Cases: Diphtheria 56, enteric fever 13, measles 15, scarlet fever 168, smallpox 81, whooping cough 387, and tuberculosis 13 (incomplete).

Washington—Spokane.—Annual report for the year 1908. Total number of deaths 1,245, corresponding to an annual death rate of 10.3 per 1,000 of population, which is estimated at 120,000. FOREIGN AND INSULAR.

ALGERIA.

Report from Algiers—Outbreak of typhus fever.

Consul Johnson reports, May 14:

There has been a sporadic outbreak of typhus fever in the Casbah, or old Arab town of Algiers, not extending to the modern city or the port. Numbers of Arabs have been driven to the city from the interior of the country by failure of crops. Typhus fever is endemic in the Arab villages in a mild form, but becomes virulent when imported into the towns. There have been about 200 cases in Algiers, with 35 deaths.

AZORES.

Report from St. Michael—Plague on islands of Fayal and Terceira—Quarantine maintained.

Consul Creevey reports, May 19:

The island of Fayal is still infected with plague. Official returns from the island of Terceira for the month of April, 1909, show 2 new cases of plague with 1 death.

The health of the island of St. Michael is officially declared good and strict quarantine is maintained against the islands of Fayal and Terceira.

BARBADOS.

Report from Bridgetown—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Status of yellow fever—Sanitary regulations enforced.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Urquhart reports, May 15:

Week ended May 15. Bills of health were issued to 4 vessels. One vessel was fumigated. These vessels carried a total number of 14

passengers and 307 members of crews.

One new case of yellow fever was reported this week, the case being in the country about 14 miles north of this port. No case of yellow fever has occurred at Bridgetown since March 19. Sanitary regulations are still being rigidly enforced, and the streets, alleys, and back premises are kept clean.

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BELGIUM.

Further relative to plague cases on steamship Rubens at Antwerp—Vessel again deratized.

The following information is received from the Belgian legation

through the Department of State, under date of May 21:

The Rubens sailed April 27, after being again deratized. The crew shipped with the exception of the two patients. One of the patients is entirely well. The condition of the second is considerably improved. No other case of plague has occurred.

CHINA.

Report from Amoy—Inspection of vessels—Examination of emigrants— Leprosy, plague, and smallpox.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Foster reports, April 20:

Week ended April 17. Bills of health issued to 2 steamships.

April 11, the British steamship *Taisang*, with 66 in the crew, 38 cabin and 160 steerage passengers, for Manila, was granted a bill of health. Six steerage passengers were rejected for trachoma and 1 cabin passenger for leprosy.

April 12, the British steamship Zafiro, with 74 in crew, 106 cabin and 401 steerage passengers, for Manila, was granted a supplemental bill of health. Eight steerage passengers were rejected for trachoma and 2 steerage passengers for seebing

and 2 steerage passengers for scabies.

Leprosy, plague, and smallpox are present in Amoy.

Reports from Shanghai—Inspection of vessels—Examination of emigrants—Plague-infected rats; new foci of infection found—Smallpox on U. S. S. Helena.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, April 20 and 28:

Week ended April 17. One original and 8 supplemental bills of health were granted to 9 vessels having an aggregate personnel of 3,364. There were inspected 3 vessels, 416 members of crews, and 19 steerage passengers; also 2 pieces of personal effects. Manifests were viséed for 6,382 packages of freight. One emigrant for San Francisco per steamship *Korea* was examined and passed, and 1 was rejected on account of trachoma.

The United States cruisers Galveston, Charleston, Denver, Cleveland, and Chattanooga were granted bills of health for ports in Japan and China, with Manila as the final destination, upon certificate

from their surgeons.

Infected rats continue to be found.

At the request of the surgeon of the United States ship Helena I visited that vessel on Friday, April 16, to inspect the vaccinations of the crew. Fifty-seven members of crew were revaccinated. Of the remaining members of the crew there were about 20 typical "takes," while the remainder showed reaction to a greater or less degree. The case of smallpox removed from this vessel developed a very severe confluent type. Two suspects are at present in the isolation hospital.

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Week ended April 24. One supplemental bill of health was granted during the week to 1 steamship with a personnel of 63. There were inspected 1 vessel and 63 members of crew. There were also inspected 21 packages of freight, 1 of which, green hides, was rejected and 20

of which were disinfected with formalin. Plague conditions in Shanghai remain unchanged.

No human cases have been reported. Plague-infected rats continue to be found in the several sections of the settlement. Since my last report 20 new foci of rat infection have been discovered, distributed as follows: Eastern district, 10; northern district, 8; central district, 2. In the eastern district one focus was established adjoining the water works. The remainder of these foci in this district were in the immediate vicinity of localities previously known to be infected. But in the case of the northern and central districts considerable new territory was involved.

Reports from Hankau for the week ended April 17 show that relapsing fever prevails to some extent among the poorer class of natives at that place. The same reports show that a foreign hide

inspector there died of pulmonary anthrax.

On the American steamship *Olivette*, sailing May 22 for Key West and Tampa, a leper was found among the passengers and sent ashore. In the lazarettoes of Cuba there are at present 299 lepers, representing but a portion of the cases actually existing. For the first ten-day period of May 13 cases of leprosy were reported in the Republic of Cuba.

Since the beginning of the rainy season mosquitoes have become more numerous in Habana, belonging almost exclusively to the species *Culex solicitans*.

Report from Matanzas—Inspection of vessels.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Nuñez reports, May 24:

INDIA.

Report from Bombay—Plague campaign—Measures taken to check spread of smallpox from pilgrim ships from Jiddah.

Consul Dennison reports, April 23:

The report of the Bombay health officer for the past quarter states that the mortality was lower by 1,352 than in the corresponding quarter last year, and the difference in the figure between this period and the mean of the corresponding quarter since plague began is very considerable. The report states that the destruction of rats, inocu-

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lation, and other preventive measures have been vigorously pressed. The large scale on which the rat campaign has been organized is shown by the fact that 100,000 rats were sent to the laboratory for examination during the past quarter. Inoculation, however, does not become any more popular, and a smaller number of inoculations is reported than was performed in the corresponding quarter of last year. The report also shows that the port health officer and president of the Haj committee have cooperated with the executive health officer in checking the spread of infection from smallpox brought by pilgrim ships from Jiddah.

Report from Calcutta—Transactions of Service—Cholera, plague, and smallpox—Plague in India and Bengal.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Allan reports, April 29:

During the week ended April 24, a bill of health was issued to the steamship Rauenfels, bound for Boston and New York, with a total crew of 70. The usual precautions were taken, the holds fumigated, rat guards placed on the wharf lines and the Asiatics' effects disinfected.

During the week ended April 17, 108 deaths from cholera, 90 from plague, and 171 from smallpox, in Calcutta. In Bengal there were 274 cases of plague with 235 deaths. In India there were 5,309 cases of plague with 4,594 deaths.

The annual meeting of the sanitary officers of the Empire is now taking place and regulations regarding vaccination, diagnosis of

leprosy, etc., are being discussed.

Sanitary measures appear to be well enforced. All vessels arriving at this port are inspected and all suspicious cases, if there are any on board, removed to the lazaretto and the ship is subjected to disinfection, if necessary, before passengers are allowed to land or the cargo to be discharged. All outgoing passengers are examined by the Mexican medical officer before going on board. All persons on trains are subject to inspection en route. A memorandum of their destination and of their intended place and length of sojourn is kept. They are subject to constant observation while in the State if strangers or transients, and all persons not known to be immune are isolated when affected with any suspicious disease. The city of Merida is divided in 4 or 5 districts, to each of which are assigned a medical inspector and several assistants, who make frequent visits to residences in their respective districts, keep note of immune and nonimmune occupants, of the entry and departure of nonimmunes, and of all matters of sanitary interest; isolate suspects, petrolize or

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compel the removal or proper covering of water receptacles, and, when necessary, practice disinfection of infected premises. Monthly

reports are made to the chief officer of sanitation.

The report on yellow fever in Yucatan for April, 1909, is as follows: At Merida it was reported, May 14, that there was "1 new case of yellow fever in the lazaretto." The case came from Tekax, a small interior town. This is the first case in Merida since March 3. Ticul, 2 cases, 1 death; last case, April 9. San Bernardo, 1 case, 1 death; last case, April 25.

The Persian ministry of foreign affairs states that on April 26 a vessel (probably Arabian) from Bender-Abbas, on the Persian Gulf, arrived at Bushire, having had 9 deaths on board from plague, and with 1 person suffering from the same disease, who subsequently died.

In consequence of this the stipulation of the convention of Paris in regard to quarantine will be strictly observed, and all vessels coming from Bender-Abbas will be subjected to quarantine for five days.

Cholera.—Cholera made its appearance in the town of Taytay about 10 days ago, a total of 9 cases occurring, but no further cases have been reported for more than 5 days. Considerable interest attached to this small outbreak because a large commission composed of members of the bureau of health, the bureau of science, and the Philippine Medical School, being in all more than 15 medical men, were at work in that municipality making a study of the incidence of hookworm and a general sanitary survey of the conditions that exist in a native town of the Philippines. In addition to its other duties, this commission had special instructions to exercise vigilance with regard to any cases of cholera that might occur. From the foregoing it will be seen that the investigation of first cases could be carried out under the most favorable auspices, but that, in spite of this fact, no light could be thrown upon the origin of the first case. The case in question occurred in an old man, about 60 years of age, who had not been outside of Taytay for a number of weeks previous, and, so far as could be ascertained, the food which he ate was mostly obtained in Taytay itself and was common to the majority of the inhabitants. So far as known, there have been no other cases of cholera nearer Taytay than 50 miles. The remaining 8 cases could be more or less satisfactorily traced to the An extensive examination is now being made for possible spirilli carriers, so far without success.

The number of cases in the remaining provinces of the Philippines remains about the same, the disease slowly spreading from town to town.

Smallpox.—It may perhaps be interesting to note that during the past 2 weeks there have been 36 cases of smallpox in Manila, of which 34 were of the varioloid form and occurred in persons who had not been previously vaccinated. No deaths resulted. The two remaining cases were unvaccinated Americans, both of whom died. This produced considerable excitement in Manila, and thousands of persons are flocking to the different health stations in order to be vaccinated. The service has been cooperating actively in this work, no less than 160 persons being vaccinated by the office force on duty in the office of the chief quarantine officer.

During the week consular bills of health were issued at the port of Manila as follows:

April 13, the British steamship Changsha, with 72 members of crew and 9 passengers, en route from Hongkong to Zamboanga, was granted a supplemental bill of health. April 15, the United States Army transport Logan, with 195 in the crew and with 713 passengers, was granted a bill of health for San Francisco via Nagasaki and Honolulu. The crew and passengers were bathed and their effects

and baggage disinfected. The cargo and baggage was disinfected or passed after inspection. The vessel was only partially disinfected. All persons on board were inspected at the hour of sailing. April 15, the British steamship Ning Chow, with 93 in the crew, en route from London to Seattle and Tacoma, was granted a supplemental bill of health after inspection of cargo and personnel. April 16, the British steamship Indrasamha, with 64 in the crew, en route from Kobe to New York, was granted a supplemental bill of health after the usual supervision and inspection of cargo. April 17, the British steamship Shimosa, with 57 in the crew, en route from New York to Iloilo, was granted a supplemental bill of health.

RUSSIA.

Report from Libau—Status of cholera at St. Petersburg—Typhus fever in Russian cities—Examination of emigrants.

Acting Assistant Surgeon De Forest reports, May 14:

Cholera.—Fifteen cases of cholera, with 7 deaths, occurred at St. Petersburg from May 7 to 14, inclusive.

Typhus fever.—From 2 to 4 cases of typhus fever occur at St.

Petersburg daily.

During the week ended May 9 there occurred 5 new cases of typhus fever in Libau. The disease is reported to be present in nearly every large city in Russia. Reports of its presence in Moscow, St. Petersburg, Kiew, and Wilna are received.

One thousand four hundred and thirty-six emigrants for steamship *Russia*, which leaves Libau May 18 for New York, have been examined. Of the number examined about 1,100 will sail on the date named.

SALVADOR.

Report from San Salvador—Decrease of smallpox—Vaccination.

Consul-General Frazier reports, April 27:

There has been a gradual abatement of smallpox in Salvador. The superior board of health of San Salvador reports, under this date: San Salvador, no cases; Santa Ana, 7 convalescent cases; Santiago de la Frontera, 12 patients, no new cases; Ahuachapan, 5 convalescent cases; Canton San Geronimo, department of Metapan, in the recently established hospital, 7 patients. Two deaths occurred before the opening of the hospital.

This statement represents the present status of the disease. Prac-

tically the entire population has been vaccinated.

VENEZUELA.

Report from Caracas—Plague—Plague rats—Service representative appointed for duty in consulate.

The following is received from the Department of State, under date of May 24:

The American minister, in a telegram dated May 24, reports: "A case of bubonic plague developed at Caracas. Government active."

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May 28. The following report dated May 27 from the American minister at Caracas was received from the Department of State:

Two cases of plague officially declared since May 20. Government proceeding with great activity. After examination, rats found infected. Energetic sanitary measures being taken. Special isolation hospital. Thorough disinfection of premises and inoculation of occupants. Compulsory inoculation with lymph for persons leaving Federal district. Sanitary inspection of all houses. Up to the present time no cases are reported at La Guaira. Public health commission lately created is in charge, and reports directly to the government. Maritime sanitary police regulations adopted, and strict compliance therewith decreed by the executive.

Acting Asst. Surg. W. H. Kellogg, appointed May 6 for duty in the office of the American consulate at La Guaira, proceeded May 29 to La Guaira and Caracas with instruction to respond to any request made by the American minister for inspection or advice at Caracas or elsewhere.

France—St. Etienne.—Two weeks ended April 30, 1909. Estimated population, 150,000. Total number of deaths, 121, including scarlet fever 2, and 18 from tuberculosis.

Great Britain—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended May 8, 1909, correspond to an annual rate of 14.1 per 1,000 population, which is estimated at 16,445,281.

London.—One thousand three hundred and four deaths were registered during the week, including measles 73, scarlet fever 10, diphtheria 13, whooping cough 35, tuberculosis 145, and 13 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 14.1 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,833 deaths were registered.

In the "outer ring" the deaths included 11 from measles, 2 from diphtheria, 2 from scarlet fever, 1 from enteric fever, and 3 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended May 8, 1909, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 18.3 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,142,308. The lowest rate was recorded in Galway, viz, 3.9, and the highest in Kilkenny, viz, 39.3 per 1,000.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended May 8, 1909, correspond to an annual rate of 16.2 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,839,038. The highest rate of mortality was recorded in Perth, viz, 20.6, and the lowest in Paisley, viz, 12.5 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 577, including diphtheria 2, measles 8, scarlet fever 8, and 41 from whooping cough.

Spain—Cadiz.—Month of April, 1909. Estimated population, 69,382. Total number of deaths, 159, including enteric fever 3, whooping cough 16, and 16 from tuberculosis.
