#### PELLAGRA.

## Report from Charleston, S. C.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Sams reports, October 23:

Pellagra, as such, has but recently been recognized in this city, the first case having come under treatment in March, 1908, the first recorded death occurring on September 25, 1908. During the balance of that year there were four more deaths, making five in all for 1908. From January 1, 1909, to date, there have been five deaths recorded.

There is a very general opinion among the local physicians that pellagra has existed in this city for probably twenty years or more, but incorrectly diagnosed as "eczema," "dysentery," "intestinal tuberculosis," etc., with dementia a complication, or the reverse.

The following table gives the color, sex, and result in 19 cases, from its recognition in March, 1908, to date:

I believe this to be less than the actual number which has occurred here. There are several suspects under observation. Diarrhea, dermatitis, and dementia, the so-called "three d's" of pellagra, were the leading symptoms in the majority of instances, some subjects being violently insane, the dementia being absent in eight individuals, however.

The favorite sites of the eruption were the face, backs of hands, and dorsal surfaces of feet. Uncinariasis was a complication in one case, a white male.

Although considered an afebrile disease, save in so-called "typhoid pellagra," a rise of temperature to 38.5 was present in several instances. A subnormal temperature likewise occurred. The pulse rate, in a few cases abnormally high, bordering on the hundred, with a subnormal temperature, correspondingly increased when fever was present. The raw tongue was noticeable. No ocular phenomena were mentioned in histories furnished me nor noticed by myself.

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In the case of a small white boy, a sudden temporary motor paralysis of the lower limbs occurred, lasting about one week. While this has disappeared and locomotion is good, there is loss of all patellar reflex. In the cases of two colored females at present under observation

In the cases of two colored females at present under observation (both relapses) one has exaggerated "knee-jerk" and in the other one all "knee-jerk" is lost and some rigidity present in lower limbs, with ulcerations in mouth and about the ankle, also abdominal tenderness.

The rate of mortality in the insane cases was especially high.

#### Report from Melbourne—Plague on steamship Zoroaster.

**Consul Jewell reports September 9:** 

On June 4 steamship *Zoroaster* arrived at Bunbury via Colombo with a case of plague on board. All necessary precautions were taken. Prior to that date no case of plague had occurred at Bunbury during the past two years.

## Examination of rodents at Sydney for plague infection.

## Report from Rio de Janeiro-Inspection of vessels-Mortality-Plague and smallpox.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Stewart reports, September 30:

Two weeks ended September 25. Vessels inspected and bills of health issued: September 14, the British steamship Italian Prince, for New York, with coffee, no passengers, and no change in the crew personnel; on the same date the British steamship Ethalstan, for Port Eads, in water ballast, with no passengers and with 2 new members of the crew signed on here; on the same date the Brazilian steamship Goyaz for New York, in general cargo and with 17 cabin and 3 steerage passengers, and with entire crew signed on here, the home port of this vessel; September 18, the British steamship Verdi, for New York, in coffee and general cargo, with 21 cabin and 9 steerage passengers, and with no change in the crew personnel; Septem-ber 20, the German steamship *Galicia*, for New York, with no passengers, and with no change in the crew, in coffee cargo; September 24, the British steamship Coquet, for New Orleans, with coffee, no passengers and no change in the crew personnel; and on the same date the British steamship Torr Head, for Tampa, in water ballast, with no passengers and no change in the personnel of the crew. No other vessels requiring inspection left this port during the period under report.

Total estimated population of Rio de Janeiro, 811,443. Census population, 1907, 628,675.

Week ended September 19. Total deaths 224. No deaths nor cases due to yellow fever or plague. Smallpox caused no deaths, but there were 4 new cases reported. At the close of the week there were in the Hospital São Sebastiao, 10 cases of smallpox and 2 of plague under treatment, and 31 suspicious cases of illness held for observation.

Week ended September 26. Total deaths 226. No cases nor deaths due to yellow fever. Plague caused 1 death, with 1 new reported case. Smallpox caused no deaths, but there were 3 new cases reported. At the close of the week there were in the Hospital São Sebastiao, 7 cases of smallpox and 2 of plague under treatment, and 37 cases of suspicious illness held for observation.

#### CHINA.

## Reports from Amoy—Inspection of vessels—Cholera, plague, and smallpox—Quarantine against arrivals from Amoy at ports in the Netherland Indies removed.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Foster reports, September 13 and 20: Week ended September 11. One bill of health issued.

September 7, the British steamship *Taisang*, with 65 in crew, 22 cabin and 27 steerage passengers for Manila, was granted an original bill of health. Two Chinese were rejected. The crew and steerage passengers were bathed and their clothing was disinfected by steam. All on board were inspected at the time of sailing. Manifests were viséed for 343 pieces of freight. Vessel anchored in the stream while in port.

During the week ended September 11, there were 46 deaths from plague, 19 from cholera, and 1 from smallpox in Amoy.

September 6, the following notice was issued by the consul for the Netherlands: The Government of the Netherland Indies has removed the quarantine on vessels arriving from Amoy.

Week ended September 18. There were no bills of health issued from this office.

During the week there were 40 deaths from plague and 20 from cholera in Amoy.

Reports from Hongkong-Quarantine restrictions-Examination of emigrants—Inspection and fumigation of vessels.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Hough reports, September 13 and 21:

Week ended September 11. Restrictions enforced by Hongkong remain as reported on July 17, 1909. Governments of Madras, Chefoo, and Newchwang have removed the quarantine restrictions against Hongkong.

Inspection of vessels.—Vessels granted bills of health, 12; bills of health granted, without inspection, to the U.S. cruisers Charleston, Cleveland, Denver, and Galveston, with a total personnel of 1,876; vessels fumigated to destroy rats, 5.

## Reports from Shanghai—Inspection of vessels—Cholera in Korea— Cholera at Hankow.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, September 22 and 28: Week ended September 18. One original and 3 supplemental bills of health granted to 4 steamships, the aggregate personnel of which amounted to 1,236. Inspected 2 vessels, 113 members of crew, and 52 steerage passengers. Bathed 60 members of crew and 49 steerage passengers, and their effects, numbering 165 pieces, were disinfected by steam. The forecastle of one vessel was rendered mechanically clean. Manifests were viséed for 15,515 pieces of freight. There were examined and passed 52 emigrants for the United States (San Francisco per steamship Korea), while 10 were recommended for rejection on account of trachoma. This constitutes a record for emigrants from Shanghai. There has been a steady increase in the number of emigrants for the United States for some The passengers are chiefly British Indians. weeks.

The United States cruiser *Chattanooga* was in this port 3 days, en route to Manila. The vessel anchored at Woosung, and no liberty ashore was allowed to anyone but the surgeon. An original bill of health was granted upon the certificate of the surgeon to the effect that there had been no case of contagious disease on board.

The steamship Suveric, Yangtze River ports to Manila direct, was in this port for 24 hours, anchored in the stream. Her entire Asiatic crew and 3 Asiatic steerage passengers, numbering altogether 63, were bathed and their effects disinfected by steam immediately before departure. No cargo was shipped here, and no liberty was allowed. The vessel and personnel were inspected at the hour of sailing.

The steamship Aragonia, Yokohama to New York via this and Suez ports, was in this port for 4 days, anchored in the stream. No rat guards were used on the lines as required. Liberty was allowed by the master to the entire personnel, and loading was carried on during the entire 24 hours. The vessel and her personnel were inspected at the hour of sailing. She was postponed for 1 day beyond the original sailing date, and left on Thursday instead of Wednesday.

The steamship *Korea*, Hongkong to San Francisco via Shanghai and Japan ports, remained in this port for 24 hours, anchored at Woosung. Liberty was allowed to the cabin passengers only, and loading was done by daylight. Forty-nine steerage passengers for San Francisco were bathed and their effects disinfected by steam.

Cholera is epidemic in Seoul, 60 new cases having been reported September 21. Hankow reports 5 cases for the period ended September 11.

Week ended September 25. One original and 1 supplemental bill of health granted to 2 steamships, the aggregate personnel of which amounted to 224 persons. There were inspected 165 members of crew and 17 steerage passengers. Fifty members of crew were bathed and their effects disinfected by steam. One vessel was disinfected throughout.

The steamship *Shinano Maru*, Hongkong to Seattle via this and Japanese ports, was in this port for 24 hours, anchored in the stream, with rat guards on all lines. Loading was carried on from lighters day and night. Liberty was granted by the master to officers and cabin passengers. Inspection was held on board at the hour of departure.

The steamship Kalibia, Yangtze River ports to Manila and New York, was in this port for 24 hours, in the stream at Woosung. This vessel stopped at Shanghai for the purpose of securing a bill of health and being disinfected. The holds, which were entirely empty, and the crew's quarters were fumigated with  $SO_2$  for 12 hours.

There has been no change in the general health conditions of Shanghai during the week.

A severe epidemic of cholera is reported in Korea, and 100 new cases per day are reported in Seoul. Cholera is also present at Hankow among natives.

American Consul Rariden reports under date of September 20: Cholera appeared in Batavia district September 12. Thirty-five cases with 30 deaths have been reported up to September 18. The disease has been confined entirely to the natives and Chinese.

Cholera in the district of Djambi, Sumatra, has almost entirely disappeared. There were 18 cases with 14 deaths in the month of August in this district.

## Report from Smyrna—Smallpox epidemic.

Consul-General Harris reports, October 5:

Smallpox is now epidemic in Smyrna. The available statistics give only the number of deaths, and during the past month show a decided increase from 5 per week to 23 the week before last. The actual number of deaths from this disease, however, is much greater owing to the fact that the correct cause of death is not always given.

October 4. The French consul-general who arrived at this post only two months ago from San Francisco, Cal., died of black smallpox in its most malignant form, after a few days illness.

October 4, 8 deaths, and October 5, 16 deaths were reported.
