STATISTICAL REPORTS OF MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY, STATES AND CITIES
OF THE UNITED STATES—UNTABULATED.

CALIFORNIA—*Los Angeles*.—Month of December, 1908. Estimated population 275,000. Total number of deaths reported, 308, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 5, scarlet fever 2, and 61 from tuberculosis. Cases of contagious diseases reported: Diphtheria 20, enteric fever 19, scarlet fever 69, measles 6, smallpox 4, and tuberculosis 26.

San Diego.—Month of December, 1908. Estimated population, 40,000. Total number of deaths, 63, including diphtheria 1, and 9 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 3, diphtheria 6, enteric fever 2.

CONNECTICUT.—Month of November, 1908. Reports to the state board of health from 167 towns, having an aggregate population of 1,037,346, show as follows: Total number of deaths from all causes 1,273, including measles 6, scarlet fever 3, diphtheria 26, whooping cough 9, enteric fever 20, and 108 from tuberculosis. Cases: Measles 247 in 30 towns, scarlet fever 95 in 34 towns, diphtheria 249 in 45 towns, whooping cough 131 in 14 towns, enteric fever 56 in 24 towns, and tuberculosis 83 in 31 towns.

FLORIDA.—Report from the state board of health of communicable diseases for the week ended December 26, 1908, shows as follows: Enteric fever: Jacksonville 2, Lulu 1. Tuberculosis: Dade City 1, Ybor City 1, Jacksonville 2, Ocala 1, Tampa 2. Diphtheria: Tampa 3, West Tampa 1, Ocala 1, Jacksonville 9, Bradentown 1, Starke 1. Malaria: Jacksonville 4, Tampa 2, West Tampa, 1.

IOWA—*Council Bluffs*.—Annual report for the year 1908: Estimated population, 37,000; total number of deaths, 404, including smallpox 2, enteric fever 9, diphtheria 5, whooping cough 7, and 28 from tuberculosis. Cases: Smallpox 129, scarlet fever 30, diphtheria 89, measles 7, and whooping cough 5.

MASSACHUSETTS—*Worcester*.—Month of September, 1908: Estimated population, 147,084; total number of deaths, 169, including enteric fever 2, scarlet fever 2, whooping cough 2, diphtheria 4, and 15 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 79, scarlet fever 10, enteric fever 12, measles 1, whooping cough 1, and tuberculosis 25.

Month of October, 1908: Total number of deaths, 174, including diphtheria 2, enteric fever 1, and 18 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 76, enteric fever 10, measles 4, scarlet fever 26, whooping cough 13, and tuberculosis 22.

NEW HAMPSHIRE—*Manchester*.—Month of December, 1908. Estimated population, 64,793. Total number of deaths, 98, including diphtheria 5, enteric fever 2, and 8 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 73, enteric fever 4, measles 1, and scarlet fever 16.

NEW YORK—*Rochester*.—Month of September, 1908. Estimated population, 200,000. Total number of deaths, 244, including tuberculosis 20, diphtheria 2, and 3 from enteric fever. Cases not reported.

Month of October. Total number of deaths, 238, including tuberculosis 15, diphtheria 3, and 2 from enteric fever. Cases: Scarlet fever 15, diphtheria 22, enteric fever 20, and measles 23.

Month of November. Total number of deaths, 200, including tuberculosis 25, diphtheria 2, and 2 from enteric fever. Cases not reported.

Rome.—Month of December, 1908. Estimated population, 18,500. Total number of deaths, 39, including 6 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 10, and tuberculosis 6.

OHIO—*Columbus*.—Month of December, 1908. Estimated population, 185,000. Total number of deaths, 152, including enteric fever 3, scarlet fever 1, diphtheria 2, and 19 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 6, enteric fever 13, measles 46, scarlet fever 30, whooping cough 1, and tuberculosis 81.

PENNSYLVANIA—*Scranton*.—Month of September, 1908. Estimated population, 127,000. Total number of deaths 122, including diphtheria 1, scarlet fever 5, enteric fever 2, whooping cough 3, and 6 from tuberculosis. Cases: Tuberculosis 1.

Month of October, 1908. Total number of deaths 150, including diphtheria 5, enteric fever 2, scarlet fever 8, and 7 from tuberculosis. Cases: Tuberculosis 10.

TENNESSEE—*Nashville*.—Month of December, 1908. Estimated population, 124,769. Total number of deaths 155, including enteric fever 3, diphtheria 3, and 19 from tuberculosis. Cases: Scarlet fever 19, smallpox 1, enteric fever 5, and pulmonary tuberculosis 7.

TEXAS—*Fort Worth*.—Annual report for the year 1908. Estimated population, 70,000. Total number of deaths 713, including diphtheria 1, and 1 from tuberculosis. Cases: Smallpox 296, enteric fever 38, scarlet fever 37, diphtheria 98, measles 55, whooping cough 1, and tuberculosis 2.

Month of December, 1908. Total number of deaths 70, deaths not reported. Cases: Enteric fever 5, scarlet fever 8, and diphtheria 13.

VIRGINIA—*Newport News*.—Month of December, 1908. Estimated population, 28,749. Total number of deaths, 25, including 3 from tuberculosis. Cases: Diphtheria 2.

Richmond.—Annual report for the year 1908. Estimated population, 114,084. Total number of deaths, 2,486, including enteric fever 57, measles 6, scarlet fever 1, whooping cough 33, diphtheria 4, and 258 from tuberculosis. Death rate per 1,000 of population, 21.79.

Month of December, 1908. Total number of deaths, 182, including enteric fever 1, whooping cough 1, and 30 from tuberculosis. Cases: Enteric fever 13, diphtheria 25, measles 1, scarlet fever 1, and whooping cough 3.

WASHINGTON—*Spokane.*—Month of December. Estimated population, 90,000. Total number of deaths, 85. Causes of deaths not reported. Cases: Smallpox 3, measles 11, scarlet fever 33, diphtheria 35, and enteric fever 4.

FOREIGN AND INSULAR.

CURRENT QUARANTINE MEASURES.

[From the Veröffentlichungen des Kaiserlichen Gesundheitsamtes, Berlin, January 6, 1909.]

CHOLERA.

BULGARIA.—December 11. The crews of lighters which unload vessels from Russian ports, when said vessels have not complied with quarantine regulations, but unload at the ports of Varna, Silistria, and Rustchuk, are subject to disinfection with ten days' observation.

GERMAN EMPIRE.—December 29. Medical inspection of arrivals at German ports from Archangel and Riga, which was ordered October 19, suspended.

TURKEY.—December 22. Measures ordered against arrivals from Russian ports of the Black Sea, with the exception of Taganrog, suspended. Arrivals from Taganrog undergo five days' quarantine with disinfection at Sinope. Treatment of arrivals from Black Sea ports, having pilgrims on board, is not altered.

BARBADOS.

Report from Bridgetown—Yellow fever on the island.

Consul Martin reports, January 4:

I have been officially notified to-day of 2 more cases of yellow fever. Both are in the parish of St. Lucy, at the extreme north end of the island, 18 miles from Bridgetown.

The last case reported was fatal. The other report is silent on the subject. (See Public Health Reports, January 1, 1909.)

CHINA.

Reports from Hongkong—Quarantine restrictions—Plague—Inspection of vessels—Examination of emigrants.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Hough reports, December 18:

Week ended November 14. Restrictions enforced by Hongkong remain as reported on October 17. Restrictions enforced against Hongkong remain as reported on October 17. Quarantinable diseases: Plague, 1 case, 1 death. Vessels inspected and granted bills of health, 9. Aliens examined for Honolulu and Pacific coast ports, 584; rejected, 89. Aliens examined for Philippine Islands, 58; rejected, 11.

Week ended November 21. No quarantinable diseases. Vessels inspected and granted bills of health, 4. Aliens examined for Honolulu and Pacific coast ports, 21. Aliens examined for Philippine Islands, 43; rejected, 10.

Week ended November 28. Restrictions enforced against Hongkong by Ceylon and Niuchwang have been withdrawn. No quarantinable diseases. Vessels inspected and granted bills of health, 10. No aliens examined for Honolulu and Pacific coast ports. Aliens examined for Philippine Islands, 26; rejected, 4.

Week ended December 5. Restrictions enforced against Hongkong remain as reported on October 17 and November 28. No quarantinable diseases. Vessels inspected and granted bills of health, 8. Aliens examined for Honolulu and Pacific coast ports, 404; rejected, 55. Aliens examined for Philippine Islands, 26; rejected, 13.

Report from Shanghai—Inspection and disinfection of vessels—Smallpox on U. S. Army transport Seward.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Ransom reports, December 16:

During the week ended December 12, 1 original and 3 supplemental bills of health were issued to 4 steamships, having an aggregate personnel of 822. Two vessels and 84 members of crews were inspected during the week, and the remaining 2 vessels were inspected December 13, having been delayed by bad weather. There were inspected altogether 226 members of crews and 3 steerage passengers. The forecabin of one vessel was disinfected. Seventy-two Asiatic members of crew were bathed. Their effects were disinfected by steam. Manifests were viséed for 32,975 pieces of freight. Twenty pieces of human hair from the interior were rejected on the manifest. Properly authenticated certificates as to the packing of these 20 cases of hair were subsequently received, and an additional manifest was countersigned for them.

Numerous inspections were made during the week of cargo in the process of packing for shipment to the United States.

The weekly report of the municipal health department shows that there were reported among foreigners 2 new cases of smallpox.

The 2 cases of smallpox reported occurred among the crew of the U. S. Army transport *Seward*, now undergoing repairs at this port. The surgeon of the vessel reports that he immediately vaccinated the entire crew, and that he is keeping them under observation, the cases having been removed to the isolation hospital. Necessary steps will be taken by this office to secure proper disinfection of the vessel and her personnel before her departure for Manila.

CUBA.

Report from Habana—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Sanitary conditions.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Amesse reports, January 19:

A total of 568 passengers embarked at Nuevitas, Cuba, on the army transport *Sumner*, and, together with a crew of 138, were inspected. The entire personnel was certified as free from quarantinable diseases.

The chartered transport *Galveston* cleared from this port during the week for Galveston, carrying 76 officers and men detached from the army of Cuban pacification.

The national sanitary department reports satisfactory health conditions throughout the Republic.

Report from Matanzas—Inspection of vessels.

Assistant Surgeon Nunez reports, January 18:

Week ended January 16. Five bills of health were granted to vessels leaving for United States ports in good sanitary condition. No quarantinable diseases were reported either in the city or province.

Report from Santiago—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Sanitary department removed to new official building.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Wilson reports, January 13:

Week ended January 9. Bills of health issued to 7 vessels bound for the United States and its dependencies. The Cuban steamship *Julia*, bound for San Juan, P. R., was fumigated.

No new case of yellow fever was reported, either here or in San Luis.

The sanitary department has been removed to the outskirts of the city. The trolley cars pass the door. The department occupies a very large building, which gives room for everything under one roof. The building was erected by the Spaniards for barracks, and was used during the first American intervention as the quartermaster's depot. The office, laboratory, storerooms, stables, and repair shops are all together. The disinfecting apparatus has not yet been removed, but soon will be.

ECUADOR.

Report from Guayaquil—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Plague and yellow fever—Plague still present at Milagro.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Wightman reports, December 28, through Passed Assistant Surgeon Lloyd:

Week ended December 19. Four steamships, with an aggregate personnel of 315 in the crews, 70 cabin, and 41 steerage passengers were fumigated.

For the same week a total of 59 deaths were recorded for Guayaquil, including 1 death from yellow fever and 1 from plague.

Plague is still present at Milagro.

INDIA.

Report from Calcutta—Transactions of service—Cholera, plague, and smallpox—Plague in India and Bengal.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Eakins reports, December 23:

Week ended December 19. Bills of health issued to the steamship *Koranna*, bound for Philadelphia and New York, with a total crew of

58 and 2 passengers; to the steamship *Labuan*, bound for Boston and New York, with a total crew of 42; to the steamship *Harport*, bound for New York, with a total crew of 31, and to the steamship *Sutherland*, bound for Boston and New York, with a total crew of 48. The usual precautions were taken, the holds fumigated, rat guards placed on the wharf lines, and the Asiatics' effects disinfected.

Week ended December 12: Ten deaths from cholera, 9 from plague, and 6 from smallpox in Calcutta.

In Bengal during the same week there were 126 cases and 116 deaths from plague. In India during the same period, 2,044 cases and 1,588 deaths from plague.

MEXICO.

Report from Mexico City—Yellow fever at Merida and in vicinity of Maxcanu.

The following is received from Doctor Liceaga, president of the superior board of health, under date of January 14:

During the week ended January 9, 1 case of yellow fever occurred at the city of Merida and 1 at San Bernardo plantation, 9 kilometers distant from Maxcanu.

Report from Salina Cruz—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Smallpox; imported—Vaccination.

Acting Assistant Surgeon McPherson reports, January 16:

During the period January 1 to 15, inclusive, 3 steamships were inspected and fumigated on clearing from this port for the United States.

Four or 5 cases of smallpox have appeared in this port. All of the cases were infected from one person, who developed the disease immediately after his arrival here from Mexico City. All of the cases are strictly isolated, and an active campaign of vaccination has been undertaken among all unvaccinated persons.

PARAGUAY.

Report from Asuncion—Plague.

Consul Norton reports, December 7: Several deaths have occurred in this city during the past week under circumstances which lead me to believe that plague has again made its appearance. The official reports of the health department for the past two weeks show 6 deaths from "infectious fever," a term employed heretofore in registering deaths from plague.

PERU.

Report from Callao—Inspection and fumigation of vessels—Status of plague in Peru—Smallpox at Lima—Plague at Iquique, Chile.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Gutierrez reports, December 28:

Week ended December 19. Three vessels carrying an aggregate personnel of 111 in the crew, 67 cabin and 68 steerage passengers were fumigated.

Week ended December 26. Two British steamships and the United States light-house fleet, comprising 6 vessels, were granted bills of health. The steamships were fumigated. The aggregate personnel of the merchant vessels was composed of 178 members of crews, 64 cabin and 60 steerage passengers.

The steamship *Estonia* left Libau for New York December 29 with 256 passengers, after inspection.

Habana.—Month of November, 1908. Estimated population, 300,000. Total number of deaths, 437, including enteric fever 3, measles 1, diphtheria 1, and 88 from tuberculosis.

FRANCE—*Cherbourg.*—Month of December, 1908. Estimated population, 43,948. Total number of deaths 81, including enteric fever 1, whooping cough 1, and 6 from tuberculosis.

Marseille.—Month of December, 1908. Estimated population, 517,498. Total number of deaths 880, including diphtheria 24, enteric fever 25, measles 9, smallpox 1, and 103 from tuberculosis.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales.*—The deaths registered in 76 great towns in England and Wales during the week ended January 2, 1909, correspond to an annual rate of 18.2 per 1,000 population, which is estimated at 16,234,952.

London.—One thousand eight hundred and four deaths were registered during the week, including measles 86, scarlet fever 7, diphtheria 23, enteric fever 7, whooping cough 11, tuberculosis 182, and 22 from diarrhea. The deaths from all causes correspond to an annual rate of 19.6 per 1,000. In Greater London 2,499 deaths were registered. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 3 from measles, 2 from scarlet fever, 5 from diphtheria, whooping cough 3, and 1 from enteric fever.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended January 2, 1909, in the 21 principal town districts of Ireland was 24.7 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,131,959. The lowest rate was recorded in Drogheda, viz, 12.3, and the highest in Portadown, viz, 41.3 per 1,000.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended January 2, 1909, correspond to an annual rate of 17.4 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,839,038. The highest rate of mortality was recorded in Dundee, viz, 19.7, and the lowest in Aberdeen and Leith, viz, 14.6 per 1,000. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 622, including measles 1, diphtheria 8, scarlet fever 3, and 23 from whooping cough.

JAPAN—Formosa.—Two weeks ended December 12, 1908. Estimated population, 3,050,004. Total number of deaths not reported. Deaths from contagious diseases reported were: Enteric fever 4. Cases: Enteric fever 14, diphtheria 1, and smallpox 6.
