STATISTICAL REPORTS OF MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY, STATES AND CITIES  
OF THE UNITED STATES—UNTABULATED.

**CALIFORNIA.**—Month of November, 1907. Estimated population, 2,001,193. Total number of deaths reported to the State board of health, 2,545, corresponding to an annual death rate of 15.5 per 1,000 population, includes diphtheria 49, enteric fever 63, measles 9, scarlet fever 3, smallpox 1, plague 15, whooping cough 7, and 371 from tuberculosis.

*Sacramento.*—Month of November, 1907. Estimated population, 40,000. Total number of deaths, 54, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 3, and 5 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 2 and scarlet fever 4.

**COLORADO.**—Month of November, 1907. Estimated population, 615,570. Reports to the State board of health show as follows: Diphtheria, 98 cases, 17 deaths; enteric fever, 308 cases, 46 deaths; scarlet fever, 302 cases, 19 deaths; smallpox, 81 cases and no deaths. Total number of deaths from all causes, 891.

**CONNECTICUT**—Month of August, 1907. Reports to the State board of health from 165 towns having an aggregate population of 1,016,833 show as follows: Total number of deaths from all causes, 1,756, including diphtheria 8, enteric fever 32, measles 4, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 19, and 123 from phthisis pulmonalis. Cases: Diphtheria, 62 in 26 towns; enteric fever, 221 in 46 towns; measles, 37 in 10 towns; scarlet fever, 48 in 27 towns; whooping cough, 28 in 13 towns; phthisis pulmonalis, 64 in 27 towns.

Month of September, 1907. Reports to the State board of health from 164 towns having an aggregate population of 1,013,440 show as follows: Total number of deaths from all causes, 1,393, including diphtheria 9, enteric fever 43, measles 3, scarlet fever 2, whooping cough 9, and 106 from phthisis pulmonalis. Cases: Diphtheria, 100 in 29 towns; enteric fever, 292 in 64 towns; measles, 17 in 9 towns; scarlet fever, 60 in 22 towns; whooping cough, 35 in 11 towns; phthisis pulmonalis, 50 in 23 towns.

*New London.*—Month of December, 1907. Estimated population, 20,200. Total number of deaths 39, including measles 2 and 4 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 2, enteric fever 3, measles 46, and scarlet fever 34.

**FLORIDA.**—Reports to the State Board of Health for the week ended December 21, 1907, show as follows: Diphtheria—*Jacksonville*, 4 cases; *Miami*, 1 case. Enteric fever—*Jacksonville* and *Inverness*, each 1 case. Smallpox—*Tarpon Springs*, 3 cases. Tuberculosis—*Tampa*, 1 case.

Week ended December 28, 1907. Diphtheria—*Fernandina* and *Jacksonville*, each 1 case. Enteric fever—*Jacksonville*, 1 case; *Tampa*, 3 cases. Tuberculosis—*Jacksonville*, 1 case.

INDIANA—*Anderson*.—Month of December, 1907. Estimated population, 25,398. Total number of deaths, 26, including 3 from tuberculosis. Cases: Measles 1 and tuberculosis 3.

IOWA—*Davenport*.—Month of December, 1907. Estimated population, 45,000. Total number of deaths not reported. One death from enteric fever. Cases: Diphtheria 17, enteric fever 16, scarlet fever 1, and whooping cough 2.

KANSAS.—Month of November, 1907. Reports to the State board of health show as follows: Diphtheria, 200 cases, 27 deaths; enteric fever, 175 cases, 36 deaths; measles, 51 cases, no deaths; scarlet fever, 124 cases, 7 deaths; smallpox, 61 cases, no deaths; tuberculosis, 91 cases, 54 deaths.

Contagious diseases were distributed in the cities as follows:

*Atchison*.—Diphtheria, 20 cases, 3 deaths; smallpox, 5 cases.

*Coffeyville*.—Diphtheria, 1 case; enteric fever, 1 case; scarlet fever, 1 case.

*Kansas City*.—Diphtheria, 19 cases, 1 death; enteric fever, 44 cases, 7 deaths; scarlet fever, 15 cases; smallpox, 2 cases; measles, 1 case; tuberculosis, 6 cases, 6 deaths.

*Leavenworth*.—Diphtheria, 5 cases; enteric fever, 2 cases; smallpox, 3 cases; tuberculosis, 1 case, 1 death.

*Parsons*.—Enteric fever, 5 cases, 1 death; smallpox, 14 cases; scarlet fever, 2 cases; measles, 6 cases; tuberculosis, 7 cases, 5 deaths.

*Topeka*.—Diphtheria, 7 cases, 1 death; enteric fever, 3 cases, 1 death; scarlet fever, 1 case; tuberculosis, 6 cases, 6 deaths.

MASSACHUSETTS.<sup>a</sup>—Reports from the State board of health for the month of August, 1907, show as follows: Week ended August 3, 1907. Forty-three cities and towns, having an aggregate estimated population of 2,233,961, report 776 deaths, including diphtheria 10, enteric fever 8, measles 2, and 58 from phthisis pulmonalis. Cases: Diphtheria 105, enteric fever 35, measles 69, scarlet fever 65, smallpox 13, and tuberculosis 101.

Week ended August 10, 1907. Number of localities reporting, 44. Estimated population, 2,227,757. Total number of deaths, 826; diphtheria 12, measles 6, phthisis pulmonalis 47. Cases: Diphtheria 122, enteric fever 40, measles 63, scarlet fever 55, whooping cough 9, and tuberculosis 106.

Week ended August 17, 1907. Number of localities reporting, 44. Estimated population, 2,227,757. Total number of deaths, 861; diphtheria 9, enteric fever 4, measles 2, phthisis pulmonalis 63. Cases: Diphtheria 118, enteric fever 55, measles 45, scarlet fever 68, smallpox 2, and tuberculosis 84.

Week ended August 24, 1907. Number of localities reporting, 40. Estimated population, 2,191,394. Total number of deaths, 804; diphtheria 12, enteric fever 7, measles 2, phthisis pulmonalis 62. Cases:

Diphtheria 146, enteric fever 66, measles 32, scarlet fever 68, and tuberculosis 99.

Week ended August 31, 1907. Number of localities reporting, 43. Estimated population, 2,211,983. Total number of deaths, 818; diphtheria 7, enteric fever 5, measles 4, phthisis pulmonalis 48. Cases: Diphtheria 111, enteric fever 83, measles 47, scarlet fever 64, whooping cough 9, and tuberculosis 103.

MINNESOTA—*St. Paul*.—Month of October, 1907. Estimated population, 210,000. Total number of deaths reported to the department of health, 150, including diphtheria 4, enteric fever 5, and 27 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 57, scarlet fever 9, and smallpox 67.

Month of November, 1907. Total number of deaths, 152, including diphtheria 7, enteric fever 6, smallpox 1, and 18 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 52, scarlet fever 20, and smallpox 110.

MONTANA.—Month of November, 1907. Estimated population, 280,000. Reports to the State board of health show as follows: Total number of deaths, 329, including diphtheria 8, enteric fever 18, scarlet fever 2, and 30 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 145, enteric fever 118, measles 8, scarlet fever 66, and smallpox 7.

NEW HAMPSHIRE—*Franklin*.—Month of December, 1907. Estimated population, 6,000. Total number of deaths, 7, including 1 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 1 and tuberculosis 1.

NEW JERSEY.—Reports to the State board of health for the month ended December 15, 1907, show a total of 2,745 deaths, including diphtheria 52, enteric fever 39, measles 8, scarlet fever 26, whooping cough 19, and 302 from tuberculosis.

*Morristown*.—Month of December, 1907. Estimated population, 12,500. Total number of deaths, 28. Cases: Diphtheria 1 and scarlet fever 21.

OHIO—*East Liverpool*.—Month of November, 1907. Estimated population, 20,000. Total number of deaths, 12, including scarlet fever 1, enteric fever 1, and 4 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 1, scarlet fever 5, diphtheria 5, and tuberculosis 4.

*Zanesville*.—Month of December, 1907. Estimated population, 26,000. Total number of deaths, 33, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 2, scarlet fever 2, and 3 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 4 and scarlet fever 6.

OREGON—*Portland*.—Month of November, 1907. Estimated population, 175,000. Total number of deaths, 130, including enteric fever 4, whooping cough 1, and 11 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 53, enteric fever 18 (7 brought to city for treatment), measles 45, smallpox 16, whooping cough 2, and scarlet fever 14.

PENNSYLVANIA—*Beaver Falls*.—Month of December, 1907. Estimated population, 12,000. Three deaths reported, including 1 from enteric fever. Cases: Diphtheria 1 and enteric fever 2.

*South Bethlehem.*—Four weeks ended December 28, 1907. Estimated population, 18,000. Total number of deaths, 26, including diphtheria 2 and 1 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 3, enteric fever 4, and scarlet fever 6.

## FOREIGN AND INSULAR.

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### CURRENT QUARANTINE MEASURES.

[From the Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes, Berlin, December 4 and 18, 1907.]

#### CHOLERA.

**BULGARIA.**—November 16. The cities of Khorassan and Hassan Kale, in the vilayet of Erzeroum, declared cholera infected.

Travelers from Roumania and Russia admitted at all ports of the Danube after medical inspection. Such travelers shall be subject at their homes to medical inspection for ten days.

**CHINA.**—November 25: The German consul at Mukden has suspended sanitary control of vessels from Moji and Newchwang. Importation of rags, waste paper, coffins containing corpses, and fresh and dried earth is prohibited.

**PRUSSIA.**—November 29: Official inspection of traffic on the Vistula ordered at Schillno, Schultitz, and Einlage, and on the Warthe at Porgocelice and Posen, suspended, and an observation station established at Schmallingken on the Memel.

**ROUMANIA.**—November 21: On account of the presence of cholera in Turkey November 7–20, arrivals from Turkish ports are admitted only at the ports of Costanza and Sulina, and after medical inspection and renewal of drinking water supply. Soiled clothing to be disinfected. Importation of susceptible articles of food prohibited. Crew and passengers subject to five days' medical observation.

**SPAIN.**—November 19: Russian Black Sea ports declared cholera infected.

**STRAITS SETTLEMENTS.**—October 19: Perlis, on the east coast of the Malay Peninsula, north of Kedah, declared cholera infected.

**TURKEY.**—November 26. *Special regulations for the pilgrimage to the Hedjaz.* Pilgrim vessels destined for the Hedjaz, coming from Russian ports on the Black Sea, which have undergone the treatment required at Sinope, but which have not landed their pilgrims, shall repair to Klazomene and there undergo the prescribed measures. They shall pass the Straits in quarantine.

On account of the occurrence of cholera, officially declared, at Sinope, arrivals from Sinope shall be subject to medical inspection at the first Turkish port provided with sanitary officials from December 1. All pilgrims coming from Russia by way of Vienna or Budapest shall be detained at the station of Tschataldja and there be subject to medical inspection and disinfection of effects. A special train shall carry them to Sirkedji, from which place they shall be conveyed, under care of local police authorities, to the special vessels provided

for the Hedjaz. Pilgrims from Roumania shall be detained forty-eight hours at Monastir Aghzy, and effects shall be disinfected.

To this on the same date were added, as follows:

1. The lazaretto of Sinope being full is closed for the present to arrivals from Russia.

2. Arrivals from Russia shall be subject to detention at Kavak. If cholera cases have occurred on board, the vessel is excluded from all Turkish ports. If no such cases have occurred, the vessels shall pass the Straits in quarantine and repair to Klazomene, there to undergo the required measures.

3. Arrivals from Russia carrying ordinary passengers shall be subject to medical inspection at Kavak. If such inspection shall show cholera cases or suspect cholera on board, the vessel shall be directed to go out into the open sea, as she can not be admitted to any Turkish port. On favorable inspection the vessel shall repair to the port of Monastir Aghzy, there to undergo the required measures. Travelers of the third class shall be landed at the lazaretto. Travelers of the first class shall be subject to observation on board.

#### PLAGUE.

AUSTRIA.—November 18: In accordance with circular of the maritime authorities of Trieste, arrivals from Philippeville are subject to requirements of circular of August 12, 1904.

BELGIUM.—November 19: Arrivals from Bône, Algeria, subject to same restrictions as ordered for arrivals from Philippeville.

BULGARIA.—November 9: City of Tunis declared plague infected.

DUTCH INDIES.—October 18: Quarantine measures against Foo-chow suspended.

EGYPT.—November 2 and 23: Plague regulations against arrivals from Oran and Tunis suspended.

FRANCE.—November 12: Bône, in Algeria, officially declared plague infected.

HOLLAND.—Bône declared plague infected; five days' quarantine. November 23: Measures against Tunis suspended.

MALTA.—November 21: Bône and Philippeville declared plague infected; Oran and Tunis declared no longer infected.

TURKEY.—November 18: Quarantine measures against Port Said and Tunis replaced by medical inspection in the first Turkish port provided with official physicians.

#### ALGERIA.

##### *Bône declared free of plague.*

The following information is received from the Department of State, under date of January 2:

The American Ambassador at Paris states that he has been informed by the French foreign office that as the isolation of the last case of plague discovered at Bône, Algeria, dates back to November 15, 1907, as the bacteriological examination made on rats has proved negative for more than two weeks, and as all measures for disinfection and for the destruction of rats have been applied, the port of Bône need no longer be considered as contaminated.

## BRAZIL.

*Report from Rio de Janeiro—Inspection of vessels—Mortality—Plague and smallpox.*

Acting Assistant Surgeon Stewart reports, December 7 and 11:

Week ended December 1: Vessels inspected and issued bills of health from this consulate-general: November 26, British steamship *Tintoretto*, for New York, in cargo of coffee, with 2 cabin and 16 steerage passengers for the United States, and with no change in the personnel of the crew; November 27, British steamship *Exmouth*, for New Orleans, in water ballast, with no passengers, and no change in the personnel of the crew; November 29, British bark *Helios*, for Mobile, in stone ballast and some sand ballast, with no passengers, and with 2 new members of the crew signed on in this port.

All vessels lay in the open bay while here discharging or loading.

*Mortality at Rio de Janeiro—Plague and smallpox.*—Week ended December 1: Total deaths, 278. There were no cases nor deaths due to yellow fever, 12 new reported cases of smallpox with 11 deaths, and 13 new reported cases of plague with 3 deaths. At the close of the week there were in the Hospital São Sebastião no cases of yellow fever under treatment, 19 cases of smallpox and 12 cases of plague under treatment, and 27 cases of suspicious illness under observation.

Week ended December 8: Vessels inspected and issued bills of health from this consulate-general: December 3, British bark *Burnham Wood*, for Ship Island, Mississippi, in stone and sand ballast, with no passengers and 2 new men in the crew personnel; British steamship *Grecian Prince*, for New York, in cargo of coffee, no passengers and no change of personnel; December 4, British steamship *Katharge*, for New Orleans, in water ballast, with no passengers and no change in the personnel of the crew; British steamship *Byron*, for New York, in coffee cargo, with 24 cabin and 17 steerage passengers, and one change in the crew personnel; British steamship *Ballanoch*, for New Orleans, in coffee cargo, with no passengers and no change in the personnel of the crew; December 5, British steamship *Basuta* for a southern port, via St. Lucia, for orders, in water ballast, with no passengers and no change in the personnel of the crew; December 7, German steamship *Seigmund*, for New York, with a cargo of coffee, no passengers, and no change in the crew personnel in this port.

No other vessels left this port during the week for United States ports or other ports requiring inspection.

*Mortality, plague and smallpox.*—Total deaths during the week ended December 8, 1907, 241. Yellow fever caused no new cases nor any deaths, bubonic plague caused 4 new reported cases with 2 deaths, and smallpox 19 new reported cases with 3 deaths. At the close of the week there were in the Hospital São Sebastião 16 cases of smallpox and 11 cases of plague under treatment, with 41 cases of suspicious illness under observation.

## CAPE COLONY.

*Reports from Cape Town—Examination of rodents at King Williams Town for plague infection.*

The following are received from the medical officer of health for the colony under dates of November 18 and 25:

Week ended November 16:

*King Williams Town.*—No case of plague was discovered during the week.

One hundred and nineteen rats (including 4 found dead) and 68 mice (including 1 found dead) were examined, of which 3 rats and 1 mouse were found to be probably plague infected.

Week ended November 23:

*King Williams Town.*—No case of plague discovered during the week. Forty-seven rats (2 found dead) and 29 mice (7 found dead) were examined, of which 1 rat and 7 mice were found to be probably plague infected.

## CHINA.

*Reports from Hongkong—Quarantine restrictions—Inspection of vessels—Cholera, plague, and smallpox.*

Acting Assistant Surgeon Hough reports:

Week ended November 2. Restrictions enforced by Hongkong remain as reported on October 5. Restrictions enforced against Hongkong by Ceylon as reported on October 5 have been withdrawn.

Vessels inspected and granted bills of health, 8. Quarantinable diseases: Cholera, 3 cases, 7 deaths (imported from Singapore); plague, 2 cases, 2 deaths.

Week ended November 9:

Vessels inspected and granted bills of health, 7.

No quarantinable diseases.

Week ended November 16:

Quarantinable diseases: Plague, 1 case, 1 death; smallpox, 1 case, 1 death.

## CUBA.

*Report from Cienfuegos—Inspection of vessels—Yellow fever.*

Acting Assistant Surgeon Marsillan reports:

Week ended December 28. Vessels inspected and bills of health issued, 5; members of crews inspected, 193; member of crew inspected, landed here, 1.

Vessels inspected during the week: Spanish steamship *Pio IX*, from Habana for New Orleans, with 55 in the crew; the Norwegian steamship *Frey*, from Philadelphia for a port in the United States via Port au Prince, Haiti; the British steamship *Capenor*, from Baltimore for Newport News; the Spanish steamship *Niceto*, from Santiago de Cuba for Port Tampa, Fla., and the German steamship *Helgoland*, from Manzanillo for New Orleans.

No new case of yellow fever or other quarantinable disease has been reported during the week, either in the city or the surrounding country.

January 4: Last case of yellow fever died yesterday in this city.

*Report from Habana—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Re-appearance of yellow fever in Habana Province—Sailing vessels for Gulf ports fumigated and temperatures of passengers for Key West taken—Yellow fever at Santa Clara.*

Yellow fever reappeared in this Province on December 18, in the person of a Spanish immigrant, 20 years of age, living at Los Palos. The case was isolated in the hospital at Guines, an adjacent town, and officially confirmed December 24. Death resulted December 27.

Sailing vessels bound for Gulf ports are being fumigated, and the temperatures of all passengers for Key West noted. Persons having a temperature above 38° are, by request of the National Sanitary Board, sent to Las Animas Hospital for observation.

January 6. One case of yellow fever at Santa Clara confirmed to-day.

*Report from Matanzas—Inspection of vessels.*

Acting Assistant Surgeon Nuñez reports, December 31:

Week ended December 28. Two bills of health were granted to vessels leaving for United States ports. No new cases of yellow fever have been reported within this district.

*Report from Santiago—Inspection and fumigation of vessels.*

Acting Assistant Surgeon Wilson reports, December 26:

Week ended December 21.

Bills of health issued to 3 vessels bound for the United States. The Cuban steamship *Julia*, bound for San Juan, P. R., was fumigated to kill mosquitoes. No quarantinable disease has been reported.

GERMANY.

*Report from Berlin—Status of cholera in Russia.*

The following is received from Consul-General Thackera, under date of December 23:

*Cholera in Russia.*

According to official statistics published by the Russian Government Gazette and reprinted in the weekly bulletin of the imperial health office at Berlin, there were registered in the whole of the Russian Empire during the period from November 13 to 19, 202 new cases of cholera, with 115 deaths.

During the period from November 20 to 26 the total number of fresh cases of cholera recorded in the Russian Empire amounted to 96, with 62 deaths.

In the city of Kief, according to another report, there were registered, during the period from November 24 to December 7, 24 new cases of cholera and 4 deaths, making the total number of cases in this district since the outbreak of the present epidemic 1,372 cases and 358 deaths.

#### GUATEMALA.

##### *Report from Guatemala City—Yellow fever on railroad from Puerto Barrios to Guatemala City.*

The following information is received from the Department of State, under date of January 2:

The American chargé d'affaires ad interim at Guatemala City states, under date of December 13, that it is reported that yellow fever has again broken out on the line of the railroad from Puerto Barrios to that capital.

##### *Report from Livingston—Yellow fever in interior towns.*

Consular Agent Reed reports, December 25:

During the latter part of November and the first days in December there were cases of yellow fever in the town of Zacapa. The disease spread to Chiquimula, a town with a population of 6,000, situated south of Zacapa and the Guatemalan Railroad and at a distance of about 20 miles. At this latter place there have been a number of cases and some deaths. The disease still prevails there.

#### HAWAII.

##### *Report from Honolulu—Examination of rats for plague infection.*

Passed Assistant Surgeon Currie reports that, during the week ended December 14, 194 rats were examined bacteriologically at the plague laboratory of the Service at Honolulu. No plague infection proved. Antirats campaign is continued at Aiea.

#### INDIA.

##### *Reports from Calcutta—Cholera, plague, and smallpox—Plague in India and Bengal.*

Acting Assistant Surgeon Eakins reports, December 5:

During the week ended November 23, 1907, there were 108 deaths from cholera, 18 from plague, and 2 from smallpox in Calcutta. In Bengal, during the same week, 96 cases and 78 deaths from plague, and in India, during the same period, 5,188 cases and 4,000 deaths from plague.

*Report from Naples—Inspection of vessels—Emigrants recommended for rejection—Smallpox in Italy.*

Passed Assistant Surgeon Cumming reports:

Number of emigrants per steamship *Manchuria* recommended, November 11, for rejection: For Honolulu, 4; advised to wait, 16.

Per steamship *Tango Maru*, November 11: For Seattle, 4; advised to wait, 29. Of these rejections and detentions all were for trachoma.



*Reports from Kobe—Inspection of vessels—Examination of emigrants—Cholera—Smallpox—Plague at Osaka—Smallpox on sailing vessel W. H. Talbot.*

Temporary Acting Assistant Surgeon Slade reports, December 2, 7, and 10:

Week ended November 30, 1907: Two supplemental bills of health were granted to 2 steamers and 2 original bills of health were granted 2 steamers, altogether with an aggregate personnel of 893. There were inspected 4 vessels, 427 crew, and 405 steerage passengers. Manifests were issued for 56,075 pieces of freight. There were disinfected 671 pieces of personal effects. One hundred and forty-four steerage passengers were bathed and disinfected and held five days under observation prior to ships' sailing. Their effects were disinfected.

Emigrants were examined as follows: Steamship *China*, for Honolulu, examined 190, recommended for rejection 104; for San Francisco by same steamer, 3 examined, 2 recommended for rejection.

The emigrants passed, together with 59 intending passengers to Victoria by the steamship *Shawmut*, were held five days prior to the ship's sailing and all passengers' effects were disinfected.

The following diseases were reported in Kobe during the week: Cholera, 4 cases and 2 deaths; smallpox, 38 cases and 12 deaths. The total mortality was 174.

The reports from Osaka for the same week give 70 cases of plague, with 62 deaths, an increase over last week of 19 cases and 9 deaths.

*Special quarantine restrictions on account of smallpox.*

Doctor Slade further reports, December 7:

In view of the fact that smallpox has increased considerably in this port within the last three weeks, and that the disease has gained a foothold here, the special restrictions provided in the quarantine laws and regulations for steerage passengers and crew of vessels sailing from ports infected with smallpox have been put into operation, to take effect from and after this date.

Week ended December 7. Five supplemental bills of health were granted to 5 steamships and 1 original bill of health was granted to 1 steamship, altogether an aggregate personnel of 428. There were inspected 6 vessels, 322 members of crews, and 84 steerage passengers. Manifests were viséed for 92,635 pieces of freight.

There were disinfected 393 pieces of personal effects. Eighty-four steerage passengers were bathed and vaccinated and held five days under observation prior to embarkation. Their effects were disinfected.

Emigrants were examined as follows: Steamship *Tango Maru*, for Seattle, examined 76, recommended for rejection 43. The emigrants passed, together with 45 intending passengers to Victoria by same steamer, were bathed and vaccinated and held five days under observation prior to embarkation. Their effects were disinfected.

The following diseases were reported in Kobe during the week: Cholera, 3 cases and 1 death; smallpox, 28 cases and 8 deaths. The total reported mortality was 163.

Smallpox being epidemic in Kobe, all emigrants, either to America, American dependencies, or to Canadian ports, if traveling by the same steamships, are vaccinated, as are also all new members of crews taken on at Kobe by vessels bound for American ports.

The sailing vessel the *W. H. Talbot* was held in quarantine here. A case of smallpox was discovered. The vessel was carefully fumigated, sailors' quarters were cleaned and disinfected, and all hands vaccinated. The patient was transferred at once to hospital on shore.

The report from Osaka for the week ended December 7 gives 52 cases and 58 deaths from plague, a decrease of 18 cases and 4 deaths compared with the previous week.

PERU.

*Report from Callao—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Status of plague in Peru—Smallpox at Lima—House disinfection for plague and smallpox at Lima.*

Vessels were dispatched as follows:

December 6 the Chilean steamship *Loa*, for Ancon, Canal Zone, with a general cargo and a total personnel of 159, of whom 4 members of crew, 45 cabin and 16 steerage passengers, were from this port.

December 7 the British ship *Stronsa*, for Port Townsend, Wash., in ballast, with a crew of 30, of whom 4 were from this port; and the American cable steamship *Relay*, for New York, with a crew of 39.

The *Loa* was fumigated; the other two vessels were inspected and passed.

Smallpox continues in Lima. December 4, there were 32 patients in the smallpox hospital there. During the month of November, 19 houses were fumigated in Lima for that disease, and 14 for plague or the finding of dead rodents.

## VENEZUELA.

*Report from La Guaira—No yellow fever present—Smallpox at Caracas.*

The Department has received a telegram dated December 30 from the American consul at La Guaira, Venezuela, reading as follows:

No yellow fever officially reported or personally known to exist at present. Report has been fully confirmed regarding epidemic of smallpox at Caracas.

Owing to the presence of smallpox in Caracas the president of the State of Carababo has issued an order for the vaccination of all persons in Puerto Cabello.

*GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.*—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended December 14, 1907, correspond to an annual rate of 16.1 per 1,000 population, which is estimated at 16,024,458.

*London.*—One thousand four hundred and forty-six deaths were registered during the week, including measles 23, scarlet fever 13, diphtheria 15, enteric fever 2, whooping cough 18, tuberculosis 173, and 10 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 15.8 per 1,000. In Greater London 2,011 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 5 from diphtheria, 2 from measles, 1 from scarlet fever, and 3 from whooping cough.
