## AINOTE ON SQUIRREL FLEAS AS PLAGUE CARRIERS.

From squirrel to guinea pig.—A California ground squirrel (Citellus beecheyi) after having been freed of fleas was inoculated with a culture of B. pestis that had been carried for a long time on artificial media. On the fifth day after the inoculation, 89 squirrel fleas (Ceratophyllus acutus Baker) were put in the cage with the animal. The squirrel died 4 days later. A few hours after the death of the squirrel 4 guinea pigs were placed in the cage, the body of the squirrel being permitted to remain with them for about half an hour. The body of the squirrel was then removed and subjected to a postmortem examination and the lesions of subacute plague were found. One of the guinea pigs died on the eighth day and another on the twelfth day. Each animal exhibited the lesions of subacute plague. The remaining guinea pigs were chloroformed on the sixteenth day and found entirely healthy.

In this experiment the possibility of contagion from the contamination of the cage and from the body of the squirrel could not be eliminated; however, the mass of evidence against such modes of infection is so great as to leave practically no doubt that the trans-

mission was by means of the fleas introduced.

From squirrel to squirrel.—A ground squirrel was inoculated with a culture of the plague bacillus derived from a case of plague in man (squirrel origin). Forty-eight hours after the inoculation 100 fleas (C. acutus) were placed in the cage with the squirrel. This squirrel died upon the fifth day, and at the autopsy showed the usual lesions of acute plague. Twenty-seven fleas were recovered from the body of the rodent. Two of the fleas were crushed and each showed in smears an abundance of pest-like bacilli. The remaining 25 fleas were placed in a clean cage with a healthy squirrel. This second squirrel died on the tenth day, presenting at autopsy the characteristic lesions of subacute plague. A culture of B. pestis was isolated from the liver. This experiment proves conclusively that squirrel fleas may carry plague infection from one squirrel to another, but whether this is the usual mode of conveyance in nature remains to be proven. The fleas used in these experiments were bred on healthy squirrels in the laboratory and had never had an opportunity to become contaminated prior to the experiment.

# CONDEMNATION OF INSANITARY PREMISES IN SAN FRANCISCO, CAL.

In considering the method of presenting cases to the board of health for condemnation, the procedure, the result of orders of the board of health, the number of cases in abeyance under injunction proceedings, and the present status of the latter cases, it is essential to bear in mind the status of San Francisco from the sanitary point of view at the time the United States Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service took charge of the antiplague campaign.

After the conflagration in 1906, which consumed the entire business center and also the most densely inhabited section of the city, hastily constructed, flimsy shacks, erected over basements filled with fire-débris, served for business purposes, and 100,000 homeless persons drifted into the already well-filled unburnt part of the city.

The scavenger service, carried on by private individuals, was completely disorganized and the waste and garbage of a huge community

was thrown carelessly about.

Under such favorable conditions rats multiplied rapidly, and six months after the conflagration, when human plague cases appeared and the work for the eradication of plague began, the number of rats was estimated at several millions. With the exception of two outlying sections, rats infected with plague were brought in from all

parts of the city.

Out of the confusion of the first few months following the conflagration arose the most unusual conditions of tenancy of land and buildings; as a consequence, such temporary business shacks as those above mentioned, constructed mostly on short lease holds of the land, were of too little value to warrant spending much money in order to place them in a rat-proof condition, and yet of too much value to be summarily torn down. Practically the entire food supply of the city is handled in a section consisting of about 15 square blocks of such shacks; in a period of six months, following a year of constant trapping and poisoning, over 3,000 rats were trapped in this limited territory.

Wood is the cheapest building material on the Pacific coast, and San Francisco, like other Pacific coast cities, uses this material very extensively. Outside of the restricted fire-limit area, buildings for business or dwelling purposes are constructed exclusively of wood. A city so constructed is a huge rat harbor, and wherever foodstuffs are accessible there rats are numerous, and, excepting from systematic trapping and poisoning, are in no risk of destruction.

At the beginning of the work for the eradication of plague there were no state laws nor city ordinances that could be used in enforcing antiplague measures, and yet it was apparent that as owners of property would have to expend money in rat-proofing their premises, adequate laws would be required. Surgeon Rupert Blue, with the support of the board of health, requested the board of supervisors to pass such ordinances as were essential for the successful prosecution of the work. These included an ordinance granting power to the board of health to condemn insanitary premises; also ordinances

requiring the concreting of stables, markets, and the ground area of all new buildings, the sealing of all apertures made for the installation of plumbing, telephone and electric wires, the collection and disposal of garbage, and many others. It was then found that, with the assistance of these ordinances, nearly all cases could be carried to completion by the efforts of the United States public health officers in the field. A small proportion, the refractory cases, were presented to the board of health, from time to time, for condemnation.

The following is the routine procedure employed in obtaining the

rat proofing of premises:

In the course of systematic inspection certain premises are found to be in such condition as to harbor rats. The inspector reports on this condition and ascertains the name of the owner or lessee of the property. The latter is then communicated with and requested to be on the premises at a definite time. At this appointment the nature of the nuisance is pointed out to him and a written copy of the requirements furnished and explained. A reasonable time is fixed in which to comply with these requirements. At the end of this time if no beginning has been made a second communication is forwarded urging him to comply with the law and warning him that in case of noncompliance the premises will be taken up for condemnation. At the end of another period of inaction a communication is forwarded to the health officer of the city of San Francisco recommending the premises for condemnation.

This communication states the location of the property, its character, the names of the owner, lessee, tenants, etc., the part to be condemned, and the requirements that will be necessary in order to

place the premises in a sanitary condition.

The city health officer, acting on this recommendation, now makes out a formal complaint in accordance with the law governing the procedure of condemnation. The board thereupon sets a date for hearing the case; notice of this hearing is served by a police officer on the responsible parties and a copy also posted on the property.

At the time set for hearing there are present a quorum of the board of health, the health officer, the representative of the United States Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service, and the owners, lessees, occupants, and other persons interested in the premises.

The complaint is read by the health officer. The president of the board calls upon the owner, lessee, agent, or other responsible person, to present any objection to the complaint or any reason why the premises should not be condemned. Following this statement, the representative of the Service is called upon, if necessary, to explain more fully the nature of the nuisance or of the requirements, or to furnish any additional evidence that may be required, etc. To assist the members of the board in reaching a decision a number of photographs of the premises are included in the documents of the case.

If the case be sustained, the board, by formal resolution, declares the premises to be in an insanitary condition and, as such, condemned. This condemnation means that the premises shall be destroyed or that certain alterations shall be made which shall be

sufficient to place them in a sanitary condition.

The work to be done usually corresponds with the requirements formulated by the officer of the United States Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service. In many instances a committee of the

board visits the premises in question in order to ascertain personally the nature of the conditions. Almost without exception these committees have concurred with the demands of the Service officers.

One of two things then happens:

1. The responsible party complies with the orders of the board. A report to that effect is forwarded by the Service officer to the board

of health, the case called, abated, and closed.

2. If, after a period of 15 days, which is usually extended to one month, the requirements have not been complied with and the responsible party offers no sufficient reasons for an extension of time, the Service officer forwards to the board of health a communication stating these facts and recommending that the premises be vacated according to law.

The owner is again notified to be present at a special meeting of the board and show cause why the premises should not be vacated according to law. The purpose of this hearing is to give the responsible party still another chance to comply with the requirements. Upon his refusal to do so or his nonappearance at the hearing, the board resolves that the premises shall be vacated. The health officer then transmits this order of the board in writing to the chief of police, who enforces the order.

In a number of instances the threatened or actual execution of the order of vacation is arrested by an injunction procured by the owner

and restraining the board of health from such action.

The number of cases thus condemned from the beginning of antiplague work in September, 1907, to January 1, 1910, is 1,127; the number of cases abated by such action is 965; the number of unabated cases to date is 122. Most of these unabated cases depend for their final abatement on a number of conditions, entirely local in their character, and resulting directly from the conditions caused by the great fire. Such conditions are, for instance, the early expiration of leases, and the question of the length of life that will be given by the board of supervisors to that class of temporary shack mentioned at the beginning of this report.

Last case of human plague sickened January 30, 1908. Last case of rodent plague trapped October 23, 1908. Total number of rats found infected to date, 398.

Week ended March 26, 1910. Premises inspected, 750. Houses destroyed, 9. Buildings condemned, 7. Nuisances abated, 84. Poisons placed, 7,200. Rats trapped, 2,247. Rats found dead, 16. Gophers trapped, 1. Moles trapped, 1. Rats identified, 2,263, as follows: Mus norvegicus, 1,790; Mus rattus, 89; Mus musculus, 341; Mus alexandrinus, 43. Average number of traps set daily, 7,345. Examined bacteriologically, 1,924 rats, 1 gopher, 1 mole. No plague infection found.

#### BERKELEY, CAL.

There is no record of rodent plague in Berkeley. The last case of human plague sickened August 28, 1907.

Week ended March 26, 1910. Rats trapped, 46. Rats examined bacteriologically, 46. No plague-infected rats found.

#### OAKLAND, CAL.

Last case of human plague sickened October 26, 1909. Last case

of rodent plague found December 1, 1908.

Week ended March 26, 1910. Rats found dead, 29. Rats trapped, 575. Rats identified, 604, as follows: Mus norvegicus, 506; Mus rattus, 5; Mus musculus, 92; Mus alexandrinus, 1. Rats examined bacteriologically, 504. No plague-infected rats found.

#### ALAMEDA COUNTY (EXCLUSIVE OF THE CITY OF OAKLAND).

Last case of human plague sickened 2 miles southwest of Sunol, September 26, 1909. Last plague-infected rodent found March 17, 1910. To the present time 75 ground squirrels and 1 wood rat have been found infected.

Week ended March 26. Ranches inspected, 5. Ground squirrels shot, 80. Acres covered with poison, 45. Ground squirrels examined bacteriologically, 80. Five plague-infected squirrels found.

The infected squirrels were found in Oakland Township. Three were found respectively on March 5, 9, and 16, and 2 on March 17.

#### FRESNO COUNTY, CAL.

There is no record of human or rodent plague in Fresno County. Week ended March 26. Ranches inspected, 38. Ground squirrels shot, 675. Ground squirrels examined bacteriologically, 671. No plague-infected squirrels found.

#### MERCED COUNTY, CAL.

There is no record of human or rodent plague in Merced County. Week ended March 26. Ranches inspected, 8. Ground squirrels shot, 166. Rabbits shot, 9. Examined bacteriologically, 161 squirrels and 9 rabbits. No plague infection found.

#### MONTEREY COUNTY, CAL.

There is no record of human or rodent plague in Monterey County. Week ended March 26. Ranches inspected, 28. Ground squirrels shot, 314. Ground squirrels examined bacteriologically, 311. No plague-infected squirrels found.

#### SAN LUIS OBISPO COUNTY, CAL.

There is no record of human plague in San Luis Obispo County.

A plague-infected rodent was found January 29, 1910.

Week ended March 26. Ranches inspected, 13. Ground squirrels shot, 110. Ground squirrels examined bacteriologically, 110. No plague-infected squirrels found.

#### SAN MATEO COUNTY, CAL.

There is no record of human or rodent plague in San Mateo County. Week ended March 26. Ranches inspected, 9. Ground squirrels shot, 150. Ground squirrels examined bacteriologically, 146. No plague-infected squirrels found.

#### SANTA BARBARA COUNTY, CAL.

There is no record of human or rodent plague in Santa Barbara

County.

Week ended March 26. Ranches inspected, 16. Ground squirrels shot, 113. Ground squirrels examined bacteriologically, 111. No plague-infected squirrels found.

#### SANTA CLARA COUNTY, CAL.

There is no record of human plague in Santa Clara County. A plague-infected rodent was found November 3, 1909. Total number of ground squirrels found infected to date, 9.

Week ended March 26, 1910. Ranches inspected, 2. Ground squirrels shot, 36. Ground squirrels examined bacteriologically, 36.

No plague-infected squirrels found.

#### TULARE COUNTY, CAL.

#### INDIA.

#### BOMBAY-Decrease in Plague Among Rats.

Consul Denison reports, March 11:

There has been a decrease in plague among rats during the past 10 days. The percentage of plague-infected rats captured ordinarily varies from 2 per cent in November to 30 per cent in March. At this time last year the figure was 26 per cent, but the highest that has been reached this season is 18 per cent, and during the past 10 days that has declined to 14 per cent. It may be merely a passing phase in the progress of the infection, due to the unusually cool weather that has been prevalent for the month of March, but unless this is the case, there ought soon to be a corresponding decline in plague amongst human beings.

During the week ended March 8 there were 121 deaths from plague, as against 91 in the preceding week and 197 in the corresponding

week of 1909.

Smallpox accounted for 53 deaths, as against 42 in the previous week and 19 in the corresponding week of 1909.

The total mortality was 796, or 43 more than in the preceding week, so that the increase represents exactly the spread in these two diseases.

#### CALCUTTA-Cholera, Plague, and Smallpox.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Allan reports, March 10:

Week ended February 19. At Calcutta there were 34 deaths from cholera, 21 from plague, and 3 from smallpox; in all Bengal, 2,499 cases of plague with 1,966 deaths. Week ended February 26: At Calcutta 41 deaths from cholera, 20 from plague, and 2 from smallpox; in all Bengal, 2,901 cases of plague with 2,367 deaths.

Week ended March 18. At Novotscherkask 2 cases of cholera with 2 deaths were reported. At Libau 2 cases of plague with 2 deaths. At Saratov smallpox was reported epidemic and spreading rapidly. At Riga typhus fever was reported present with 81 cases and 12 deaths, and a total of 278 cases present.
