STATISTICAL REPORTS OF MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY, STATES AND CITIES
OF THE UNITED STATES—UNTABULATED.

FLORIDA—*Pensacola*.—Month of February, 1909. Estimated population, 30,000. Total number of deaths, 44, including enteric fever 4, and 3 from tuberculosis.

ILLINOIS—*Alton*.—Month of February, 1909. Estimated population, 22,000. Total number of deaths, 23, including 2 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria, 1.

Quincy.—Month of February, 1909. Estimated population, 43,000. Total number of deaths, 42, including diphtheria 1, and 4 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 22, enteric fever 2, scarlet fever 2, and measles 1.

INDIANA—*Jeffersonville*.—Month of February, 1909. Estimated population, 12,000. Total number of deaths 10, including 1 from tuberculosis. Cases: Tuberculosis 1.

IOWA—*Cedar Rapids*.—Month of February, 1909. Estimated population, 35,000. Total number of deaths 43, including enteric fever 2, and 3 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 10, and diphtheria 1.

KANSAS.—Month of January, 1909. Estimated population, 1,470,495. Total number of deaths from contagious and infectious diseases, 82. Causes of death: Tuberculosis 43, enteric fever 15, diphtheria 18, scarlet fever 4, smallpox 1, and 1 from measles. Cases: Tuberculosis 63, enteric fever 36, diphtheria 127, scarlet fever 132, smallpox 198, and measles 111.

KENTUCKY—*Louisville*.—Report for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1908. Estimated population, 206,416. Total number of deaths 3,997, including enteric fever 109, measles 2, scarlet fever 6, whooping cough 20, diphtheria 21, and 494 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet

fever 220, diphtheria 269, whooping cough 31, enteric fever 223, tuberculosis 328, and smallpox 38. The total number of deaths correspond to an annual death rate of 15.34 per 1,000 of population.

MARYLAND—*Hagerstown*.—Month of February, 1909. Estimated population, 30,000. Total number of deaths 109, including enteric fever 1, measles 1, and 7 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 2, scarlet fever 3, diphtheria 1, and measles 56.

MASSACHUSETTS.—Reports from the state board of health for the month of January, 1909. Fifty-three cities and towns reporting, having an aggregate estimated population of 2,369,328, report 3,772 deaths, including diphtheria 78, enteric fever 22, measles 16, and 422 from phthisis pulmonalis. Cases: Diphtheria 1,055, enteric fever 184, measles 1,213, scarlet fever 1,074, whooping cough 494, and phthisis pulmonalis 653.

Newton.—Month of February, 1909. Estimated population, 38,919. Total number of deaths, 37, including enteric fever 1, and 4 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 7, enteric fever 3, scarlet fever 13, tuberculosis 2, and measles 10.

NEW HAMPSHIRE—*Concord*.—Months of January and February, 1909. Estimated population, 20,000. Total number of deaths, 78, including 7 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 2, scarlet fever 1, diphtheria 6, and measles 4.

NEW JERSEY—*Elizabeth*.—Months of January and February, 1909. Estimated population, 60,509. Total number of deaths, 198, including enteric fever 2, diphtheria 2, measles 2, and 23 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 10, scarlet fever 12, diphtheria 42, measles 20, and whooping cough 1.

NEW YORK—*Buffalo*.—Month of February, 1909. Estimated population, 410,000. Total number of deaths, 475, including diphtheria 14, scarlet fever 14, enteric fever 9, measles 2, whooping cough 1, and 39 from tuberculosis. Cases: Tuberculosis 79, enteric fever 23, diphtheria 112, scarlet fever 450, measles 31, whooping cough 27, and smallpox 2.

Rochester.—Seven months ended January 31, 1909. Estimated population, 200,000. Total number of deaths, 1,605, including measles 8, enteric fever 18, whooping cough 3, diphtheria 16, scarlet fever 5, and 155 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 116, diphtheria 138, enteric fever 102, and measles 1,111.

Rome.—Month of February, 1909. Estimated population, 18,500. Total number of deaths, 42; cause of deaths not reported. Cases: Scarlet fever 3, diphtheria 1, and measles 2.

NORTH CAROLINA.—Month of January, 1909. Estimated population, 1,893,810. Reports of state board of health from 85 counties show as follows: Measles in 21 counties, whooping cough in 26 counties, scarlet fever in 29 counties, diphtheria in 30 counties, enteric fever in 29

counties, malarial fever in 6 counties, pernicious malarial fever in 2 counties, hemorrhagic malarial fever in 2 counties, and smallpox in 14 counties, viz: Ashe, 7; Camden, 30; Currituck, 31; Duplin, 50; Johnston, 12; Jones, 3; Madison, 2; Nash, 1; New Hanover, 2; Pasquotank, 50 or more; Pitt, 2; Sampson, 22; Scotland, 6; Wayne, 20.

OHIO—*Toledo*.—Month of January, 1909. Estimated population, 195,888. Total number of deaths, 178, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 12, scarlet fever 2, and 20 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 35, measles 3, scarlet fever 15, enteric fever 57, tuberculosis 1.

OREGON—*Portland*.—Month of January, 1909. Estimated population, 175,000. Total number of deaths, 140, including enteric fever 1, diphtheria 2, and 13 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 34, enteric fever 15, measles 27, smallpox 26, whooping cough 2, and scarlet fever 21.

PENNSYLVANIA—*Dunmore*.—Month of February, 1909. Estimated population, 17,500. Total number of deaths, 32, including scarlet fever 1, measles 1, and 1 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 2, measles 27, diphtheria 1, and tuberculosis 1.

Pittsburg.—Month of October, 1908. Estimated population, 462,801. Total number of deaths, 670, including diphtheria 10, scarlet fever 9, measles 2, whooping cough 3, enteric fever 8, and 41 from pulmonary tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 104, scarlet fever 183, enteric fever 96, whooping cough 11, tuberculosis 142, and measles 50.

South Bethlehem.—Month of February, 1909. Estimated population, 15,000. Total number of deaths, 31, including 1 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 2, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 4, and tuberculosis 9.

UTAH.—Month of January, 1909. Reports to the state board of health from 27 counties, having an estimated population of 346,873, show as follows: Total number of deaths, 306, including diphtheria 12, enteric fever 4, whooping cough 3, scarlet fever 8, smallpox 1, and 9 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 96, enteric fever 24, measles 188, scarlet fever 179, smallpox 237, whooping cough 107, and tuberculosis 16 (incomplete).

VIRGINIA—*Richmond*.—Month of February, 1909. Estimated population, 115,701—white, 73,204; colored, 42,497. Total number of deaths, 176—white, 87; colored, 89—including enteric fever 1, and 23 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 7, enteric fever 25, measles 3, scarlet fever 5, and whooping cough 9.

WISCONSIN—*Milwaukee*.—Month of January, 1909. Estimated population, 370,000. Total number of deaths 387, including enteric fever 8, measles 1, scarlet fever 9, diphtheria 14, whooping cough 1, and 34 from tuberculosis. Cases: Smallpox 65, tuberculosis 50, diphtheria 110, scarlet fever 123, enteric fever 47, and measles 146.

CURRENT QUARANTINE MEASURES.

[From the Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes, Berlin, March 3, 1909.]

CHOLERA.

RUSSIA.—February 14. The Don territory is declared only menaced with cholera, with the exception of the Taganrog district, which is infected. The territories of Kooban, Terek, and Akmolinsk, the city of Taganrog, and the market town of Asov are declared free from cholera.

BARBADOS.

Report from Bridgetown—Inspection of vessels—Status of yellow fever.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Urquhart reports, February 27 and March 6:

Period February 22 to 27. Number of vessels inspected, 6. Total number of passengers, 3; members of crews, 153. The sanitary condition of the vessels, cargoes, crews, and passengers was good. Five cases of yellow fever were reported this week, none of which were in this port; they were in the interior of the island. No deaths were reported for the week.

To date there have been reported 54 cases of yellow fever, with 16 deaths. The last case of yellow fever and last death from the same disease reported in Bridgetown occurred February 1.

Week ended March 6. Number of vessels inspected, 7; total number of passengers, 40; members of crews, 385. The sanitary condition of the vessels, cargoes, crews, and passengers was good. Three cases of yellow fever were reported this week, 2 in Bridgetown, with no deaths.

CHINA.

Report from Amoy—Plague.

The following is received from the Department of State, under date of March 16:

Cable from Amoy, China, plague.

Report from Shanghai—Inspection of vessels—Plague in rats.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, January 26:

Week ended January 23. Supplemental bills of health granted to 2 steamships having an aggregate personnel of 449. Of these 1 vessel, 117 members of crews, and 17 steerage passengers were inspected.

There were also inspected and passed 41 pieces of steerage passenger baggage. Manifests were viséed for 3,653 pieces of freight, amounting to 187.02 tons.

The steamship *Tenyo Maru*, Hongkong to San Francisco, remained at Woosung while in this port. Loading was carried on from lighters during daylight only, and rat guards were used on lines to lighters. The communication with shore was limited to the European personnel exclusively. The inspection of personnel from Shanghai was carried out at the tender for the vessel at the hour of her departure.

The steamship *Tango Maru*, Hongkong to Seattle, lay at a buoy while in this port. She was loaded from lighters during the entire twenty-four hours, rat guards being used on all lines. The purser of the vessel only was allowed on shore. The vessel was scheduled to sail on January 23, and bill of health was accordingly issued at that time; but her departure was delayed twenty-four hours, so that the final inspection of the vessel and personnel was made at 11.30 on January 24.

Plague-infected rats continue to be found and are spread over the entire settlement. No human plague cases have been reported. The weather has been exceedingly cold, and there have been two falls of snow during the week just ended.

No reports have been received from outports.

CUBA.

Reports from Habana—Inspection of vessels—House and water-deposit inspection—Sewerage system—Summary of inspection work, and comparative statistics, year 1908.

Sanitary conditions in Habana and vicinity are satisfactory.

During the month of February the district inspectors examined 40,513 premises, uncovering 78 deposits of mosquito larvæ, 34 of these collections showing larvæ of *Stegomyia calopus*.

The work of installing a system of sewerage is now in progress, about 4 miles having been thus far completed of the 425 miles outlined in the decree authorizing the work.

The official report of the city health officer for the month of January, 1909, shows 40,000 houses inspected and 45 deposits of water containing mosquito larvæ uncovered. Of these latter 27 contained larvæ of *Stegomyia calopus*. This low percentage of infested premises is accounted for by the low temperatures prevailing and the absence of rain. The department issued 3,273 orders for various corrections of sanitary delinquencies. One hundred and sixty-six cisterns and wells were screened, and 621 fines imposed.

Tuberculosis is credited with 96 of the 506 deaths registered for the month, a proportion of almost 1 in 5. Many of these deaths occurred among the cigar makers, and the health officer calls special attention

to the grave consequences involved in retaining employees in the tobacco trade who are known to be infected. A campaign of education is contemplated to supplement the antituberculosis movement inaugurated under the American administration.

The mortality rate for the month was 17.76, with an estimated population of 333,000.

YEAR 1908.

The annual report of the year 1908 of the city health officer of Habana shows that in the year 1906 there were 6,144 deaths in the municipality of Habana; in 1907, 6,708; and in 1908, which is the subject of this report, 5,994. A corresponding improvement is noticeable in the morbidity statistics as compared with those of 1907:

The number of deaths due to these and other preventable diseases has also decreased, having a diminution in the fatal cases of 34 in enteric fever, 54 in enteritis in children of less than 2 years of age, 29 in diphtheria, and 7 in infantile tetanus.

One hundred and seventy-two public and 104 private schools were inspected, comprising the examination of 10,852 children.

As a result of this inspection, orders were issued to 644 children to temporarily discontinue school attendance to prevent the spread of transmissible diseases. Forty-five children suffering from trachoma were suspended from attendance.

The division of disinfection fumigated 4,231 houses, containing 22,830 rooms, on account of transmissible diseases.

There were disinfected in the steam sterilizer 4,827 pieces of clothing and 5,784 pieces were burned.

The mosquito division petrolized or destroyed 818,105 cans and other breeding places found on vacant lots and public grounds. This division also petrolized or drained 170,586 pools, ditches, and swamps; 39,395 crab holes were destroyed, 15,183 drainage ditches were covered or cleaned and petrolized, and 50,912 square meters of brush were cleared.

In the tuberculosis division the following transactions are noted:

Since the dispensary was opened to the public, 12,141 patients have registered, and on December 31, 1907, 308 patients were under treatment. In 1908, 979 patients registered, 918 adults and 61 children. There were 5,926 consultations at the dispensary and 1,102 home visits. The pharmacy dispensed 9,909 prescriptions. Patients to the number of 88 were supplied with food and 411 with condensed milk.

In the central office for tuberculosis there were on December 31, 1907, 1,769 registries. During the year 1908, 1,739 registrations were made. One thousand one hundred and eighty-five patients died and 506 were dropped from the lists, the actual number on December 31, 1908, being 1,817 tuberculous patients.

The division of district inspectors was also very active during the year, having petrolized 580,128 houses, in which 1,611 water deposits were found to contain mosquito larvæ; 1,734 of the genus *Stegomyia*.

The largest number of *Stegomyia* deposits found for any one month was 176 in October.

Eighty-seven stores, 63 private houses, 34 tenement houses, and 57 stables were closed. Seventeen houses were demolished, and 4,315 cesspools were cleaned, giving a total of 9,906 cartloads. Orders were issued for the mosquito-proof covering of 410 water tanks, 181 water deposits, 58 cisterns, and 318 containers of various descriptions.

In the month of March, 1908, the work of collecting and classifying mosquito larvæ was begun. A register of the infested houses was kept, and the name of the occupant noted.

The medical inspectors have maintained a very careful surveillance over all passengers coming to Habana from districts infected with yellow fever or suspected of such infection. All hotels, inns, boarding houses and lodging houses were required to report their daily arrivals. The registration books of all lodging houses have been kept as the law requires, and on this account the tracing of yellow fever cases has been much more successful.

During the year 1908 there were only 3 cases of yellow fever; 1 from Aguila street, taken sick January 27; another from Estrella street, taken sick on same date, and the last case from an inn in San Pedro street, taken sick September 11. This last case could not be satisfactorily traced. The measures employed to check spread from this case were successful.

The campaign against uncovered water deposits has resulted in a marked diminution of the *Stegomyia* mosquito, and a brigade is maintained. The special brigades for petrolizing cesspools and ditches have been reorganized to reenforce the work of the inspectors. Each brigade consists of 4 men with a horse and a cart.

Report from Matanzas—Inspection of vessels.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Nuñez reports, March 8:

Bills of health were granted to 9 vessels leaving for United States ports in good sanitary condition.

There were no quarantinable diseases reported during the week.

EGYPT.

Case of plague among pilgrims at Suakim.

The following information is taken from the Bulletin Quarantenaire, Alexandria, February 4 and 11:

A case of plague among the pilgrims by the steamship *Huriet II* was bacteriologically verified at the sanitary camp of Suakim and isolated February 1. The pilgrims were ordered to be removed to another

section of the camp after disinfection and quarantine, beginning from the date of verification.

Suakim is situated on the Red Sea and is the starting point of caravan travel for Berber, Kassala, and Khartoum.

Pilgrimage of 1908-9 declared plague infected.

The sanitary, maritime, and quarantine council of Egypt at its session of January 12 declared the present pilgrimage to the Hedjaz to be plague infected and resolved to apply to it the plague regulations. Pilgrims returning to Egypt by way of Syria shall undergo quarantine at Tor. Vessels bringing to Egyptian ports any considerable number of these pilgrims will be refused admission.

GERMANY.

Report from Berlin—Status of cholera in Russia.

The following is received from Consul-General Thackara, under date of February 20:

During the period from January 24 to 30 there were registered in the city of St. Petersburg 193 cases of cholera, with 52 deaths, and in other places in the government district of Petersburg 1 new case and 4 deaths; in the Don region 7 cases (4 deaths), making a total of 201 cases and 60 deaths.

According to a supplementary official report the total number of cases in the previous week amounted to 304, with 129 deaths.

Cholera spreading in St. Petersburg.

Consul-General Thackara further reports, February 15:

According to a press telegram dated February 12, the number of cholera cases continues to increase. To-day there were 43 fresh cases. At St. George's Hospital there are 15 new cases, and there are 2 cases at the Constantin Military School. A special cholera council has been convoked.
