CALIFORNIA.—Month of November, 1908. Estimated population, 2,019,519. Total number of deaths reported to the State board of health, 2,484, including diphtheria 40, enteric fever 55, measles 5, scarlet fever 16, whooping cough 3, smallpox 2, and 317 from tuberculosis.

Oakland.—Month of December, 1908. Estimated population, 200,000. Total number of deaths, 140, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 2, and 9 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 33, enteric fever 6, scarlet fever 7, smallpox 4, measles 1, and tuberculosis 4.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Stewart reports, December 15:

Two weeks ended December 12. Vessels inspected and received bills of health: November 30, the Brazilian steamship Acre for New York, via Brazilian coast ports, in general cargo and with 63 cabin and 23 steerage passengers, and the entire crew shipped in this port, which is the home port; all members of crew were vaccinated when needed; December 1, the British steamship Hillmere for some southern port, in water ballast, via St. Lucia for orders, with no passengers and no change in personnel; December 3, the British steamship Queen Eleanor for New York, in cargo of coffee, no passengers, and 4 new members of the crew signed on in this port; December 4, the British steamship Byron for New York, in coffee cargo, with 19 cabin and 7 steerage passengers and no change in the crew personnel; December 5, the British steamship Tintoretto for New York, in coffee cargo, with no passengers and with no change in the crew personnel; December 10, the British steamship *Grecian Prince*, for New York, in coffee cargo, with no passengers and with no change in the crew personnel; and December 12 the British steamship Phidias, for New Orleans, in cargo of coffee, with no passengers and no change in the personnel of the vessel's crew.

No other vessels requiring inspection left this port for the United

States during the period under report.

Mortality report for Rio de Janeiro—Plague and smallpox.—Week ended December 6. Total estimated population, 811,443; census population, 1907, 628,675. Total deaths, 426. No deaths nor cases reported caused by yellow fever. Plague caused 2 deaths, with 8 new reported cases; smallpox, 109 deaths, with 183 new reported cases, of which number 45 occurred in the suburbs. At the close of the week there were in the hospital São Sebastião 140 cases of smallpox and 21 cases of plague under treatment; in the hospital Engenho de Dentro, 109 cases of smallpox under treatment; in the hospital Paula Candido, 77 convalescent cases of smallpox.

Week ended December 13. Total deaths, 320. No cases nor deaths reported due to yellow fever. Smallpox caused 60 deaths with 115 new reported cases, of which number 30 occurred in the suburbs; plague, 4 deaths with 5 new reported cases. At the close of the week there were in the hospital São Sebastião 150 cases of smallpox and 21 cases of plague under treatment; in the hospital Engenho de Dentro 97 cases of smallpox, and in the hospital Paula Candido 29 convalescent cases

of smallpox.

Plague, smallpox, and yellow fever at Bahia.—From January 1 to August 31, 1908, there were in the city of Bahia 2 deaths from yellow fever, 17 from bubonic plague, and 49 from smallpox.

#### CHINA.

Report from Shanghai—Inspection of vessels—Smallpox—Plague at Tonyshan extinct.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, December 8:

During the week ended December 5, 1 original and 3 supplemental bills of health were granted to 4 steamships, having an aggregate personnel of 410. The matter was brought to the attention of various members of the sanitary council, the result being that the presence, but not the extent, of cholera as reported has been confirmed.

Brazil—Bahia.—Month of August, 1908. Estimated population, 265,000. Total number of deaths, 454, including smallpox 8, yellow fever 1, plague 5, and 70 from tuberculosis.

São Pãulo, Santos, and Campinas.—Five weeks ended December 6, 1908. Estimated population, 300,000. Total number of deaths, 1,072, including measles 5, enteric fever 9, smallpox 31, whooping cough 4, diphtheria 7, and 84 from tuberculosis.

Canada—Quebec—Sherbrooke.—Month of November, 1908. Estimated population, 14,709. Total number of deaths, 17, including enteric fever 1, diphtheria 2, and 4 from tuberculosis.

Nova Scotia—Yarmouth.—Month of December, 1908. Estimated population, 6,700. Total number of deaths, 13, including 1 from diphtheria. Cases: Scarlet fever 1, diphtheria 3, and smallpox 1.

Costa Rica—San Jose.—Month of November, 1908. Estimated population, 26,682. Total number of deaths, 55, including 6 from tuberculosis.

FRANCE—St. Etienne.—Two weeks ended December 15, 1908. Estimated population, 150,000. Total number of deaths, 135, including enteric fever 2, whooping cough 1, diphtheria 1, and 13 from tuberculosis.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended December 19, 1908, correspond to an annual rate of 15.3 per 1,000 population, which is estimated at 16,234,952.

London.—One thousand three hundred and fifty-nine deaths were registered during the week, including measles 51, scarlet fever 14, diphtheria 24, enteric fever 14, whooping cough 4, tuberculosis 123, and 19 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 14.8 per 1,000. In Greater London 1,940 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 5 from measles, 1 from scarlet fever, 5 from diphtheria, and 4 from whooping cough.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended December 19, 1908, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 19.3 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,131,959. The lowest rate was recorded in Lurgan, viz, 4.4, and the highest in Portadown, viz, 36.2, per 1,000.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended December 19, 1908, correspond to an annual rate of 16.6 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,839,038. The highest rate of mortality was recorded in Perth, viz, 26.7, and the lowest in Leith, viz, 13.6 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths

registered from all causes was 585, including measles 2, diphtheria 8, scarlet fever 3, and 22 from whooping cough.

MAURITIUS—Port Louis.—Month of September, 1908. Estimated population, 376,635. Total number of deaths 1,020, including enteric fever 8, measles 5, plague 13, diphtheria 1, and 68 from tuberculosis.

SPAIN—Almeria.—Month of November, 1908. Estimated population, 50,000. Total number of deaths, 97, including enteric fever 6, diphtheria 1, and 4 from tuberculosis.

Huelva.—Month of November, 1908. Estimated population, 24,000. Total number of deaths, 73, including enteric fever 1, measles 1, and 16 from tuberculosis.

Madrid.—Month of November, 1908. Estimated population, 556,663. Total number of deaths, 1,136, including diphtheria 28, enteric fever 15, measles 26, scarlet fever 10, whooping cough 1, small-pox 9, and 109 from tuberculosis.

URUGUAY—Montevideo.—Month of October, 1908. Estimated population, 252,000. Total number of deaths, 423, including enteric fever 1, measles 4, scarlet fever 1, diphtheria 3, and 71 from tuberculosis.
