CURRENT QUARANTINE MEASURES.

[From the Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes, Berlin, January 29, 1908.]

CHOLERA.

AUSTRIA.—December 27 and January 11. Arrivals from Mekka, Yambo, Constantinople, and Djeddah subject until further notice to requirements of circular of August 12, 1904.

GERMAN EMPIRE.—January 18 and 20. Requirements of the circular of September 30 to be carried out by the authorities of the maritime States against arrivals from ports of the Red Sea and the Suez Canal; also against arrivals from Constantinople.

GREECE.—January 7. Vessels from Constantinople subject to forty-eight hours' quarantine with disinfection. The quarantine station is the lazaretto of St. Georges, in the Bay of Salamis. January 18. Period of detention for such arrivals extended to four days.

ITALY.—January 16. Constantinople and other ports of the Bosphorus declared cholera-infected.

ROUMANIA.—January 8. Measures against arrivals from Constantinople extended to apply to arrivals from Asiatic Turkey. January 16. Importation of fresh food supply of animal origin, also conserves, vegetables, and fruit from Constantinople and Asiatic Turkey forbidden.

RUSSIA.—January 17. The city and government of Kief, the city of Omsk, the governments of Orenburg, Akmolinsk, and the Kuban territory, declared free of cholera; also January 19 the government of Pensa.

SPAIN.—January 16. Three deaths from cholera declared at Pera (Constantinople).

SWITZERLAND.—January 14. The cities of Mekka and Medina, and the ports of Djeddah and Yambo, declared cholera-infected.

TURKEY.—January 11. Arrivals from Constantinople subject to medical inspection on arrival at the first Turkish port.

PLAGUE.

AUSTRIA.—January 3. Port and sanitary police authorities of Trieste directed to suspend measures against Oran.

BELGIUM.—January 9. Ministerial order against arrivals from Tunis suspended.

EGYPT.—January 17. Plague regulations against arrivals from Mangalore suspended.

GERMAN EMPIRE.—January 15. Medical inspection of arrivals from ports in Tunis suspended.

Togo.—January 13. Quarantine measures ordered against arrivals from Accra.

GREECE.—January 18. Quarantine against Mediterranean ports of Egypt reduced to a period of twenty-four hours.

RUSSIA.—January 18. The Persian province of Seistan, the Bahrein Islands, and the city of Bucharest on the Persian Gulf, also the cities of Hongkong, Bassorah, and Djeddah declared free of plague.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Stewart reports, January 14:

Week ended January 12. Vessels inspected and received bills of health from the Consulate-General: January 8, German steamship *Seiglinde*, for New York, with a cargo of coffee, steerage passengers, no cabin passengers, and with no change in the personnel; January 9, Brazilian steamship *Sergipe*, in cargo, with a full new crew signed on in this port, and with 21 cabin and steerage passengers; January 10, British steamship *Homer*, for New Orleans, in cargo of coffee, with no passengers, and no change in the personnel of the crew, and on the same date, British steamship *Barnard*, for Galveston, in water ballast, with no passengers, and with no change in the crew personnel.

Mortality, Rio de Janeiro—Plague, smallpox, and yellow fever.—Week ended January 12, 1908. Total estimated population, 628,675. Total deaths, 243. One new case of yellow fever reported during the week, with no deaths due to this cause. Bubonic plague caused no deaths, but there were 3 new cases reported, and smallpox caused 13 deaths, with 14 new reported cases. At the close of the week there were in the Hospital São Sebastião 41 cases of smallpox and 7 cases of plague under treatment and 18 cases of suspicious illness under observation.

During the week two cases of yellow fever were officially reported and confirmed in the city of Habana, one case February 4 and another case February 6. Both were Spaniards newly arrived in the island and living at different points in the city. The usual precautionary measures have been taken to prevent a spread of the disease.

February 15. One death from yellow fever reported at Cardenas last night.

February 17. One new case of yellow fever reported late February 15 at Santa Clara. One new case of yellow fever reported to-day at Santa Clara; a United States cavalryman.

February 18. One new case of yellow fever reported to-day at Santa Clara, a soldier.

Reports from Matanzas—Inspection of vessels—Fumigation of steamship Britannic, from Trinidad, on account of yellow-fever case landed at Cardenas—Death of yellow-fever case.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Nuñez reports, February 10, 14, and 15: Week ended February 8. Bills of health granted to 4 vessels.

February 14. The Norwegian steamship *Britannic*, which landed February 7 one yellow-fever case at Cardenas originating in the island of Trinidad, sails to-day for Philadelphia after fumigation by this service here.

February 15. The case of yellow fever landed at Cardenas from the steamship *Britannic* died last night.

Report from Santiago—Inspection and fumigation of vessels.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Wilson reports, February 4:

Week ended February 1. Bills of health issued to 7 vessels bound for the United States. The German steamship *Tromp*, bound for Norfolk, was fumigated before departure, to kill mosquitoes. On all the bills of health a note was made of the case of yellow fever that terminated fatally January 16.

No quarantinable disease was reported during the week covered by this report.

ECUADOR.

Report from Guayaquil—Plague.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Lloyd reports:

February 13. The local board of health, governor, and physicians declare plague, Guayaquil.

GERMANY.

Reports from Berlin—Status of cholera in Russia.

The following are received from Consul-General Thackera, under dates of January 27 and February 3:

According to official statistics during the period from December 25 to 31 there were registered in the whole of the Russian Empire 28 new cases of cholera, with 10 deaths.

February 3. According to official statistics there were registered during the period from January 1 to 7, in addition to the figures previously reported, 3 new cases of cholera and 4 deaths, including 1 fresh case and 2 deaths in Samara, 1 case and 2 deaths in Tomsk, and 1 new case in the territory of Kuban. Between January 8 and 14 there were registered 2 new cases in the governmental district of Tomsk.

HAWAII.

Report from Honolulu—Examination of rats for plague infection.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Currie reports that during the week ended January 24, 192 rats were examined bacteriologically at the plague laboratory of the Service at Honolulu. No plague infection found.

INDIA.

Reports from Calcutta—Transactions of Service—Cholera, plague, and smallpox—Plague in India and Bengal.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Eakins reports, January 16: During the week ended January 11, bill of health was issued to the steamship *Nuenfels*, bound for Boston and New York with a total crew of 64. The usual precautions were taken, the holds fumigated, rat guards placed on the wharf lines and the effects of Asiatics disinfected.

During the week ended December 28, there were 49 deaths from cholera, 14 from plague, and 5 from smallpox in Calcutta. In Bengal during the same week there were 331 cases of plague, with 231 deaths.

JAPAN.

Reports from Yokohama—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Increase of smallpox—Vaccination of steerage passengers and crews.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Cumming reports, January 22:

During the week ended January 18, bills of health were issued to 4 vessels, having an aggregate personnel of 312 passengers and 355 crew.

One of the vessels, the *Chingtu*, for Manila, was fumigated by the local authorities, and the *Ben Vorlich*, for the same port, was fumigated under supervision of this office, the crews of each being vaccinated.

There is an increase of smallpox in this city.

All steerage and crew embarking here are being vaccinated at the disinfection station immediately after a bath and their effects are being disinfected as usual.

Up to this date there have been about 82 cases of smallpox reported, with 21 deaths.

Emigrants recommended for rejection.

Number of emigrants per steamship *China* recommended January 19 for rejection: For Manila 5. Advised to wait 3.

Per steamship *Kaga Maru* January 22: For Seattle 3. Advised to wait 23. Rejections and detentions were for trachoma.

Reports from Kobé—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Examination of emigrants—Epidemic smallpox—Quarantine restrictions—Plague in Osaka.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, January 14:

Week ended January 11. Supplemental bills of health granted to 4 steamships, with an aggregate personnel of 624.

There were inspected 4 vessels, 365 members of crews, 3 cabin and 233 steerage passengers. One steamship was fumigated (2 after holds only, as 2 forward holds were fumigated at Yokohama), and 9 dead rats were found on board subsequent to fumigation. There were bathed 152 steerage passengers; their effects, consisting of 402 pieces of baggage, were disinfected with steam. Vaccination certificates were issued to 152 steerage passengers and to 54 members of crews. Manifests were viséed for 11,496 pieces of freight, and 30 pieces (plants from the Osaka district) were rejected.

Emigrants were examined as follows: Steamship *Hong Kong Maru* for San Francisco and Honolulu, passed 152, recommended for rejection 104.

The weekly report of communicable diseases in Kobe shows small-pox 648 cases, with 218 deaths. Total deaths reported 236.

It will be seen that there was an alarming increase in the number of smallpox cases during the week, the new cases numbering 648 as compared with 265 during the previous week, but there was an apparent drop in the death rate from 37.7 to 33.6 per cent. The greatest number of new cases reported on any one day was 129 on January 9, and the smallest number 49 on January 5. It is reported that the death rate is about 55 per cent, and that there are at present about 1,200 cases under treatment.

The disease is distributed nearly throughout Kobé and Hiogo, but is most severe in the latter district.

Reports from Osaka show the following with regard to the plague situation in that city: Week ended December 28, 20 cases and 19 deaths; week ended January 4, 6 cases and 5 deaths; week ended January 11, 5 cases and 5 deaths.

The restrictions enforced by this office are those contemplated in the quarantine regulations with regard to certain articles of freight and personal effects, together with the recommendation that vaccination be practiced in the case of all steerage passengers and crews embarking here on vessels bound for a port of the United States or its dependencies.

Steerage passengers from Osaka and vicinity are held seven days under observation prior to embarkation, and the special requirements with regard to freight from ports infected with plague are enforced against all freight from that place.

Cholera extinct at Kobé.

The following information is received from the Department of State, under date of February 13:

A dispatch dated December 31, 1907, from the vice-consul at Kobé, Japan, reports that Kobé is free from cholera, no case having occurred since December 6, 1907.

No case of yellow fever has developed on the Isthmus since the month of May, 1906. Mosquitoes are still found in Colon, but can not be said to be abundant. *Culex* is the most plentiful variety; *Anopheles*, as is indicated by the malarial rate, are still present; *Stegomyia* are present but not numerous.

Through the efforts of the sanitary department of the Isthmian Canal Commission sanitary conditions continue to improve, but, to quote from the report of the department of sanitation for the month of August, 1907, "the rapid progress of construction of the canal causes us to have a constantly changing surface topography, and *Anopheles* breeding places are often thus made to exist near the camps and settlements. By this means the malarial status of any settlement may be changed very rapidly. * * *." During the past six months all gutters have been removed from houses and most of

the water tanks have been abolished, thus minimizing the number of breeding places. In some parts of Colon tin cans and other receptacles are seen between buildings. These form excellent breeding places for *Stegomyia*.

Trachoma, although not classed as a quarantinable disease, is very prevalent on the Isthmus, particularly so among the Greek and Italian laborers. Until quite recently (December 11, 1907), no precautions in the case of laborers were taken to prevent the importation of trachoma.

Malaria may be considered the prevailing disease, although other tropical diseases are frequently met with. Pneumonia is very fatal to the negro. Typhoid fever also has been very prevalent.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

Report from Manila—Increase of cholera in Manila—Reappearance of cholera at Mariquina—Inspection of vessels.

Chief Quarantine Officer Heiser reports, January 8:

Week ended January 4. Thirty-one cases of cholera with 23 deaths were reported.

Cholera.—During the week covered by this report there has been a very large increase in the number of cases of cholera reported in the city of Manila. The cases are most virulent in character, the victims usually succumbing a few hours after symptoms of the attack appear. There has been a large influx of visitors into Manila from the near-by provinces, on account of the holiday season. Some of these visitors were suffering from cholera on their arrival. No connection has been traced between the cases of cholera. There have been no two cases at any one house. There have been scarcely two cases to occur in the same street, and intervals sometimes of several days have elapsed before a second case appeared in any one section of the city. The persons attacked have, almost without exception, belonged to the poorer classes. No cases among Europeans or Americans have been reported.

To add to the gravity of the situation, the disease has also reappeared at Mariquina, which is a town located upon the watershed from which the water supply of the city of Manila is obtained. In order to guard as much as possible against pollution of the stream troops have been sent to the Mariquina Valley for the purpose of patrolling the banks of the river.

Consular bills of health were issued as follows: January 2, the Norwegian steamship *Standard*, with 27 crew, en route from Saigon to Cebu, was granted a supplemental bill of health, after the usual inspection. January 3, the U. S. army transport *Crook*, with 161 crew and 141 passengers, was granted a bill of health for San Francisco via Nagasaki and Honolulu. The crew and steerage passengers were bathed, and their effects and baggage disinfected. The vessel was partially disinfected. The cargo and the baggage were either disinfected or passed after inspection. All persons on board were inspected at the hour of sailing. January 4, the British steamship *Taiyuan*, with 72 members of crew and 55 passengers, en route from Hongkong to Zamboanga, was granted a supplemental bill of health. All persons on board were inspected prior to the vessel's departure.

Report from Lourenço Marquez—Plague officially verified.

Consul Hollis reports, January 7:

The latest official information relative to suspect plague at this port, published in the Boletim Oficial of January 4, states that the 8 suspect cases that occurred from November 8 to December 12 have been verified by the board of health of the Province as bubonic plague. Of these cases 5 died and 3 recovered. There has not been a new case since December 12. The bacteriological examination of rats sent to the laboratory shows no plague infection.

London.—One thousand six hundred and fifty-one deaths were registered during the week, including measles 21, scarlet fever 19, diphtheria 22, enteric fever 4, whooping cough 23, tuberculosis 215, and 9 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 18.0 per 1,000. In Greater London 2,279 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 3 from diphtheria, 4 from measles, 1 from scarlet fever, and 5 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended January 25, 1908, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 26.2 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,131,959. The lowest rate was recorded in Portadown, viz, 5.2, and the highest in Sligo, viz, 48.0 per 1,000.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended January 25, 1908, correspond to an annual rate of 22.2 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,839,038. The highest rate of mortality was recorded in Perth, viz, 26.7, and the lowest in Edinburgh, viz, 17.7 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 782, including diphtheria 8, enteric fever 5, measles 81, scarlet fever 3, and 25 from whooping cough.
