#### PLAGUE-PREVENTION WORK.

Surgeon Blue reports:

#### INFECTED GROUND SQUIRRELS.

The finding of 3 plague-infected ground squirrels in California was reported during the week ended August 27, 1910. They were found as follows: One in Alameda County, Cal., August 16, at Craigmont, half a mile north of Berkeley, and 2 in San Joaquin County, Cal., August 19, at McLaughlin ranch, about 3½ miles northeast of Tracy.

#### ANIMALS EXAMINED FOR PLAGUE INFECTION.

During the week ended August 27, 1910, there were examined for plague infection at the federal laboratory at San Francisco and the branch laboratories at Oakland and Los Angeles, Cal., animals as follows: Squirrels 2,705, gophers 4, rabbits 9, badgers 1, rats 1,864. The rats were identified as follows: Mus norvegicus 1,649, Mus rattus 88, Mus alexandrinus 82, Mus musculus 45.

The total number of animals examined was 4,583. Three plague-infected squirrels were found.

#### DISTRIBUTION OF POISON.

In connection with the making of a squirrel-free zone around the cities on San Francisco Bay, 1,775 acres of land in Alameda County were covered with poison during the week ended August 27, 1910.

#### SFATTLE, WASH.

Assistant Surgeon Chapin reports:

During the week ended August 27, 1910, 1,011 rats were collected. Of these 860 were necropsied and examined for plague infection. No plague infected rats were found.

#### AUSTRIA-HUNGARY.

#### Cholera.

The American consul at Fiume reported to the Department of State September 13:

Isolated cholera cases in 8 communities from Kressburg to Mohacs,

on the Danube.

The imperial health bureau at Berlin reported, August 31, the occurrence of 2 cases of cholera at Vienna in persons recently arrived from Hungary. One case ended fatally. The cases were bacteriologically verified.

#### [BRAZIL.]

#### [[PFRNAMBUCO-Emalipor-Health Conditions.;

Consul Griffith reports, July 31 and August 2:

During the two weeks ended May 31, 45 deaths from smallpox and

1 death from yellow fever were reported.

Smallpox is prevalent in Pernambuco continuously and in a most virulent form, an average of 50 deaths occurring from the disease in a period of two weeks. The deaths are chiefly among the lower classes, who live in the low, marshy suburbs of the town and observe no sanitary or hygienic precautions. Leprosy is present. The lepers beg in the streets. There is a hospital for lepers situated a short distance from the city. Sporadic cases of yellow fever occur, and during the past four months 2 deaths from bubonic plague have been reported. The drainage system which covers the greater part of the city is efficient. The water is good and comes from wells at a distance from the city. The incessant rains keep the streets clean. The streets are swept each night and garbage is carted away and burned in a large plant constructed especially for the purpose.

#### CHINA.

#### Amoy-Cholera'and'Plague.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Moorhead reports, August 8:

During the week ended August 6 a death from cholera occurred in the international settlement of Kulangsu. In Amoy city plague continues present in sporadic form, and a recrudescence of plague is reported from some of the outlying districts.

#### CUBA.

#### Habana-No/Quarantinable Disease.

Passed Assistant Surgeon de Valin reports, August 30:

During the week ended August 27 no quarantinable disease was reported in the island.

#### GERMANY-Cholera at Kalthoff, West Prussia.

The American consul at Stettin, Germany, reported to the Department of State September 14:

Six deaths from cholera and 4 serious additional cases at Kalthoff, suburb of Marienburg. One hundred persons are quarantined.

#### HAWAII.

Last case of human plague at Honolulu occurred July 12, 1910.

The last plague-infected rat was found at Aiea, 9 miles from Honolulu, April 12, 1910.

At Hilo the last case of human plague occurred March 23, 1910. The last plague-infected rat was found at Piihuona, 4 miles from Hilo, April 9, 1910.

#### INDIA.

#### BOMBAY-Health Conditions.

Consul Dennison reports, August 9:

Week ended August 9. The public health conditions of Bombay have undergone practically no change since last week's report. The relief which followed the break up of the long period of hot, dry weather continues, and just at present the city is suffering to some extent from an excess of generous rainfall.

In the 7 days ended August 9 the total mortality in Bombay was 705 as against 658 in the previous week. The five-year average is 671, but in the corresponding week of last year only 582 deaths were recorded.

Plague accounted for 36 deaths, against 38 in the previous week, 27 in the corresponding week of 1909, and a mean for the past five years of 33. Smallpox deaths have fallen to 2, but there was a small number of fresh attacks. Cholera has completely disappeared and the corrected death rate is 37.49.

#### CALCUTTA—Cholera and Plague.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Allan reports, August 11:

During the week ended July 23 there were 18 deaths from cholera and 17 from plague in Calcutta; in all Bengal, 34 cases of plague with 31 deaths; in all India, 737 cases with 554 deaths.

#### ITALY.

#### The Cholera Outbreak.

Surg. H. D. Geddings at Naples reports, August 28, as follows:
The announcement of the presence of cholera in Italy August 17
came as a complete surprise. There had been no disturbing rumors,
although the cholera situation in the Black Sea provinces of Russia had
become disquieting and had led to renewed precautions in the handling
of emigrants destined for the United States. On August 18 a circular letter was addressed by this office to all steamship agencies in
Naples announcing the enforcement of the quarantine regulations of
the United States in regard to cholera. During the afternoon of
August 17 and the morning of August 18 about 80 passengers of the
steerage class were placed under observation in a special boarding
house designated by the Italian inspector of emigration at this port.

Origin of the infection.—Reliable information gives the cause of the outbreak as the debarkation at Brindisi of a party of Russian gypsies from Batum, who proceeded by rail to Trani, which is to be regarded as the primary focus of the epidemic. Whether any of the wanderers were ill upon arrival admits of doubt; but it is certain that arriving in Trani they washed clothing in vessels used for drawing water from a well, and in due course there followed cases of choleriform disease, the nature of which was not immediately recognized, and which were regarded by the authorities as "grave gastro-intestinal disturbances." The infection spread to various towns and cities in the provinces of Bari and Foggia, both in the region of Apulia.

The town of Trani has up to this time suffered most severely, and it is to be regarded as the primary focus of infection, the outbreak partaking of the characteristics of a water-borne epidemic. The infection at other points is secondary, and the nature of the spread

up to this time points to "contact" outbreaks.

Extent of the infection.—To this time the disease has made its appearance in the following places: In the province of Bari, at Andria, Trani, Corato, Bitonto, Spinazzola, Barletta, Bari, and Bisceglie. In the province of Foggia, at Cerignola, Trinitapoli, San Ferdinando di Puglia, and Margherita di Savoia. The province of Lecce at this date remains free from infection, and it is to be remembered that these three provinces compose the region or district of Apulia.

The following figures represent as nearly as can be arrived at the

The statistical information from the other points is not at this date available, but the number of cases and deaths is small.

Measures taken by the authorities. —Inspectors and commissioners were promptly sent from the central sanitary office at Rome to the infected district and the measures taken by them have been thorough and seem to have had good results. The situation to-day is considerably improved. Travel in the infected district is being restricted and regulated; towns are being cleaned and put in better sanitary condition, and arrangements have been made for the distribution of drinking water from the aqueduct of Ofanto, a source of great purity. will receive 150 cubic meters daily, and Barletti, Trani, and Bisceglie, each about 100 cubic meters. Prohibitions have already been put in force as to the sale of fruits, especially melons, tomatoes, cucumbers, and other articles of food, such as snails, oysters, and mussels. exportation of fruits, vegetables, etc., from the infected districts has also been prohibited. Hospitals have been organized in all towns, and large quantities of disinfectants have been distributed, while all doubtful wells have been closed, and all suspected cisterns have been ordered cleaned and refilled with the pure water mentioned above. Special precautions have also been taken at all the ports which have Russian connections.

Conditions in Naples.—Naturally there is some uneasiness in Naples, and the sanitary authorities have been spurred to great activity. With the careful regulation of railroad travel much of the risk to Naples will be removed. The water supply of the city is such, and its source is so removed from all human habitation, and so carefully policed and guarded, that a water-borne epidemic of cholera is, humanly speaking, impossible. But should cases be introduced into the lower quarters of the city, there would undoubtedly be contact epidemics or at least outbreaks. Sanitary matters are receiving the careful consideration of the proper authorities, and there is no sense of false security with its attendant danger.

The relation of the outbreak to emigration.—This aspect of the subject is the one of the most importance to the sanitary authorities of the United States, and I am glad to be able to report a satisfactory condition of affairs. As previously mentioned, detention of persons and the disinfection of their baggage and effects was begun coincidently with the first alarm. The Italian commissioner-general of emigration came at once to Naples, and with him and the representatives of the various steamship companies arrangements have been com-

pleted as follows:

I. Pending the inauguration of measures to be hereafter detailed the movement of emigration from the infected provinces to Naples by

rail will be prohibited.

II. As soon as the necessary arrangements can be made, all would-be emigrants from the infected provinces will be collected in a clean town, under proper sanitary regulations, and brought to Naples on special trains, which trains will be under the supervision of military medical officers, and the trains will be equipped with all necessary emergency supplies and provided with a sufficient force of military hospital stewards and nurses.

III. Arriving in Naples, the emigrants will be carried from a special station, on special tenders or lighters, to a hospital or receiving ship which will be moored off the end of the mole. This ship will be

capable of receiving 400 or more emigrants, will have some bathing facilities, a sulphur furnace, facilities for the disinfection of the clothing in which the emigrants arrive, special arrangements for the disintection of all excreta prior to discharge into the waters of the bay, a clinical laboratory for diagnostic use, and in addition to the regular complement will have on duty a naval medical officer and a force of naval stewards and nurses, and to this ship Acting Assistant Surgeon Buonocore and I will have access at all times. Under these conditions the emigrants will be detained five full days, and then brought to the regular place of embarkation for the medical examination. The present shore facilities for the disinfection of personal effects are ample and are under our control. Should any case of cholera make its appearance on the receiving ship, the ship, with all on board, will at once put to sea and repair to the quarantine station on the Island of Sardinia and her place will be taken by another ship. The vessel will be ready for the reception of passengers August 29.

Smallpox in Naples.—During the week ended August 21 3 cases of smallpox were reported at the health office of the city of Naples.

#### RUSSIA.

#### ODESSA-Cholera and Plague.

Consul Grout reports, August 13:

During the week ended August 12, 72 new cases of cholera and 31 deaths were reported. At the close of the week there were 83 cases remaining in hospital. To date there have been reported 462 cases of cholera, with 230 deaths.

From August 7 to 13, inclusive, 2 cases of plague, with 1 death, were reported. Fifteen cases of suspect plague were removed to hospital. The chief medical officer of south Russia reports as follows relative

to the outbreak of plague in Odessa:

"A patient with symptoms not recognized was brought to the Odessa town hospital on June 4 and was placed in one of the general wards. This patient died on June 8. As the case attracted a certain amount of interest, a post-mortem examination was held the day after death, and it was found to be a case of plague. A considerable number of rats obtained from the neighborhood where the patient had lived were examined bacteriologically, but not one was found to be infected with the disease. This apparently quite isolated case remained a mystery. None of the many persons who had come in contact with this patient showed the least sign of having caught the disease. Two months later a post-mortem examination was held (July 27) the subject of which had been brought to the hospital the day before. This examination revealed another case of plague. case was speedily followed by 2 more cases. Up to the present time there have been 7 deaths from verified plague, and there remain 13 cases bacteriologically verified and 13 under observation. Thus far not one of the persons found ill with plague seems to have contracted it from another patient, but all seem to have taken it from some primary cause. All of the houses from which plague patients have been taken have been found infested with rats, but no plague rats have been found. Disinfection of suspected places and destruction by fire of property considered contaminated are rigorously carried out."

It is stated that almost every case of plague in Odessa has been that of a person living or working upon the ground floor of a building. The governor of Odessa has ordered that all such places within the infected district be cemented and made rat proof.

#### ROSTOV ON DON-Cholera.

Consular Agent Martin reports, August 12:

The epidemic of cholera is rapidly decreasing, only about 10 cases being reported daily. From the northern Caucasus cholera is reported to be gradually penetrating every village, the number of deaths from the disease being considerable.

#### ZANZIBAR.

#### ZANZIBAR-Plague.

Canada— Vancouver.—Month of July, 1910. Population, 78,900. Total number of deaths from all causes 71, including measles 1 and tuberculosis 9.

Yarmouth.—Month of July, 1910. Population, 6,700. Total number of deaths from all causes 9, including diphtheria 1 and tuberculosis 1.

CHILE—Punta Arenas.—Month of April, 1910. Population, 12,000. Total number of deaths from all causes 32, including tuberculosis 4.

EGYPT—Alexandria.—Month of June, 1910. Population, 720,000. Total number of deaths from all causes not reported. Deaths from contagious diseases include typhus fever 5, typhoid fever 9, smallpox 3, measles 38, scarlet fever 1, diphtheria 4, plague 3, tuberculosis 63.
