RESULTS OF MICROSCOPIC EXAMINATION FOR HOOK-WORM DISEASE IN A PUBLIC SCHOOL IN RICHMOND COUNTY, VA.

By Ch. Wardell Stiles, Ph. D., Professor of Zoology, and Charles G. Crane, B. S., Assistant in Zoology, Hygienic Laboratory, United States Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service.

At the request of Dr. A. C. Fisher, of Emmerton, Va., we have examined microscopically all of the pupils (white), 39 in number, of one of the public schools in the Washington district, Richmond County, Va., to determine the frequency of hookworm infection.

Of these 39 children (23 boys, 16 girls), 37 pupils, or 94.8 per cent harbor hookworms, as demonstrated microscopically by finding the eggs. The 2 negative cases are children from Washington, D. C., who moved to the county only last fall.

Blank cards were furnished to Doctor Fisher for certain data in connection with each child. From these cards the following information has been tabulated:

Actual and apparent age.—The actual age of the pupils varies from 7 to 17 years. Of the 21 boys showing infection, 11 pupils, or 52.3 per cent, were judged by Doctor Fisher as appearing younger than they actually are, that is to say they are underdeveloped for their age. The total actual age for the 21 male cases is 243 years, giving an average of 11.5 years; their total apparent age is 221 years, giving an average of 10.5 years; thus they average 1 year in underdevelopment; this underdevelopment is given as 1 year for 4 boys, 2 years for 3 boys, and 3 years for 4 boys.

Of the 16 girls, 6 pupils, or 37.5 per cent, were judged as apparently younger than they actually are; their total actual age is 199.6 years, giving an average of 12.4 years; their total apparent age is 188.6 years, giving an average of 11.7 years; thus they average 0.7 year in underdevelopment; this underdevelopment is estimated at 1 year for 1 girl, and 2 years for 5 girls.

The total actual age for the 37 infected pupils is 442.6 years, giving an average of 11.9 years; the total apparent age is 409.6 years, giving an average of 11.0 years; thus, the total underdevelopment of the 37 infected children is 33 years, or 396 months, giving an average of 0.89 year, or 10.69 months.

Sanitary condition of the homes.—Of the 39 children, 17 pupils, or 43.5 per cent, are living in homes which are not provided with any privy—in other words, they are living on a theoretical maximum of soil pollution; 5 of these 17 children, or 29.3 per cent, report that there has been typhoid fever in their families within the past 10 years. remaining 22 pupils live on farms with a surface privy open in back; 3 of these children, or 13.6 per cent, report typhoid fever in their fam-

ilies within the past 10 years.

Ground itch.—As some of the children are very young, their testimony as to ground itch is not altogether satisfactory; 19 report having had ground itch, 12 (including the 2 negative cases) deny ground itch, and 8 report that they do not recall whether or not they have had it.

Farm life.—The 37 children infected with hookworm disease have

spent their entire life on farms.

The foregoing statistics need not be surprising to any person who has followed the recent work on hookworm disease and who is ac-

quainted with rural sanitation in the South.

The point may be emphasized that the foregoing statements as to underdevelopment and sanitation are based upon local (Virginia) testimony. Our part of the work has been confined to the laboratory examinations.

PLAGUE-PREVENTION WORK.

Infected Ground Squirrels.

A plague-infected squirrel was found March 25, 1910, in Oakland Township, Alameda County, Cal.

Summary of Examinations at Plague Laboratories at San Francisco and Oakland, Cal.

Passed Assistant Surgeon McCoy reports:

Week ended April 2, 1910. The animals examined for plague were as follows: 4,940 rats, of which 2,011 were Mus norvegicus, 68 Mus rattus, 103 Mus alexandrinus, and 71 Mus musculus; 2,651 squirrels, 19 rabbits, 17 gophers.

Doctor McCoy further reports:

SAN FRANCISCO, CAL.

Last case of human plague sickened January 30, 1908. Last case of rodent plague trapped October 23, 1908. Total number of rats

found infected to date, 398.

Week ended April 2, 1910. Premises inspected, 1,158. Buildings destroyed, 13. Buildings condemned, 9. Nuisances abated, 133. Poisons placed, 8,160. Rats trapped, 2,007. Rats found dead, 33. Gophers trapped, 17. Squirrels trapped, 1. Rats identified, 2,040, as follows: Mus norvegicus, 1,563; Mus rattus, 68; Mus musculus, 306; Mus alexandrinus, 103. Average number of traps set daily, 7,526. Examined bacteriologically, 1,752 rats, 17 gophers, and 1 squirrel. No plague infection found.

BERKELEY, CAL.

There is no record of rodent plague in Berkeley. The last case of

human plague sickened August 28, 1907.

Week ended April 2, 1910. Rats trapped, 20. Rats examined bacteriologically, 20. No plague-infected rats found.

OAKLAND, CAL.

Last case of human plague sickened October 26, 1909. Last case

of rodent plague found December 1, 1908.

Week ended April 2, 1910. Rats found dead, 15. Rats trapped, 533. Rats identified, 548, as follows: Mus norvegicus, 483; Mus musculus, 65. Rats examined bacteriologically, 481. No plague-infected rats found.

ALAMEDA COUNTY, CAL. (EXCLUSIVE OF THE CITY OF OAKLAND).

Last case of human plague sickened 2 miles southwest of Sunol, September 26, 1909. Last plague-infected rodent found March 25, 1910. To the present time 76 ground squirrels and 1 wood rat have been found infected.

Week ended April 2, 1910. Ranches inspected, 6. Ground squirrels shot, 144. Acres covered with poison, 77. Ground squirrels examined bacteriologically, 144. One plague-infected squirrel was found in Oakland Township, March 25.

FRESNO COUNTY, CAL.

There is no record of human or rodent plague in Fresno County. Week ended April 2. Ranches inspected, 30. Ground squirrels shot, 878. Ground squirrels examined bacteriologically, 871. No plague-infected squirrels found.

MADERA COUNTY, CAL.

There is no record of human or rodent plague in Madera County. Week ended April 2. Ranches inspected, 1. Ground squirrels shot, 71. Ground squirrels examined bacteriologically, 69. No plague-infected squirrels found.

MERCED COUNTY, CAL.

There is no record of human or rodent plague in Merced County. Week ended April 2. Ranches inspected, 9. Ground squirrels shot, 303. Rabbits shot, 17. Examined bacteriologically, 300 squirrels and 17 rabbits. No plague infection found.

MONTEREY COUNTY, CAL.

There is no record of human or rodent plague in Monterey County. Week ended April 2. Ranches inspected, 33. Ground squirrels shot, 250. Ground squirrels examined bacteriologically, 246. No plague-infected squirrels found.

SAN LUIS OBISPO COUNTY, CAL.

There is no record of human plague in San Luis Obispo County. A

plague-infected rodent was found January 29, 1910.

Week ended April 2. Ranches inspected, 19. Ground squirrels shot, 165. Ground squirrels found dead, 41. Ground squirrels examined bacteriologically, 206. No plague-infected squirrels found.

SAN MATEO COUNTY, CAL.

There is no record of human or rodent plague in San Mateo County. Week ended April 2. Ranches inspected, 7. Ground squirrels shot, 161. Ground squirrels examined bacteriologically, 157. No plague-infected squirrels found.

SANTA BARBARA COUNTY, CAL.

There is no record of human or rodent plague in Santa Barbara

County.

Week ended April 2. Ranches inspected, 23. Ground squirrels shot, 190. Ground squirrels examined bacteriologically, 186. No plague-infected squirrels found.

SANTA CLARA COUNTY, CAL.

There is no record of human plague in Santa Clara County. A plague-infected rodent was found November 3, 1909. Total number of ground squirrels found infected to date, 9.

Week ended April 2, 1910. Ranches inspected, 4. Ground squirrels shot, 77. Ground squirrels examined bacteriologically, 75. No

plague-infected squirrels found.

TULARE COUNTY, CAL.

There is no record of human or rodent plague in Tulare County. Week ended April 2. Ranches inspected, 8. Ground squirrels shot, 301. Rabbits shot, 2. Examined bacteriologically, 297 squirrels and 2 rabbits. No plague infection found.

VENTURA COUNTY, CAL.

There is no record of human or rodent plague in Ventura County. Week ended April 2. Ranches inspected, 7. Ground squirrels shot, 101. Ground squirrels examined bacteriologically, 99. No plague-infected squirrels found.

SEATTLE, WASH.

Assistant Surgeon Chapin reports:

Month of March, 1910. Rats received, 4,495. Rats examined, 279. No plague-infected rats found.

SMALLPOX IN OKLAHOMA FROM OCTOBER 1, 1908, TO JANUARY 31, 1910.

The following information was received from the state board of health under date of March 18, 1910:

During the last quarter of the year 1908 smallpox was reported in the State of Oklahoma as follows:

October, 38 cases; November, 74 cases; December, 119 cases with

2 deaths; total, 231 cases, 2 deaths.

During the year ended December 31, 1909, smallpox was reported as follows: January, 203 cases, 2 deaths; February, 202 cases, 1 death; March, 191 cases, 2 deaths; April, 263 cases; May, 173 cases;

June, 114 cases; July, 18 cases; August, 17 cases, 1 death; September, 20 cases; October, 55 cases; November, 41 cases; December, 137 cases; total, 1,434 cases, 6 deaths.
During the month of January, 1910, 238 cases of smallpox with 2 deaths were reported.

Status of Plague on Island of Hawaii.

I'March 27. The total number of plague deaths at Hilo, Hawaii, since March 12, is 4, and at Honokaa, a subport about 60 miles from Hilo, 2. All the Hilo cases have occurred among Japanese. The 2 deaths at Honokaa were of children of a white family, girls aged, respectively, 5 and 13 years. The infection in their cases was axillary. The father of the children owns a large store the supplies for which all come by boat from Hilo. A plague-infected rat was found at

529 April 22, 1910

Honokaa March 16. Two infected rats were found at Hilo March 23. Infected and suspicious districts are strictly quarantined. Measures are being enforced to prevent the spread of plague by means of interisland traffic.

A report of March 28 states that the last case of human plague at Hilo occurred March 23, 1910, and that the last plague-infected rat was found March 26, 1910.

Diphtheria Among Immigrants.

On February 23 Doctor Ramus reported that he had received at the quarantine station 315 Russian immigrants from the steamship Mongolia on account of a case of diphtheria that developed among them two days after arrival, and on February 25 he reported the arrival of the steamship Tenyo Maru from Japanese ports with 1 case of diphtheria among the 70 Russians landed, and that at the request of the governor of Hawaii he had removed the 69 contacts to the quarantine station. On March 7 the steamship Korea arrived from the Orient with 54 cases of diphtheria among the Russian immigrants. The immigrants, 249 in number, were quartered at the quarantine station where 89 cases of diphtheria had developed among the two groups of immigrants previously received. The situation was considered so grave that the governor ordered a company of the national guard for duty at the quarantine station to assist in handling the 600 immigrants held in detention. On March 6 a case of diphtheria occurred on the revenue cutter Thetis and the patient was removed to the station. On March 26 the steamship Siberia, from the Orient, brought a case of diphtheria which had developed among immigrants. The total number of immigrants in detention at the quarantine station March 27 was 800. Disinfection of bedding and effects has been carried out.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Smith at Kobe, Japan, had reported, February 16 and 23, an outbreak of diphtheria, with 5 cases and 1 death, among Russian emigrants, at Ono detention station at Kobe. The cases had been removed to the isolation hospital.

Smallpox on U.S. S. Albatross.

Doctor Ramus reports, April 15, a case of smallpox on U. S. S. Albatross from Yokohama.

INDIA.

CALCUTTA-Cholera, Plague, and Smallpox.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Allan reports, March 17:

Week ended March 5. At Calcutta there were 49 deaths from cholera, 29 from plague, and 2 from smallpox; in all Bengal, 3,110 cases of plague, with 2,544 deaths; in all India, 24,834 cases of plague, with 21,514 deaths.

Week ended March 12. Bill of health issued to steamship Rabenfels, for Boston and New York, with a total crew of 30. The usual precautions were taken, holds fumigated, rat guards placed on

wharf lines, and effects of Asiatics disinfected.

Emigrants inspected: Per steamship Nippon Maru for Honolulu 24, including 4 Koreans, and for San Francisco 1; per steamship Tamba Maru for Seattle 38. The emigrants passed, with 8 intending passengers for Victoria by the Tamba Maru and 2 by the Kiyo Maru for Mexico were bathed and their effects were disinfected. All the emigrants were 7 days in detention at Ono quarantine station.

of plague with 1 death.

MEXICO.

Report from the Superior Board of Health of Mexico.

In compliance with articles 1 and 2 of the International Sanitary Convention held at Washington, October 9-14, 1905, the president of the Superior Board of Health of Mexico reports, April 11, that no case of yellow fever and no death from the said disease were registered in the Mexican Republic during the week ended April 9, and that the prophylactic measures reported under date of September 28, 1908, continue to be carried out.

COATZACOALCOS-Inspection and Fumigation of Vessels.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Thompson reports, April 7:

Week ended April 2. Vessels inspected: April 1, steamships *Traveller* for a port in the United States via Veracruz and Tampico, and *Honduras* for New Orleans; April 2, steamship *Oregonian* for Delaware Breakwater Quarantine. The *Honduras* was fumigated. No quarantinable disease reported.

PERU.

CALLAO-Inspection of Vessels-Plague in Peru.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Castro-Gutierrez reports, March 30:
Week ended March 19. One vessel, with 94 in crew and 30 cabin
and 18 steerage passengers, was fumigated. Week ended March 26.
Six vessels having an aggregate of 645 in crews and 106 cabin and 141
steerage passengers inspected. Five of these vessels were fumigated.

Bills of health show plague present at Mollendo with 8 cases and 3 deaths during the past 2 weeks. Plague is reported present in the Province of Pacasmayo. At Antofagasta, Chile, plague was reported present with 4 cases in the lazaretto. Smallpox was also reported present. At Iquique, Chile, plague was reported March 20.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

Prophylactic Plague Measures.

Passed Assistant Surgeon Victor G. Heiser, chief quarantine

officer, reports, March 4:

In view of the increased frequency with which vessels now come alongside of the new docks which have recently been completed at Iloilo, Cebu, and Manila, and, more especially, since many of such vessels come direct from Chinese and Japanese ports that are plague infected, it has been deemed advisable to take further precautions in order to prevent the introduction of plague into the Philippine Islands. With this end in view the following circular letter was issued February 21, 1910:

[Circular.]

United States Treasury Department, Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service, OFFICE CHIEF QUARANTINE OFFICER FOR PHILIPPINE ISLANDS, Manila, P. I., February 21, 1910.

To the owners, agents, and masters of vessels, and others concerned:

Sirs: In order to minimize the danger from the spread of plague by vessels in the event that this disease should again make its appearance in the Philippine Islands, all vessels in the interisland service, and all local craft, including cascoes, launches, lighters, etc., and vessels in the foreign trade which call at the ports of entry in the Philippines, must be fumigated at least twice annually in order to destroy the rats and vermin that may be aboard.

It is the intention to carry out this fumigation at such times as will cause the least inconvenience to the vessels; and in view of the fact that rats and vermin are a source of considerable annoyance and expense to the owners of vessels, as well as being most undesirable, it is hoped that your full cooperation in carrying out this fumigation will be accorded. No charge will be made for the work. A certificate stating that the vessel has been fumigated will be issued to all masters of vessels who may desire it.

Masters of vessels would confer a great favor upon this bureau if they would send to the quarantine office a brief statement, each time a vessel is fumigated, which would

give the number of rats and mice that were killed by the fumigation.

All vessels should be empty when fumigated, and it is respectfully requested that, when unloading is completed and before new cargo is taken on board, the quarantine office be notified before noon on the day on which it is desired to have the fumigation done in order that the work may be carried out as expeditiously as possible.

In addition to the foregoing, and at the request of this office, the customs harbor regulations at Iloilo, Cebu, and Manila have been so amended that all vessels that come to a wharf will be required to use the special kind of rat guard which is in use at San Francisco. Vessels are also required to keep at least several feet away from the wharf, so that the danger of rats coming ashore will be still further minimized.

Arrangements have also been made with the Bureau of Agriculture to breed a good type of rat-catching cat, which can be kept on the

wharves.

Local Regulations.

In view of the improved cholera conditions in the city of Manila, vessels proceeding to Iloilo are now allowed to leave Manila without a bill of health or inspection.

Examination of water supply at St. Petersburg showed cholera bacilli in specimens taken March 25. Specimens taken April 1 were negative.

The steamship Russia sailed from Libau for New York March 29, with 1,189 passengers and a crew of 137, all of whom had been in Libau for the full 5 days; pieces of baggage disinfected, 198. The case of smallpox previously reported as found among passengers examined for the Russia was held until recovery.

VENEZUELA.

February 1 to 15, 1910. Total number of deaths 423, including typhoid fever 1, smallpox 79, measles 3, plague 2, tuberculosis 53.

CANADA—Sherbrooke.—Month of March, 1910. Population, 15,300. Total number of deaths from all causes 17, including typhoid fever 1, diphtheria 1, tuberculosis 2.

France—Toulon.—Month of March, 1910. Population, 101,602. Total number of deaths from all causes 186, including typhoid fever 2, tuberculosis 22.
