11. Rodents destroyed, 431; examined, 343; found infected, 0. Week ended January 18. Rodents destroyed, 647; examined, 529; found infected, 0. Week ended January 25. Three cases, 2 deaths. Rodents destroyed, 390; examined, 314; found infected, 0. Week ended February 1. Rodents destroyed, 448; examined, 383; found infected, 0. Last infected rat found January 22.

Cairns.—One case found January 23. The patient was employed on a sugar plantation at Mulgrave, 21 miles from Cairns. Plague-infected rats were found on the plantation. Of 115 rats examined, 27 were found plague infected.

NEW SOUTH WALES.

Sydney.—Week ended January 11.—Rodents destroyed, 2,236; examined, 834; found infected, 12. Week ended January 18. One case. No cause of infection found. Rodents destroyed, 2,206; examined, 848; found infected, 7. Week ended January 25. Rodents destroyed, 2,259; examined, 859; found infected, 9. Date of last infected rodent found, January 25. From fresh premises January 17.

BRAZIL.

Reports from Rio de Janeiro—Inspection of vessels—Mortality—Plague and smallpox.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Stewart reports, February 12 and 27: Week ended February 9. Vessels inspected and bills of health issued: February 5, British steamship *Byron*, for New York, with a

cargo of coffee, 25 cabin and 13 steerage passengers, with no change in the crew personnel; February 6, British steamship *Titian*, for New Orleans, with a cargo of coffee, no passengers, and no change in the crew personnel.

No other vessels left this port during the week bound for United States ports.

Mortality—Plague and smallpox.—Week ended February 9. Total deaths, 239. There were no deaths from yellow fever during the week, nor were any new cases reported during the period. There were no deaths from bubonic plague during the week, and there was but one new reported case. There were 20 deaths caused by variola, with 30 new reported cases. At the close of the week there were in the Hospital São Sebastião no cases of yellow fever, 40 cases of variola, and 10 cases of bubonic plague under treatment, and 30 cases of suspicious illness under observation.

Week ended February 23. Vessels issued bills of health February 17: Portuguese bark *Mariana Madre*, for Pensacola, Fla., in stone ballast, no cargo, and with no change in the personnel; German steamship *Corrientes*, for New York, with a cargo of coffee, 2 cabin and 2 steerage passengers, and with no change in the crew personnel. February 18, the British steamship *Swedish Prince*, for New York, with a cargo of coffee and with no passengers and with no change in the crew personnel, and British steamship *Voltaire*, for New York, with a cargo of coffee, 7 cabin and 11 steerage passengers, and with no change in the personnel of the crew.

No other vessels requiring inspection left this port during the week.

Mortality—Plague and smallpox.—Week ended February 23, 1908. Total deaths, 261. No cases nor deaths due to yellow fever. Variola caused 47 new reported cases and 4 deaths, and bubonic plague caused no deaths, although 1 new case was reported. At the close of the week there were in the Hospital São Sebastião 50 cases of variola, 2 cases of plague, and 28 cases of suspicious illness under observation.

Week ended March 14.

Bills of health were issued to 3 vessels clearing for United States ports. At the request of the agents of the Norwegian steamship *Vitalia*, bound for Galveston, Tex., this vessel was fumigated March 13 under my direction and supervision when about to leave for her port of destination.

Since March 12 Cuba has decreed quarantine with reference to yellow fever against the following countries: Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, Costa Rica, Republic of Panama (the Canal Zone being excepted), the British, Dutch, and French Guianas, Brazil, and the Islands of Trinidad, Curaçao, and Barbados.

No quarantinable diseases have been reported during the week.

Report from Santiago—Inspection of vessels.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Wilson reports, March 10:

Week ended March 7. Bills of health were issued to six vessels bound for the United States. No quarantinable disease was reported.

HAWAII.

Report from Honolulu—Examination of rats for plague infection.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Currie reports that during the week ended February 29, 141 rats were examined bacteriologically at the plague laboratory of the Service at Honolulu. No plague infection found.

INDIA.

Reports from Calcutta—Transactions of Service—Cholera, plague, and smallpox—Plague in India and Bengal.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Eakins reports, February 13, 20, and 27: During the week ended February 8 a bill of health was issued to

the steamship *Scharzfels*, bound for Boston and New York, with a total crew of 64. The usual precautions were taken, the holds were fumigated, rat guards were placed on the wharf line, and the lascars' effects were disinfected.

During the week ended February 15 a bill of health was issued to the steamship *Kasenga*, bound for Boston and New York with a total crew of 67. The usual precautions were taken, the holds were fumigated, rat guards were placed on the wharf lines, and the Asiatic's effects disinfected.

During the week ended January 25 there were 23 deaths from cholera, 16 from plague, and 16 from smallpox in Calcutta. In Bengal there were 363 cases of plague, with 307 deaths. In India during the same period there were 4,209 cases of plague, with 3,190 deaths.

During the week ended February 1 there were 24 deaths from cholera, 15 from plague, and 10 from smallpox in Calcutta. In Bengal there were 406 cases of plague, with 351 deaths. In India during the same period there were 4,464 cases of plague, with 3,621 deaths.

During the week ended February 8 there were 104 deaths from cholera, 9 from plague, and 10 from smallpox in Calcutta. In Bengal there were 517 cases of plague, with 365 deaths. In India during the same period there were 5,043 cases of plague, with 4,018 deaths.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Cumming reports, February 25:

Week ended February 22: Bills of health were issued to five steamships leaving this port for American ports with an aggregate personnel of 624 members of crews, and 44 saloon and 382 steerage passengers.

All members of crews and all steerage passengers taken on here were bathed and vaccinated. Their effects were disinfected and labeled.

The steamship *Saint Patrick*, bound hence for New York, was fumigated and personal effects and bedding were disinfected.

There have been 64 cases of smallpox, with 16 deaths during the week. Tokyo is infected as well as the rural districts.

Emigrants recommended for rejection.

Number of emigrants per steamship *America Maru* recommended February 4 for rejection: For Honolulu, 7; advised to wait, 26.

Per steamship *Malte* February 15: For Honolulu, 1; advised to wait, 11.

Per steamship *Manchuria*: For Honolulu, 1; advised to wait, 16. Examinations and detentions were for trachoma.

Report from Kobe—Inspection of vessels—Examination of emigrants—Smallpox decreasing at Kobe—Plague and smallpox at Osaka.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, February 25:

During the week ended February 22 four supplemental bills of health were granted to four steamships, with a total personnel of 1,131.

There were inspected three vessels, 681 members of crews, 61 cabin, and 336 steerage passengers. Seventy-five members of crews and 209 steerage passengers were bathed, and their effects were disinfected by steam. There were steamed 809 pieces of personal effects. Vaccination certificates issued, 209.

Emigrants were examined as follows:

Steamship *China* for Honolulu, passed 84, recommended for rejection 127; steamship *Manchuria* for Honolulu, passed 128, recommended for rejection 92.

The official report of communicable diseases in Kobe for the week shows 181 cases of smallpox, with 108 deaths. The total deaths from all causes reported number 274.

Smallpox in Kobe continues to decline, but there is yet an average of over 25 new cases per day.

During the week ended February 15, there were reported in Osaka 199 new cases of smallpox with 63 deaths; also 1 case and 1 death from plague.

Reports from Nagasaki—Smallpox at Moji and Shimonoseki.

The following is received from the Department of State, under date of March 16:

The Department is in receipt of a telegram from the American consul at Nagasaki, Japan, dated the 12th instant, reading as follows: "Smallpox Moji Shimonoseki."

Emigrants recommended for rejection.

Sanitary Inspector Bowie reports:

February 20. Number of emigrants per steamship *Manchuria* recommended for rejection, 11.

LIBERIA.

Report from Monrovia—Quarantine against Accra on account of plague.

The following is received from the American legation at Monrovia, through the Department of State:

A proclamation dated February 11, made by the President of Liberia, states that bubonic plague on the Gold Coast is confined exclusively to Accra and that therefore the restrictions previously proclaimed with respect to all ports on the Gold Coast are withdrawn, except with respect to Accra. All vessels from Accra are subjected to quarantine throughout the Republic of Liberia.

MEXICO.

Report from Coatzacoalcos—Inspection of vessels.

Acting Assistant Surgeon McPherson reports, March 16:

Two weeks ended March 11. February 29, the American steamship *American* bound for Delaware Breakwater with a cargo of sugar was inspected. March 8, the American steamship *Californian* bound for Delaware Breakwater was inspected.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

Report from Manila—Continued decrease of cholera—Smallpox in the islands—Inspection of vessels.

Chief Quarantine Officer Heiser reports, February 25:

Week ended February 8, 1908. The number of cholera cases reported in the city of Manila continues to fall, there being only 6 cases for this week as against 13 for the preceding week, and 41 for the week preceding that. There were 5 deaths from cholera during the week ended February 8. For the three last days of the week no cases were reported.

There has also been a reduction in the number of cases occurring in the provinces. The disease, however, continues to occur in sporadic form in widely separated sections of the archipelago.

On account of the carnival, which is to be held here beginning February 27, it is variously estimated that from 10,000 to 50,000 people from various sections of the islands and from near-by foreign countries will visit Manila. On this account the Service finds itself confronted with the responsibility of preventing dissemination of cholera among these people, and more especially to prevent the spread of the disease to those provinces of the Philippines which have heretofore remained uninfected.

Smallpox.—Smallpox infection this season is particularly virulent in the Philippines.

In the town of San Fabian, in the Province of Pangasinan, more than 100 unvaccinated individuals have contracted the disease.

During the week vessels were granted consular bills of health as follows:

February 5 the British steamship *Kumeric*, with 68 crew and 8 passengers, was granted a consular bill of health for Tacoma, via Hongkong and Japan ports. The personnel were inspected at the hour of sailing. The cargo was inspected and passed during loading and the manifests were viséed.

VENEZUELA.

Report from Maracaibo—Smallpox—General vaccination ordered.

Consul Plumacher reports, February 18:

The president of the State of Zulia has ordered that the population of the State shall be vaccinated. The physicians in all the rural districts have been provided with sufficient material and the order

will be strictly executed. Here in all the different parts of the city the physicians appointed have commenced vaccination. In the surrounding States smallpox is prevailing. Some cases of smallpox have occurred among the population of Maracaibo.

CANADA—British Columbia—Vancouver.—Month of February, 1908. Estimated population, 52,000. Total number of deaths, 52, including enteric fever 1, measles 1, diphtheria 1, and 6 from tuberculosis.

FRANCE—Calais.—Month of February, 1908. Estimated population, 66,627. Total number of deaths, 86, including 21 from tuberculosis.

Cherbourg.—Month of February, 1908. Estimated population, 43,948. Total number of deaths, 78, including scarlet fever 1, enteric fever 2, and 13 from tuberculosis.

Marseille.—Month of February, 1908. Estimated population, 517,498. Total number of deaths, 1,123, including diphtheria 7, enteric fever 57, measles 1, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 1, smallpox 11, and 137 from tuberculosis.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales.*—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended February 29, 1908, correspond to an annual rate of 17.3 per 1,000 population, which is estimated at 16,234,952.

London.—One thousand five hundred and forty-five deaths were registered during the week, including measles 14, scarlet fever 10, diphtheria 13, enteric fever 4, whooping cough 25, tuberculosis 205, and 21 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 16.8 per 1,000. In Greater London 2,179 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 2 from measles, 2 from scarlet fever, 6 from diphtheria, and 5 from whooping cough.

Portsmouth.—Five weeks ended February 15, 1908. Estimated population, 208,291. Total number of deaths, 406, including diphtheria 7, measles 3, and whooping cough 1.

Salford.—Two weeks ended February 29, 1908. Estimated population, 236,670. Total number of deaths, 158, including diphtheria 6, measles 3, scarlet fever 2, whooping cough 3, and 15 from phthisis pulmonalis.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended February 29, 1908, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 21.3 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,131,959. The lowest rate was recorded in Newry, viz, 4.2, and the highest in Sligo, viz, 43.2 per 1,000.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended February 29, 1908, correspond to an annual rate of 19.2 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,839,038. The highest rate of mortality was recorded in Dundee, viz, 27.2, and the lowest in Aberdeen, viz, 14.6 per 1,000.
