Report from Memphis, Tenn. — Smallpox — Smallpox in State of Arkansas.

Surgeon Wasdin reports, February 12: During the month of January there were approximately 50 cases of smallpox in Memphis, all of which were treated in the pesthouse. In addition to this number during the past week there have been from 6 to 10 cases originating in the city, the majority of them being post-office employees. It is thought that these employees were infected from contaminated mail.

There are now about 20 cases in the smallpox hospital of this county. There are a few cases being treated at their homes under city regulations.

In the State of Arkansas there is a great deal of smallpox in the counties bordering on the river, and quite recently there was a serious outbreak in a neighboring county.

COLORADO.—Semiannual report for the period ended June 30, 1908. Estimated population, 615,570. Total number of deaths, 5,688; cause of death not reported. Cases: Diphtheria 618, scarlet fever 2,009, smallpox 381, and enteric fever 191.

INDIANA—*Evansville*.—Month of December, 1908. Estimated population, 75,000. Total number of deaths, 84, including enteric fever 4, diphtheria 3, and 12 from pulmonary tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 20, scarlet fever 4, whooping cough 2, enteric fever 7, and pulmonary tuberculosis 8.

MINNESOTA—*Minneapolis*.—Month of January, 1909. Estimated population, 300,000. Total number of deaths, 276, including diphtheria 14, enteric fever 1, scarlet fever 3, and 43 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 92, scarlet fever 57, smallpox 22, enteric fever 1, and tuberculosis 29.

NEBRASKA—*Lincoln*.—Month of January, 1909. Estimated population, 60,000. Total number of deaths, 45, including 5 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 4, scarlet fever 8, measles 2, and smallpox 2.

NEW YORK—*Buffalo*.—Month of January, 1909. Estimated population, 410,000. Total number of deaths, 523, including diphtheria 16, scarlet fever 15, enteric fever 5, and 45 from tuberculosis. Cases: Tuberculous 62, enteric fever 30, diphtheria 115, scarlet fever 410, measles 16, whooping cough 36, and smallpox 1.

Schenectady.—Month of January, 1909. Estimated population 77,666. Total number of deaths, 74, including scarlet fever 5, and 8 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 24, diphtheria 5, measles 2, and tuberculosis 8.

Yonkers.—Month of November, 1908. Estimated population, 72,000. Total number of deaths, 96, including enteric fever 1, diphtheria 4, and 17 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 1, scarlet fever 22, diphtheria 26, measles 28, and pulmonary tuberculosis 10.

Month of December, 1908. Total number of deaths, 88, including whooping cough 1, diphtheria 1, and 7 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 1, scarlet fever 30, diphtheria 15, measles 43, and pulmonary tuberculosis 18.

Month of January, 1909. Total number of deaths, 105, including scarlet fever 5, diphtheria 3, and 12 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 37, diphtheria 16, measles 108, and pulmonary tuberculosis 19.

OREGON.—Month of November, 1908. Reports to the state board of health from 34 counties show as follows: Total number of deaths, 431, including diphtheria 27, enteric fever 13, scarlet fever 2, measles 3, and 29 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 95, enteric fever 43, scarlet fever 41, smallpox 45, tuberculosis 16, and measles 1.

Month of December, 1908. Reports to the state board of health from 34 counties show as follows: Total number of deaths, 360, including tuberculosis 40, enteric fever 12, diphtheria 5, and 2 from scarlet fever. Cases: Tuberculosis 8, enteric fever 35, diphtheria 72, scarlet fever 50, measles 16, and smallpox 51.

WASHINGTON—*Spokane*.—Month of January, 1909. Estimated population, 100,000. Total number of deaths, 110, including diphtheria 4, enteric fever 4, and 5 from tuberculosis. Cases: Smallpox 5, measles 60, scarlet fever 34, diphtheria 43, and enteric fever 1.

WISCONSIN.—Report for the quarter ended September 30, 1908. Estimated population, 2,228,969. Total number of deaths, 6,279, including scarlet fever 21, tuberculosis 512, enteric fever 70, diphtheria 70, measles 5, and 29 from whooping cough. Cases reported from 58 counties, as follows: Diphtheria 248, enteric fever 197, whooping cough 218, smallpox 173, scarlet fever 163, measles 192, and tuberculosis 238.

FOREIGN AND INSULAR.

CURRENT QUARANTINE MEASURES.

(From the Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes, Berlin, February 3 and 10, 1909)

CHOLERA.

DUTCH INDIES.—December 22. Quarantine measures against Singapore suspended.

EGYPT.—January 23. Cholera regulations in force against Tuti-corin.

RUSSIA.—January 16. The government of Taurida and the district of Tambov declared free from cholera. January 21. The Province of Nagasaki in Japan declared cholera infected.

TURKEY.—January 26. Measures against Taganrog suspended. Vessels from Russian ports of the Black Sea carrying emigrants or similar aggregations of men subject to medical inspection and disinfection at the lazaretto at Sinope or at Monastir-Aghzy (Kavak), said measures to take not more than twenty-four hours in application.

PLAGUE.

AUSTRIA.—January 20. Measures against arrivals from Beirut suspended by order of the maritime sanitary authorities at Trieste.

CHINA.—December 31. The German consul at Chefoo, acting in concert with the Chinese local authorities and the consular representatives of the treaty powers, has suspended control measures for German vessels arriving from Swatow, Tientsin, and Chinwangtao. The importation of articles previously forbidden is still prohibited.

DUTCH INDIES.—December 19. Quarantine measures against Kobe ordered.

TURKEY.—January 18. Measures against arrivals from Beirut suspended.

ALGERIA.

Deratization at Algiers—Rat fleas.

The following is taken from the *Bulletin Bimensuelle*, Algiers, January 31:

January 16-31: Rodents taken by the maritime sanitary service, 379; examined by the laboratory of health, 68; result, negative. Classification of rats: *Mus norvegicus*, 290; *Mus rattus*, 46; *Mus alexandrinus*, 1; *Mus musculus*, 42. Rat fleas determined—*Pulex cheopis*, on *Mus rattus*, 37; *Ctenopsylla musculi*, on *Mus rattus*, 31; *Ceratophyllus fasciatus*, on *Mus rattus*, 1; *Ctenopsylla musculi*, on *Mus norvegicus*, 6; *Pulex cheopis*, on *Mus norvegicus*, 84.

AUSTRALIA.

Examination of rodents for plague infection at Brisbane.

The following information is taken from plague bulletins received from the Department of Public Health of Queensland:

Date of finding of last plague-infected rat, September 15, 1908.

Week ended January 9. Rodents destroyed, 689; examined, 512; plague rodents, 0. Week ended January 16. Rodents destroyed, 604; examined, 541; plague rodents, 0.

BARBADOS.

Report from Bridgetown—Status of yellow fever in the Island.

Consul Martin reports, February 11:

Since February 3 there have been 6 cases of yellow fever reported, 1 case in Bridgetown and the other cases in the outlying parishes of St. Joseph and St. Lucy. The case in Bridgetown was that of the senior resident surgeon at the Barbados general hospital. The disease seems now to be abating, and the general board of health is taking measures for better sanitation, care of patients, and destruction of mosquitoes. No Europeans or transient visitors have been attacked.

BRITISH GUIANA.

Report from Georgetown—Status of yellow fever at Paramaribo, Dutch Guiana.

Consul Clare reports, January 30:

The consular agent at Paramaribo, in a letter dated January 27, states that since the outbreak of yellow fever, December 18, there have been 32 cases, of which 8 terminated fatally and 24 recovered. No new cases have occurred since January 18.

CHINA.

Report from Canton—Sanitary conditions.

The following report, forwarded by Vice Consul-General Hull, under date of January 4, was received from the Department of State February 24:

Sanitary conditions of Canton, China.

There are no official statistics or records of facts relating to the sanitary conditions and mortality rate of Canton. The following statement, based on personal observation, includes the entire city proper, within and without the walls, Honam (south of the river), Fati, Fong Tsun, and the boat population.

With the exception of the diseases enumerated in the following table, the mortality due to ordinary causes is probably nearly double that of the large cities of Europe or America. It certainly is not as high as has often been estimated.

Bubonic plague was unknown in modern times in Canton previous to 1894.

Most of the buildings in Canton are low, being only one story, or a story and a half high, with large openings from the top to the ground floor. Light and ventilation are provided for by ventilators or skylights in the roof. During the hot season (April to October, inclusive) from 60 to 70 per cent of these buildings have a bamboo or mat wind shoot or funnel which distinctly reduces the temperature within the buildings. The city streets are largely paved with Hongkong granite stone. In the center of most of the streets is a surface sewer about 2 feet wide and 3 feet deep, just beneath the stone pavement, built of sandstone, brick, or tile. While these sewers are often clogged, they are also frequently cleared out. About one-half of these sewers, more particularly those outside the walls, are reached by tide water each day, which helps to clear these drains. The difference between high and low tide is about 6 feet. For centuries past the city water supply has been from surface wells and the river. This is now largely modified by the recent introduction of a modern system of waterworks, pressure being secured by well-constructed standpipes. The source of supply is from the river several miles northwest of the city. Modern machinery, filter beds, and pipes are used and an analysis of the water shows it to be of good quality.

The diseases of Canton.—These are such as are usually found in a semitropical climate. Malaria, dysentery, and enteric fever are common, though the latter has prevailed only during recent years. Tuberculosis is rife. Beriberi and bubonic plague are restricted largely to the summer months. True Asiatic cholera has been present twice during the past twenty years in epidemic form. At other times only occasional cases are seen. Smallpox is common in a mild form among the Chinese during the winter months (December to February). Leprosy in its various forms is frequently met with among the poorer classes of Chinese.

The population of Canton is generally overestimated. No census has been taken, but a fair estimate of the population of Canton and its immediate suburbs, including the boat population, would certainly be somewhat less than 2,000,000. Canton city itself, exclusive of the boat population, which may be estimated at 200,000, would hardly reach 1,000,000.

There are almost no native hospitals in Canton, civil or military, worthy of the name. There are many public dispensaries connected with the Shin Tongs, or halls of good works, scattered about the city,

but their use is largely restricted to the dispensing of Chinese drugs to outpatients. There is a military hospital in a temporary building or shed, connected with the large camp just outside the northeast corner of the city, near the imperial mint. There is also a Fong Pin hospital just off the northwest corner of the city wall where patients are received as inpatients.

The principal hospital and the oldest in the city is the Medical Missionary Society's hospital, commonly called the Canton Hospital. For fifty years the hospital has carried on a large work, introducing the first modern surgery into China. The hospital has 300 beds, and in emergency this number could be largely increased. Its location is on the river front, less than one-fourth mile east of the custom-house and foreign settlement. Over 2,000 inpatients and 25,000 outpatients are treated annually, while about 2,000 surgical operations are performed each year. There are 10 main buildings, including the medical college building, connected with the hospital. The institution is supported entirely by the local Chinese and foreign communities.

There is also the Paul Domour French hospital, located near the electric light works, on the river front. It is a neat little hospital of about 80 to 100 beds, managed on modern lines, and efficient work is done.

Plague in the principal cities of Egypt.—At Cairo, in 1906, there was 1 case with 1 death of plague. At Alexandria plague was present in all the years covered by the report, with a total of 997 cases, 595 deaths. At Port Said plague was reported in 1900 and was consecutively present, with a total of 232 cases, 127 deaths. At Suez the disease appeared in 1904 and was present in 1905, 1906, and 1907, with 97 cases, 70 deaths. At Ismaila, which is situated on the Suez and Sweetwater canals and equally distant from the Red and Mediterranean seas, plague was present in 1907 with a total of 10 cases, 8 deaths. Of the 20 government districts, including Nubia, into which Egypt is divided, 17 were infected with plague. The total population, census of 1897, was stated at 9,734,405.

GERMANY.

Report from Berlin—Status of cholera in Russia.

The following is received from Consul-General Thackara, under date of February 15:

According to the latest official bulletin there were registered in the city of St. Petersburg during the week ended January 23, 273 cases of cholera and 114 deaths; in the government district of Tomsk, 3 cases and 1 death, and in the Don territory, 13 cases and 7 deaths, making a total for the week of 289 cases and 122 deaths. According to an official supplementary report, the total number of cholera cases in Russia

during the previous week amounted to 217, with 59 deaths, of which 2 cases and 1 death occurred in the government district of Petersburg, 1 case and 1 death in the government district of Moscow, 23 cases and 7 deaths in the Don territory, and 5 cases in the Akmolinsk territory.

INDIA.

Reports from Calcutta—Transactions of service—Cholera, plague, and smallpox—Plague in India and Bengal.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Eakins reports, February 4:

Week ended January 30. Bill of health issued to the steamship *Matoppo*, bound for Boston and New York with a total crew of 52. The usual precautions were taken, the holds fumigated, rat guards placed on the wharf lines, and the Asiatics' effects disinfected.

Week ended January 23. At Calcutta there were 9 deaths from cholera, 13 from plague, and 98 from smallpox. In Bengal, 247 cases of plague, with 205 deaths. In India, 2,899 cases of plague, with 2,306 deaths.

Smallpox in Calcutta.

The following is received from Consul-General Michael, under date of January 14:

Smallpox has appeared in Calcutta in some localities. It is specially prevalent in the Badur Bagan quarter, and many applications for vaccination are received. The present outbreak is very mild and deaths are very few. There have been several cases, with one death, among Europeans.

JAPAN.

Report from Yokohama—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Plague rat on steamship Decalion at Kobe—Plague cases from coasting steamship from Osaka—Cholera, plague, and smallpox in Japan, year 1908.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Cumming reports, February 6:

During the two weeks ended February 6 bills of health were issued to 7 vessels having an aggregate of 74 saloon and 90 steerage passengers and 720 members of crews. Two of these vessels were fumigated in part, the steamship *Suruga*, hence via Chinese and Japanese ports to New York, because of having lain at a dock in Shanghai without precautions, and the Nippon Yusen Kaisha mail steamship *Yawata Maru* for Australia via Manila. These vessels were fumigated each trip.

No more plague-infected rats have been found, and this city is in good sanitary condition. A rat taken from the British steamship *Decalion* at Kobe having been found infected, a telegram to the port officer insured her disinfection at this port.

The *Shinkochi Maru*, a coasting steamship of the Osaka Chosen Kaisha, left a case of plague at Kagoshima, and another was found upon her return to Osaka. The frequency with which infection has been spread from Osaka shows the necessity of careful watching of freight from that place (shipped at Kobe) to avoid inclusion of infected rats in packages.

The home department reports the following diseases throughout the Empire for the year 1908: Smallpox, 24,189 cases; dysentery, 40,044 cases; plague, 352 cases; cholera, 564 cases. This shows an increase in smallpox and a decrease in plague and cholera.

Examination of emigrants.

Number of emigrants per steamship *Tenyo Maru*, January 30: For Honolulu, held for observation, 7; for San Francisco, 3.

Per steamship *Tango Maru* for Seattle, February 3: Recommended for rejection, 5.

Rejections and detentions were for trachoma.

Report from Kobe—Inspection of vessels—Examination and disinfection of emigrants.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Knight reports, February 2: Week ended January 30. Supplemental bills of health were granted to 4 steamships. There were inspected 62 members of crews and 49 steerage passengers. Twenty-four steerage passengers were bathed and disinfected. Their

effects were disinfected by steam. The number of pieces of baggage steamed was 58, and bedding 46. Manifests were viséd for 52,547 pieces of freight, amounting to 4,212 tons.

Emigrants were examined as follows: Steamship *Tenyo Maru*, for Honolulu, passed 13, recommended for rejection 16; steamship *Tenyo Maru*, for San Francisco, passed 7, recommended for rejection 1; steamship *Tango Maru*, for Seattle, passed 2, recommended for rejection 6. The emigrants passed, together with 1 intending passenger to Victoria, by the steamship *Tango Maru*, were inspected, bathed, and disinfected. Their effects were disinfected before embarkation.

In Yura, there was reported a total of 116 cases of plague.

One case of plague was reported on the steamship *Shinkochi Maru* January 29, at Osaka. This vessel plies in trade between Osaka and Kushu.

MEXICO.

Report from Salina Cruz—Inspection and fumigation of vessel.

Acting Assistant Surgeon McPherson reports, February 16:

During the period February 1 to 15, inclusive, 1 steamship was inspected and fumigated on clearing from this port for the United States.

PERU.

Report from Callao—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Status of plague in Peru—Smallpox at Lima—Plague and smallpox in Chile.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Gutierrez reports, February 5:

Week ended January 30, 3 vessels were fumigated. They carried an aggregate personnel of 49 members of crews and 4 cabin passengers.

There were 5 cases of smallpox at the lazaretto at Lima January 21. No cases were reported at Callao.

Plague at Callao continues. There have been 3 cases this month.

Plague in Chile is reported as follows: Iquique, January 26, 9 cases in the lazaretto; 4 cases in two weeks.

Smallpox continues in the country around Talcahuano, Chile.

RUSSIA.

Report from Libau—Status of cholera at St. Petersburg—Leprosy at Libau—Examination of emigrants.

Acting Assistant Surgeon De Forrest reports, February 9:

During the week ended February 8, 173 new cholera cases with 66 deaths were reported at St. Petersburg. No new cases of cholera have been reported from any other part of Russia since February 1.

Two cases of leprosy were removed from Libau during the first week in February.

The steamship *Estonia* sailed to-day with 642 steerage and 5 cabin passengers for New York. Five passengers were destined for Copenhagen, where the vessel anchors to take on supplies. All passengers for Copenhagen by steamships carrying passengers from Libau are required to observe the same quarantine as those sailing direct for New York.

ST. PIERRE ISLAND.

Report from St. Pierre—Quarantine against coast of Newfoundland on account of smallpox.

Consul Jenkins reports, January 13:

The quarantine against smallpox (see Public Health Reports, Feb. 19, 1909, p. 215) is still in force, and applies to all vessels clearing from the Newfoundland coast, but especially to vessels sailing from certain southern seacoast villages which the authorities here declare are known to be infected with smallpox.

American vessels returning from the Newfoundland coast with bait, should they call at St. Pierre, would be subject to quarantine. It can not be stated how serious the reported epidemic of smallpox is in Newfoundland. The health department of St. Pierre and Miquelon reports that there are no cases of smallpox in this colony.

SALVADOR.

Report from San Salvador—Smallpox—Vaccination.

The following is received from Consul-General Frazier, under date of February 6:

During the past month several cases of smallpox have appeared in Salvador. At San Salvador there have been 3 cases to date, none of which were fatal; in Santa Ana, from 30 to 40 cases, and slight outbreaks in the towns which are situated on the routes of travel between this Republic and Guatemala. The board of health maintains a bureau of vaccination at San Salvador which not only distributes vaccine, but also sends out vaccinators to the towns and villages throughout the country. It is due to the energetic and prompt action of this bureau of vaccination that practically the entire population has already been vaccinated. The best medical opinion is that the disease is now under control, and that it is unlikely to develop into a serious epidemic.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales*.—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended February 6, 1909, correspond to an annual rate of 18.7 per 1,000 population, which is estimated at 16,445,281.

London.—One thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight deaths were registered during the week, including measles 52, scarlet fever 11, diphtheria 24, enteric fever 7, whooping cough 29, tuberculosis 164, and 12 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 20.3 per 1,000. In greater London 2,617 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 3 from measles, 9 from diphtheria, scarlet fever 4, and 2 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended February 6, 1909, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 20.7 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,142,308. The lowest rate was recorded in Galway, viz, 7.8, and the highest in Sligo, viz, 38.4 per 1,000.

Belfast.—Annual report for the year 1908. Estimated population, 380,344. Total number of deaths, 7,523, including measles 186, scarlet fever 4, whooping cough 137, diphtheria 33, enteric fever 57, and 1,258 from tuberculosis. The number of deaths correspond to an annual death rate of 19.5 per 1,000 of population.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended February 6, 1909, correspond to an annual rate of 18.5 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,839,038. The highest rate of mortality was recorded in Dundee, viz, 25.9, and the lowest in Leith, viz, 14.6 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 662, including diphtheria 12, scarlet fever 4, whooping cough 42, measles 2, and enteric fever 1.
