FOREIGN AND INSULAR.

ALGERIA.

Philippeville declared free of plague.

The following information is received from the Department of

State, under date of January 3:

A dispatch from the American ambassador at Paris reports that the foreign office has informed him that the last case of plague having been discovered at Philippeville on November 2, the bacteriological examinations made on rats having proven negative since November 25, and all measures for disinfection and for the destruction of rats having been applied, the port of Phillippeville need no longer be considered as contaminated.

CUBA.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Marsillan reports, January 6 and 9:

The number of passengers was 6,390, an increase of 1,722 over 1906. This includes those in transit.

The total number of vessels fumigated was 24, the same as in 1906. The number of immune certificates issued was 70, an increase of 15 over 1906.

There were no vaccination certificates issued for the Canal Zone or Panama in 1907, whereas in 1906 there were 5.

HAWAII.

Report from Honolulu-Examination of rats for plague infection.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Currie reports that during the week ended December 21, 209 rats were examined bacteriologically at the plague laboratory of the Service at Honolulu. No plague infection found.

HONDURAS.

Vessels from San Francisco, Cal., not required to be fumigated at Amapala.

The following is received from the Department of State, under date of January 8:

A note from the minister of foreign affairs of Honduras states that orders have been issued to the authorities of the only port of Honduras on the Pacific, Amapala, temporarily to waive fumigation on vessels coming from San Francisco, Cal.

INDIA.

Report from Calcutta—Proposed preventive measures against plague.

The following is received from Consul-General Michael, under date of December 5:

Plague deaths in India during the last 11 years number nearly 5,500,000, or little less than 500,000 annually. The ruin, beggary, and desolation wrought by this disease in parts of India can not be comprehended fully except by those who have been face to face with it.

A report made by a commission appointed by the Government, in cooperation with the Royal Society and the Lister Institute, furnishes

some very interesting and valuable information.

It is considered that the experience now acquired warrants the belief that the systematic destruction of rats promises to be one of the most effective measures that can be adopted for preventing the spread of plague.

Among preventive measures, disinfection, with really germicidal fluids, of both houses and clothing takes a high place in regard to

towns where the disease has not fully established itself.

The most efficacious of the various methods hitherto adopted with the object of arresting plague has been the prompt abandonment of the affected locality for a period which varies with local conditions. The evacuation, however, must be thorough, as, if a portion of the inhabitants remain, the disease will continue to spread. Where the exodus is feasible the people should be encouraged to resort to it and assisted by the grant of blankets and warm clothing when necessary and by the provision of huts and the materials for building them.

Inspection of travelers by railway, road, and steamship is advised, and segregation camps for the detention of the sick should be adopted outside villages, though these measures admit of difficulty if applied to towns. The removal of the sick to hospitals is eminently desirable, though it has always been unpopular.

Inoculation with prophylactic fluid is of value, both for the protection which it affords against an attack and its effect in mitigating

the violence of the disease.

The application of the measures enumerated above must depend upon the circumstances and the locality, the character of the people, the stage which the disease has reached, and the agency available for dealing with it. What is necessary in a district free from plague may be useless or vexatious where the disease has become indigenous; what is effectual in one part of the country may be inoperative in another; a degree of control which is acceptable to a particular community may be strongly resented by a people who observe a different code of social usage, and in a province with a well-developed system of village officials more can be attempted than in a province where

no such organization exists.

The report considers finally that the local governments are competent to determine what measures are practicable or expedient at particular times or places; that preventive measures depend for their success on the hearty cooperation of the people themselves; that every effort should be made to enlist the sympathies of the people, and that it rests mainly with them to bring about, by their own action, the cessation of plague in India.

JAPAN.

Reports from Yokohama—Inspection and disinfection of vessels— Decrease of cholera at Kobe and Yokohama—Smallpox at Kobe— Cholera at Tokyo—Plague at Osaka.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Cumming reports, December 12 and 26: Week ended December 7. Four vessels, having an aggregate personnel of 402 passengers and 335 crew, were inspected and granted bills of health. The *Benavon*, for Cebu, was disinfected in part, her crew were bathed and their effects disinfected. All crew and steerage passengers embarking here are handled in the same way, and at present, on account of sanitary conditions in the Empire, steerage passengers are registered and remain five days in approved hotels before being allowed to embark.

Cholera has nearly disappeared from Yokohama. It is dying out in Kobe, but smallpox is prevalent. Plague continues to spread in

Osaka.

From September 25 to December 3, 228 cases of cholera with 125

deaths were reported in Tokyo.

Week ended December 21. The steamship *Erroll*, for New York, was fumigated in part to kill vermin, and all steerage passengers were held for five days' observation, if through or from infected territory, and bathed, their effects being disinfected.

Cholera seems to be extinct at Yokohama.

Smallpox has appeared in the city, but has been confined to 8 cases

in one focus. In Kobe the disease prevails.

Representatives from the central health office have reported that the plague conditions in Osaka are very serious, and that the disease has such a foothold there that the following steps should be taken:

Preparations to isolate 100,000 persons; disinfection of about 500,000 houses, and destruction of rats. The local authorities are now considering the matter and meantime fighting the rats, infected rats being found, it is said, in every district of the city.

Emigrants recommended for rejection.

Number of emigrants per steamship Nippon Maru recommended December 18 for rejection: For Honolulu, 9; advised to wait, 32. For San Francisco, advised to wait, 1. Aliens examined at Kobe and transferred from, 4.

Report from Kobe—Inspection of vessels—Examination of emigrants—Smallpox—Plague at Osaka.

Temporary Acting Assistant Surgeon Slade reports, December 19: Week ended December 14. Three supplemental bills of health were granted to 3 steamships and 1 original bill of health was granted to 1 steamship, altogether an aggregate personnel of 1,201. There were inspected 4 vessels, 605 members of crews, and 516 steerage passengers. Manifests were issued for 59,764 pieces of freight.

There were disinfected 490 pieces of personal effects. Two hundred and twenty-six steerage passengers were bathed, disinfected, and vaccinated, and held 5 days under observation prior to em-

barkation. Their effects were disinfected.

Emigrants were examined as follows: Steamship Manchuria for Honolulu: Examined, 188; recommended for rejection, 84. Steamship Cyclops for Tacoma: Examined, 22; recommended for rejection, 11. Steamship Nippon Maru for Honolulu: Examined, 213; recommended for rejection, 96. By the same vessel for San Francisco: Examined, 3; recommended for rejection, 2.

The emigrants passed were all bathed, vaccinated, and held 5 days

under observation prior to embarkation.

The following disease was reported in Kobe during the week:

Smallpox, 149 cases and 24 deaths.

Reports from Osaka for the same week give 24 cases of plague with 20 deaths, and 5 cases of cholera with 5 deaths.

Report from Nagasaki-Emigrants recommended for rejection.

Sanitary Inspector Bowie reports:

December 13. Number of emigrants recommended for rejection, 5.

MEXICO.

Report from Salina Cruz-Inspection and fumigation of vessels.

Acting Assistant Surgeon McPherson reports, January 1:

Period December 16 to 31, inclusive. Two vessels cleared from this port for the United States, the steamship *Nebraskan*, which left for San Diego, Cal., December 21, and the steamship *Arizonan*, which left this port for San Diego December 27. Both vessels were fumigated according to regulations while in the roadstead outside the harbor.

MOROCCO.

Report from Tangier—Measures taken to prevent importation of plague at ports in Morocco.

The following is received from the American legation at Tangier,

under date of December 21:

The sanitary council of Tangier has appointed a medical commission to examine into the requirements necessary for precautionary measures against importation of plague infection at Moroccan ports. This commission is at present at work.

PERU.

Report from Callao—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Status of plague in Peru—Smallpox in Lima—Plague in vicinity of Arica, Chile.

Assistant Surgeon Wightman reports, December 16: Week ended December 14. Vessels dispatched as follows:

December 11. British steamship *Condor*, for New York with general cargo and a total personnel of 32, of whom 1 cabin passenger was from this port.

December 12. British steamship California for Ancon, Canal Zone, with general cargo and a total personnel of 183, of whom 6 members of crew, 29 cabin, and 34 steerage passengers were from this port.

United States cruisers Tennessee and Washington, for San Francisco, Cal., each with a personnel of 1,000, none of whom came from

this port.

December 13. American barkentine *Lahaina*, for Newcastle, New

South Wales, bound later for San Francisco, Cal.

The Condor and the California were fumigated. The two cruisers were passed on statement of their medical officers. Fumigation was offered to the barkentine Lahaina, but not insisted on, and was not accepted by her master.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

Reports from Manila—Cholera—Inspection of vessels.

Chief Quarantine Officer Heiser reports, November 22 and 29: Week ended November 16. Quarantinable disease was reported for the city of Manila as follows: Cholera, 6 cases and 6 deaths.

Vessels granted consular bills of health as follows:

November 15 the British steamship St. George, with 36 crew, en route from Manila to New York via Cebu and ports, was granted a consular bill of health. The vessel was fumigated throughout while in port when empty and before the cargo was taken on board. All persons on board were inspected at the hour of sailing, and the cargo manifests were viséed.

November 15 the United States army transport Sherman, with 191 crew and 1,111 passengers, was granted a bill of health for San Francisco via Nagasaki and Honolulu. The crew and steerage passengers were bathed and their effects and baggage were disinfected at Mariveles. All cargo and effects on board were either disinfected or passed after inspection. All persons on board were inspected at the hour of sailing.

Week ended November 23. Cholera, 4 cases and 4 deaths.

November 23 the British steamship Indrani, with 61 crew, bound from New York to Ilolio via ports, was granted a supplemental bill of health after the usual inspection of personnel.

London.—One thousand four hundred and eighty-five deaths were registered during the week, including measles 18, scarlet fever 24, diphtheria 15, enteric fever 5, whooping cough 21, tuberculosis 189, and 11 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 16.3 per 1,000. In greater London 2,112 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 5 from diphtheria, 3 from measles, 5 from scarlet fever, and 8 from whooping cough.

Salford.—Two weeks ended December 21, 1907. Estimated population, 236,670. Total number of deaths, 164, including diphtheria 3, measles 13, scarlet fever 5, whooping cough 4, and phthisis pulmonalis 13.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended December 21, 1907, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 23.3 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,117,547. The lowest rate was recorded in Ballymena, viz, 4.8 and the highest in Lurgan, viz, 44.3 per 1,000.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended December 21, 1907, correspond to an annual rate of 20.8 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,812,171. The highest rate of mortality was recorded in Dundee, viz, 30.5, and the lowest in Aberdeen, viz, 13.7 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 724, including diphtheria 11, enteric fever 2, measles 53, scarlet fever 3, and 26 from whooping cough.

GREECE—Patras.—Fifteen days ended December 16, 1907. Estimated population, 38,500. Total number of deaths not reported. One death from diphtheria and 7 from tuberculosis.

Spain—Barcelona.—Ten days ended December 20, 1907. Estimated population, 600,000. Total number of deaths, 286, including diphtheria 4, enteric fever 16, measles 1, and 23 from tuberculosis.

Seville.—Month of November, 1907. Estimated population, 148,-315. Total number of deaths, 369, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 4, smallpox 1, whooping cough 2, and 95 from tuberculosis.

TURKEY—Constantinople.—Two weeks ended December 8, 1907. Estimated population 1,000,000. Total number of deaths, 471, including diphtheria 9, enteric fever 16, measles 2, scarlet fever 3, small-pox 4, and 58 from tuberculosis.

West Indies—Turks Island.—Five weeks ended January 4, 1908. Estimated population, 1,700. Seven deaths reported.
