Campaign against ground squirrels in Contra Costa County, Cal.

The following is received from Doctor Blue under date of May 10:

About April 20, 1909, a central headquarters for the campaign against ground squirrels in Contra Costa County was established at Alamo, Cal., and 5 men were placed on duty under the supervision of Passed Asst. Surg. W. C. Rucker.

The campaign will consist in shooting, trapping, and poisoning. For the latter purpose small gas machines will be used for sulphur

and carbon bisulphide asphyxiation. More men will be added to the above force as fast as accommodations can be secured.

On being notified of the proposed campaign the supervisors of Contra Costa County passed the inclosed resolution.

A copy is also inclosed of a state law which was enacted at the last session of the legislature against the harboring of ground squirrels and other rodents throughout the State.

No. 1.

[Extract from the proceedings of the board of supervisors of Contra Costa County, State of California, Thursday, May 6, 1909.]

Whereas the Federal Government has made a small appropriation for the purpose of the eradication of ground squirrels throughout the county of Contra Costa; and

Whereas Passed Asst. Surg. W. C. Rucker has been assigned by Doctor Blue, passed assistant surgeon, commanding, to conduct such campaign: Therefore be it

Resolved, That said Dr. W. C. Rucker be, and is hereby, appointed a squirrel inspector of this board for the purpose of carrying on a campaign to eradicate and destroy the ground squirrels in Contra Costa County; and be it further

Resolved, That the board of supervisors of Contra Costa County urgently recommends and requests that the farmers and citizens of Contra Costa County lend him every assistance in their power to eradicate said ground squirrels.

The foregoing resolution was passed by the unanimous vote of the board.

No. 2.

An act declaring property infested with certain rodents to be a public nuisance; requiring owners, occupants, and persons having possession of or dominion over such property to endeavor to exterminate and destroy such rodents; providing for the inspection of property by boards of health and health officers; authorizing boards of supervisors and other governing bodies to purchase materials and employ inspectors to prosecute such work of extermination; authorizing state and local health authorities to prosecute such work in certain cases; providing for the payment of the expense thereof; making the amount of such expense a lien on the property; providing for the collection of such amount by foreclosure of such lien; and declaring any violation of the provisions thereof to be a misdemeanor.

The people of the State of California, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. It shall be and is hereby declared to be the duty of every person, firm, copartnership, company, and corporation owning, leasing, occupying, possessing, or having charge of or dominion over, any land, place, building, structure, wharf, pier, dock, vessel, or water craft, which is infested with rats, mice, gophers, or ground squirrels, or as soon as the presence of the same shall come to his, their, or its knowledge, at once to proceed and to continue in good faith to endeavor to exterminate and destroy such rodents, by poisoning, trapping, and other appropriate means.

SEC. 2. The State board of health and inspectors appointed by such board, and local health officers and inspectors appointed for the purpose, as hereinafter provided, shall have authority, and shall be permitted to enter into and upon any and all lands, places, buildings, structures, wharves, piers, docks, vessels, and water craft, for the purpose of ascertaining whether the same are infested with such rodents and whether the requirements of this act as to the extermination and destruction thereof are being complied with: *Provided, however*, That no building occupied as a dwelling, hotel, or rooming house, shall be entered for such purpose except between the hours of nine o'clock in the forenoon and five o'clock in the afternoon of any day.

SEC. 3. The board of supervisors of each county and the city council or other governing body of each city and county, city, and town, whenever it may by resolution determine that it is necessary for the preservation of the public health or to prevent the spread of contagious or infectious disease, communicable to mankind, or when such board shall so determine that it is necessary to prevent great and irreparable damage to crops or other property, may appropriate moneys for the purchase of, and may purchase, poison, traps, and other materials for the purpose of exterminating and destroying such rodents in such county, city and county, city or town, and may employ and pay inspectors, who shall have authority to and shall prosecute such work of extermination and destruction, under the direction of such board, or of the local health officer, or board of health, on both private and public property, in such county, city and county, city or town.

SEC. 4. Whenever any person, firm, copartnership, company, or corporation, owning, leasing, occupying, possessing, or having charge of or dominion over any land,

place, building, structure, wharf, pier, dock, vessel, or water craft, which is infested with such rodents, shall fail, neglect, or refuse to proceed and to continue to endeavor to exterminate and destroy such rodents, as herein required, it shall be the duty of the state board of health, its inspectors and the local board of health and health officer, at once to cause such nuisance to be abated by exterminating and destroying such rodents. The expense thereof shall be a charge against the county, city and county, city or town, wherein the work is done, and the board of supervisors or other governing body shall allow and pay the same. Thereupon, the clerk of such board shall file in the office of the county recorder a notice of such payment, claiming a lien on such property for the amount of such payment. Any and all sums so paid by such county, city and county, city or town, shall be a lien on the property on which said nuisance shall have been abated, and may be recovered in an action against such property, which action to foreclose such lien shall be brought within ninety days after such payment, and be prosecuted by the district, city, or town attorney, in the name of such county, city and county, city or town, and for its benefit. When the property is sold, enough of the proceeds shall be paid into the treasury of such county, city and county, city or town to satisfy such lien and the costs, and the overplus, if any there be, shall be paid to the owner of the property, if known, and if not known shall be paid into court for the use of such owner when ascertained. When it appears from the complaint in such action that the property on which such lien is to be foreclosed is likely to be removed from the jurisdiction of the court, the court may appoint a receiver to take possession of the property and hold the same while the action may be pending or until the defendant shall execute and file a bond, with sufficient sureties, conditioned for the payment of any judgment that may be recovered against him in the action and all costs.

SEC. 5. Any violation of the provisions of this act shall be deemed a misdemeanor and shall be punishable as such.

Report from Los Angeles, Cal.—Case of leprosy.

Surgeon Brooks reports, May 4:

A case of leprosy has been found in a patient recently admitted to the Los Angeles County Hospital.

The patient is 55 years of age, a native of Italy. He has been a sailor for 19 years, and at one time was a plantation laborer in the Hawaiian Islands. He states that he has lived in this city for the last 6 years, usually working in restaurants or saloons, sweeping, dishwashing, etc. The thickened and furrowed condition of the forehead, lobes of the ears, hands, and especially the feet, are strongly indicative of leprosy. There is a superficial ulceration of both legs. Large numbers of acid-fast bacilli have been found in smears from the ulcers and in the secretions from the mouth and nostrils. There is a marked anaesthesia of the legs and the feet, and to a less degree in the arms. The patient believes that the disease appeared within the last two years. His last place of employment has been disinfected by the city health department, and he will be strictly isolated at the county hospital.

Summary of plague laboratory work during the month of April, 1909.

Assistant Surgeon Chapin, plague laboratory, reports, May 5, through Passed Assistant Surgeon Glover:

During the month of April, 1909, 4,083 rats were delivered at the laboratory and 4,004 were necropsied. No plague-infected rats were found. Two hundred and thirty-seven fleas were found upon 32 rats examined. Twenty-six rats were subjected to cultural and inoculation tests on account of lesions suggesting a remote possibility of an incipient or a typical plague infection, but with negative results.

ILLINOIS—*Alton*.—Month of April, 1909. Estimated population, 22,000. Total number of deaths, 14, including 1 from enteric fever. Cases: Diphtheria 1, and smallpox 2.

Peoria.—Month of April, 1909. Estimated population, 80,000. Total number of deaths not reported. Deaths reported from contagious diseases were: Scarlet fever 1, diphtheria 2, measles 3, whooping cough 1, and 8 from tuberculosis. Cases: Smallpox 44, and scarlet fever 6.

IOWA—*Ottumwa*.—Month of April, 1909. Estimated population, 25,000. Total number of deaths, 30; cause of deaths not reported. Cases: Measles 3, whooping cough 4, and tuberculosis 3.

KANSAS.—Month of February, 1909. Estimated population, 1,470,495. Total number of deaths from contagious and infectious diseases, 115. Causes of death: Tuberculosis 82, enteric fever 11, diphtheria 11, scarlet fever 7, and 4 from measles. Cases: Tuberculosis 134, enteric fever 35, diphtheria 82, scarlet fever 186, smallpox 358, and measles 562.

LOUISIANA—*New Orleans*.—Month of April, 1909. Estimated population, 362,000 (white, 265,000; colored, 97,000). Total number of deaths, 534 (white, 321; colored, 213), including enteric fever 5, scarlet fever 9, diphtheria 3, whooping cough 4, and 74 from tuber-

culosis. Annual death rate per 1,000 for the month: White, 14.53; colored, 26.35. Total white and colored, 17.68.

NEW YORK STATE.—Month of March, 1909. Estimated population, 8,699,643. Total number of deaths, 13,111, corresponding to an annual death rate of 18.1 per 1,000 of population, including enteric fever 77, smallpox 1, measles 140, scarlet fever 147, whooping cough 65, diphtheria 246, and 1,553 from tuberculosis. Cases: Tuberculosis 3,097, diphtheria 2,118, scarlet fever 3,175, measles 6,870, smallpox 32, and enteric fever 389.

Auburn.—Month of April, 1909. Estimated population, 40,000. Total number of deaths, 45, including whooping cough 1, and 5 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 2, enteric fever 1, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 5, phthisis pulmonalis 5.

Buffalo.—Month of April, 1909. Estimated population, 415,532. Total number of deaths, 477, including diphtheria 6, scarlet fever 13, enteric fever 5, and 57 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 11, scarlet fever 343, diphtheria 41, measles 40, whooping cough 26, and tuberculosis 80.

Rome.—Month of April, 1909. Estimated population, 18,500. Total number of deaths, 55, including diphtheria 2, and 8 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 2, diphtheria 13, enteric fever 1, whooping cough 7.

NORTH CAROLINA—Charlotte.—Month of April, 1909. Estimated population, 40,000. Total number of deaths, 42, including whooping cough 1, measles 2, and 5 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Measles 76, and whooping cough 4.

OHIO—Toledo.—Month of March, 1909. Estimated population, 195,888. Total number of deaths, 169, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 4, scarlet fever 1, and 20 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 16, measles 14, scarlet fever 18, enteric fever 40, and tuberculosis 2.

OREGON—Portland.—Month of March, 1909. Estimated population, 255,000. Total number of deaths, 169, including diphtheria 1, whooping cough 1, enteric fever 1, and 18 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 17, measles 231, whooping cough 5, scarlet fever 53, smallpox 9, and enteric fever 10.

UTAH—Salt Lake City.—Month of April, 1909. Estimated population, 85,000. Total number of deaths from all causes, 123, including diphtheria 2, scarlet fever 9, enteric fever 2, and 9 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 25, whooping cough 38, measles 10, smallpox 37, scarlet fever 83, and tuberculosis 1.

FOREIGN AND INSULAR.

ARABIA.

Report from Maskat—Fatal plague case from steamship Agrica from the Persian Gulf.

Vice and Deputy Consul Fazel reports, April 19:

One case of plague was landed here from the British India Steam Navigation Company's steamship *Agrica* arriving here from the Persian Gulf April 14. The patient died April 16.

AUSTRALIA.

Examination of rodents for plague infection in Queensland—Plague infection found in rats at Mackay.

The following information is taken from plague bulletins received from the department of health of Queensland, under dates of March 20 and 27 and April 3 and 8:

Brisbane.—Week ended March 20. Rodents destroyed, 466; examined, 410; plague infected, 0. Week ended March 27. Rodents destroyed, 521; examined, 443; plague infected, 0. Week ended April 3. Rodents destroyed, 548; examined, 462; plague infected, 0. Week ended April 8. Rodents destroyed, 460; examined, 372; plague infected, 0.

Date of last plague-infected rat September 15, 1908.

Mackay.—Infected rats found: March 19, 8; March 23, 3.

Report from New Castle, New South Wales—Plague case imported from Sydney.

Consul Killmaster reports, April 16:

During the month of March, 1909, 1 case of bubonic plague was imported into the New Castle district from Sydney.

Plague in Sydney—Plague rats.

The following information is taken from the *Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes*, April 28:

During the period from March 6 to 12, 4 plague cases occurred in Sydney, of which 1 ended fatally. Three of the cases occurred among the crew of a steamship which arrived March 6 from the New Hebrides. The fourth case was in a resident of the city. Plague rats were found in the residence of the latter case and also in the port.

BARBADOS.

Report from Bridgetown—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Small-pox on steamship Parima from Georgetown, British Guiana—Pernicious malarial fever on steamship Ecclesia from Brazil—Status of yellow fever—Mosquito destruction.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Urquhart reports, May 1:

Week ended May 1. Bills of health issued to 9 vessels having 32 passengers and 355 members of crews. Four vessels were fumigated.

One case of smallpox was taken off the steamship *Parima* from Georgetown, British Guiana, and placed in quarantine. The patient was a steward. All who could not show a good vaccination scar, with a recent history, were vaccinated by the port physician, with the exception of the captain, who refused to submit to vaccination. Notation to that effect was made upon bill of health and fumigation certificate. The living quarters of the ship were fumigated, and the bedding of the patient was burned, and his quarters were washed out with a solution of bichloride of mercury.

The steamship *Ecclesia* arrived here from Puerto Villa, on the Madeira River, Brazil, with 12 of the crew sick with malarial fever, pernicious form. Between Puerto Villa and Para, on the return voyage, 1 man died; and upon being removed to quarantine another died. The vessel was fumigated throughout, and hatches were recommended to be kept closed until just before arriving at Pensacola. The ship was in Madeira River water ballast, which was replaced with sea water upon leaving here; drinking water from condenser on board. The ship was compelled to lay to, so the captain reports, nearly a day, between here and Para, because all the crew were too sick to navigate the vessel. Twelve men were taken on here to replace those landed.

Four new cases of yellow fever were reported during the week. All of these cases occurred in the country, and all were among negroes. The warfare on the *Stegomyia calopus* is continued. The sanitary condition of this port is good.

BELGIUM.

Plague on steamship Rubens at Antwerp bacteriologically confirmed.

The following is received from the Belgian legation, through the Department of State:

May 3. An English vessel, the *Rubens*, which left San Nicolas, Argentine Republic, in cargo of grain, March 6, was held at Doel by the sanitary service April 11 as suspect.

There were 3 members of the crew, one of whom had been attacked by, and two were still suffering from, a disease which clinical examination has shown to be a mild form of bubonic plague (ambulatory plague).

The patients and the entire crew, numbering 300 persons, were immediately taken, the former to the lazaretto and the others to the sanitary station of Liefkenshoeck. The latter have remained five

days under observation. After this detention they will be subjected to five days' further surveillance by the local administration. The patients will remain at the lazaretto until cured.

The crew have been inoculated with antiplague serum. The ship has been disinfected and deratized. Discharge of cargo will be done at the port of Antwerp by lighters.

One of the patients is recovering. The condition of the second is satisfactory.

May 12.—Bacteriological examination has confirmed the clinical diagnosis in the cases of plague taken from the steamship *Rubens*. One of the patients is cured. He will resume his service on board the *Rubens* at the time of its departure. The condition of the last case is very satisfactory. No other case has occurred. Measures of surveillance and observation have been rigorously observed. The unloading of the steamship is almost completed and the vessel will return to active sea service.

CHINA.

Report from Amoy—Inspection of vessel—Examination of emigrants—Vaccination—Leprosy, plague, and smallpox.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Foster reports, April 3:

Week ended April 3.

The British steamship *Taisang*, with 69 in the crew and 34 cabin and 212 steerage passengers for Manila, was granted a bill of health. All passengers were vaccinated and inspected prior to sailing. Two steerage passengers were rejected for trachoma and one was rejected for favus.

The following quarantinable diseases are present in Amoy: Plague, leprosy, and smallpox.

Plague is reported epidemic in Chang Chew, the first prefectural city 30 miles west of Amoy.

Report from Shanghai—Inspection of vessels—Examination of emigrants—Plague rats—Rat-proofing of houses.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, April 14:

Week ended April 10. Supplemental bills of health granted to 2 steamships with an aggregate personnel of 482. There were inspected 1 vessel, 45 members of crews, and 4 cabin and 16 steerage passengers. Fifty-four pieces of baggage were also inspected and 2 pieces disinfected. There were examined and passed for San Francisco, per steamship *Tenyo Maru*, 4 emigrants, and 1 intending emigrant was recommended to wait. Manifests were viséed for 1,370 pieces of freight, amounting to 188.13 tons.

There were examined last week 510 rats found dead in various parts of the settlement, 6 of which (4 from the eastern and 2 from the northern districts) were plague-infected. Rat traps in operation numbered 2,478, and there were caught and destroyed without examination 462 rats. Four hundred and seven native houses were temporarily rat-proofed.

There were inspected 194 members of crews and 50 steerage passengers, and 27 members of crews and 25 steerage passengers were bathed and disinfected. Their effects were disinfected by steam. The number of pieces of baggage steamed was 127 and bedding 50. Manifests were viséed for 52,138 pieces of freight, amounting to 3,415 tons.

Emigrants were examined as follows: Steamship *Shinano Maru*, for Seattle. Passed, 23. Recommended for rejection, 12. The emigrants passed, together with 2 intending passengers to Victoria by the steamship *Shinano Maru*, were inspected, bathed, and disinfected, and their effects were disinfected before embarkation.

During the week 3 cases of human hair were disinfected with formalin.

The official returns of infectious diseases for the week show 1 case of plague in Kobe.

It is officially reported that between January 1 and April 12, 1909, 410 cases of plague, with 334 deaths, occurred on the Island of Formosa. The authorities are using every means to eradicate the disease, but it is still on the increase. Formosa is situated 800 miles southwest of Kobe.

During the week ended April 17, 2 supplemental bills of health were granted to 2 steamships and one original bill of health was granted to 1 steamship.

There were inspected 167 members of crews and 42 steerage passengers. Fifty-three members of crews and 32 steerage passengers were bathed and disinfected. Their effects were disinfected by steam. The number of pieces of baggage steamed was 190 and of bedding 64. Manifests were viséed for 34,741 pieces of freight, amounting to 2,368 tons.

Emigrants were examined as follows: Steamship *Tenyo Maru* for Honolulu, passed 22, recommended for rejection 15; steamship *Tenyo Maru* for San Francisco, passed 10, recommended for rejection 2.

The official returns of infectious diseases for the week show that there was reported in Kobe 1 case of plague, with no death from that disease.

RUSSIA.

Report from Libau—Status of cholera in St. Petersburg—Examination of emigrants—Method of certification—Disinfection of baggage—Typhus fever and plague present.

Acting Assistant Surgeon De Forrest reports, April 30:

In St. Petersburg from April 22 to 28, inclusive, there occurred 12 cases of cholera and 1 death.

Eight hundred and ninety-eight emigrants for steamship *Estonia*, sailing May 4, have been examined.

The steamship company states that they will, in May, begin the construction of barracks for their emigrants, consisting of 3 buildings and disinfecting station. I ascertain by personal observation that all passengers leaving in the company's vessels have been in Libau for 5 days and give each person or each family a blue or green card with names, ages, and date of first inspection. If they are in good condition, I stamp the card. They remain in special emigrant houses here for at least 5 days under daily observation of the city sanitary physician. When these emigrants come on board the ship, I inspect them again and hold all suspicious cases over until the sailing of the next steamship, and those who are passed have their quarantine card stamped with a date stamp.

All baggage (except hand baggage) is disinfected by formalin gas. By the end of May I expect to disinfect all hand baggage.

Typhus fever.—No new cases in Libau during the week ended April 30. There are 19 cases present.

Plague.—No new cases of plague in Libau. The one case previously reported is still present.

The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 15.0 per 1,000. In Greater London 2,005 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 15 from measles, 6 from diphtheria, 3 from scarlet fever, and 9 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended April 24, 1909, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 23.9 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,142,308. The lowest rate was recorded in Drogheda, viz, 4.1, and the highest in Armagh, viz, 48.1 per 1,000.
