UNITED STATES.

International Congress of Tuberculosis.

Following are the contents of a letter, dated December 26, 1907, sent by the Surgeon-General to State, county, and municipal health officers:

The prevention of tuberculosis is engaging the increasing attention of public health authorities and philanthropists throughout the world. There is certainly no more important public health question demanding the activities of sanitary officers at the present time, and it is desirable that our people generally recognize its importance and enlist in the campaign against tuberculosis. The diffusion of knowledge with respect to the disease is no doubt one of the most important measures that can be instituted by public health officials. With the view to this end, an international congress on tuberculosis will be held in Washington, D. C., September 21 to October 12, 1908. At this congress all phases of the problem will be considered, a number of eminent specialists from abroad having signified their intention to participate in the deliberations.

Section VI will be devoted to the national, State, and municipal control of the disease, and it is urged that all public health officials attend its session, participate in the benefits to be derived from discussions of the governmental responsibilities and activities, and as a result be better prepared to assist in a systematic campaign against

the disease throughout the country.

STATISTICAL REPORTS OF MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY, STATES AND CITIES OF THE UNITED STATES—UNTABULATED.

CALIFORNIA—Sacramento.—Month of December, 1907. Estimated population, 40,000. Total number of deaths, 67, including diphtheria 2, scarlet fever 1, and 13 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 6, scarlet fever 8, and varioloid 2.

FLORIDA.—Reports from the State board of health for the week ended January 25, show as follows: Diphtheria—Pensacola 1 case. Enteric fever—Bartow 1 case. Tuberculosis—Jacksonville 3 cases, Newberry 1 case, New Berlin 1 case, Tallahassee 1 case, Tampa 1 case, Welborn 1 case, Warrington 1 case.

CONNECTICUT—Bridgeport.—Month of December, 1907. Estimated population, 100,000. Total number of deaths, 115, including diphtheria 3, scarlet fever 1, and 13 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 15, enteric fever 1, measles 8, scarlet fever 6, and phthisis pulmonalis 9.

ILLINOIS—Rockford.—Month of December, 1907. Estimated population, 45,000. Total number of deaths, 39; including diphtheria, 4; scarlet fever, 1; and 1 from phthisis pulmonalis. Cases: Diphtheria, 24; scarlet fever, 7.

MICHIGAN.—Month of December, 1907. There were 2,767 deaths returned to the department of state as having occurred during the month of December, which corresponds to an annual death rate of 12.5 per 1,000 estimated population. There was an increase of 183 over November, but a decrease of 200 from the number returned for the corresponding month of 1906.

Important causes of death were as follows: Pulmonary tuberculosis, 165; other forms of tuberculosis, 29; typhoid fever, 43; diphtheria and croup, 44; scarlet fever, 23; measles, 9; whooping cough, 10.

PENNSYLVANIA—Towandq.—Year 1907. Census population, 4,663. Total number of deaths, 66; including diphtheria, 2; enteric fever, 1. Cases: Diphtheria, 21; enteric fever, 2; and scarlet fever, 5.

CURRENT QUARANTINE MEASURES.

[From the Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes, Berlin, January 15, 1908.]

CHOLERA.

EGYPT.—December 28. Cholera regulations applied at Egyptian ports to arrivals from the Hedjaz.

Norway.—January 4. The Russian governments of Astrachan, Perm, Viatka, Vladimir, Riasan, Jenneseisk, Stavropol, and Irkutsch,

and the Transbaikal Territory, declared free of cholera.

Turkey.—January 1. Vessels from the Russian ports of the Black Sea without pilgrims shall be subject on arrival at Kavak to medical inspection. If the said medical inspection shall show cholera or suspect cholera on board, the vessels shall repair to the lazaretto at Sinope, where the sick shall be transshipped and the prescribed measures carried out. If the inspection is favorable, the vessels may carry out the prescribed measures at the lazaretto at Monastir-Aghzy.

PLAGUE.

British East Indies.—December 13. Quarantine measures applied

at Orissa against arrivals from Djeddah.

GERMAN EMPIRE.—January 6. The governments of the maritime States directed by Government circular to enforce sanitary police treatment of vessels from Lourenço Marquez. Measures against Philippeville suspended. Medical inspection ordered for vessels arriving from:

1. Turkish ports of Asia Minor on the Ægean Sea and the Med-

iterranean Sea, especially from the Gulf of Smyrna.

2. Ports of the Red Sea, the Suez Canal, and the Egyptian ports of the Mediterranean Sea.

Spain.—December 7. Arrivals from all Morocco admitted since it has been determined that the disease in the Gomera-Kabyle is not plague but typhus fever.

Sweden.—January 2. City of Tunis declared plague-infected and

Philippeville declared free of plague.

BRAZIL.

Report from Rio de Janeiro-Mortality-Plague and smallpox.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Stewart reports, January 2:

Week ended December 29. Total deaths, 300. No cases nor deaths due to yellow fever. Smallpox caused 4 deaths, with 30 new reported cases, and plague 1 death, with 6 new reported cases. There were at the close of the week, in the Hospital São Sebastião, 31 cases of smallpox and 7 of plague under treatment, and 18 cases of suspicious illness under observation.

CUBA.

No quarantinable diseases have been reported within this district

during the past week, nor any of a contagious nature.

Report from Santiago—Inspection of vessels.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Wilson reports, January 21:

Week ended January 18.

Bills of health issued to 6 vessels bound for the United States and their dependencies. Two vessels were fumigated before departure, viz: The Cuban steamship *Julia* bound for San Juan, Porto Rico, and the American schooner *Frances C. Tunnell* bound for Tampa.

The case of yellow fever reported January 14 died January 16

and the autopsy confirmed the clinical diagnosis.

ECUADOR.

Report from Guayaquil—Summary for month of December, 1907—Smallpox and yellow fever—Fumigation of vessels—Vaccinations.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Lloyd reports, January 13:

During the month of December there were 298 deaths in Guayaquil in a population of 70,000. There were 3 deaths from yellow fever and 8 from smallpox.

Ten vessels were fumigated during the month, 15 persons were

vaccinated, and 23 immune certificates were issued.

There are 12 or 15 cases of yellow fever in the city at present, possibly more.

EGYPT.

Pilgrimage to Mekka declared cholera-infected—Measures adopted to prevent introduction of cholera into Egypt.

The following information is taken from the bulletin of the Conseil sanitaire, maritime, et quarantenaire, Cairo, under date of January 10:

The pilgrimage to Mekka having been declared cholera infected, the government of Egypt has ordered measures to be taken to prevent the introduction of the disease by pilgrims landing on the coast of Egypt from Arab coasting vessels. These measures include the patrolling of the banks of the canal from Port Said to Kosseir by detachments of cyclists, camel guards, and infantry, and the establishment of infantry posts. The south coast of the Gulf of Suez and the Red Sea will also be protected by strong patrols of the camel guard. All the steam vessels of the service will cooperate with this service of surveillance when needed. Pilgrim vessels will be followed by steam launches furnished by the canal company and manned by coast guards to prevent attempts of pilgrims to leave the vessels

during transit of the canal. In addition to these measures, the quarantine service has established posts of surveillance in the vicinity of Suez, at Ismailia, and at Kantarah. Physicians are stationed at these posts for examination of all persons passing them. Pilgrims will undergo ten days' quarantine at the Wells of Moses, with disinfection.

A sanitary post has also been established at Nakle and the physician there is directed to visit pilgrims passing that place and to divert them to Tor. The garrison at Tor will lend all i ecessary aid to the sanitary physician in the discharge of his duty. As regards surveillance of the African coast of the Red Sea the quarantine service has especially directed the attention of the government to Rawayah. It has also pointed out the necessity for the exercise of a very rigorous surveillance of the wells along the littoral and of the routes leading to them, for it is at these wells that the Arab coasting vessels are most likely to attempt to make clandestine landing of pilgrims, and it has requested the Government of Erythrea to have oversight of Soudanese pilgrims returning to their country by way of Massawa. At Tor a cordon has been formed to prevent communication with the detention camp. Orders have been given to the directors of the camps at Tor and Suakim to destroy food brought by pilgrims and the latter are enjoined to take only strictly necessary food during the voyage from Djeddah or Yembo to Tor or Suakim. The measures to which pilgrims are subject at the camp at Tor are as follows:

Cholera cases landed and taken to hospital. Other passengers landed and isolated. The group shall be composed of as small a number as possible. Soiled linen and baggage shall be disinfected; also merchandise suspected of contamination, and the vessel, the disinfection to be as complete as possible. All pilgrims shall be under observation seven days. If a case of cholera shall occur in any section the period of seven days shall begin with the date of appearance of the case. Egyptian pilgrims shall be subject to three days' addi-

tional observation.

Requirements relative to vessels.

Vessels having suspected or verified cases of cholera on board after leaving Tor or Suakim shall repair to the nearest quarantine camp. Vessels from the Hedjaz which have not disembarked pilgrims or analogous masses and which have had no suspected case on board shall be subject to the preventive measures prescribed for ordinary suspected vessels. If destined for Egypt they shall submit to the required five days' observation at a sanitary station, and to all measures prescribed for suspected vessels. If during the voyage suspected cases have occurred the vessels shall be detained for five days' observation at the Wells of Moses.

Caravars of Egyptian pilgrims shall, before entering Egypt, undergo quarantine and disinfection of effects at El Tor. Caravans of foreign pilgrims shall be subject to the same requirements as those of Egyptian pilgrims and shall be escorted by sanitary guards to the

confines of the desert.

GERMANY.

Report from Berlin—Status of cholera in Russia—Regulations against Russian emigrants modified.

Consul General Thackara reports, January 10 and 13:

According to official statistics, 55 fresh cases of cholera and 17 deaths were registered in the whole of the Russian Empire during the period from December 11 to 17. During the week ended December 24 there were registered 43 cases and 32 deaths. The total number of cholera cases recorded since July 16 last amounts to 12,061, with 5,769 deaths.

In the city of Kief, which has about 150,000 inhabitants, there have been registered since the outbreak of the epidemic 1,390 cholera cases and 363 deaths.

In a communication dated December 20, the Prussian Minister of the Interior notified the head administration of the control stations that thereafter the disinfection and bathing of immigrants from Russia would be abolished, and that the governors of the various Prussian provinces had been informed of this change in the sanitary regulations.

HAWAII.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Currie reports that during the week ended January 11, 203 rats were examined bacteriologically at the plague laboratory of the Service at Honolulu. No plague infection found.

HONDURAS.

Health conditions at Puerto Cortes good—Yellow fever in interior towns—Military cordon to be formed around infected district.

The following information is received, under date of January 27, through the Department of State, from Commander Maxwell, U. S. Navy, commanding the U. S. S. Marietta:

The health of Puerto Cortes is good. No passengers from Port Barrios are permitted to land at Puerto Cortes, owing to the ex-

istence of yellow fever at Chiquimula. I am informed by the American chargé d'affaires that the commission sent to investigate the question of yellow fever by the Guatemalan Government did not go to Chiquimula or Las Cabradas, but that 2,000 troops had been sent to the infected district for the purpose of forming a cordon around the towns mentioned.

INDIA.

Reports from Calcutta—Transactions of Service—Cholera, plague, and smallpox—Plague in India and Bengal.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Eakins reports, January 2:

Week ended December 21. No transactions.

During the week ended December 28 bill of health was issued to the steamship *Lichtenfels*, bound for Boston and New York with a total crew of 63. The usual precautions were taken, the holds fumigated, rat guards on wharf lines, and the lascars' effects disinfected.

During the week ended December 14 there were 116 deaths from cholera, 27 from plague, and 6 from smallpox in Calcutta. In Bengal during the week ended December 14 there were 269 cases of plague with 203 deaths. In India during the same period there were 4,021 cases of plague with 3,133 deaths.

ITALY.

Reports from Yokohama—Inspection and fumigation of vessels— Smallpox increasing—Vaccination of steerage passengers and crews required—Plague at Nushima and Osaka—Isolated cases of cholera in fishing districts.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Cumming reports, January 8:

Bills of health issued during the week ended January 4, to 3 vessels having an aggregate personnel of 365 members of crews, 51 saloon and 243 steerage passengers. The steamship *Jesseric*, for New York via Kobe and many other ports, was partially fumigated.

Smallpox is beginning to spread in this city, 8 cases having been reported yesterday and a toal of 14 cases with 3 deaths since Janu-

ary 1.

All steerage passengers leaving here will be bathed, effects disinfected and vaccination required, and the same measures will be taken with crews.

Plague has reached Nushima, a small island adjoining Awaji just outside of Kobe. Osaka continues to be a dangerous center.

Isolated cases of cholera are still occasionally reported in outlying fishing districts despite the unusually cold weather.

Emigrants recommended for rejection.

Number of emigrants per steamship Bellerophon recommended January 8 for rejection: For United States, 4.

Per steamship *Iyo Maru* January 8: For Seattle, Wash., 2. Advised to wait, 14. Rejections and detentions were for trachoma.

Reports from Kobe—Inspection of vessels—Modifications of quarantine restrictions—Increase of smallpox epidemic.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, January 2 and 7:

Week ended December 28. Three supplemental bills of health granted to 3 steamships. There were inspected 3 vessels, 159 members of crews, 7 cabin and 64 steerage passengers; 34 members of crews and 64 steerage passengers were bathed, and their effects were disinfected by steam. There were disinfected by steam 326 pieces of personal effects; vaccinated and held five days, 69 steerage passengers; vaccinated 2 cabin passengers and 39 crew at their own request.

For the steamship Amiral Fourithon for Honolulu 69 emigrants

were passed and 79 recommended for rejection.

In view of the disappearance of cholera from this port the special restrictions imposed upon vessels, cargo, and personnel on account of the infection of Kobe with that disease were removed January 1. All restrictions are continued in force so far as Osaka is concerned, owing to the existence of plague in that city. Such restrictions as are indicated by the quarantine regulations on account of the epidemic of smallpox in Kobe are maintained with regard to vessels, personnel, and cargo.

The official statistics of communicable diseases in Kobe during the period for which this report is made show 236 cases of smallpox and 47 deaths. The smallpox epidemic continues to increase, there having been 34 more cases last week than during the week previous. The largest number of new cases reported on any one day was 44 on December 23, and the smallest number 24 on December 28. The daily

average of new cases was about 34.

The efforts of the local authorities to stamp out the disease have in no way been relaxed, but seem to have been unavailing up to the present. The epidemic began on November 5 with 2 cases, since which time it has steadily increased. Up to and including December 29 there have been reported 722 cases and 133 deaths. It is reported

that 60 new cases were reported today.

Week ended January 4. Three supplemental bills of health granted to 3 steamships, with a total personnel of 770. There were inspected 3 vessels, 425 members of crews, and 299 steerage passengers; and 206 steerage passengers were bathed, held five days prior to embarkation, and their effects disinfected by steam. Certificates of vaccination were issued to 207 persons. Manifests were viséed for 38,056 pieces of freight.

Emigrants were examined as follows: Steamship Mongolia for Honolulu, passed 121, recommended for rejection 99; steamship

Iyo Maru for Seattle, passed 28, recommended for rejection 28.

The weekly report of communicable diseases in Kobe shows 265 cases of smallpox and 91 deaths. This disease is steadily on the increase. The average for the week has been 38 new cases per day.

Plague at Osaka is on the decrease. Kobe remains free from in-

fection with this disease.

PERU.

Reports from Callao-Inspection and fumigation of vessels-Status of plague in Peru.

Assistant Surgeon Wightman reports, December 30 and Janu-

ary 6:

Week ended December 28. Vessels were dispatched as follows: December 23, the British steamship Quillota, for Ancon, Canal Zone, with a general cargo and a total personnel of 185, of whom 14 members of the crew, 47 cabin and 24 steerage passengers were from this port; December 24, the British bark Jordan Hill, for Portland, Oregon, in ballast, with a crew of 32, of whom 24 were from this port, and the German steamship Salatis, for San Francisco, Cal., with a general cargo and a total personnel of 60, of whom 1 steerage passenger was from this port; and December 28, the Chilean steamship Limari, for Ancon, Canal Zone, with a general cargo and a total personnel of 197, of whom 4 members of crew, 56 cabin and 49 steerage passengers were from this port. All these vessels were fumigated.

The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 18.5 per 1,000. In Greater London 2,437 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 6 from diphtheria, 5 from measles, 4 from scarlet fever, and 2 from whooping cough.

Salford.—Two weeks ended January 4. Estimated population, 236,670. Total number of deaths, 183, including diphtheria 6, measles 16, scarlet fever 2, whooping cough 3.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended January 11, 1908, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 25 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,131,959. The lowest rate was recorded in Wexford, viz, 4.7, and the highest in Lisburn, viz, 45.5 per 1,000.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended January 11, 1908, correspond to an annual rate of 24.3 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,839,038. The highest rate of mortality was recorded in Perth, viz, 32.6, and the lowest in Aberdeen, viz, 15.2 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 855, including diphtheria 8, enteric fever 2, measles 84, scarlet fever 4, and 23 from whooping cough.

NEWFOUNDLAND.—Period from December 1, 1907, to January 11, 1908. Estimated population, 30,000. Total number of deaths, 2; enteric fever, 1; scarlet fever, 1.

Spain—Barcelona.—Ten days ended January 10, 1908. Estimated population, 600,000. Total number of deaths, 399, including diphtheria, 3; enteric fever, 13; measles, 1; scarlet fever, 1, and 22 from tuberculosis.

Madrid.—Month of December, 1907. Population, 556,663. Total number of deaths, 1,131, including diphtheria, 10; enteric fever, 13; measles, 2; scarlet fever, 2; whooping cough, 1, and 154 from tuberculosis.

Year 1907. Population, 556,663. Total number of deaths, 15,165, including diphtheria, 124; enteric fever, 193; measles, 472; scarlet fever, 45; whooping cough, 36; smallpox, 10, and 1,771 from tuberculosis.
