STATISTICAL REPORTS OF MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY, STATES AND CITIES OF THE UNITED STATES—UNTABULATED.

California—Sacramento.—Month of July, 1908. Estimated population, 50,000. Total number of deaths, 58, including 6 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 7, measles 2, smallpox 1, and scarlet fever 8.

FLORIDA.—Reports from the State board of health for the week ended August 22, 1908, show as follows: Enteric fever—Jacksonville, 5 cases; Tampa, 3 cases; De Funiak Springs, 2 cases; Ocala, Middleburg, Green Cove Springs, Plant City, Fort Meade, and Daytona Beach each 1 case. Diphtheria—Pensacola, 1 case. Tuberculosis—Jacksonville, 2 cases; Tampa and Orlando each 1 case.

MICHIGAN.—Month of July, 1908. There were 2,655 deaths returned to the department of state as having occurred during the month of July, which corresponds to an annual death rate of 12.1 per 1,000 estimated population. There was an increase of 140 over June, and an increase of 64 over the number returned for the corresponding month of 1907.

Important causes of death were as follows: Pulmonary tuberculosis, 190; other forms of tuberculosis, 25; enteric fever, 38; diphtheria and croup, 17; scarlet fever, 7; measles, 8; whooping cough, 23.

MINNESOTA—Minneapolis.—Month of July, 1908. Estimated population, 300,000. Total number of deaths, 229, including diphtheria 5, enteric fever 2, and 30 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 39, enteric fever 5, scarlet fever 14, smallpox 4, and tuberculosis 26.

Nebraska—Lincoln.—Month of June, 1908. Estimated population, 60,000. Total number of deaths, 38, including enteric fever 1 and 2 from tuberculosis.

Month of July, 1908. Total number of deaths, 46, including enteric fever 1 and 7 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 1.

New York—Saratoga Springs.—Month of June, a 1908. Estimated population, 11,822. Total number of deaths 22, including 2 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 1, scarlet fever 1, and tuberculosis 5.

Troy.—Month of July, 1908. Estimated population, 77,650. Total number of deaths, 142, including enteric fever 5 and 15 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 6 and tuberculosis 9.

OHIO—East Liverpool.—Month of July, 1908. Estimated population, 20,000. Total number of deaths, 21, including enteric fever 3 and 3 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 6 and scarlet fever 1.

TEXAS—Fort Worth.—Month of July, 1908. Estimated population, 70,000. Total number of deaths, 49. Cases: Enteric fever 8 and scarlet fever 1.

UTAH.—Month of July, 1908. Reports to the State board of health from 27 counties, having an estimated population of 346,873, show as

follows: Total number of deaths, 241, including diphtheria 4, enteric fever 1, whooping cough 3, scarlet fever 3, smallpox 1, and 11 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 61, enteric fever 39, measles 36, scarlet fever 50, smallpox 19, whooping cough 176, and tuberculosis 15 (incomplete).

Washington—Seattle.—Month of July, 1908. Estimated population, 276,562. Total number of deaths, 146, including diphtheria 3, enteric fever 2, and 14 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 39, measles 7, enteric fever 25, scarlet fever 32, and smallpox 16.

#### BARBADOS.

Report from Bridgetown—Inspection of vessels—Trinidad authorities declare island free from plague—Quarantine still in force against Trinidad.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Urquhart reports, August 15:

# Sanitary conditions of Trujillo and Crystales.

Trujillo, built over the ruins of an old Spanish settlement situated upon a plateau immediately along the beach of an open bay and practically in the shadow of a precipitous coastal range of hills which rise almost to an altitude of 1,500 feet, is about 60 miles to the northeastward from Ceiba, and has a population of about 2,000 natives and foreigners. With few exceptions all houses are of stone and concrete construction and appear to have been built with an ultimate view of protection rather than sanitary comfort. The few openings which exist are not screened. The streets are rather wide and substantially paved with cobble stones. In the center of the streets deep ditches exist and appear to serve the double purpose of drains and sewers. These ditches lead into a small creek which empties into the sea at a

point about 300 yards from the town limits. In general the ditches are useless adjuncts to the local sanitary scheme and would be a

menace to the public health were it not for the heavy rainfall.

The water supply is excellent and is piped into the town and houses from the Crystales River, the intake being at a point in the hills above human habitation. Water tanks do not exist and are not allowed by the municipal authorities. There are several surface wells, all of which are properly covered and are therefore not favorable breeding places for mosquitoes. A careful scrutiny of all water receptacles revealed the presence of many Anopheles and not a few Culex larvæ, but in no instance was Stegomyia found. It is possible that Stegomyia exists, but not in sufficient numbers to be commonly observed. There are no hospitals, but there is a board of health, which is under the immediate supervision of a regularly qualified graduate in medi-Garbage is carted outside of town limits daily and is sometimes burned. It is, however, oftener dumped into the Crystales River at a point near its mouth. Old-fashioned underground water-closets are scattered throughout the community. The port is an important distributing point for rubber and cocoanuts, but as this class of cargo is locally handled almost exclusively by large sailing vessels which clear direct for ports in the United States, very few fruit steamers make it a port of call. Communication with Ceiba is effected by means of a mule train, which requires from three to four days in transit; by small sailing vessels, and infrequently by fruit steamers. Communication with the interior is frequent and uninterrupted.

The health conditions are very good. Malarial fevers are common but mostly of mild type, and gastro-intestinal disorders are not infrequently observed among children. No quarantinable diseases exist.

Crystales, the principal suburb of Trujillo, separated from it by the Crystales River, is the largest Carib settlement on the Honduran coast. The inhabitants are exclusively of Carib origin and number about The houses are irregularly scattered over an extensive area and kept in good sanitary condition. The streets, however, present an entirely different appearance and have been allowed to become almost impassable by a dense growth of weeds and bushes. This condition has been made materially worse by the accumulation of all kinds of garbage. The topography of the settlement is naturally favorable to efficient drainage, and no surface pools exist. This condition, combined with the absence of water tanks, is responsible for the presence of very few mosquitoes. A careful inspection showed the presence of Anopheles and Culex larvæ but no Stegomyia. There are very few underground cesspools and no surface wells, the necessity for the latter being obviated by the proximity of the Crystales River. There is a large public washhouse, but it is rarely used. The Caribs seem to prefer the river for all washing purposes. The health conditions appear to be excellent. Malarial fevers are not uncommon and are mostly of mild type.

#### RUSSIA.

### Cholera situation in Russia.

The following is received from Ambassador Riddle, at St. Petersburg, under date of August 3:

According to notices received from the Foreign Office the status of cholera in Russia up to July 31 is as follows: Astrakhan, 7 deaths; Tsaritsine, 16 deaths.

The city of Tsaritsine is declared infected with cholera, and the governments of Astrakhan, Saratov, Samara, Simbirsk, Tambov, the Volga, and the cities of Baku and Hrasnovodsk are threatened with

that disease.

The following is received from Consul-General Thackara, at Berlin,

under date of August 14:

According to an official bulletin published by the Imperial Health Office, there have been registered in the Government District of Astrakhan since the beginning of this year's epidemic, 42 cases of Asiatic cholera with 19 deaths; in the Government District of Saratov 88 cases with 44 deaths, of which 71 cases and 40 deaths occurred in Zarizyn and 10 cases and 1 death in the city of Saratov. In the city of Astrakhan on August 1 and 2 there were 11 cases and 4 deaths, making a total of 36 cases and 16 deaths. Cases of cholera have also been reported on board ships in Zarizyn and Saratov.

#### VENEZUELA.

## Plague situation at Caracas.

The following is received from Consular-Agent Brewer, at Caracas, under date of August 10:

The following is a report of plague in this city:

At the quarantine hospital during the period July 25 to August 9, 1908, there were 7 new patients, 4 recoveries, and 4 deaths.

Thirteen patients are at present in the hospital.

In addition there have been several deaths reported throughout the city.

Matanzas.—Month of July, 1908. Estimated population, 35,515. Total number of deaths, 84, including enteric fever 2 and 10 from tuberculosis.

DUTCH GUIANA—Parimaribo.—Month of July, 1908. Estimated population, 34,038. Total number of deaths, 131. No contagious diseases reported.

France—Roubaix.—Month of July, 1908. Estimated population, 121,115. Total number of deaths, 160, including scarlet fever 1, enteric fever 1, measles 3, and 24 from tuberculosis.

GIBRALTAR.—Two weeks ended August 9, 1908. Estimated population, 36,830. Total number of deaths, 8.

Great Britain—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended August 8, 1908, correspond to an annual rate of 13.2 per 1,000 population, which is estimated at 16,234,952.

London.—One thousand one hundred and twenty-six deaths were registered during the week, including measles 30, scarlet fever 9, diphtheria 5, whooping cough 21, enteric fever 5, tuberculosis 153, and 104 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 12.2 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,537 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 4 from measles, 1 from scarlet fever, 2 from diphtheria, and 4 from whooping cough.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended August 8, 1908, correspond to an annual rate of 12.8 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,839,038. The highest rate of mortality was recorded in Dundee, viz, 17.0, and the lowest in Perth, viz, 8.9 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 450, including measles 4, scarlet fever 3, enteric fever 1, diphtheria 2, and 15 from whooping cough.

MAURITIUS.—Month of May, 1908. Estimated population, 376,625. Total number of deaths, 1,616, including enteric fever 2, measles 2, plague 1, and 91 from tuberculosis.

SPAIN—Cadiz.—Month of July, 1908. Estimated population, 69,382. Total number of deaths 140, including diphtheria 1, measles 1, and 22 from tuberculosis.

Madrid.—Month of July, 1908. Estimated population, 556,663. Total number of deaths, 1,269, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 17, measles 11, scarlet fever 4, whooping cough 7, and 121 from tuberculosis.

Malaga.—Month of May, 1908. Estimated population, 135,000. Total number of deaths, 324, including 26 from tuberculosis.

Month of June, 1908. Total number of deaths, 265, including diphtheria 1, and 25 from tuberculosis.

URUGUAY—Montevideo.—Month of June, 1908. Estimated population, 309,511. Total number of deaths, 396, including enteric fever 6, diphtheria 4, scarlet fever 1, and 43 from tuberculosis.
