SUMMARY, OCTOBER, 1908.

November 7. During the month of October, 17 vessels were fumigated and 42 inspected at this port.

During the month 1 rat was determined to be infected with plague. It was caught September 26 in a snap trap on the water front in a grain warehouse. The problem of rat protection and rat extermination in this locality is a very perplexing one by reason of the construction of the streets and business houses on wooden piling. The city trappers placed about 7 dozen traps beneath the 1200 block from Western avenue to the water's edge, and about 4 dozen snap traps were placed in the buildings of this block. Poisons were also placed in this district. One hundred and ninety-six rats were brought in from this district during the month, 16 of which had been picked up dead. Many of these latter were too badly decomposed to admit of any examination. No other plague-infected rats were found during the month. An effort is being made by the city trappers to cover all the district on the water front beneath the piling, as well as above, and to this end, in addition to the above-mentioned traps, 6 traps, mostly cage traps, have been set in each block. Five hundred and sixty rats have been brought in from the water front during the month, including those from the 1200 block.

Summary of plague laboratory work for month of October, 1908.

Assistant Surgeon Chapin reports, November 5, through Passed Assistant Surgeon Glover:

November 5. The following is a report of the work done in the plague laboratory for the month of October, 1908:

During the month 5,534 rats were delivered at the laboratory, of which 4,054 were necropsied. No evidence of plague infection was found. The verification was completed during the month of a plague rat delivered September 26.

The summary of the work to date comprises 3 human and 21 rat cases. The last human case was discovered October 25, 1907, and the last plague-infected rat was delivered September 26, 1908.

CALIFORNIA.—Month of September, 1908. Estimated population, 2,001,193. Total number of deaths reported to the state board of health, 2,369, including diphtheria 25, enteric fever 61, measles 2, scarlet fever 5, whooping cough 10, smallpox 1, and 358 from tuberculosis.

COLORADO—*Colorado Springs*.—Months of August and September, 1908. Estimated population, 32,000. Total number of deaths, 84, including enteric fever 1, scarlet fever 2, whooping cough 2, diphtheria 2, and 33 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 29, diphtheria 7, enteric fever 21, and whooping cough 3.

FLORIDA.—Reports from the state board of health for the week ended November 7, 1908, show as follows: Enteric fever—*Bartow* and *Jacksonville*, each 1 case. Tuberculosis—*Jacksonville*, *Tampa*, and *Manatee*, each 1 case. Diphtheria—*Bradentown*, 2; *Jacksonville*, and *Tampa*, each 4 cases; *Plant City*, *Miami*, and *Tallahassee* and *Mahatee*, each 1 case.

ILLINOIS—*Alton*.—Month of October, 1908. Estimated population, 22,000. Total number of deaths, 10, including diphtheria 1, and 1 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 3.

Jacksonville.—Month of October, 1908. Estimated population, 17,500. Total number of deaths, 23. Cases: Diphtheria 5.

Quincy.—Month of October, 1908. Estimated population, 43,000. Total number of deaths, 59, including enteric fever 1, and 5 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 14, enteric fever 2, and scarlet fever 1.

INDIANA.—Month of September, 1908. Estimated population, 2,648,594. Total number of deaths, 2,755, including tuberculosis 318, enteric fever 118, diphtheria 29, scarlet fever 5, measles 1, and 21 from whooping cough.

Morbidity: Diphtheria, 352 cases in 32 counties; enteric fever, 446 cases in 76 counties; smallpox, 32 cases in 8 counties; tuberculosis, 318.

IOWA—*Davenport*.—Month of October, 1908. Estimated popu-

lation, 40,000. Total number of deaths not reported. Cases: Diphtheria 32, enteric fever 6, measles 95, tuberculosis 1, whooping cough 2, and smallpox 1.

Sioux City.—Month of October, 1908. Estimated population 50,000. Total number of deaths not reported. Cases: Diphtheria 3, enteric fever 3, and scarlet fever 1.

NEW JERSEY.—Reports to the state board of health for the month ended October 15, 1908, show a total of 2,904 deaths, including diphtheria 34, enteric fever 34, measles 1, scarlet fever 18, whooping cough 21, and 298 from tuberculosis.

Morristown.—Month of October, 1908. Estimated population 12,500. Total number of deaths, 18. Cases: Enteric fever 1, scarlet fever 3, and diphtheria 1.

Perth Amboy.—Month of May, 1908. Estimated population, 28,000. Total number of deaths, 23, including diphtheria 2, and two from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 3, scarlet fever 3, measles 24.

NEW YORK.—Month of September, 1908. Estimated population, 8,546,356. Reports to the state department of health show as follows: Total number of deaths, 11,069, corresponding to an annual death rate of 15.5 per 1,000 of the population, including enteric fever 195, measles 17, scarlet fever 33, whooping cough 45, diphtheria 140, smallpox 1, and 1,258 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 1,415, enteric fever 1,197, measles 449, scarlet fever 972, smallpox 5, and tuberculosis 2,657.

Buffalo.—Month of October, 1908. Estimated population, 410,000. Total number of deaths, 632, including diphtheria 17, scarlet fever 10, enteric fever 18, whooping cough 5, and 48 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 136, enteric fever 66, measles 20, scarlet fever 326, whooping cough 18, and tuberculosis 56.

Saratoga Springs.—Month of October, 1908. Estimated population, 11,822. Total number of deaths, 12, including 2 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 2, diphtheria 2, and tuberculosis 3.

NORTH CAROLINA.—Month of September, 1908. Estimated population, 1,893,810. Reports of state board of health from 74 counties show as follows: Measles in 5 counties, whooping cough in 16 counties, scarlet fever in 25 counties, diphtheria in 39 counties, enteric fever in 59 counties, malarial fever in 17 counties, pernicious malarial fever in 6 counties, hemorrhagic malarial fever in 5 counties, and smallpox in 3 counties, viz: Currituck, several; McDowell, 6, and Nash, 4.

Charlotte.—Month of October, 1908. Estimated population, 40,000. Total number of deaths, 57, including enteric fever 1, and 11 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 7, scarlet fever 3.

OHIO—Cleveland.—Month of September, 1908. Estimated population, 515,000. Total number of deaths, 522, including diphtheria 7,

enteric fever 5, measles 2, scarlet fever 1, and 38 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases not reported.

Zanesville.—Month of October, 1908. Estimated population, 30,000. Total number of deaths, 28, including 5 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 7, scarlet fever 2.

PENNSYLVANIA—*South Bethlehem.*—Month of November, 1908. Estimated population, 18,000. Total number of deaths, 15. Cases: Scarlet fever 1, enteric fever 3, diphtheria 1, and whooping cough 1.

TENNESSEE—*Nashville.*—Month of October, 1908. Estimated population, 124,769. Total number of deaths, 152, including enteric fever 3, diphtheria 6, and 24 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 42, scarlet fever 28, smallpox 1, and enteric fever 67.

UTAH—*Salt Lake.*—Month of October, 1908. Estimated population, 85,000. Total number of deaths 96, corresponding to an annual death rate of 13.56 per 1,000. Deaths: Enteric fever 5, diphtheria 2, and 5 from tuberculosis. Cases: Smallpox 14, scarlet fever 11, diphtheria 9, measles 1, enteric fever 25, and whooping cough 15.

VIRGINIA—*Newport News.*—Month of October, 1908. Estimated population, 28,749. Total number of deaths, 24, including enteric fever 2, diphtheria 1, and 4 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 18.

WASHINGTON—*Seattle.*—Month of September, 1908. Estimated population, 276,562. Total number of deaths, 172, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 5, and 16 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 35, measles 9, enteric fever 100, scarlet fever 14, smallpox 1, tuberculosis 15.

WISCONSIN—*Oshkosh.*—Month of October, 1908. Estimated population, 30,000. Total number of deaths, 43. Cases: Enteric fever 2, scarlet fever 4, and diphtheria 9.

BARBADOS.

Report from Bridgetown—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Sanitary conditions.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Urquhart reports, October 31:

Week ended October 31. Eleven vessels were inspected, of which 2 were fumigated. Number of passengers inspected 188; members of crews 489. The sanitary condition of this port remains good, no quarantinable diseases having been reported for the port or island for the week.

BELGIUM.

Report from Antwerp—Measures to prevent propagation of cholera by Russian emigrants in transit to the United States.

The following is received from Consul-General Dietrich, under date of October 20:

Every precaution is being taken by the authorities in Belgium to prevent the propagation of cholera by Russian emigrants passing through this seaport on their way to the United States. The Russian Government is obliged, by special agreement made in recent years, to continuously report to the German authorities whenever and wherever there is an outbreak of cholera within its territory. The officials of the German Government and the Prussian railways provide for measures of the utmost vigilance on the Russian border and for careful inspection of every emigrant on his way to a continental seaport.

On arriving at Antwerp all Russian emigrants are at present detained for five days. Before they are allowed to enter the city and repair to their lodging houses they are scrupulously examined by physicians appointed by the Belgian Government. When the five days of quarantine are over, the Russian emigrants are again inspected with the other steerage passengers and then allowed to go on board the steamship.

BRAZIL.

Week ended October 11: October 6, the British steamship *Byron*, for New York, with a cargo of coffee, 26 cabin and 4 steerage passengers, and no change in the crew personnel; October 7, the British steamship *Brookwood*, in water ballast, for some southern port, with no passengers and no change in the crew; October 8, the Italian bark *Maria de Bilbao*, for Brunswick, in stone and sand ballast, with no passengers and no change in crew; on the same date, the British steamship *Maltby*, for some southern port, in water ballast, with no passengers and no change in the crew personnel; October 10, the British steamship *Cameron*, for some southern port, in water ballast, with no passengers and no change in the crew personnel; and October 9, the Portuguese bark *Soares da Costa*, for New Orleans, in stone and sand ballast, with no passengers and 3 new members of her crew taken on in this port.

Week ended October 18: October 13, the British steamship *Cavour*, for New Orleans, in cargo of coffee, no passengers, and with no change in the personnel of the crew; October 14, the British steamship *Ocean Prince*, for New Orleans, in cargo of coffee, no passengers and 2 new members of the crew signed on here; on the same date, the British steamship *Barkston*, for Pensacola, in water ballast, with no passengers and with no change in personnel; October 16, the Italian bark *Vandura*, for Pensacola, in stone and sand ballast, with no passengers, and with 10 new members of the crew signed on in this port. No other vessels requiring inspection left during the week.

Mortality in city of Rio de Janeiro.—Week ended October 4. Total census population, 1907, 628,675. Total deaths, 534. Plague caused 2 deaths, with 10 new reported cases; smallpox, 262 deaths, with 585 new reported cases, of which number 165 were in the suburban zone of the city. At the close of the week there were in the Hospital São Sebastião, 414 cases of smallpox and 6 of plague; in the Hospital de Engenho de Dentro, 197 cases of smallpox, and in the Hospital Paula Candido, 174 convalescents from smallpox.

Week ended October 11. Total deaths, 529. No cases nor deaths due to yellow fever. Plague caused 3 deaths, with 6 new reported cases. Smallpox caused 227 deaths, with 418 new reported cases, of which number 124 were in the suburban zone. At the close of the week there were in the Hospital São Sebastião, 336 cases of smallpox, and 8 cases of plague under treatment. In the Hospital Engenho de Dentro, 156 cases of smallpox. In the Hospital Paulo Candido, 202 convalescent cases of smallpox.

Week ended October 18. Total deaths during the week, 459. Yellow fever caused no deaths nor were there any cases reported.

Plague caused 2 deaths with 5 new reported cases, and smallpox caused 163 deaths with 417 new reported cases, of which number 147 were in the suburban district. At the close of the week there were in the Hospital São Sebastião, 305 cases of smallpox and 7 cases of plague; in the Hospital Engenho de Dentro, 166 cases of smallpox under treatment; in the Hospital Paulo Candido, 235 convalescent cases of smallpox. The epidemic seems to be slowly abating.

Consul Van Sant reports, November 10:

A mild epidemic of smallpox prevails at Kingston. There are 23 cases in the isolation hospital and about 10 cases under quarantine in

their homes throughout the city. The cases are of a mild type, and no serious results have occurred. Every precaution is being taken for proper quarantine.

CHINA.

Reports from Shanghai—Inspection of vessels—Cholera—Quarantine against Amoy removed—Cholera at Hankau declining.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, October 13:

During the week ended October 3 original and supplemental bills of health were granted to 5 steamships with an aggregate personnel of 940. Bills of health were granted to the United States men-of-war *Villaloba* and *Callan*.

The passengers from this port per Pacific Mail steamships *China* and *Manchuria* were inspected.

There were inspected 1 vessel, 94 members of crew, and 32 steerage passengers. Nine pieces of personal baggage were disinfected and 37 pieces passed and labeled.

Cholera is present here, chiefly among natives. One foreigner died of the disease two weeks ago. Smallpox is diminishing.

During the week ended October 10, 1 original and 1 supplemental bill of health were issued to 2 steamships with an aggregate personnel of 369. There were inspected 1 vessel, 66 members of crews, 2 cabin and 1 steerage passenger. There were disinfected by steam the effects of 57 members of crews and 1 steerage passenger. Fifty-seven men were bathed. The forecabin of 1 vessel was mechanically cleaned.

Manifests were viséed for 404 pieces of freight, amounting to 33 tons.

The authorities here have removed the quarantine restrictions against Amoy, that port having been declared free on September 30 from cholera and plague in epidemic form.

The cholera epidemic at Hankau has subsided. There are now occurring only a few sporadic cases each week.

The work is being accomplished by clearing the mangroves, which are chopped in short pieces, and placing over them successive layers of rock, soil, and the sweepings from the city, forming a firm ground.

The sanitary conditions in this city and Tokyo are excellent.

A severe epidemic of dysentery is present in Kagawa ken, a prefecture on Shikoku Island, opposite Kobe. There are 7,000 cases in Kagawa, while in this ken only 5 cases of dysentery are reported for the month up to October 19.

There are only a few cases of cholera in Moji.

Examination of emigrants.

Number of emigrants per steamship *Manchuria* October 11: For Honolulu, rejected 1; advised to wait, 1.

Per steamship *Hongkong* October 20: For Honolulu, 1; advised to wait, 3.

Per steamship *Minnesota* October 23: For Seattle, advised to wait, 3. Rejections and detentions were for trachoma.

Report from Kobe—Inspection of vessels—Examination of emigrants.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Slade reports, October 22:

Week ended October 17. Supplemental bills of health granted to 4 steamships.

One hundred and fifty-four members of crew and 129 steerage passengers were inspected. Forty-nine members of crews and 36 steerage passengers were bathed and disinfected. Since my last report only 1 case of plague has occurred in Callao. No new cases of smallpox have been reported in Callao. In Lima there are 8 cases of smallpox in the lazaretto. Bills of health for Chile report 1 case of plague, October 6, in the lazaretto at Iquique.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

Report from Manila—Status of cholera in Manila and the provinces—Disinfection of transport Sheridan on account of cholera—Inspection of vessels.

Chief Quarantine Officer McClintic reports, September 29 and October 6:

Week ended September 26. There were during the week 314 cases of cholera, with 184 deaths, and 4 cases of smallpox, with 1 death in the city of Manila.

During the first of the week the cholera epidemic seemed to reach its maximum, there being 59 cases reported September 20, but since that date the number of cases has gradually decreased.

The bureau of health is taking very energetic steps to stamp out the disease, and with a large force of men is using large quantities of formalin, carbolic acid, and lime in disinfecting the infected districts. Results of their campaign are already becoming manifest by the large decrease in the daily number of cases, and, furthermore, the virulence of the disease is decreasing, as is evidenced by the diminishing mortality.

September 21 the United States Army transport *Sheridan*, with 181 in the crew, 148 cabin passengers, and 258 steerage passengers, was granted a bill of health for San Francisco via Nagasaki and Honolulu, after having been twice disinfected and held in quarantine for seven days on account of 2 cases of cholera having occurred on board in the persons of a passenger and of a member of the crew. September 23 the British steamship *Jesseric*, with 55 in the crew and 38 passengers, en route from Yokohama to Boston and New York via Cebu, was granted a supplemental bill of health after the usual inspection of personnel and cargo.

Week ended October 3. Sixty-seven cases of cholera with 33 deaths, and 1 case of smallpox were reported for the city of Manila.

Acting Assistant Surgeon DeForrest reports, November 2:

The steamship *Korea* sailed from this port October 27, with 10 officers, 80 members of crew, 31 cabin passengers, and 567 steerage passengers; total, 688. All had been in Libau for 5 days previous to sailing and were examined previous to embarkation.

Two weeks ended October 31. The sanitary condition of this port and vicinity is good; no quarantinable diseases exist.

VENEZUELA.

Report from Caracas—Status of plague.

The following is received from Mr. John Brewer, in charge of the archives of the legation, through the Department of State, under date of October 31:

No new cases of bubonic plague have been reported in this city for the past 16 days. At present 8 patients are undergoing treatment in the quarantine hospital.

London.—One thousand two hundred and twelve deaths were registered during the week, including measles 15, scarlet fever 6, diphtheria 11, enteric fever 5, whooping cough 11, tuberculosis 121, and 70 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 12.4 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,671 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 1 from measles, 5 from diphtheria, 1 from scarlet fever, 2 from enteric fever, and 19 from diarrhea.

Salford.—Week ended October 24, 1908. Estimated population, 239,294. Total number of deaths, 77, including scarlet fever, 1, diphtheria 4, measles 1, and 7 from diarrhea.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended October 24, 1908, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 16.2 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,131,959. The lowest rate was recorded in Lisburn, viz, 4.5, and the highest in Tralee, viz, 26.4 per 1,000.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended October 24, 1908, correspond to an annual rate of 13.3 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,839,038. The highest rate of mortality was recorded in Leith, viz, 14.8, and the lowest in Perth, viz, 7.4 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 467, including diphtheria 8, measles 2, scarlet fever 4, whooping cough 8, and 31 from diarrhea.
