STATISTICAL REPORTS OF MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY, STATES AND CITIES OF THE UNITED STATES—UNTABULATED.

CALIFORNIA—*Los Angeles*.—Month of May, 1909. Estimated population, 275,000. Total number of deaths reported, 301, including enteric fever 4, scarlet fever 2, whooping cough 2, diphtheria 1, and 45 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 24, enteric fever 14, scarlet fever 47, smallpox 4, measles 25, and tuberculosis 34.

San Diego.—Month of May, 1909. Estimated population, 42,500. Total number of deaths, 51, including diphtheria 1, and 7 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 5, measles 4.

Stockton.—Three months ended February 28, 1909. Estimated population, 25,000. Total number of deaths, 72, including 7 from tuberculosis. Cases: Smallpox 50, scarlet fever 6, diphtheria 2, and tuberculosis 7.

FLORIDA.—Cases of communicable diseases diagnosed at the laboratory of the state board of health for the week ended June 12, 1909, are as follows: *Diphtheria*—Palatka, 1; Jacksonville and Tampa, each 2 cases. *Malaria*—Jacksonville, 18; Tampa, 13; Crescent City, 2; Inverness, Lake Butler, Mayport, Plant City, and Palatka, each 1 case. *Tuberculosis*—Jacksonville, 3; Tampa, 2; Bradentown, Gainesville, Orlando, Sanford, and Wausau, each 1 case. *Enteric fever*—Jacksonville, 2; Mandarin, Sopchoppy, and Tampa, each 1 case.

ILLINOIS—*Quincy*.—Month of May, 1909. Estimated population, 43,000. Total number of deaths, 44, including enteric fever 2, diphtheria 2, and 6 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 1, diphtheria 7, measles 2.

INDIANA.—Month of April, 1909. Total number of deaths, 3,212, corresponding to an annual death rate of 14.3 per 1,000 of the popu-

lation, which is estimated at 2,732,549. Deaths from contagious diseases were: Tuberculosis 427, enteric fever 33, diphtheria 9, scarlet fever 9, measles 36, whooping cough 48, and 1 from smallpox. Cases: Smallpox, 74 in 18 counties; enteric fever, 58 in 24 counties; diphtheria, 60 in 21 counties.

KENTUCKY—*Henderson*.—Month of May, 1909. Estimated population, 17,900. Total number of deaths, 18, including enteric fever 2, and 4 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 2, scarlet fever 1, smallpox 2, and tuberculosis 4.

LOUISIANA—*New Orleans*.—Month of May, 1909. Estimated population, 362,000 (white, 265,000; colored, 97,000). Total number of deaths, 609 (white, 375; colored, 234), including enteric fever 6, scarlet fever 17, diphtheria 4, and 77 from tuberculosis. Annual death rate per 1,000 for the month: White, 16.98; colored, 28.84. Total white and colored, 20.18.

MISSOURI—*Springfield*.—Month of May, 1909. Estimated population, 35,000. Total number of deaths, 30, including 8 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 6, and diphtheria 1.

NEW HAMPSHIRE—*Concord*.—Month of April, 1909. Estimated population, 20,000. Total number of deaths, 43, including measles 1, and 3 from pulmonary tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 1, diphtheria 4, and measles 478.

Month of May, 1909. Total number of deaths, 55, including whooping cough 1, and 7 from pulmonary tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 7, diphtheria 2, and measles 319.

NEW YORK—*Auburn*.—Month of May, 1909. Estimated population, 40,000. Total number of deaths, 39, including whooping cough 1, and 3 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 1, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 13, and phthisis pulmonalis 6.

Yonkers.—Month of May, 1909. Estimated population, 72,200. Total number of deaths, 83, including enteric fever 1, diphtheria 3, and 9 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 70, diphtheria 12, measles 38, enteric fever 1, and pulmonary tuberculosis 25.

OHIO—*Cleveland*.—Annual report for the year 1908. Total number of deaths, 7,177, corresponding to a death rate of 13.93 per 1,000 of population, which is estimated at 515,000. The number of deaths from contagious diseases were: Enteric fever 64, measles 41, scarlet fever 34, whooping cough 22, diphtheria 83, and 698 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 915, scarlet fever 652, enteric fever 520, measles 2,685, and whooping cough 805.

Toledo.—Month of April, 1909. Estimated population, 195,888. Total number of deaths, 162, including diphtheria 1, enteric fever 2, and 24 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 17, measles 25, scarlet fever 11, enteric fever 12, and tuberculosis 1.

TENNESSEE—Nashville.—Month of May, 1909. Estimated population, 127,723. Total number of deaths, 170, including enteric fever 1, and 18 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 5, smallpox 4, enteric fever 10, diphtheria 6, and pulmonary tuberculosis 14.

TEXAS—Fort Worth.—Month of May, 1909. Estimated population, 80,000. Total number of deaths, 74, including 2 from smallpox. Cases: Smallpox 21, enteric fever 5, scarlet fever 1, diphtheria 1, measles 2, whooping cough 1, and tuberculosis 1.

UTAH—Salt Lake City.—Month of May, 1909. Estimated population, 85,000. Total number of deaths from all causes, 90, including diphtheria 2, scarlet fever 7, whooping cough 2, and 6 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 17, whooping cough 33, measles 11, smallpox 56, scarlet fever 76, enteric fever 1, and tuberculosis 1.

VIRGINIA—Newport News.—Month of May, 1909. Estimated population, 28,749. Total number of deaths 33, including 7 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 1, diphtheria 2, measles 5, and tuberculosis 5.

Richmond.—Month of May, 1909. Estimated population, 115,701—white, 73,204; colored, 42,497. Total number of deaths, 215—white, 110; colored, 105, including 20 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 4, enteric fever 21, scarlet fever 2, and whooping cough 2.

WASHINGTON—Seattle.—Month of April, 1909. Estimated population, 276,000. Total number of deaths, 179, including enteric fever 1, scarlet fever 2, diphtheria 3, and 28 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 21, smallpox 4, scarlet fever 59, measles 83, enteric fever 2, and tuberculosis 21.

Tacoma.—Month of May, 1909. Estimated population, 120,000. Total number of deaths, 44, including diphtheria 1, tuberculosis 5, and 1 from enteric fever.

CURRENT QUARANTINE MEASURES.

PLAGUE.

[From the Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes, Berlin, June 3, 1909.]

Italy.—May 18. Quarantine declared against arrivals from the port of Azov, on the Black Sea.

May 24. Singapore declared cholera infected.

ALGERIA.

Deratization at Algiers and other localities—Rat fleas.

The following is taken from the *Bulletin Bimensuelle*, Algiers, May 15:

Algiers.—May 1–15: Rodents taken by the maritime sanitary service, 826; examined by the laboratory of health, 46; result, negative. Classification of rats: *Mus norvegicus*, 691; *Mus rattus*, 129; *Mus alexandrinus*, 4; *Mus musculus*, 72.

RAT FLEAS. *Ctenopsylla musculi* on *Mus norvegicus*, 21.

Bona.—Month of April: Rodents taken, 401; examined, 171.

Bougie.—Month of March: Rodents taken, 29; examined, 17; result, negative. The rodents taken were from the wharves.

Dellys.—Month of April: Rodents taken: 51 in the city; 54 on the wharves. Total 105.

Oran.—Month of April: Rodents taken, 906; examined, 258; result, negative.

Philippeville.—Month of April: Rodents taken, 53; examined, 26; result, negative.

AUSTRALIA.

Examination of rodents for plague infection in Queensland.

The following is taken from the bulletin received from the department of public health of Queensland:

Brisbane.—Week ended May 8: Number of rodents destroyed, 517; examined, 413; found infected, 0.

Date of last plague-infected rat, September 15.

BARBADOS.

Reports from Bridgetown—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Status of yellow fever in island—Fumigation in infected districts—Quarantine against Trinidad on account of plague.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Urquhart reports, June 5 and 12:

Week ended June 5. Bills of health issued to 8 vessels, of which 3 were fumigated—116 passengers and 298 members of crews.

Sanitary condition of vessels, cargoes, crews, and passengers, good.

No new yellow fever cases or deaths were reported during the week.

The sanitary condition of the port remains good. Sanitary regulations are rigidly enforced. The government has been officially notified since May 29, of the existence of a case of plague in Trinidad. The usual quarantine will be enforced in consequence.

Week ended June 12. Bills of health issued to 7 vessels, of which 2 were fumigated—74 passengers and 332 members of crews.

Sanitary condition of vessels, cargoes, crews, and passengers, good.

Three new cases of yellow fever were reported during the week, all negroes. These cases all occurred in St. Joseph's parish, about 15 miles north of Bridgetown, where most of the fever cases have occurred during this season. The central board of health has decided to send inspectors at once to the infected district and begin a more thorough system of fumigation of houses and cleaning up of premises to rid the district of infection. The health of this port is good.

CHINA.

Report from Amoy—Cholera.

The following information is received from the consular office, through the Department of State, June 19:

Cholera, Amoy.

Reports from Hongkong—Quarantine restrictions—Plague and small-pox—Examination of emigrants—Inspection of vessels.

Temporary Acting Assistant Surgeon Gröne reports:

Weeks ended April 10 and 24 and May 1. Restrictions enforced by Hongkong remain as reported April 3.

Quarantinable diseases.—Week ended April 10. Plague, 1 case; smallpox, 2 cases. Week ended April 24. Plague, 5 cases, 1 death; smallpox, 1 case. Week ended May 1. Plague, 7 cases, 7 deaths; smallpox, 1 case, 1 death.

Inspection of vessels.—Week ended April 10: 5 steamships. Week ended April 24: 8 steamships. Week ended May 1: 6 steamships.

Aliens for Honolulu and Pacific coast ports.—Week ended April 10. Examined, 9; rejected, 4. Week ended April 24. Examined, 26; rejected, 18. Week ended May 1. None.

Aliens for Philippine Islands.—Week ended April 10. Examined, 14; rejected, 10. Week ended April 24. Examined, 11; rejected, 8. Week ended May 1. Examined, 7; rejected, 6.

No reports for week ended April 17 received.

Method employed at Hongkong for the prevention and destruction of rats on vessels.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Hough, on leave in the United States, reports, June 18:

The following is a report on the methods enforced in Hongkong, China, for the prevention and destruction of rats on vessels bound

from that port to places in the United States or the Philippine Islands:

All vessels on the regular routes between Hongkong and United States ports are required to undergo, while empty, sulphur fumigation every 6 months.

All vessels dry docking in Hongkong are fumigated after leaving the dock.

All occasional or tramp vessels calling at Hongkong from any port in China must be fumigated before a bill of health is granted.

During the past year many of the vessels have been disinfected at San Francisco, and when this was done, and a certificate from the medical officer of the service produced, the fumigation was waived at Hongkong.

The Nippon Yusen Kaisha, a Japanese line plying regularly between Hongkong and Seattle, require their vessels to be fumigated on every trip, i. e., about once in 3 months. This is the company's regulation, but this office is requested to supervise it.

There are 3 steamship lines running vessels from Japan to Australia via Hongkong and Manila, and these vessels are fumigated each trip, either in Japan or Australia, as is required by the Australian government.

One line of vessels, the Arthur Holt Steamship Company, plies between England and Seattle via the Malay Straits and China and Japan. All of these vessels are fumigated when empty in Liverpool, and always have a certificate of disinfection from the United States consul.

When the systematic fumigation was started about 4 years ago great numbers of rats were killed on every vessel. Now, however, the number found on the regular steamships is very small, showing that the fumigation is effective.

Very few of the vessels go alongside the wharf in Hongkong. This is fortunate, as the usual method of using rat guards on the lines is, in the majority of cases, not efficient.

Report from Swatow—Cholera and plague in vicinity.

Consul Pontius reports, April 17 and 24, and May 1, 8, and 15:

Bubonic plague is increasingly prevalent in the outlying districts. April 24, 5 districts were reported infected, with a total of 200 deaths; May 1, 12 districts, with a total of 1,500 deaths; May 8, a total of 2,000 deaths was reported, with 2 new districts infected; and May 15, 50 deaths were reported in 1 district.

Cholera was reported present, with several deaths, in the vicinity of Swatow May 1.

The Norwegian steamship *Times*, employed in the freight service between Mobile and Habana, arrived June 7 with a case of enteric fever on board. This being the second case of enteric fever removed from this vessel in 2 weeks, the water tanks were discharged and the captain was directed to disinfect them with live steam before taking on water from Habana. Prior to this drinking water was supplied at Mobile.

Temperatures are recorded of all nonimmune passengers bound for southern ports and persons with readings of 38° C. are rejected.

No reports of house-to-house inspection have been received.

Case of yellow fever at Habana on steamship Fürst Bismarck from Veracruz.

Doctor Amesse further reports, under date of June 21:

A case of yellow fever arrived at Habana on the steamship *Fürst Bismarck* from Veracruz.

The patient was a Spaniard from Puebla, Mexico, who was said to have spent six days in a lodging house near the wharves at Veracruz just prior to sailing. The disease developed on the third day out from Veracruz. Upon arrival the case was isolated at the Las Animas Hospital.

Report from Matanzas—Inspection of vessels—Mosquitoes.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Nuñez reports, June 14:

Week ended June 12. Bills of health issued to 8 vessels leaving for United States ports with an aggregate personnel of 236 crews and 12 passengers in transit. They were all in good sanitary condition.

Rainy weather prevailed throughout the week, and mosquitoes are notably increasing in number, notwithstanding the periodical oiling of their usual breeding places.

No quarantinable diseases have been reported.

JAPAN.

Reports from Yokohama—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Plague—Inspection of hospital for infectious diseases.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Cumming reports, May 26:

During the week ended May 22 bills of health were issued to 5 vessels having an aggregate personnel of 550 members of crew, and 258 steerage and 310 cabin passengers.

The steamships *Woglinde* and *Pathan* from this port for New York via Manila and ports were fumigated throughout (except officers' quarters) for the purpose of destroying rats. The crews of nearly all of the vessels trading between Yokohama and New York via Suez are shipped at Singapore en route to New York; hence the crew treated here is not that which reaches the United States.

In addition to the above the *Minnesota*, with 193 cabin and 78 steerage passengers and 281 members of crew, was cleared for Seattle; the *China*, with 117 cabin and 180 steerage passengers and 159 members of crew, was cleared for San Francisco via Honolulu; and the schooner *Junho Maru*, with 17 members of crew, for Agana, Guam Island. Steerage passengers and crew embarking here were bathed and their effects disinfected and labeled as usual.

Another case of plague was discovered 2 days ago in a new focus near the creek just under the bluff where most of the Europeans live. This makes 11 cases and 8 deaths reported.

May 25 I visited and inspected the Manji hospital for infectious diseases for the city of Yokohama.

The hospital is in an inclosure of about 2 acres in the southeastern suburban portion of the city and on the main creek or canal, and is surrounded by a 6-foot close-board fence.

The buildings consist of a 2-story frame administration building, in which are quarters for the female nurses, resident physicians, 2, and 2 pharmacists, and from this building radiate covered (roofed) plank walks leading to the hospitals proper, which consist of about 6 one-story frame buildings.

These buildings are well raised above the ground, and are 1 room deep. On the south side of the building 10 rooms, each 12 by 12 feet, adjoin each other, and on the north side runs a 6-foot hall. The rooms are separated from the hall by sliding glass doors, and the outer walls are nearly all of glazed sash, so that the building is light and well ventilated throughout. The floors are bare and wooden beds are used. An end room is used as nurses' room.

The hospital is used for cases of plague, dysentery, smallpox, cholera, scarlet fever, enteric fever, and diphtheria, and I was shown cases of enteric fever, diphtheria, smallpox, bubonic plague, and dysentery. There were no cholera or scarlet fever cases under treatment.

The plague ward is in the same compound and is not fenced off from the other wards, but there is a separate entrance for patients and washroom and watercloset.

The utmost care seems to be taken to prevent infection of doctors and nurses. Upon approaching the covered walk leading to the wards we were provided with white gowns with tight wristlets. Over the feet and legs are slipped heavy, close, cotton stocking and leggings in one piece, while over the nose and mouth are worn shields holding gauze. In making physical examination of plague pneumonia patients there are provided capes with hoods completely covering head, shoulders, and face. In the face of the hood mask are inserted glass eyepieces and wire gauze respirators.

The floors of the plague ward are kept wet with carbolic spray.

There were 4 bubonic plague cases shown us.

In the compound, but separated by a fence, are quarters for persons under observation and detention. These were occupied by about 150 contacts from the plague-infected areas.

The contacts are bathed and their clothes disinfected before admission. They sleep in rooms, one or more families being in one 12 by 12 room. They sleep on the native tatami or mats of heavy straw some 4 inches thick, covered by matting. The rooms are poorly lighted, like the homes of the poorest class.

A disinfection of these quarters would be impracticable unless they were drenched in a strong disinfecting solution.

A place for disinfection of clothing, etc., is provided, together with a building in which visitors may change their garments.

Report from Kobe—Inspection of vessels—Examination and disinfection of emigrants.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Knight reports, May 29:

Week ended May 22. Supplemental bills of health granted to 5 steamships and 1 original bill of health granted to 1 steamship.

There were inspected 226 members of crews and 212 steerage passengers. Seventy-three members of crews and 28 steerage passengers were bathed and disinfected and their effects were disinfected by steam. The number of pieces of baggage steamed was 236 and bedding 56. Manifests were viséed for 71,404 pieces of freight, amounting to 6,695 tons. One vessel was fumigated with sulphur to kill vermin, and her forecandle was washed down with antiseptic solution.

Emigrants were examined as follows: Steamship *Minnesota*, for Seattle, passed 25, recommended for rejection 13; steamship *China*, for Honolulu, passed 2, recommended for rejection 20; for San Francisco, passed 1, recommended for rejection 4.

Report from Nagasaki—Examination of emigrants.

Acting Sanitary Inspector Thompson reports, May 15: May 10, for Seattle, Wash., examined 10 aliens, passed 8, rejected 2. For Honolulu and San Francisco, passed 8, rejected 6. Rejections were for trachoma.

During the week ended May 15 there was no quarantinable disease present in the consular district.

MEXICO.

Report from Coatzacoalcos—Inspection of vessels—Sanitary conditions—Mosquitoes.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Thompson reports, June 10:

Week ended June 9. Three vessels inspected.

No illness occurred on these vessels while in port and all on board were well when they sailed.

Malaria is the prevailing disease at the port, but the general health is good. The rainy season has begun and mosquitoes are more numerous. There have been no cases of quarantinable disease reported.

PERSIA.

Report from Teheran—Further relative to plague on steamship at Bouchir.

The following information is taken from the bulletin of the sanitary council of Persia, dated May 3:

April 27. The chief of the sanitary service of the Persian Gulf reported to the council:

Steamship *Dumra* arrived at Bouchir from Bassorah April 26, with a history of 3 suspect plague deaths. One case entered at the lazaretto at Bouchir died four hours after admission of pneumonic plague. Pure culture of plague bacillii was obtained. All necessary measures have been taken. The cases occurred among members of the crew. The crew did not land at Bassorah, where the vessel was quarantined.

May 2. Another seaman from the crew of the *Dumra* died at the lazaretto at Bouchir April 30.

The sanitary officer for the Persian Gulf reports the sanitary condition of the Gulf ports to be satisfactory.

The city of Bassorah is declared clean, the infection having been imported from Bombay. The steamship *Dumra* came from Bombay. (See Public Health Reports, June 4, 1909, p. 792.)

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

PORTUGAL.

Report from Lisbon—Further relative to yellow fever cases from steamship Lanfranc.

Information received June 14 from Consul-General Aymé, through the Department of State, shows that 2 passengers suffering from yellow fever were landed at Lisbon from the steamship *Lanfranc*, en route from Para to Liverpool. They were promptly placed in quarantine. (See Public Health Reports, June 18, 1909, pp. 877 and 883.)

RUSSIA.

Report from Libau—Status of cholera in St. Petersburg—Examination of emigrants.

Acting Assistant Surgeon De Forest reports, June 4:

During the week ended June 1, 5 cases of cholera with 4 deaths were reported in St. Petersburg.

For steamship *Lituania*, sailing for New York, to-morrow, June 5, I have examined 1,058 emigrants, of which number about 800 will sail. All will have been in Libau, under observation, for 5 days. Two hundred pieces of baggage have been disinfected.

VENEZUELA.

Report from Caracas—New plague cases.

The following information is received from the American minister at Caracas, through the Department of State, under date of June 17:

Five additional cases of plague since last cable, June 9; 5 deaths in all.

*Measures to prevent spread of plague—Preventive inoculation—
Destruction of rodents.*

The American minister at Caracas reports, May 31, through the Department of State:

A decree of the municipality forbids any person to leave the federal district without being provided with a certificate of having been injected with Haffkine lymph. The minister for foreign affairs states that a decree is to be issued forbidding any travel in tramways or coaches without such certificate. Rats and mice are being purchased and many of these rodents have been burned. A force of over 100 men who have been injected with Haffkine lymph are at work cleaning the gullies that cross the city. Plague patients are immediately isolated and premises disinfected. The construction of the houses and other conditions make the question of sanitation in Caracas a very difficult one. Rats have been breeding for hundreds of years in the old houses. The people here have had no experience with the disease and measures against it are likely to be neglected if there is the slightest sign of an abatement.

A very general inoculation with Haffkine lymph is being conducted, and up to May 31 2,500 persons were officially reported as having been inoculated.

London.—One thousand two hundred and forty deaths were registered during the week, including measles 63, scarlet fever 6, diphtheria 17, enteric fever 3, whooping cough 35, tuberculosis 123, and 16 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 13.7 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,754 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 4 from measles, 4 from diphtheria, 1 from scarlet fever, and 8 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended May 29, 1909, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 20.2 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,142,308. The lowest rate was recorded in Newry, viz, 4.2, and the highest in Newtownards, viz, 45.8 per 1,000.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended May 29, 1909, correspond to an annual rate of 16.7 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,839,038. The highest rate of mortality was recorded in Dundee, viz, 19.4, and the lowest in

Greenock, viz, 10.8 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 596, including diphtheria 5, measles 3, scarlet fever 5, enteric fever 3, and 40 from whooping cough.
