FOREIGN AND INSULAR.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Cofer authorized to act as president of the Territorial board of health of Hawaii.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Cofer was authorized, April 13, with the approval of the Secretary of the Treasury, to act as president of the Territorial board of health of Hawaii, without compensation, and in addition to his duties as chief quarantine officer. The approval was given on request addressed April 9 to the Bureau by the governor of Hawaii.

BARBADOS.

Report from Bridgetown—Yellow fever in vicinity.

Consul Clare reports, March 13:

A case of yellow fever was officially reported March 9 as occurring on March 7 about one and one-half miles from Bridgetown. A fatal case was reported to-day which occurred March 11, about 9 miles from Bridgetown.

Since January 29, 8 cases have been reported, 5 of which resulted

fatally.

BRAZIL.

Report from Rio de Janeiro—Inspection of vessels—Mortality— Smallpox.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Stewart reports March 12:

Mortality. — Week ended March 8. Total deaths, 303. There were no deaths nor cases caused by yellow fever or plague. For the first time in more than a year there have been no cases nor deaths from plague in two successive weeks. Smallpox caused 23 deaths with 38 new reported cases. At the close of the week there were in the Hospital São Sebastião, 63 cases of smallpox under treatment, and 23 cases of suspicious illness under observation. No cases of plague or yellow fever were in the hospital.

Report from Kobe—Inspection of vessels—Examination of emigrants— Smallpox—Plague and smallpox at Osaka—Vaccinations performed by the Service.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, March 10:

Supplemental bills of health were issued during the week ended March 7 to 2 steamships, and there were inspected 2 vessels, 152 members of crews, 3 cabin and 3 steerage passengers. Seventy-five steerage passengers were bathed and had their effects disinfected by steam. Manifests were viséed for 17,607 pieces of freight, aggregating 1,821 tons. Vaccination certificates were issued to 75 persons. Emigrants were examined as follows: Steamship Shawmut for Seattle, passed 20, recommended for rejection 19; steamship Asia for Honolulu, passed 48, recommended for rejection 80. Bills of health were prepared for the Shawmut, Asia, and Inverclyde, but were not issued, the sailing of these vessels being postponed on account of the severe storm prevailing.

The official report of the health department shows smallpox 79 cases

and 47 deaths.

Reports from Osaka show plague 1 case and 1 death; smallpox 292 cases and 100 deaths for the week ended March 7.

The total number of deaths reported in Kobe during the week from

all causes was 192.

From December 24, 1907, to and including March 7, 1908, there have been performed here by me 1,928 vaccinations. Of these 432 have not been reported upon, but of the remaining 1,496 there have been reported as "takes" 1,212. Only 211 of these vaccinations were examined by me, of which number I consider 170 as good "takes." The remaining 1,285 were reported upon by the United States quarantine officers at Yokohama and Manila and by the various ships' surgeons. Two ships reported upon by Japanese physicians showed in each case 55 per cent of "takes," while those reported upon by European physicians showed from 73 to over 90 per cent of "takes." The total percentage of "takes" appears to have been 81.

The source of the virus used was Tokyo and Shanghai. All of the virus from Tokyo was under one month old when used, while the oldest Shanghai virus used was about six weeks old. The percentages of

"takes" with the viruses was, Tokyo 83.2, Shanghai 89.5.

Of 380 passengers vaccinated in Kobe by others, 98 were considered as "takes," being 26.2 per cent. Of 240 vaccinated by ships' surgeons,

etc., there was 137 "takes" or 57 per cent.

Of the total number observed only 3 "sore arms" have been reported to me, and these came under the observation of Doctor Cumming at Yokohama, who has seen the majority of those I have operated

upon. Two of these were diagnosed as probably erysipelas.

The operation is performed after thoroughly scrubbing the arm with pure alcohol and allowing it to dry for from five to ten minutes. A drop of the vaccine about the size of a pin head is then expelled from the tube upon the unbroken skin which is scarified with a sterile cut-down exploring needle, very light cuts being made in two directions through the drop of vaccine, which is thus introduced with each stroke. Two or three points of inoculation, each about one third of an inch square, are made in each subject, the epidermis alone being removed and no bleeding results. The vaccinations are given twenty minutes to dry under my direct observation, when they are dressed with two or three thicknesses of sterile gauze and adhesive plaster. They are observed on the fifth day, although a good number show up well in from twenty-four to forty-eight hours.

The needles are sterilized in an alcohol flame and allowed to thoroughly cool between each vaccination. By using two or three needles and having assistants to wash and dress the arms, from 80 to 90 vac-

cinations can be performed in an hour.

Vaccinations by the Japanese, using the German method, seem to result in only about 10 per cent of takes.

Reports from Nagasaki—Smallpox—Status of smallpox at Moji, Shi monoseki, and Wakamatsu—Vaccination enforced.

Sanitary Inspector Bowie reports, March 13:

Smallpox at this port has not made progress. At Moji and Shimonoseki, on opposite sides of the Shimonoseki Straits, in this consular district, and at Wakamatsu, about 20 miles this side of Moji, the figures

are as follows: From January 1 to March 7, 1908, Shimonoseki, cases 28, deaths 8; Moji, cases 126, deaths 17; and Wakamatsu, cases 134, deaths not given. In all of these places vaccination is being rigidly enforced. Considerable difficulty has been met with owing to so many cases being concealed.

MEXICO.

Report from Coatzacoalcos—Inspection of vessels—Health conditions good.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Thompson reports, April 2:

Week ended April 1. March 26, the American schooner L. N. Dantzler, bound for Galveston, was inspected and fumigated. March 28, the American steamship Oregonian, bound for Delaware Breakwater, was inspected. March 31, the German steamship Syria, bound for Colon via Progreso, was inspected.

No case of any contagious or infectious disease was reported during

the week.

Report from Salina Cruz-Inspection and fumigation of vessels.

Acting Assistant Surgeon McPherson reports, April 1:

Period March 16 to 31, inclusive. Two steamships cleared from this port for San Diego, Cal. Both vessels were fumigated throughout while in the roadstead outside the harbor.

Reports from Veracruz—Inspection and fumigation of vessels— Smallpox cases imported from the interior.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Jacobs reports, March 29 and April 1:
March 28. Fumigated the British steamship *Manchuria*, bound for Mobile, with 25 in the crew. The vessel sails in ballast.

Three cases of smallpox were reported March 21. These were

imported from the interior and immediately isolated.

The general sanitary condition is good.

PANAMA.

Report from Bocas del Toro—Health conditions of port and vicinity satisfactory.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Osterhout reports, April 1:

I have made careful inquiry of all persons in a position to know the health conditions, and am able to say that this port and the surrounding territory are in a healthy condition. There is no evidence of the existence of any infectious or contagious disease at the present time, nor has any existed since the close of the inspection service, October 31, 1907.

France—Nice.—Month of February, 1908. Estimated population, 150,881. Total number of deaths not reported. One death from diphtheria, 1 from enteric fever, and 3 from measles reported.

St. Etienne.—Two weeks ended March 15, 1908. Estimated population, 150,000. Total number of deaths, 144, including measles 3, and 20 from tuberculosis.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended March 21, 1908, correspond to an annual rate of 16.9 per 1,000 population, which is estimated at 16,234,952.

London.—One thousand four hundred and fifty-five deaths were registered during the week, including measles 24, scarlet fever 11, diphtheria 15, enteric fever 2, whooping cough 32, tuberculosis 193, and 19 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 15.8 per 1,000. In Greater London 2,117 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 7 from measles, 7 from scarlet fever, 4 from diphtheria, and 8 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended March 21, 1908, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 24.7 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,131,959. Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended March 21, 1908, correspond to an annual rate of 18.5 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,839,038. The highest rate of mortality was recorded in Perth, viz, 22.2, and the lowest in Edinburgh, viz, 14.6 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 652, including diphtheria 2, measles 37, scarlet fever 5, enteric fever 1, and 24 from whooping cough.
