Summary, Month of February, 1909.
During the month of February there were 59 vessels inspected and 8 vessels fumigated in connection with plague-prevention measures at Seattle.

Examination of rats for plague infection, month of February, 1909.
Assistant Surgeon Chapin, plague laboratory, reports, March 6, through Passed Assistant Surgeon Glover:

During the month of February, 1909, 2,872 rats were delivered at the laboratory and 2,729 were necropsied. No plague-infected rats were found. Of the necropsied rats 723 were females. One hundred and fourteen fleas were found upon 52 rats examined for this purpose.
The last plague rat was found September 26, 1908.

California-San Diego.-Month of February, 1909. Estimated population, 42,500. Total number of deaths, 40, including 11 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 1, diphtheria 3, tuberculosis 2.

City and county of San Francisco.-Month of January, 1909. Estimated population, 475,000. Total number of deaths, 553, including enteric fever 3 , scarlet fever 2 , whooping cough 4 , diphtheria 5 , measles 1, and 77 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 53, scarlet fever 47, smallpox 4, measles 272, whooping cough 37, enteric fever 13, and tuberculosis 121.

Los Angeles.-Month of February, 1909. Estimated population, 275,000. Total number of deaths reported, 366 , including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 5," and 73 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 29, enteric fever 27, scarlet fever 57, measles 17 , smallpox 4 , and tuberculosis 42.

Indiana-Lafayette.-Annual report for the year 1908. Estimated population, 23,000. Total number of deaths, 292, including enteric fever 5 , whooping cough 3 , measles 1 , diphtheria 5 , smallpox 1 , and 36 from pulmonary tuberculosis. Cases: Whooping cough 10 , enteric fever 8 , diphtheria 24 , smallpox 59 , measles 56 , scarlet fever 5, and pulmonary tuberculosis 11.

Kansas-Leavenworth.-Months of January and February, 1909. Estimated population 22,000. Total number of deaths, 67, including enteric fever 1, and 2 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 3, diphtheria 6, enteric fever 6 , tuberculosis 4 , and measles 2.

Louisiana-New Orleans.-Month of February, 1909. Estimated population, 362,000 ( 265,000 white, 97,000 colored). Total number of deaths 557 ( 352 white, 205 colored), including enteric fever 8 (white), scarlet fever 8 (white), diphtheria 2 (white), and 73 from tuberculosis, of which 44 were white and 29 colored. The death rate per 1,000 of population per annum for the month was: White, 15.94; colored, 25.36; Total white and colored, 18.46.

Minnesota.-Month of November, 1908. Estimated population, $1,979,658$. Reports to the state board of health show as follows: Total number of deaths, 1,504 , including diphtheria 55 , enteric fever 50 , scarlet fever 8 , whooping cough 5 , and 152 from tuberculosis. Deaths reported from state institutions during the month numbered 27, including enteric fever 1 , and 7 from tuberculosis.

Missouri-Springfield.-Month of February, 1909. Estimated population, 35,000 . Total number of deaths, 36 , including 6 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 6, diphtheria 2, smallpox 1.

New Hampshire-Manchester.-Month of February, 1909. Estimated population, 64,793 . Total number of deaths, 121 , including

## AUSTRALIA.

## Report from Brisbane-Examination of rodents for plague infectionLaboratory plague in animals at Mackay.

The following information is taken from plague bulletins received from the Department of Public Health of Queensland:

Date of finding of last plague-infected rat, September 15, 1908.
Week ended January 30, 1909. Rodents destroyed, 540; examined, 447; plague rodents, 0. Week ended February 6. Rodents destroyed, 684; examined, 600; plague rodents, 0.

Week ended February 13. Rodents destroyed, 580; examined 482; plague rodents, 0 .
. Mackay.-On January 21 a man carrying on business at Mackay died in the local hospital. Post-mortem specimens obtained from the cadaver and forwarded to Brisbane, on preliminary bacteriological examination were found to be negative of plague. A guinea pig and mouse, however, were inoculated in the usual way, and on February 2 the government bacteriologist reported that the animals had died ( 6 days after inoculation) with typical post-mortem appearances of plague. An active search for rats is being conducted and all precautions taken at Mackay.

## BARBADOS.

Reports from Bridgetown-Status of yellow fever.
Consul Martin reports, February 25 and March 5: Since February 16, 7 more cases of yellow fever have been reported to this consulate, all in the country parishes. Five of these cases were colored persons, and all were native born. None are reported as having terminated fatally.

There have been reported, since December 12, 52 cases, 16 being fatal.

March 5: Since February 25 there have been only 2 cases of yellow fever reported. One occurred in a colored boy in an outlying district, the other in a white man in the city of Bridgetown. A case has occurred at Speightstown, on the west coast, 12 miles north of Bridgetown, the first to occur in that parish. The disease is abating. Official information states that 25 of the first 52 cases were fatal.

Sir Rupert Boyce, of England, arrived in the colony March 1. He saw a case on the next day and at once pronounced it yellow fever.

He sees no difficulty in stamping it out by destroying the mosquitoes. He approves of the sanitary measures already taken by the authorities, and more efficient action is being used to eradicate the source of infection.

BRAZIL.

Period from January 18 to February 10. Vessels inspected and received bills of health for United States ports: January 19 the German steamship Gunther, for New York, in coffee cargo, with no passengers from this port and no change in the crew personnel; January 22 the British steamship Cervantes, for New York, with coffee, no passengers and 2 new members of the crew signed on in this port; on January 23 the American barge Clatsop, in ballast, with no change in crew at this port and bound for Portland, Oreg.; on the same date the British steamship Castillian Prince, for New York, in coffee cargo, with no passengers, and no change in crew here; on January 26, for Honolulu, the American ship Dirigo, with cargo of coal in transit, no passengers and 12 new members of the crew taken here; January 26 the British steamship Virgil, for New Orleans, in coffee, no passengers and no change in the crew; on the same date the British steamship Black Prince, for New Orleans, in cargo of coffee, no passengers and no change in the crew; on January 27 the Belgian steamship Cavour, for New York, in cargo, with no passengers and 1 new member of crew taken on in this port; on January 28 the British steamship Pontiac, for New York, in coffee cargo, with no passengers and with no change in the crew here; January 30 the Brazilian steamship Goyaz, for New York, with coffee and miscellaneous cargo for coast ports, and with a new crew taken on here, all of whom were vaccinated, and with 34 cabin and 78 steerage passengers; February 2 the British steamship Saxon Prince, for New York, in coffee cargo, with no passengers and no change in crew; on the same date the Norwegian bark Vaar, for Port Arthur, Tex., in stone ballast, with no passengers and no change in the crew; February 3 the British steamship Byron, for New York, with coffee cargo, no change in crew and with 13 first-class and 12 steerage passengers, and on the same date the British steamship St. Ursula, bound for New York, putting in here for coal only, with no passengers and no change in crew and no communication other than with coal barge.

No other vessels left during the period under report bound for United States ports.

Week ended February 18. No transactions.
Mortality, week ended January 24.-Total deaths, 291. No deaths nor cases caused by yellow fever. Plague caused no deaths, but there were 6 new cases reported. Smallpox caused 34 new deaths and 34 new reported cases, of which number 11 were in the suburban zone. At the close of the week there were in the Hospital São Sebastião 67 cases of smallpox and 9 cases of plague under treatment; in the Hospital Engenho do Dentro, 18 cases of smallpox under
treatment; in the Hospital Paula Candido, 2 convalescent cases of smallpox.

Week ended January 31.-Total deaths, 321. No cases nor deaths due to yellow fever, and only 1 death due to plague. Smallpox caused 17 deaths, with 27 new reported cases, of which number 4 were in the suburban zone. At the close of the week there were in Hospital São Sebastião 48 cases of smallpox and 5 cases of plague, and in the Hospital Engenho do Dentro 18 cases of smallpox under treatment. There was 1 convalescent case in the Hospital Paula Candido.

Week ended February 7.-Total deaths during the week, 278. No deaths nor cases due to yellow fever. Smallpox caused 13 deaths, with 31 new reported cases, of which number 7 were in the suburban zone. Plague caused 1 death, with 3 new reported cases. At the close of the week there were in the Hospital São Sebastião 43 cases of smallpox and 5 cases of plague under treatment; in the Hospital Engenho do Dentro, 13 cases of smallpox under treatment.

Week ended February 14.-Total deaths, 354. Plague caused 1 death, with 4 new reported cases. Smallpox caused 18 deaths, with 29 new reported cases, of which number 3 belonged to the suburban zone. At the close of the week there were in the Hospital São Sebastião 42 cases of smallpox and 3 cases of plague under treatment, and at the Hospital Engenho do Dentro 7 cases of smallpox under treatment.

## BRITISH GUIANA.

Report from Georgetown-Parimaribo, Dutch Guiana, declared free from yellow fever.

Consul Clare reports, February 13:
The consular agent at Paramaribo writes under date of February 10 that the governor of Dutch Guiana informs him officially that Paramaribo is now free of any quarantinable diseases, no new cases of yellow fever having occurred since January 18.

Clean bills of health are now being issued by the local authorities and the foreign consuls.

## Report from Shanghai-Inspection of vessels-Examination of emi-grant-Plague in rats-Measures recommended.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, February 9:
During the week ended February 6, 3 supplemental and 1 original bill of health were issued to 3 steamships with an aggregate personnel of 633 . There were inspected 3 vessels, 211 members of crews and 4 steerage passengers, and manifests were viséed for 3,419 pieces of freight. One emigrant for San Francisco was examined and passed.

Infected rats continue to be found in all sections of the city, but no human cases have been officially reported. It is stated by the French municipality that no plague infected rats have been found there.

Circulars have been sent out in the French concession cautioning inhabitants both native and foreign as to the necessity for and method of collecting dead rats, and squads of coolies are employed to perform this work.
Tientsin reports show 4 cases and 1 death from smallpox. The report is for the British and Japanese concessions only.

## ECUADOR.

Reports from Guayaquil-Inspection and fumigation of vesselsPlague and yellow fever-Plague and plague measures in interior towns.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Wightman reports, February 15 and March 1, through Passed Assistant Surgeon Lloyd:

During the 4 weeks ended February 6, bills of health were issued to 7 steamships, of which 5 were fumigated.

Quarantinable diseases were reported in Guayaquil as follows: Week ended January 16, 1 death from yellow fever, 2 deaths from plague; week ended January 23, 8 deaths from plague; week ended January 30, 2 deaths from yellow fever, 4 deaths from plague; week ended February 6, 7 deaths from yellow fever, 3 deaths from plague.

A case of plague occurred in Milagro January 18. The house in which it occurred was torn down and reconstructed and useless material burned. No further cases have been reported.

There have been 3 new cases of plague in Babuhoyo, all from the same house. This house was burned.

Tolte, the Indian village reported as plague infected, has remained free from that disease since measures were instituted by the public health service of Ecuador, but 7 cases have occurred in the neighboring village of Nisag, about 5 miles from Tolte. The roofs are being removed from the infected houses and their interior surfaces burned over. As they are built of stone and adobe the damage resulting from this process is but slight.

A few cases of smallpox have appeared in Guamote, a village on the railroad somewhat over 100 miles from Guayaquil.

March 1. During the 2 weeks ended February 20, 4 steamships were fumigated.

As the rainy season progresses plague shows a disposition to increase. It was during the same season last year that the first cases of the disease were discovered. February 25 there were 32 cases in the lazaretto. The total mortality, however, is considerably less than at the corresponding period of last year. For the week ended February 13, 61 deaths from all causes were recorded for Guayaquil, of which number 6 resulted from plague and 4 from yellow fever. For
the week ended February 20, a total of 71 deaths was recorded, 3 being due to plague and 3 to yellow fever. No death from other quarantinable disease was reported.

## GERMANY.

Report from Leipzig-Malaria-Measures for the extermination of mosquitoes.

Consul Warner reports, February 16:
Many cases of malaria having recently occurred in sections of Leipzig adjacent to the four small streams which flow through the city, the city council has decided to adopt stringent measures to exterminate the mosquitoes (Anopheles) that spread the disease.

In order that the work of extermination may be thoroughly and systematically carried out, the city council has notified all householders in the infected sections of the city to carefully examine their houses or apartments for mosquitoes and to destroy any that may be found. Every household in the districts concerned has been furnished by the council with a circular, which, in addition to information as to the cause and spread of malaria, contains advice as to the best means of destroying the malaria mosquitoes. Certain dates have been specified between which the houses are to be searched and the mosquitoes destroyed. At the expiration of the time specified, inspectors appointed by the council will visit each house and apartment and make careful examinations to see that the work of exterminating mosquitoes has been properly carried out. Those who fail to comply with the regulations promptly and thoroughly will be subject to a fine.

Report from Yokohama-Examination of emigrants.

Rejections and detentions were for trachoma.
Reports from Kobe-Inspection of vessels-Examination and disinfection of emigrants-Plague in rats and rat fleas-Smallpox.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Knight reports, February 16 and 23:
Week ended February 13. Supplemental bills of health granted to 4 steamships.
Fifty-three members of crews and 111 steerage passengers were inspected. Forty members of crews and 45 steerage passengers were bathed and disinfected. Their effects were disinfected by steam. The number of pieces of baggage steamed was 187, and of bedding 96. Manifests were viséed for 52,394 pieces of freight, amounting to 4,872 tons.

Emigrants were examined as follows: Steamship Korea, for Honolulu, passed 28, recommended for rejection 14; steamship Korea, for San Francisco, passed 2, recommended for rejection 3; steamship Aki Maru, for Seattle, passed 15, recommended for rejection 5.

The official returns for the week show plague found in rats and rat fleas in Kobe.
-During the week ended February 20 supplemental bills of health were granted to 2 steamships.

There were inspected 91 members of crews and 53 steerage passengers. Eighteen steerage passengers were bathed and disinfected. Their effects were disinfected by steam. The number of pieces of baggage steamed was 46, and of bedding 36. Manifests were viseed for 9,567 pieces of freight, amounting to 1,371 tons.

Emigrants were examined as follows:
Steamship Nippon Maru, for Honolulu, passed 14, recommended for rejection 14; and steamship Nippon Maru, for San Francisco, passed 4, recommended for rejection 1.

The official returns of infectious diseases for the week show smallpox 4 cases and 1 death. It will be noticed that smallpox is reported for the first time since the disappearance of the epidemic last year. Three of these cases, however, are Hindus, members of the crew of a vessel recently visiting Kobe, while the fourth is a Japanese child.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Gutierrez reports, February 18:
During the week ended February 6, 4 vessels were fumigated. They carried an aggregate personnel of 170 in the crew, and 97 cabin and 53 steerage passengers. One member of the crew from the British steamship Coya died at Callao from plague.

During the week ended February 13 bills of health were granted to 10 vessels of the United States Pacific fleet and 2 merchant vessels; the former were passed on statement of their medical officers and the latter fumigated prior to sailing. The merchant vessels carried an aggregate personnel of 113 in the crew, and 63 cabin and 52 steerage passengers.

The following is the latest report on plague in Peru received from the Director de Salubridad Pública:


The figures with the sign (*) have been miswired. Three plague patients ran away from the lazaretto at Chepen. There were 3 cases of smallpox in the lazaretto at Lima February 4. No cases of smallpox have been reported in Callao.

Since February 5,4 cases of plague with 2 deaths have occurred at Callao.

Reports of the status of cholera in Russia show for St. Petersburg from March 1 to 5, March 3 not included, 50 cases and 19 deaths; for Jaroslav from the beginning of the epidemic to March 1,43 cases and 18 deaths. New cases and deaths were reported at Jaroslav and Rubinsk March 1.

The steamship Lituania sailed March 5. Five days previous to the sailing of the vessel 1,199 emigrants were examined. Of this number 928 , the full number which the vessel could accommodate, sailed. They were reexamined on the day of sailing.

The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 19.9 per 1,000 . In Greater London 2,621 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 14 from measles, 1 from scarlet fever, 17 from diphtheria, whooping cough 2 , and 1 from enteric fever.

Ireland.-The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended February 27, 1909, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 23.0 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at $1,142,308$. The lowest rate was recorded in Portadown, viz, 10.3, and the highest in Lurgan, viz, 31.0 per 1,000 .
