# PUBLIC HEALTH REPORTS.

REPORT OF THE TRANSACTIONS OF THE INTERNATIONAL COM-MISSION FOR THE REVISION OF THE INTERNATIONAL CLASSI-FICATION OF THE NOMENCLATURE OF DISEASES AND CAUSES OF DEATH. HELD IN PARIS, IN JULY, 1909.

The commission convened at 9.30 o'clock on the morning of July 1, 1909, in the conference room of the ministry of the interior, Paris, under the presidency of Dr. Arnold Netter, member of the academy of medicine, professor of medicine of the Trouseau Hospital and member of the superior council of hygiene of France. Dr. Jacques Bertillon acted as secretary-general.

On calling the roll of countries the following were found to be represented by one or more delegates, viz: Austria, Australia, Belgium, Brazil, Bulgaria, United States of Colombia, Costa Rica, China, United States of America, Spain, France, Greece, Italy, Mexico, Monaco, Montenegro, Holland, Roumania, and Switzerland.

The delegation of the United States was as follows: Surg. Frank L. Pleadwell, U. S. Navy; Surg. H. D. Geddings, U. S. Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service; Dr. Wilmer R. Batt, state registrar of vital statistics of Pennsylvania; Prof. Walter F. Willcox, of Cornell University; Dr. William H. Guilfoy, registrar of records of the department of health of the city of New York, and Dr. Cressy L. Wilbur, chief statistician of the Bureau of the Census, Washington, D. C.

At a preliminary meeting of the delegation of the United States, which your representative was unable to attend, Surg. Frank L. Pleadwell, U. S. Navy, was chosen as the chairman of the delegation, and at the opening session Doctor Wilbur was announced as one of the vice-presidents.

Addresses of welcome were delivered by the president, Professor

Netter, and the secretary-general, Dr. Jacques Bertillon.

The object of the commission was then explained at length by Doctor Bertillon, and the work of revision was at once proceeded with. Two sessions daily were held during the continuance of the meeting, and the transactions were marked by a spirit of entire harmony and good feeling, although, as was naturally to be expected,

there was a wide diversity of opinion upon the revision of many of the titles and rubrics.

It was noticeable, as the work of the commission progressed, that there was opposition to any subdivision of titles and multiplication of the number of rubrics, any proposition looking to either of these ends being almost universally voted down and in some instances the discussion on such propositions being apparently cut short.

Another feature worthy of notice was that in the arrangement of the classification of diseases and causes of death, it was the convenience of the statistician, rather than the ideas of the pathologist that was given chief consideration, but as the classification is intended primarily for the use of statisticians, this would seem to be justifiable.

After five sessions, a protocol of signature was prepared and signed by one delegate from each country on the afternoon of July 3, and

immediately thereafter the commission adjourned.

The delegates were the recipients of numerous hospitalities, and among the invitations received was that to a lunch to the American delegation by the American ambassador at Paris, and one to a reception to the entire commission by the President of the French Republic and Madame Faillières, on Sunday, July 4, 1909.

# AMŒBIC DYSENTERY IN SAN FRANCISCO, CAL.

Cases of amœbic dysentery are now frequently admitted to this hospital (Marine Hospital, San Francisco). The total number of such cases received from December 1, 1908, to August 9, 1909, was

55, 16 of which, it is believed, originated in California.

A thorough and careful examination was made in each case, and no case was recorded as amœbiasis until living motile amœbae were found in the stools on several different days, nor was it then recorded unless the patient had also the clinical symptoms of the disease. In one case operated on for appendicitis motile amœbae were found in the ulcerated appendix, and in several cases with liver abscess the motile amœbae were found in the abscess.

A careful investigation of the antecedents of each case was made, and it was found that of the 55 cases suffering from amœbiasis 16 had undoubtedly contracted the disease on the Pacific coast of the United States. I concur in the opinion of Passed Assistant Surgeon Long that the disease is undoubtedly spread here by the eating of fresh vegetables raised by Chinese truckmen, who fertilize the plants with human excreta, as is the custom in China and other oriental countries. The matter has been brought to the attention of the local health authorities, who, it is believed, will find means to exercise effective supervision over gardens where vegetables are raised for the market.

At a recent meeting of the San Francisco board of health, called to consider this matter, the following measures were decided upon:

<sup>1.</sup> Amœbic dysentery, or amœbiasis, to be declared an infectious disease, and all physicians and hospitals notified that cases coming to their knowledge must be reported to the board of health.

2. That a resolution be presented to the board of supervisors, urgently requesting the extension of the jail sewer to the city sewer, and also urging that the construction of Islais Creek sewer be hastened as rapidly as possible.

3. The health officer was directed to prepare an ordinance to present to the board of supervisors, making the use of human excrement and sewage for the irrigation or fertilization of vegetables a misdemeanor.

4. That as soon as possible sanitary inspectors be appointed to investigate the con-

dition of vegetable gardens.

5. That samples of vegetables be collected and sent to Acting Assistant Surgeon Wherry, United States Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service, at the plague laboratory, Oakland, to determine whether or not amœbæ could be cultivated from

The practicability of licensing the sale of vegetables in the city, in order to maintain control over such gardens as were located outside of the city limits was discussed,

but was left for another time.

The amœba has also been demonstrated by one of the hospital staff in several recent cases of dysentery occurring in this city in the prac-

tice of private physicians.

The usual treatment of cases at this hospital has been, first, large doses of ipecac given in salol-coated capsules; later high enemata of 1 to 1,000 quinine solution. Appendicostomy was performed in a few cases last year, but usually this operation is not found to be essential to successful treatment.

### MILK EPIDEMIC OF TYPHOID FEVER.

# Report from Ithaca, N. Y.

Doctor Crumm, health officer, reports, August 31:

During the 10 days ended August 31, 35 cases of typhoid fever, with 1 death, occurred at Ithaca. All the cases were due to infected milk on one route.

STATISTICAL REPORTS OF MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY, STATES AND CITIES OF THE UNITED STATES—UNTABULATED.

CONNECTICUT.—Month of August, 1909. Reports to the state board of health from 158 towns having an aggregate population of 1,042,834 show as follows: Total number of deaths from all causes,

1,468, corresponding to an annual death rate of 16.8 per 1,000 of population, including measles 8, scarlet fever 5, diphtheria 9, whooping 'cough 20, enteric fever 29, and 105 from pulmonary tuberculosis. Cases: Measles, 103 in 25 towns; scarlet fever, 73 in 19 towns; diphtheria, 107 in 33 towns; whooping cough, 96 in 21 towns; enteric fever, 165 in 43 towns; and tuberculosis, 100 in 29 towns.

FLORIDA—Pensacola.—Month of August, 1909. Estimated population, 30,000. Total number of deaths, 25, including enteric fever 5, and 2 from tuberculosis.

Illinois—Quincy.—Month of August, 1909. Estimated population, 43,000. Total number of deaths 55, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 2, and 5 from tuberculosis. Cases: Not reported.

Kentucky—Henderson.—Month of August, 1909. Estimated population, 17,900. Total number of deaths, 21, including 2 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 13, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 1, and 2 from tuberculosis.

Louisville.—Month of August, 1909. Estimated population, 260,416. Total number of deaths, 291, corresponding to an annual death rate of 15.34 per 1,000 of population, including enteric fever 13, scarlet fever 3, diphtheria 1, and 43 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 13, enteric fever 45, and diphtheria 13.

MARYLAND—Washington County.—Month of August, 1909. Estimated population, 50,000. Total number of deaths, 82. Cases: Enteric fever 20, diphtheria 3, and whooping cough 2.

MINNESOTA.—Month of June, 1909. Estimated population, 1,979,-658. Reports to the state board of health show as follows: Total number of deaths, 1,247, including diphtheria 36, enteric fever 21, scarlet fever 26, measles 4, whooping cough 16, smallpox 3, and 178 from tuberculosis. Deaths reported from state institutions during the month numbered 23, including 5 from tuberculosis.

NEW HAMPSHIRE—Manchester.—Month of August, 1909. Estimated population, 68,000. Total number of deaths, 123, corresponding to a monthly death rate of 1.79 per 1,000 of population, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 1, and 10 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 4, measles 27, diphtheria 19, and enteric fever 2.

NEW YORK STATE.—Month of July, 1909. Estimated population, 8,699,643. Total number of deaths, 11,199, corresponding to an annual death rate of 15.4 per 1,000 of population, including enteric fever 85, measles 126, scarlet fever 65, whooping cough 94, diphtheria 127, and 1,327 from tuberculosis. Cases: Tuberculosis 2,638, diphtheria 1,126, scarlet fever 724, measles 2,695, smallpox 16, and enteric fever 474.

Buffalo.—Month of August, 1909. Estimated population, 352,387. Total number of deaths 525, including diphtheria 6, enteric fever 7,

measles 3, scarlet fever 4, whooping cough 3, and 37 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 34, enteric fever 67, measles 22, scarlet fever 79, whooping cough 27, and tuberculosis 109.

Ithaca.—Month of August, 1909. Estimated population, 16,000. Total number of deaths not reported. One death from enteric fever reported. Cases: Enteric fever 35.

Rome.—Month of August, 1909. Census population, 15,343. Total number of deaths 42, including 2 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 4, enteric fever 2, tuberculosis 2.

Troy.—Month of July, 1909. Estimated population, 77,650. Total number of deaths, 111, corresponding to an annual death rate of 14.06 per 1,000 of population, including whooping cough 2, and 14 from pulmonary tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 2, diphtheria 5, whooping cough 4, and tuberculosis 12.

VIRGINIA—Lynchburg.—Month of August, 1909. Total number of deaths 25, including enteric fever 4, and 2 from tuberculosis. Cases: Not reported.

Richmond.—Month of August, 1909. Estimated population, 115,701 (white, 73,204; colored, 42,497). Total number of deaths 176 (white, 77; colored, 99), including enteric fever 4, and 20 (white, 3; colored, 17) from pulmonary tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 6, enteric fever 61, measles 3, and whooping cough 11.

Washington—Tacoma.—Month of August, 1909. Estimated population, 120,000. Total number of deaths 68, including scarlet fever 1, diphtheria 2, and 10 from tuberculosis. Cases: Pulmonary tuberculosis 11, scarlet fever 19, enteric fever 15, and diphtheria 6.

#### BARBADOS.

Report from Bridgetown—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Sanitary conditions.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Urquhart reports, September 4:

Week ended September 4. Bills of health issued to 11 vessels, having a total of 152 passengers and 545 members of crews. Four vessels fumigated. Sanitary condition of vessels, cargoes, crews, and passengers good. Sanitary condition of the port and island good. No quarantinable disease reported.

#### CHINA.

Report from Amoy—Funigation of vessel—Cholera and plague—Plague and smallpox in vicinity during month of July, 1909.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Foster reports, August 9:

Week ended August 7. No bills of health issued. August 7, the British steamship Taisang was fumigated with sulphur dioxide gas to destroy rats. The fumigation was done while the vessel was empty and previous to loading cargo for Manila. During the week ended August 7 there were 51 deaths from plague and 15 from cholera in Amov.

The following quarantinable diseases are reported from villages in the vicinity of Amoy for the month of July: In Kang Thau, 8 cases of plague with 3 deaths; in Eng Ta Thau, 11 cases of plague with 4

deaths, and 9 cases of smallpox with no deaths.

# Report from Hankow—Cholera.

Cholera is now present in the native city, but is not widely diffused.

Reports from Shanghai—Inspection of vessels—Cholera and small pox— Cholera on steamship Hudson.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, August 3 and 11:

Week ended July 31. One original and 2 supplemental bills of health issued to 3 steamships having an aggregate personnel of 437. There were inspected 2 steamships, 109 members of crews, 1 cabin passenger, and 8 steerage passengers. Manifests were viséed for 10,508 pieces of freight. The baggage of 3 steerage passengers, numbering 8 pieces, was disinfected. Four emigrants for San Francisco per steamship China were examined, of whom 3 were passed and 1

was recommended for rejection on account of trachoma.

The steamship Hudson, repairing in this port, and ultimately bound to New York, developed 3 cases of cholera among her crew, the first being the chief officer, whom I saw within 2 hours after he was attacked, and whom I had immediately removed to the isolation hospital. The second officer and the Chinese steward, who nursed the first case, were attacked by the disease in about 14 and 18 hours. respectively. All were immediately removed from the ship, the Chinaman by his friends, as is usually the case. The first case was taken ill on the morning of July 29, and died on the morning of July

The exact origin of the outbreak is not determined. After the removal of the last case the ship was thoroughly disinfected, and the crew were removed temporarily to other quarters to undergo obser-The crew, including the officers, were bathed, and all effects were disinfected by steam, the articles being handled exclusively by the crew of the disinfecting hulk, who also gave the living quarters a preliminary disinfection with formaldehyde gas before the removal of the clothing, following it by a thorough scrubbing with carbolic acid solution after emptying, and a further fumigation with formalin. Especial attention was given to the water-closets. No further cases have developed. All the fresh water on board was boiled for 30 minutes by leading live steam into the tanks. All of this work I personally saw done.

Week ended August 7. Four supplemental and 2 original bills of health granted to 6 steamships, with an aggregate personnel of 1,275. There were bathed and disinfected by steam 88 members of crews, including 44 from the *Hudson*, and there were inspected 219 members of crews, 1 cabin passenger, and 22 steerage passengers. Manifests were viséed for 17,047 pieces of freight. There were disinfected by steam 378 pieces of baggage belonging to members of crews, including that of the Hudson, together with all textiles from the living quarters of the crew and officers. One ship was disinfected and 1 had her forecastles mechanically cleaned. There were also disinfected 2 pieces of baggage, the property of steerage passengers. Eight emigrants for San Francisco per steamship Manchuria were examined, of whom 2 were passed and 6 recommended for rejection on account

Cholera continues to be present among foreigners and natives, but not in epidemic form.

One death from smallpox among natives.

Report from Swatow—Plague outbreak extinct—Summary of plague deaths.

Consul Pontius reports, July 8:

The outbreak of plague in Swatow and vicinity is extinct. The total approximate number of deaths recorded was 2,500. In the city of Swatow only 2 or 3 deaths occurred. The outbreak at no time obtained a foothold in the city; precautionary measures were taken.

During the first 15 days of the month of August there were 12 cases with 3 deaths and 6 cases with 4 deaths from plague and yellow fever, respectively; 16 cases of plague and 2 of yellow fever remain under

treatment; 2 vessels were fumigated.

No cases of plague have been reported from other points in the Republic. Four cases of smallpox occurred on a ranch about 10 miles from Guayaquil, the contagion being clearly traced to a place down the coast. One man on this ranch escaped vaccination in rounding up the laborers and later developed the disease and died. A mild case occurred in Guayaquil August 10, and was promptly isolated and vaccination of contacts was enforced. Smallpox is epidemic in Ensenada and vicinity (near Santa Elena) and vaccination is being enforced.

# Status of cholera in Holland.

Rotterdam.—The law requires every person to report any case of illness suspicious of being cholera which he may note. Failure is punishable with imprisonment of from 1 day to 1 year. The people are very watchful, and the sanitary authorities are receiving many calls from all over the city. Positive cholera cases are appearing in less numbers from day to day. Filtered water from tanktugs is being supplied to bargemen, and boiling of all water for personal use is quite generally carried out. During the week there has been a total of 20 new cases of cholera with 8 deaths, making a total since August 20 of 34 cases with 14 deaths. There remain in the barracks 16 patients. The situation is improving very rapidly.

General.—Positive cases of cholera have been reported during the week at Uithorn, Breda, Gorinchem, Utrecht, Tholen, Middelburg, and Vlaardinger. There have been 7 cases with 5 deaths. All occurred among bargemen directly from Rotterdam. In some places the canal water has been rendered unfit for drinking by the addition

of petroleum. All army maneuvers have been stopped.

Rotterdam free from cholera—Cholera at Amsterdam and Dirksland.

The following information is received from the Department of State, under dates of September 15 and 18:

September 15. A telegram of September 14 has been received from the American minister at The Hague, reading:

I am officially informed by the minister for foreign affairs that no case of cholera has appeared at Rotterdam since September 4, and no cholera death since September 8, and that under the treaty Rotterdam can no longer be considered infected.

September 18. The Dutch minister to the United States informs the Secretary of State that the last cases of cholera in the Netherlands occurred September 10, one at Dirksland and one at Amster-Since that date no cases have occurred.

Dirksland is a village situated 20 miles southwest of Rotterdam, in

the Rhine-Meuse delta.

In the "outer ring" the deaths included 4 from measles, 1 from scarlet fever, 8 from diphtheria, and 3 from whooping cough.
