Regulations relative to inspection and disinfection of vessels from San Francisco, Cal., at Pacific coast quarantine stations modified.

[Reports to the Surgeon-General, Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service.]

The following instructions were wired, September 28, by the Bureau, to the quarantine officers at Port Townsend, Wash.; Astoria, Oreg.; and Eureka, Los Angeles, San Diego, and San Luis Obispo, Cal.:

“In view length time since occurrence last case plague San Francisco, authorized discontinue routine inspection and disinfection San Francisco vessels except those arriving sickness on board.”

COLORADO—*Colorado Springs*.—Month of June, 1908. Estimated population, 32,000. Total number of deaths, 34, including scarlet fever 1, and 11 from tuberculosis. Cases: Measles 8, smallpox 6, and scarlet fever 13.

Month of July, 1908. Total number of deaths, 41, including scarlet fever 1, and 11 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 23, diphtheria 1, enteric fever 5, and measles 6.

FLORIDA.—Reports from the State board of health for the two weeks ended September 19, 1908, shows as follows: Enteric fever—*Jacksonville*, 10 cases; *Tampa*, 5 cases; *Plant City*, 2 cases; *Bartow*, *Macclen*, *Mayport*, *Palatka*, *West Tampa*, *Port Tampa*, *Pierson*, and *Daytona*, each 1 case. Tuberculosis—*Jacksonville*, 4 cases; *Tampa*, 2 cases; *Bartow*, *Cedar Key*, *Ocala*, *Webster*, *Sanford*, *Orlando*, *Ybor City*, *Plummers*, and *Chattahoochee*, each 1 case. Diphtheria—*Plant City*, 7 cases; *Tampa*, *Tallahassee*, and *Fernandina*, each 2 cases; *Jacksonville*, *Sanford*, and *Palmetto*, each 1 case.

ILLINOIS—*Quincy*.—Month of July,^a 1908. Estimated population, 43,000. Total number of deaths, 32, including diphtheria 1, and 7 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 3 and enteric fever 2.

NEW YORK—*Troy*.—Month of August, 1908. Estimated population, 77,650. Total number of deaths, 148, including enteric fever 5

and 18 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 13, diphtheria 1, and tuberculosis 5.

OHIO—*East Liverpool*.—Month of August, 1908. Estimated population, 20,000. Total number of deaths 20, including 2 from enteric fever. Cases: Enteric fever 2 and scarlet fever 1.

TEXAS—*Fort Worth*.—Month of August, 1908. Estimated population, 70,000. Total number of deaths, 63. Cases: Enteric fever 31, diphtheria 9, and scarlet fever 3.

UTAH.—Month of August, 1908. Reports [to the State board of health from 27 counties, having an estimated population of 346,873, show as follows: Total number of deaths, 228, including diphtheria 5, enteric fever 9, whooping cough 3, scarlet fever 3, and 9 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 46, enteric fever 125, measles 35, scarlet fever 36, smallpox 9, whooping cough 173, and tuberculosis 13 (incomplete).

VIRGINIA—*Newport News*.—Month of July, 1908. Estimated population, 28,749. Total number of deaths, 31, including enteric fever 6 and 4 from tuberculosis.

FOREIGN AND INSULAR.

QUARANTINE OF RUSSIAN EMIGRANTS AT CERTAIN PORTS IN EUROPE.

Information is received from the Department of State, under date of September 19, that on account of the appearance of cholera in Russia the following instructions have been sent to certain consular officers in Europe:

American Consul, Riga: Instruct Libau enforce paragraphs 30, 31, and 32, Quarantine Regulations, regarding detention of passengers and crew.

American Consul, London, England: Enforce paragraphs 30, 31, and 32, Quarantine Regulations, regarding detention steerage passengers from Russian points. Repeat to Southampton, Glasgow, Hamburg, Bremen, Antwerp, and Rotterdam.

[Note by the Bureau. The paragraphs cited relate to the treatment at ports of embarkation of passengers and crews from cholera infected districts and disinfection of baggage.]

CURRENT QUARANTINE MEASURES.

[From the Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes, Berlin, September 9, 1908.]

CHOLERA.

AUSTRIA.—The ministry of the interior has notified the municipal governments of Vienna, Brünn, and Lemberg to be in readiness to take measures to prevent introduction of cholera from Russia.

BULGARIA.—August 6. The city of Rostov on the Don declared cholera infected and the following measures ordered:

Vessels from the infected ports admitted only at Varna and Silistria. Free pratique will be allowed at Silistria only when vessels have undergone quarantine at Sulina. Passengers on such vessels are subject to medical inspection and to ten days' observation at their places of destination.

Vessels arriving at Varna shall undergo a five days' quarantine and be strictly disinfected. The bilge water shall be emptied, disinfected, and renewed. Passengers shall undergo five days' quarantine and ten days' observation at places of destination, with disinfection of their effects. No communication with a Bulgarian port shall be permitted to any vessel which has or has had en route a case of cholera on board. Vessels sailing under the Bulgarian flag which have cholera on board shall be admitted to free pratique only by special permit of the medical authorities. Merchandise from an infected port but not carried on an infected vessel shall be admitted at the expiration of fourteen days from date of shipment. Merchandise from noninfected ports of the Black Sea shall be admitted, provided they have not come in contact with infected materials or materials from an infected port. Importation is forbidden for used clothing and used body and bed clothing, old bags, animal raw products, such as hides, hair, etc.,

fruit and vegetables. Books and new journals may be admitted. Mail packages from infected ports not admitted. The local authorities shall keep a list of all persons allowed to land coming from an infected locality and subject to ten days' observation.

ITALY.—August 30. The port of Rostov on the Don declared cholera infected.

NETHERLANDS.—August 28. Taganrog declared cholera infected and five days' quarantine imposed.

NORWAY.—August 31. The Russian governments of Tambov, the Don Province and the city of Rostov, Astrakhan, Ufa, and Simbirsk declared cholera infected. Vessels arriving at ports in Norway with cholera on board shall repair to the quarantine station of Odderoen, near Christiansand.

ROUMANIA.—August 22. Entry from the Kirghis Steppe and Astrakhan is permitted to wash clothing, rags, and used clothing, etc., after disinfection of the same by means of steam. Pressed rags are admitted if packed in close bales and if they have been previously disinfected. When these requirements have not been complied with, sulphur disinfection shall be performed.

TURKEY.—August 29. Arrivals from Theodosia are subject at the lazaretto of Sinope to five days' disinfection. Vessels without passengers which come from Russia and which are subject only to medical inspection with disinfection of effects of crew, may carry out those measures on board and be admitted to the port of Trapezunt, provided (1) that they carry a certificated disinfecting apparatus operating with steam under pressure, and that the local authorities certify to the safety of intercourse, and (2) that they be provided with bath facilities for the crew. The prescribed shower bath shall be performed under the oversight of the sanitary officers.

PLAGUE.

BRITISH EAST INDIES.—August 4. Arrivals from Port Said subject to quarantine at Orissa.

EGYPT.—August 25. Arrivals from Adalia subject to plague regulations.

TURKEY.—August 22. Arrivals from Adalia subject to medical inspection at the first Ottoman port provided with a sanitary physician.

ALGERIA.

Deratization in ports.

The following is taken from the *Bulletin Sanitaire Bimensuelle*, Algiers, July 31:

Algiers.—July 16 to 31, 1908. Rodents taken by the maritime sanitary service 1,580; examined by the laboratory of health, 197; result negative. Classification of rats: *Mus norvegicus*, 137; *rattus*, 19; *musculus*, 22.

BARBADOS.

Report from Bridgetown—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Sanitary conditions—Quarantine against Trinidad raised.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Urquhart reports, September 12:

Week ended September 12. Bills of health issued to 7 vessels, with a total of 7 passengers and 271 members of crews. Sanitary condition of vessels, passengers, and crews good. Two vessels were fumigated.

Sanitary conditions remain good, no quarantinable diseases being reported for the week for the port or island.

Quarantine against Trinidad, maintained since June on account of plague, raised this week, that place having been officially declared free from infection.

BRAZIL.

Report from Rio de Janeiro—Inspection of vessels—Mortality—Plague and smallpox—Summary of smallpox in 1908—Spread of smallpox along railway lines.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Stewart reports, August 31:

Two weeks ended August 30. Vessels inspected and received bills of health: August 17, the British steamship *Thespis*, for New Orleans, in coffee cargo, with no passengers and no change in the personnel of the crew; August 19 the British steamship *Voltaire*, for New York, with coffee cargo, with no change in the crew personnel and with 19 cabin and 3 steerage passengers from this port, and with 26 cabin and 25 steerage passengers in transit; August 21 the German steamship *Corrientes*, for New York, with no change in the crew personnel, and in cargo of coffee, with 2 cabin and 1 steerage passengers; August 22 the British steamship *Norse Prince*, for New Orleans, in cargo of coffee, with no passengers, and no change in the crew; August 25 the British steamship *Afghan Prince*, for New York, in cargo of coffee, with 3 cabin passengers and no change in the crew, and August 28 the British steamship *Queen Eleanor*, for New York, in cargo of coffee, with no passengers and no change in the personnel of the crew.

All vessels lay in the open bay while in port.

Press reports indicate an extension of the epidemic of smallpox in Rio de Janeiro from that city to many of the stations along the Central Railway of Brazil, the line leading directly to São Paulo and indirectly to Santos. The outbreak of this disease in Santos and São Paulo is directly traceable to the infection from this city, which is, apart from railway communication, in daily communication with Santos by steamships of many lines.

Mortality in Rio de Janeiro.—Week ended August 23, 1908. Total estimated population, 811,443. Total deaths, 666. Smallpox caused 365 deaths. There were no cases or deaths of yellow fever. One case of plague and 651 cases of smallpox were reported. At the close of the week there were in the Hospital São Sebastião 485 cases of smallpox and 1 case of plague under treatment; in the Hospital Engenho de Dentro there were 144 cases of smallpox under treatment, and in the Hospital Paulo Candido 184 convalescents from smallpox.

Statistics of smallpox in Rio de Janeiro, 1908.—In my weekly report dated August 6, 1908, I gave the figures of the present epidemic of smallpox in this city up to and including the week ended August 2, 1908. There was a total to that date of 5,584 cases and 2,449 deaths. Since that date the figures have been as follows: Week ended August 9, 687 cases, 242 deaths; week ended August 16, 738 cases, 268 deaths; week ended August 23, 751 cases, 365 deaths.

The case of yellow fever in Habana terminated fatally at Las Animas Hospital on September 16, the autopsy confirming the diagnosis. (See Public Health Reports, September 18, page 1343, and September 25, page 1389.)

Drastic measures were adopted immediately on the announcement of this case, the entire district bordering on the water front being placed under extraordinary surveillance of the sanitary department.

All unemployed workmen have been segregated at Triscornia and the temperatures of nonimmunes remaining are taken several times daily, including one examination made between midnight and sunrise. Fumigations are carried out under the immediate direction of the chief of the superior board of health.

Quarantine was imposed September 16 by the United States against the port of Habana. All nonimmunes living in the city are now required to undergo detention at Triscornia before embarkation for southern ports, six days being demanded for those en route to points in Florida and five days for passengers proceeding to New Orleans or Galveston.

Persons from districts in the interior of Cuba, with the exception of the Province of Oriente, against which quarantine has been in force since April 6, 1908, may embark immediately on arrival in Habana, provided they submit satisfactory evidence of their continued residence for six days in the exempted territory.

Transports en route to Newport News, Va., are fumigated in open bay prior to taking on certified passengers, and allowed to clear without detention at either port.

The local quarantine established by the Cuban Government against Antilla, Oriente Province, on the appearance of yellow fever at that port, was raised on September 20, and the special sanitary squad withdrawn.

Modification of quarantine against Habana.

Doctor Amesse was instructed by the Bureau, September 30, as follows:

In view lapse 18 days since infective period last case yellow fever Habana, and no succeeding cases reported, authorized remove restrictions embarkations nonimmunes at Habana. Continue critical inspection passengers and crew and require good sanitary condition vessels. The quarantine restrictions against Province of Oriente continued in force until further notice.

Officers at Gulf and South Atlantic quarantine stations were notified, September 30, of this modification.

Report from Matanzas—Inspection and fumigation of vessels.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Nuñez reports, September 21:

FRANCE.

Precautions against importation of cholera from Russia by land and sea.

Assistant Surgeon Wollenberg, at Naples, reports, September 16 and 17:

The precautions regularly taken at Marseille of medical inspection and disinfection of all ships from the Black Sea are now applied to all ships from the Baltic.

Medical inspection stations for travelers from Russia have been established at Joumot and several smaller places. Arrangements have been made for the detention and isolation of infected persons. When authorized to continue travel, the persons are given health certificates, and their intended residences are registered in order that further observation may be continued.

GERMANY.

Reports from Berlin—Cholera in St. Petersburg—Status of cholera in Russia—Precautionary measures on Austrian frontier—Quarantine against arrivals from Russian ports.

The following information is received from Consul-General Thackara:

September 11. According to a dispatch dated September 10, the department of health of St. Petersburg has issued a bulletin stating that up to date there have been registered in the city 37 cases of cholera, with 12 deaths.

A further dispatch from Warsaw reports that cholera has already spread to the Vistula district. From the frontier station Pobwoloczyska it is reported that several persons from the infected districts of south Russia on their way to Vienna have been detained in Lemberg for a period of five days' observation.

September 12. The official organ of the German Government publishes the following statement regarding cholera in Russia:

Cholera first appeared in the Volga territory up-stream and broke out in Astrachan, Saratov, Samara, Simbirsk, Kasan, Nijni-Novgorod, Kostroma and Tver, then to the east in the Kirghis Steppe and the Government districts of Ufa and Perm, then spread westwards in the territory watered by the river Don and the Government district of Charkov, then northward and south of the Caucasus in the Kouban district and the Transcaucasian territory. During the past week the disease has spread to the west in the district watered by the Dnieper as far as Kief, also to Moscow and St. Petersburg. It broke out simultaneously in Baku and the Transcaspien district, and further in Siberia in the towns and villages watered by the Yenissei River.

The imperial German and the royal Prussian authorities are closely observing the eastern frontier.

Vessels arriving from Cronstadt and St. Petersburg, as well as from Russian ports in the Black Sea and the Sea of Asov, and calling at German ports, are detained and the passengers are required to undergo a strict medical examination before landing.

September 15. A dispatch dated September 14 states that during the past week there were registered in the whole of the Russian Empire 2,296 cases of cholera, with 1,026 deaths. Since the outbreak of the epidemic on July 21 there have occurred 6,747 cases of cholera, with 3,130 deaths.

September 16. The number of cases of cholera in St. Petersburg, officially stated, indicates a rapid spread of the disease in that city. During the period from noon September 14 to noon September 15 there were registered in St. Petersburg 240 fresh cases of cholera and 60 deaths. On September 15 there were 515 cholera patients in the city hospitals. In the suburbs of St. Petersburg the disease is also spreading in every direction, the Peterhof and Schlüsselburg districts having suffered most severely. Cronstadt has also been declared infected with cholera.

In some of the city hospitals the dead bodies of cholera patients have been lying for five days unburied. The physicians have proposed to make the cremation of corpses of cholera victims compulsory.

Disinfection on German frontier of Russian emigrants ordered.

The following information is received from the Department of State, under date of September 23:

A cablegram has this day been received from the consul-general at Berlin, reading as follows:

Prussian minister interior issued instructions dated September 18 for all control stations disinfect and bathe immigrants coming from Russia over frontier into Germany. Order goes into effect to-day.

Further relative to cholera in St. Petersburg.

The following is received from Passed Assistant Surgeon Grubbs, Berlin, under date of September 28:

During last day reported there were 143 deaths from cholera at St. Petersburg, with 268 cases; chief centers of infection, Rostov, Don Valley, Kouban, Gurjew, Astrakhan, and St. Petersburg; disease considered to be increasing. Immigrants inspected, disinfected, bathed at frontier, inspected at Berlin and port of departure. Detention by American authorities to complete five days from Russia. Inspection Russian vessels by sea and rivers.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Medical inspection at Gravesend, Liverpool, and other ports, of vessels arriving from Russia.

Assistant Surgeon Wollenberg at Naples, reports, September 17:

All ships from Russia destined to London are anchored at Gravesend for medical inspection. Similar inspections are made at Liverpool and other ports.

SMALLPOX IN VICINITY OF NAPLES.

During the week ended September 13, 1908, 7 cases of smallpox occurred at Piscinola, a small suburb about 4 miles from Naples. General vaccination is being carried out.

CHOLERA IN GALICIA.

A case of cholera is reported in Tarnopol, Galicia, Austria, in the person of a Russian immigrant.

Precautions against introduction of cholera into Italy from Russia by land and sea.

Doctor Wollenberg further reports, September 17 :

The danger of travelers, workmen, and emigrants importing cholera into Italy from Russia, where the disease is epidemic, has been anticipated by the Italian authorities. Large stores of sanitary supplies are on hand and all is in readiness at the frontier to erect detention camps, portable hospitals, disinfection apparatus of steam and formalin, and provisional bacteriological laboratories. The personnel can be mobilized at a moment's notice. The seaports are protected by a most efficient quarantine service.

MEXICO.

Report from City of Mexico—Yellow fever at Merida.

The following information is received from the president of the superior board of health ad interim:

September 19. Two new cases of yellow fever occurred September 18 in the city of Merida.

Reports from Progreso—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Sanitary conditions—Yellow fever at Merida.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Harrison reports, September 12 and 19:

Period September 5 to 12, inclusive. Vessels issued bills of health, 5; fumigated, 2; passengers from this port, 33, and crews, 213.

Sanitary conditions present no important changes since last report, although rain has occurred copiously and often, and mosquitoes are numerous and annoying.

In Merida at this date there are 2 new cases of yellow fever, both from the city and isolated in hospital lazaretto. These cases make in all 4 during this season in Yucatan, originating in Merida. To date there have been 2 deaths, one occurring August 25, the other September 4.

I am later informed that there are 2 cases of yellow fever in private residences in Merida in addition to those above named. Both are properly isolated. One of these is in a house in which yellow fever occurred seventeen or eighteen months ago.

Week ended September 19. Two steamships dispatched with fumigation and 2 without fumigation; passengers from this port 35, and members of crews 193.

No change in sanitary conditions at Progreso, but in Merida several new cases of yellow fever have been reported, all originating in the city.

PERSIA.

Report from Teheran—Precautions against the introduction of cholera and plague.

The following is received from the American legation, under date of August 24:

Persia is menaced with epidemics from three directions—on the east by India and on the west by Bagdad, with plague, and on the north by Russia with cholera, which has broken out at Astrakhan.

Medical officers stationed in the region of the Persian Gulf state that so far no case of plague has occurred at any of the ports within their range of inspection.

A quarantine station, which was established at Kasr-i-Shirin, on the Perso-Turkish frontier, commanding the highway between Bagdad and Teheran, in the spring of this year, but which had for some time been practically abandoned, is to be reopened, and stringent precautions are to be taken to arrest the progress of the disease.

In order to afford protection in the north against cholera at Astrakhan, quarantine posts are to be organized at Astara and Gez, the most western and eastern Persian ports on the Caspian Sea. Five or six days will apparently be the period of detention, unless cases of cholera should appear on any vessel, when the time would no doubt be prolonged.

PERU.

Two fatal cases of yellow fever at St. Vincent and 3 cases of smallpox at Grenada, British West Indies, were officially reported during the week ended September 12.

The steamship *Hillfern* bound for Fernandina and 15 days under way from Rio de Janeiro, arrived here September 12 and reported through the captain that one man (engineer) was taken off the ship with smallpox on the same day the vessel sailed from Rio. The ship was fumigated for 12 hours with a 5 per cent sulphur dioxide.

VENEZUELA.

Report from Caracas—Status of plague.

The following is received from the Department of State, under date of September 22:

This Department is in receipt of a report, dated September 6, from Mr. John Brewer, in charge of the archives of the American Legation at Caracas, in which he states that from unofficial sources he has gathered the following statistics concerning bubonic plague in that city:

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales*.—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended September 5, 1908, correspond to an annual rate of 14.6 per 1,000 population, which is estimated at 16,234,952.

London.—One thousand two hundred and forty deaths were registered during the week, including measles 15, scarlet fever 11, diphtheria 8, enteric fever 7, whooping cough 8, tuberculosis 151, and 265 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 13.5 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,849 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 1 from measles, 1 from scarlet fever, 6 from diphtheria, and 1 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended September 5, 1908, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 18.3 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,131,959. The lowest rate was recorded in Dundalk, viz, 8.0, and the highest in Tralee, viz, 42.3 per 1,000.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended September 5, 1908, correspond to an annual rate of 14.8 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,839,038. The highest rate of mortality was recorded in Perth, viz, 23.7, and the lowest in Aberdeen, viz, 12.0 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 523, including measles 4, enteric fever 2, diphtheria 3, scarlet fever 1, and 19 from whooping cough.

JAMAICA—Kingston.—Month of August, 1908. Estimated population, 52,065. Total number of deaths, 196, including enteric fever 21, and 16 from phthisis pulmonalis.
