Two squirrel fleas, common to this locality, namely, 1 specimen of the *Ceratophyllus acutus* and 1 specimen of the *Hoplopsyllus anomalus*, have been found on rats here. This is particularly interesting on account of the recent demonstration of plague in ground squirrels. Professor Doane reports having found the *Hoplopsyllus anomalus* on rats at Stanford University.

OF THE UNITED STATES—UNTABULATED.

CONNECTICUT—*Bridgeport*.—Month of September, 1908. Estimated population, 100,000. Total number of deaths, 98, including diphtheria 1, and 15 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 7, enteric fever 7, scarlet fever 5, and phthisis pulmonalis 3.

FLORIDA.—Reports from the state board of health for the two weeks ended October 17, 1908, show as follows: Enteric fever—*Jacksonville*, 3 cases, and *Tampa* 1 case. Tuberculosis—*Jacksonville* 5, *Manatee* 2, *Orlando*, *Plant City*, *West Tampa*, *Tampa*, *De Funiak Springs*, and *Tallahassee*, each 1 case. Diphtheria—*Jacksonville* 6, *Tampa* 3, *Tallahassee* 4, *Pensacola* 2, *River Junction*, *Leesburg*, *Bartow*, each 1 case. Smallpox—*Port Tampa City* 4; scarlet fever—*Starke*, 1 case.

ILLINOIS—*Alton*.—Month of September, 1908. Estimated population, 22,000. Total number of deaths, 13, including 4 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 3.

NEBRASKA—*Lincoln*.—Month of September, 1908. Estimated population, 60,000. Total number of deaths, 34, including 1 from enteric fever. Cases: Diphtheria 3, scarlet fever 1, and measles 1.

NEW YORK—*Troy*.—Month of September, 1908. Estimated population, 77,650. Total number of deaths, 121, including enteric fever 2 and 17 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 26, diphtheria 6, and tuberculosis 10.

OREGON—*Portland*.—Month of August, 1908. Estimated population, 175,000. Total number of deaths, 143, including enteric fever 7, diphtheria 1, scarlet fever 1, and 15 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 18, enteric fever 22, measles 3, smallpox 22, and scarlet fever 5.

UTAH.—Month of September, 1908. Reports to the state board of health from 27 counties, having an estimated population of 346,873, show as follows: Total number of deaths, 322, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 12, whooping cough 3, scarlet fever 2, and 10 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 49, enteric fever 189, measles 18, scarlet fever 19, smallpox 16, whooping cough 117, and tuberculosis 17 (incomplete).

VIRGINIA—*Newport News*.—Month of September, 1908. Estimated population, 28,749. Total number of deaths, 26, including whooping cough 1, enteric fever 2, and 1 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 8.

WEST VIRGINIA—Charleston.—Month of September, 1908. Estimated population, 26,000, Total number of deaths, 15, including enteric fever 1 and 2 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 7, scarlet fever 1, enteric fever 7, and tuberculosis 2.

COLOMBIA.

Report from Barranquilla—No restrictions on traffic between Barranquilla and Trinidad—Restrictions in force at La Guaira.

Consul Eberhardt reports, September 30:

The restrictions that have been enforced for several months past against the ports of Trinidad and La Guaira are now being modified or done away with entirely.

The steamship *Atrato*, of the Royal Mail Line, which called at Trinidad to discharge cargo and leave mail and passengers, but accepting neither cargo nor passengers, was given pratique here September 19, and the French steamship *La Normandie*, coming directly from La Guaira, was received here yesterday. The passengers were allowed to disembark without any medical examination and there was no disinfection of the vessel. No precautionary measures of any kind were taken.

No restrictions are placed upon the traffic between Trinidad and this port. In La Guaira, passengers before being permitted to embark for Barranquilla are required to obtain a certificate from the Colombian consul at that port to the effect that they have resided in that city continuously for at least ten days prior to sailing, the supposition being that they are free from any infection, as plague is believed to exist only at Caracas. There is no disinfection carried on either at La Guaira or Barranquilla.

Sanitary conditions in the city of Habana continue excellent.

The local chief of sanitation reports for the week 11,800 house inspections and the detection of 57 deposits containing mosquito larvæ. Of these, 31 were collections of the larvæ of *Stegomyia calopus*.

Report from Matanzas—Inspection and fumigation of vessels.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Nunez reports, October 19:

Week ended October 17. During this period 2 vessels, leaving this harbor for United States ports, were granted bills of health. One of these was fumigated.

No quarantinable diseases have been reported within this district.

Assistant Surgeon Wightman reports, October 4, through Passed Assistant Surgeon Lloyd:

Week ended September 19. One steamship, with a personnel of 115 crew, 32 cabin and 25 steerage passengers, was fumigated and received bill of health.

Week ended September 26. Two steamships, with an aggregate personnel of 197 crew, 70 cabin and 61 steerage passengers, were fumigated and received bills of health.

During the week ended September 19, 1 death from smallpox occurred, and during the week ended September 26, 1 death from smallpox.

Plague has appeared in Babahoyo, a port on the Daule River, about 40 miles inland from Guayaquil. Four cases and 1 death have been reported. The special commission on sanitation has sent a medical officer with assistants to institute sanitary measures in the port.

GERMANY.

Report from Berlin—Status of cholera in Russia.

The following is received from Consul-General Thackara, under date of October 8:

According to a bulletin published in the official gazette of September 20, there have been registered since the beginning of this year's epidemic up to September 19, in the whole of the Russian Empire, 10,359 cases of cholera, with 4,633 deaths. Of these 4,633 deaths, 492 occurred in the city of St. Petersburg and its suburbs, and 9 elsewhere in the government district of St. Petersburg, including 5 deaths in the city of Schlüsselburg.

There were 459 deaths in the city of Rostov on the Don, and 796 deaths in other parts of the Don region; 727 in the government district of Astrakhan, including 350 in the city of the same name; 637 deaths in the government district of Saratov, including 355 in the city of Zarizyn; 276 in the government district of Samara; 255 in the government district of Nishni-Novgorod, including 174 in the city of the same name; 280 in the Ural territory; 199 in the Kuban territory; 54 in the government district of Kostroma; 46 in the government district of Tiflis, including 41 in the city of the same name; 46 in the government district of Kief, including 33 in the city of the same name; 45 in the district of Kasan; 48 in Baku; 22 in Kertsch-Yenikale; 34 in the government district of Ikaterinoslav, including 16 in the city of the same name; 33 in the government district of Jaroslav; 26 in the Government district of Poltava, including 20 in the city of Kremenschug; 22 in the Syr Darja territory, including 14 in the city of Taschkend; 17 in the government district of Simbirsk; 13 in the Terek district, and 13 in Tambov, 12 in Perm, 10 in Voronesch, etc., and 4 in the city of Odessa.

Examination for trachoma at San Pedro.

Doctor Ames further reports:

An examination of school children for trachoma was made at San Pedro, Honduras, September 25, by a medical commission under the personal supervision of the governor of the Department of Cortez. The examination showed 69 cases of trachoma among 192 children. The governor has since directed a general and thorough investigation to be made to ascertain the extent of the prevalence of the disease among the population, and whether trachoma exists only as an imported disease among the large Syrian population of San Pedro or is present among natives. The commission examined the cadets at the military academy, finding among the 48 cadets 4 fully developed cases of trachoma. These cases were natives of San Pedro and Choloma, a neighboring town. The examination is expected to result in an amendment to the immigration laws of the Republic of Honduras forbidding the landing of aliens suffering with trachoma.

Report from Yokohama—Inspection of vessels—Plague in China—Cholera at Moji—Plague on island of Awaji, vicinity of Kobe.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Cumming reports, October 1:

Bills of health were issued during the week ended September 26 to 5 vessels having an aggregate personnel of 78 cabin passengers, 214 steerage passengers and 503 members of crew.

The crew of the steamship *Benvenue*, for Manila, were bathed, their effects disinfected, and the forecabin, etc., cleaned.

During the month ended September 30, 105 would-be emigrants were inspected, of whom 84 were passed, 71 of those passed being certified. One hundred and thirty-seven persons were bathed and 293 pieces of baggage disinfected.

There has been no quarantinable disease reported in this city. The authorities are very vigilant against the introduction of cholera from Moji, at which place there have been 70 cases, besides others in the neighborhood.

Plague is reported raging in Chang Shan, China, near Tientsin and Peking. This place is also near Ching Wang Tao, the great winter port of north China, whence vessels are now sailing to America.

A severe epidemic of plague is reported on the Island of Awaji, near Kobe. Forty-eight cases, all but 5 fatal, have already been reported.

Examination of emigrants.

Number of emigrants per steamship *Kaga Maru* examined October 2: For Seattle, rejected, 2; advised to wait, 5.

Per steamship *Siberia* October 2: For Honolulu, advised to wait, 3. Of these rejections and detentions all were for trachoma.

Reports from Kobe—Inspection of vessels—Plague—Cholera at Moji—Plague in vicinity of Kobe—Dysentery.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Slade reports, September 24 and 29:

During the week ended September 19 supplemental bills of health were granted to 2 steamships.

Fifty-three members of crews and 74 steerage passengers were inspected. Twenty-seven steerage passengers were bathed and disinfected and their effects were disinfected by steam. The number of pieces of baggage steamed was 77 and of bedding 60. Manifests were viséed for 36,684 pieces of freight, amounting to 3,406 tons.

Emigrants were examined as follows: Steamship *America-Maru* for Honolulu, passed 24, recommended for rejection, 12; steamship *America-Maru* for San Francisco, passed 3, recommended for rejection, 1.

The official returns of infectious diseases for the week show that there was reported in Kobe 1 death from plague.

Thirty-nine cases of cholera have been reported at Moji, 320 miles southwest of Kobe. As the water supply there is poor, the steamship companies concerned at Kobe have been warned by this office that their vessels should not be allowed to take on drinking water nor any other water unless absolutely necessary at that port.

During the week ended September 26, 1 supplemental bill of health and 2 original bills of health were issued.

Seventy members of crews and 1 steerage passenger were inspected. Fifty-seven members of crew were bathed and disinfected and their effects were disinfected by steam. The number of pieces of baggage steamed was 152. Manifests were viséed for 4,552 pieces of freight, amounting to 683 tons.

Five cases of plague during the last five weeks have broken out at the town of Nishinomiya, 15 miles east of Kobe, and at Yura on the island of Awaji, 35 miles south of Kobe, there were reported 46 cases of the same disease. The report is dated September 24. The outbreak began August 25.

Dysentery has assumed a serious form in Kobe recently. Twenty-two fresh cases appeared during the week ended September 19. Twenty-five cases are now under treatment.

Report from Nagasaki—Status of cholera at Moji and Wakamatsu.

The following is received from the Department of State, under date of October 21:

At Moji, from September 2 to 15, 33 cases and 11 deaths are reported; at Wakamatsu, from August 25 to September 15, 6 cases and 3 deaths are reported.

One of the patients from Lima escaped from the hospital. Since last report 4 cases of plague have occurred in Callao; 1 of these died in hospital.

Plague in Salaverry has abated, but in the province of Trujillo the conditions are unchanged. In Lima and Callao the situation has not changed. Callao had 6 plague cases in June, 6 in July, 5 in August, and 5 in September to date. Reports from Lima show widespread infection.

Smallpox in Callao has ceased to occur among the soldiers. There were 11 cases at the hospital in Lima.

Bill of health reports plague in Chile as follows: Iquique, report dated September 21, 4 cases during the past two weeks and 6 cases in the lazaretto.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

*Reports from Manila—Status of cholera in Manila and the Provinces—

Chief Quarantine Officer McClintic reports, September 8 and 17:

Week ended September 5. Twenty-two cases of cholera, with 19 deaths, were reported in Manila. The cholera situation in the city of Manila does not show much improvement when the number of cases reported is considered, yet the situation on the whole is better, and it is believed that the increased vigilance of the health inspectors has lessened the number of unreported cases, which, in turn, augments the number of cases certified as cholera on the daily reports of diseases.

During the past four weeks there has been a steady improvement in all the provinces except Iloilo and Ilocos Sur. There are nearly as many cases reported, but fewer infected towns, and the epidemic is rapidly being controlled. The spread of the disease has been greatly retarded during the last few weeks. Smallpox.—At the inspection of the British steamship *Changsha*, which arrived at the port of Manila on September 5, an advanced and well-marked case of smallpox was detected among the steerage passengers. The smallpox patient was removed to the San Lazaro Hospital at Manila, and the vessel was remanded to Mariveles, where the crew and passengers were vaccinated and the necessary disinfection was accomplished.

During the week consular bills of health were issued at the port of Manila as follows:

August 31 the British steamship *Ning Chow*, with 94 in the crew and 3 passengers, en route from Glasgow to Seattle and Tacoma, was granted a supplemental bill of health after the usual inspection of personnel and cargo. September 2 the British steamship *Sierra Blanca*, with 33 in the crew, en route from New York to Cebu and Iloilo, was granted a supplemental bill of health. September 4 the British steamship *Erroll*, with 45 in the crew and 2 passengers, en route from Yokohama to New York, was granted a supplemental bill of health, after the usual inspection of cargo and personnel.

Week ended September 12: Thirty-four cases of cholera with 30 deaths, and 4 cases of smallpox with 1 death, occurred in the city of Manila.
