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BACTERIOLOGICAL PROCEDURE IN SUSPECTED CHOLERA, WITH REPORT OF A POSITIVE CASE.

Since the beginning of the present epidemic of cholera in Europe the possibility of cases being found on ships arriving at ports in this country has constantly been kept in mind by the Surgeon-General of the Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service. This possibility has been considerably increased by the appearance of the disease in Italy, especially in the city of Naples, which is the point of embarkation for large numbers of immigrants to the United States.

In order that the Hygienic Laboratory might be prepared to render expert aid in the diagnosis of suspected cases of cholera, a supply of cholera agglutinating and also bacteriolytic serum was obtained.

With the use of this serum a positive opinion could be given as to whether organisms isolated from suspected cases of cholera or from suspected carriers were the cholera vibrio. The officers in the Hygienic Laboratory also reviewed the various methods proposed for the isolation and identification of the cholera vibrio in order that when called upon they might be able to render expert aid in the diagnosis of cholera.

The importance of these procedures was shown in the following report on the diagnosis of a case of cholera that appeared in an immigrant who arrived at New York on a ship from Naples and was removed to the quarantine station in accordance with the precautionary methods enforced by Dr. A. H. Doty, quarantine officer.

The suspected organism was isolated from the feces of this person by Dr. E. C. Baldwin, bacteriologist of the New York quarantine. On account of certain cultural and morphological appearances it was suspected of being the cholera vibrio and was brought to the Hygienic Laboratory by Doctor Baldwin in order that agglutination and bacteriolytic tests should be made with it.

The following data as to the patient were kindly furnished us by Doctor Baldwin by letter and are quoted verbatim:

The patient, Moiazoin Seabain, a Turk, aged 28 years, was removed for observation along with 5 others from the steamship Germania, arrived at New York on September 26 (Marseille, September 10, and Naples, September 13). These patients were all treated during the voyage for malaria and were discharged before arrival at this port. When taken from the ship the patient climbed down the ladder and walked into the hospital. On admission it was noted that he was rather weak, with temperature normal. He was given a dose of calomel and the following day, September 27, a dose of salts, the calomel not having taken effect. The next day there were 4 copious

loose movements of the bowels with severe abdominal pain, followed immediately by collapse. The morning and evening temperature on September 28 was sub-normal. On September 29, between 8 and 10 a. m., there were several more loose

movements, and at 10.30 a. m the patient died.

At autopsy the spleen was found to be much enlarged, but not much softened; the stomach and intestines were congested, particularly the intestines. The Peyer's patches were prominent. The mucosa of the stomach was covered with thick mucus streaked in places with dark blood. The intestines contained a moderate amount of rather thin, yellow fecal matter. The fluid was considerably increased in the provided states of the stomach was considerably increased in the provided states. pericardial sac, the pleural cavities and also in the meninges and ventricles of the brain. The other organs of the body did not show any pronounced changes.

The material for cultures, etc., was obtained from the stools of September 28, the

first that aroused suspicion of the nature of the case.

BACTERIOLOGICAL EXAMINATION OF SUSPECTED CHOLERA VIBRIO CULTURES BROUGHT TO THE HYGIENIC LABORATORY, OCTOBER 3, 1910.

MATERIAL.—The cultures submitted were on 3 per cent salt agar and in peptone solution.

Morphology.—Very actively motile curved rods, apparently in

pure culture.

Flagella.—Single, terminal.

Staining.—Stain easily with $\frac{1}{10}$ carbol fuchsin and other dilute Gram negative.

CULTURAL REACTIONS.—(media neutral to phenol-phthalein).

Bouillon.—Evenly distributed turbidity 18 hours. No precipi-Delicate grayish pellicle.

Peptone water.—As in bouillon, slightly less turbid.

Agar stab.—Grayish, finely granular needle track growth, round whitish surface growth.

Gelatin stab.—Delicate needle track growth 18 hours. Lique-

faction from surface, (22° C.).

Gelatin plates.—Typical, sunken, ground-glass colonies.

Indol production.—Pink color produced in peptone water culture 18 hours old on addition of a few drops of sulphuric acid; cholerared reaction.

IMMUNITY REACTIONS.—

Agglutination.—Suspension of 18 hours agar slant growth in salt solution, began to agglutinate after 20 minutes at 37° C. and was completely agglutinated in 1 hour at a dilution of 1-2,000 of specific serum having a titre of 1-2,000 with known cholera organisms. Later test with another serum gives agglutination to 1-10,000. Normal serum negative 1-200.

Pfeiffer's reaction.—Bacteriolysis accomplished by a specific cholera bacteriolytic serum having a titre of 1-10,000, in dilutions of 1-5,000 and 1-8,000, no higher dilutions being tried. This occurred in 20 minutes in the peritoneal cavity of guinea pigs. The

protocol of the experiment is as follows:

Conclusion.—The organism corresponds in all its peculiarities to the true cholera vibrio. While cultural and morphologic characters can not be regarded as in any sense conclusive, the agglutination and Pfeiffer's test are generally accepted as offering positive evidence of the identity of the organism.

METHOD OF BACTERIOLOGICAL EXAMINATION FOR AND IDENTIFICATION OF THE ORGANISM OF ASIATIC CHOLERA, FOR PUBLIC HEALTH AND QUARANTINE PURPOSES.

Suitable materials for examination are the feces, obtained if necessary by an enema of sterile water, or the vomitus, from suspected cases, or intestinal contents from various portions of the ileum, particularly the last portion, obtained at autopsy from the dead body.

The media used in cultural work should be neutral to phenol-

phthalein.

The material is first plated out on previously poured, hardened, and dried 3 per cent agar, by smearing it out on several successive plates by means of a sterile bent glass rod. Mucous flakes from the intestinal contents should be selected, if possible, for this purpose. These plates are incubated over night at 37° and suspicious colonies examined for morphology and motility in stained smears and the hanging drop. Colonies of active vibrios are then tested for agglutination by emulsifying a portion of the colony in a drop of diluted specific serum, with the platinum needle, using as a control a ten times as strong concentration of normal serum from the same animal species. Colonies not agglutinating should not be discarded but sown on agar slants for further tests, since agglutination of freshly isolated cholera vibrios does not always occur. This is the method giving the quickest results, but since it may often fail the material must also be put through an enrichment process.

The fresh material, about 1 c. c. in amount, is added to 100 c. c. of warm peptone solution in a flask, which is incubated at 37°. After 6 hours a loop is taken from the surface without jarring the flask and examined microscopically. If active vibrios are present agar plates are made with loops from the surface, incubated and examined as in the case of fresh material. If no vibrios are found in

6 hours repeat the examination in 12-24 hours.

A positive agglutination at this stage, controlled as above, justifies a tentative diagnosis of cholera, but the isolated colonies must be fished to agar slants for further examination, as should also colonies

of active vibrios which fail of preliminary agglutination.

The pure cultures of active vibrios on agar slants are now to be examined morphologically, culturally, and biologically. The cholera vibrio reacts in the following manner to these tests, always with the understanding that the biological tests (agglutination and Pfeiffer's

test) take precedence:

Actively motile, curved rods, nonspore-bearing, having terminal flagellum, easily stained by $\frac{1}{10}$ cold carbol fuchsin, Gram negative, causing uniform turbidity in bouillon and peptone solution with delicate pellicle formation, liquefying gelatin from the surface of stab, or on plates so as to depress the colony, producing indol in peptone solution without the addition of nitrite, agglutinated by specific serum at or near the maximum titre, responding to the bacteriolytic test with specific bacteriolytic serum by Pfeiffer's method properly controlled.

ANIMALS EXAMINED FOR PLAGUE INFECTION.

During the week ended October 1, 1910, there were examined at the federal laboratory at San Francisco and the branch laboratories at Oakland and Los Angeles, Cal., animals as follows: Squirrels 3,230, rabbits 9, gophers 2, rats 2,047. The rats were identified as follows: Mus norvegicus 1,786, Mus rattus 115, Mus alexandrinus 104, Mus musculus 42.

No plague-infected animals were found.

DISTRIBUTION OF POISON.

In connection with the making of a squirrel-free zone around the cities on San Francisco Bay, 1,225 acres of land in Contra Costa County, 15 acres in Merced County, and 262 acres in San Mateo County were covered with poison during the week ended October 1, 1910.

FOREIGN AND INSULAR.

MEASURES TO PREVENT THE INTRODUCTION OF CHOLERA INTO THE UNITED STATES.

LIBAU AND ODESSA.

It having been recently reported that agents of certain steamship lines have been circularizing Russia advising emigrants to ship to the United States via Libau on the Baltic, or Odessa on the Black Sea, to avoid the restraints at the German ports, the following telegram was sent on October 15, 1910, to the American consul at Ödessa by the Department of State:

Rigidly observe paragraphs 30, 31, and 32, Quarantine Regulations, 1903. In addition rigidly exclude from persons and luggage of emigrants all articles of food. Report by cable whether increased emigration to the United States is occurring at Odessa; whether emigrants are shipping direct to the United States or via other ports. If via other ports, name of ports.

The service officer at Libau, who for the past two years has been enforcing the regulations referred to, has been warned of the possible increase of emigration from his port.

In a report dated September 23, 1910, Surgeon Carter states that as a port of emigration for the United States, Bremen is the most important in Germany. The emigration from Bremen in the calendar year 1909 was 144,417 emigrants, while from Hamburg it was 113,535. Of the number stated as passing through Bremen, 34,299

were from Russia where cholera now prevails.

The emigrants come to Bremen direct from the control stations on the German frontier, the Russians in separate coaches. After inspection by the Bremen health officer the Russians are placed in barracks for the emigrants from noninfected districts. In the barracks they are under the sanitary control of the Bremen health office and are inspected daily by their physicians. The inspections are carefully made, the temperatures taken before inspection, and all emigrants in whom the temperatures are above normal are especially examined for the cause of the rise in temperature, and are usually sent to the hospital where it is said bacteriological examination of stools is made for the determination of the presence therein of the cholera vibrios.

On the afternoon and evening before sailing a final examination is made of the emigrants by the consul and the steamship officials. The consul or his deputy is present and a physician attached to the October 21, 1910 1496

consulate acts as one of the examining physicians, of whom there are three. These physicians advise the consul as to the sanitary condition of the intending passengers. At this inspection all emigrants are vaccinated. This inspection has been hitherto made in the interests of the Emigration Service for the detection of such diseases as trachoma, and for the purpose of vaccinating all steerage passengers. In the future the emigrants from the cholera-infected districts will be inspected by themselves, and will be given an especially careful physical examination.

To reach the port of Bremen from the German control station requires approximately 24 hours of traveling time; thus about 4 days' detention takes place in Bremen in addition to the detention in the German control stations. Owing to the fact that vessels sail for the various Λmerican ports, such as New York, Philadelphia, Boston, and Galveston, on different sailing days, many of these emigrants, over one-half, remain in Bremen longer than 4 days. The vessel usually sails from Bremerhaven so early in the morning that the examination must necessarily take place the afternoon or evening before, partly by artificial light, but the light is ample for this purpose.

A representative of the consular office, or the consul himself, is present at the hour of the sailing of the vessel both at Bremen and Bremerhaven, where the bill of health is rendered, and official cognizance taken of anything requiring action at the last moment.

That paragraph of the United States Quarantine Regulations requiring cabin passengers coming from cholera-infected districts embarking at a clean or an infected port to produce satisfactory evidence as to their exact place of abode during the 5 days immediately

preceding embarkation is carried out at Bremen.

Immediately upon the arrival in Bremen of Russian emigrants, their baggage is examined by the health authorities to see if it is all certified as having been disinfected at the German control station immediately prior to the last inspection on the eve of sailing. An inspection of baggage is also made by the steamship company, and all of the dirty clothing and any baggage of Russians found without labels is now disinfected before being placed aboard the vessel.

Surgeon Carter states that he is satisfied that the system of cards and records in use for practical purposes precludes the substitution

of one person for another.

At this last inspection a comparison is made of the emigrant's ship's ticket with his control-station ticket and the other papers carried by him to determine if he has been under observation the required time.

CATANIA AND MESSINA.

Upon receipt of the information that emigration would be resumed at Messina before the end of October, a medical officer was placed on duty in connection with the enforcement at Catania and Messina of the Treasury Department regulations regarding emigrants. The consular officer at Catania was instructed by the Department of State to observe carefully the conditions at Catania, and if necessary enforce the Treasury regulations. He was also instructed to cable the name and date of departure of every vessel bound for United States ports, the number of passengers, and the ports to be touched at en route.

AUSTRIA-HUNGARY.

Cholera.

Consul Slocum, at Fiume, reported, September 22 and 23, to the

Department of State:

Cholera is officially reported present in Hungary in the cities of Budapest, Pressburg, Neusatz, and Kalocsa, on the Danube, and in 24 villages in 7 counties. Emigration from the infected districts has been prohibited. Emigrants who have already left the cholera-infected districts will be held in quarantine at Fiume five days and their effects will be disinfected.

On September 26 Consul Slocum further reported cholera present

in 22 additional localities and 13 additional counties.

Minister Kerens, at Vienna, reported, September 30, to the Department of State:

During the week ended September 24, 49 cases of cholera with 23

deaths were reported in 10 counties in Hungary.

On September 29 Consul Slocum further reported 7 additional localities and 1 additional county in Hungary to be cholera infected.

CUBA.

Transmissible Diseases in the Republic.

Passed Assistant Surgeon de Valin at Habana reports, October 12: The national department of sanitation gives the following statement of transmissible diseases in the Republic:

GERMANY.

Cholera.

Minister Hill at Berlin reported, September 23, to the Department of State:

On September 9 a case of cholera occurred at Freiburg in the person of a boatman, and on September 13 a second case occurred in

a son of the first patient.

On September 13 and 19, 3 cases of cholera occurred at Marienburg, west Prussia, the patients being a messenger boy and 2 small children. One case ended fatally. The necessary measures of isolation and disinfection have been taken to prevent spread of the disease.

INDIA.

CALCUTTA-Cholera and Plague.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Allan reports, September 15:

During the week ended August 27, there were reported 9 deaths from cholera and 10 from plague in Calcutta; in all Bengal, 34 cases of plague, with 33 deaths; in all India, 2,001 cases of plague, with 1,325 deaths.

ITALY.

SITUATION IN NAPLES.

As was reported on September 25, the sanitary authorities then officially declared for the first time the existence of cholera in Naples, giving one case as occurring on that date, but on that day there were reported in the Neapolitan press, 67 cases and 49 deaths from "gastroenteritis." Since that date the cases and deaths as reported by the press, but not as yet officially declared by the minister of the interior, are as follows:

In addition to the official declaration of the infection of the city of Naples the following cases and deaths have been reported officially

in the Province:

In so far as the condition in the city of Naples is concerned, it may be said that the situation is improved. The official declaration of cholera has relieved the state of suspense which had taken possession of the public mind, and several important edicts have been issued and seem to be reasonably well enforced prohibiting the sale of oysters, mussels, and other articles of sea food, and the sale upon the streets of green, unripe, or spoiled fruit. More care is also being taken in matters of diet by all classes, certain low classes of inns and cafés on certain fête days during October, which are great popular festivals,

having been ordered to close early in the afternoon.

The condition of the water of the harbor, previously reported infected, has for the last three days been found free from cholera vibrios. The water supply of the city continues in a satisfactory condition as to quantity and quality and no cases of cholera have occurred in vessels in the harbor since September 25. There has been interruption of the schedules of ships destined for the United States; but it is announced that the regular course of emigration will be resumed on October 7 under precautions already detailed, and it is expected that by that time the arrangements made for the movement of merchandise will have been so perfected that there will be a minimum of delay or restriction. Until a normal condition of public health is restored the ships will anchor in the open roadstead, and there will be a minimum of intercourse with the shore, and this will be under strict official supervision.

I am receiving every assistance and support from the Italian emigration authorities and from the medical officers of the Royal Italian Navy who have been detailed to assist the commissioner during this crisis. To commissioner of emigration, Cavaliere A. d'Ayello; to Capitano Medico G. Sacconi and Teniente Medico S. Muso, of the quarantine ship *Marsala*; to Maggiore Medico Professor Belli and Capitano Medico d'Accurso, of the receiving and detention ship *Lazio*; and Maggiore Medico Monaco and Capitano Medico Battaglia, of the detention building, I am indebted for many acts of kindness, cooper-

ation, and courtesy.

Doctor Geddings further reported, October 15:

Naples, October 11 and 12, 17 cases of cholera with 12 deaths; rest of Italy, 52 cases with 22 deaths.

Doctor Geddings further reported:

Naples, October 13 to 16, 36 cases of cholera with 17 deaths; rest of Italy, 91 cases with 26 deaths.

JAPAN.

KOBE-Cholera-Examination of Rats.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Moore reports, September 15, 20, and 21: A case of cholera was reported in Kobe September 12. The case was found on a lighter at the water front. The lighter was disinfected and the contacts were isolated. During the week ended September 17 there were reported 10 cases of cholera with 9 deaths at Kobe, and at Osaka, 20 miles distant from

Kobe, 9 cases with 7 deaths.

During the week ended September 21, 33 cases of cholera with 17 deaths were reported at Kobe. The municipal authorities are of the opinion that the infection was brought to Kobe from Dalny, Manchuria, by the steamship Amakusa Maru, as a large proportion of those stricken with the disease assisted in unloading that ship.

The shipping agents here are cooperating with me in every way to prevent infection being conveyed on board of ships in the harbor.

All lighters engaged in loading ships have been carefully cleaned and disinfected under the supervision of this office. Any lighter appearing with cargo alongside ships destined for American ports without bearing the stamp of this service on the certificate of disinfection, securely sealed and affixed to the lighter, is turned away and not allowed to put cargo on board.

No foodstuffs, water, or ballast will be taken on shipboard at this port, and the communication with the shore will be reduced to a mini-

mum by constant vigilance on the part of this office.

All intending steerage passengers for American ports are detained in quarantine, bathed, and disinfected, and their effects are disinfected by steam prior to embarkation.

A careful supervision of cargo manifests is maintained.

The Japanese authorities remove every case of cholera to the quarantine hospital as soon as one is found and all contacts are isolated.

During the month of July, 1910, 29,117 rats were examined for plague infection. One plague-infected rat was found. During the month of August, 1910, 26,041 rats were examined.

MEXICO.

Yellow Fever at Campeche.

The following information dated October 3 and 10 was received

from the president of the superior board of health of Mexico:

Four cases of yellow fever were reported during the week ended October 1 at Campeche, 2 occurring September 25 and 2 September 30, with 2 deaths occurring, respectively, September 25 and 30. During the week ended October 8, 1 case of yellow fever and 1 death were reported, the death occurring October 3 and the case October 8.

PERU.

Status of Plague.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Castro Gutierrez reports, September 3 and 8:

Additional reports for the month of June, 1910, show 2 new cases

of plague with 1 death in the department of Libertad.

On June 28 a plague case was reported at Callao in the person of a woman who resided in Callao but worked all day in an infected locality of Lima. On September 3 a second case of plague was reported in Callao. The case originated in Lima and the patient came from the farming country in the vicinity of Lima.

Manila—Cholera.

Chief Quarantine Officer Heiser reports, August 19 and 25 and

September 2, 8, and 14:

Cholera was reported in the city of Manila as follows: Week ended August 13, 14 cases, 10 deaths; week ended August 20, 16 cases, 11 deaths; week ended August 27, 21 cases, 11 deaths; week ended September 3, 25 cases, 18 deaths; week ended September 10, 15 cases, 15 deaths.

The number of cases in the city of Manila is somewhat augmented over the number reported for previous weeks. Eight of the cases were directly traced to having been introduced from Bulacan Province by persons who were seeking work at Pandacan, a suburb of Manila.

Cholera in the Provinces.

The total number of cases of cholera occurring in the provinces has been slowly declining, the average now per week being approximately 360, as compared with 550 several weeks ago. Most of the improvement took place in the provinces of Pangasinan, Pampanga, Tarlac, and Bulacan. There has been a steady increase in the number of cases of cholera reported in the province of Batangas, 226 being reported for the week covered by this report.

RUSSIA.

Status of Cholera.

Acting Assistant Surgeon De Forest at Libau reports, October 3: During the week ended September 29, 183 cases of cholera with 66 deaths were reported in the city and suburbs of St. Petersburg. In all Russia, exclusive of St. Petersburg, there were reported during the same period 3,480 cases with 1,749 deaths. The total number of cases of cholera in all Russia from the outbreak of the epidemic to September 29 is 198,246; deaths, 92,329.

LIBAU-Smallpox-Examination of Emigrants.

Doctor De Forest further reports:

During the week ended September 18, 1 case of smallpox was reported in Libau. At the close of the week there were 2 cases present.

The steamship *Estonia* sailed from Libau September 28 with 881 passengers and a crew of 102, all of whom had been in Libau for the full 5 days under observation. All passengers and members of crew were vaccinated previous to embarkation. No foodstuff is allowed to be taken on board by passengers. All hand baggage is inspected before embarkation.

A quarantine station has been erected at Kronstadt for inspection of incoming vessels, especially those arriving from Odessa.

ODESSA-Cholera and Plague.

Consul Grout reports, September 26:

During the week ended September 23, 15 cases of cholera with 11 deaths were reported. At the close of the week there were 15 cases in hospital.

From the outbreak of epidemic plague to September 23, 113 cases

with 29 deaths were reported.

Measures Against Plague.

Minister Rockhill, at St. Petersburg, reported, September 28, to the Department of State:

The measures which have been taken to fight plague in Odessa are

as follows:

The city has been divided into 72 wards, with one doctor for each ward and six or seven sanitary guardians, whose duty it is to discover suspicious cases of plague or of cholera by visiting the dwellings in the different wards as often as possible and by questioning the inhabitants. Each case is reported to the special board, which gives

orders for the necessary measures to be taken. All the medical forces are at the disposal of this board, including the hospital service and the service in isolation districts, the disinfection detachments, and the rat destroyers; also the detachment in charge of the sanitary maintenance of the dwellings situated in the neighborhood of the epidemic.

All the ships, without exception, at Odessa are cleared of rats, and passengers as well as the crews are submitted to a medical examina-Passenger steamships have their own doctors, isolation places, medicines, and disinfectants. These ships are inspected by doctors at the ports where they land before any communication is allowed with the shore.

At the railway station of Odessa every train is visited by a doctor before leaving. The goods specified in the regulations are not conveyed, and all the warehouses and other places within the railway station are cleared of rats.

On August 24 it was decided that owing to the continued presence of plague in Odessa Musselman pilgrims coming to Odessa should not be allowed communication with the town, but should be lodged in special buildings under medical supervision. From August 13 to 24, 17 fatal cases of plague, clinically diagnosed as pneumonic, were reported in 2 villages in the territory of Semiretschensk, in Russian Turkestan, and in the Djambeitin district, from August 23 to 27, 7 cases of plague with 3 deaths; the diagnosis was bacteriologically The usual measures have been taken in the Semiretschensk and Oural territories to combat the disease.

SERVIA.

BELGRADE-Cholera.

The American consul reported October 12 to the Department of State the presence of cholera in the consular district of Belgrade.

URUGUAY.

Precautions Against Importation of Cholera.

The following regulations issued by the Uruguayan national hygienic council were forwarded to the Department of State by the American minister September 8:

In view of the outbreak and spread of Asiatic cholera in certain parts of southern Italy, the national council of hygiene, being so authorized, resolves that-

Ships which have left Mediterranean and Adriatic ports since August 13 will be subject to the following quarantine treatment:

ARTICLE 1. Uninfected ships carrying a sanitary inspector: Free pratique after sanitary visit, ocular inspection of passengers, disinfection of clothing.

ART. 2. Uninfected ships not having a sanitary inspector:
(a) Rigorous sanitary visit and medical examination of passengers.

(b) Disinfection of clothing and cabin luggage.

(c) Landing of such first and second class passengers as promise to reside within a fixed radius (to be determined by the sanitary authorities), where they can be watched during 5 days, provided that the said passengers give sufficient guaranty that they will comply with these rules.

(d) Third-class passengers will be landed at the sanitary station, have their luggage

disinfected, and be kept under observation for 5 days.

ART. 3. Infected ships carrying a sanitary inspector:

Ships which either have cholera on board upon arrival, or have had it during the voyage, will be treated as follows:

(a) Ships will be subjected to a complete disinfection, such as: Renewing water supply, fumigation of tanks, closets, etc., as the authorities judge fit.

(b) Disembarkation of the sick for treatment at the quarantine station.

(c) If cholera appears previous to the last 5 days before reaching port, passengers will be treated under article 2.

(d) If the case or cases occur within the last 5 days before reaching port, the treatment will be as follows:

1. First and second class passengers: Fumigation of clothing and medical examina-

The authorities in charge shall decide whether or not passengers shall be allowed to disembark and remain under observation for 5 days, as provided in article 2, section c. Both the sanitary inspection department and that of public inspection shall agree as to what measures are desirable before each case is decided.

Third-class passengers:

2. Disembarkation at the quarantine station, fumigation of luggage, and observation for 5 days.

ART. 4. Infected ships not carrying a sanitary inspector:

Passengers by such boats shall be treated according to (c), article 3.

ART. 5. The sanitary authorities will give every passenger a health passport, to be

presented to the authorized medical authorities whenever requested.

ART. 6. The radius mentioned in (c), article 2, shall be: On the west, the bay; on the east, Calle Sierra; on the south, Calle Juan D. Jackson; on the north, Calle Colombia.

ART. 7. The municipality has charge of watching the passengers, and will intrust it to the doctors of the public emergency service. These services are to be paid for, and

the passengers will pay before landing.

ART. 8. First and second class passengers shall pay \$5 of the national currency for the medical observance services, without regard to the further guarantee which

the sanitary authorities may require, as per (c), article 2.

ART. 9. An employee of the municipality shall be present at the sanitary visit to collect the fees.

ART. 10. The ships coming under the present ordinance shall go to the hospital at

Flores Island for the quarantine visit and the disembarkation of third-class passengers, if such is necessary.

ART. 11. The fumigation of passengers' clothing will take place in the ovens on board ship, according to articles 1 and 2, and in the presence of representatives of the

ART. 12. The disinfection of ships ending their voyage at Montevideo shall take place after the unloading of all cargo and in the presence of two sanitary guards and a sanitary assistant.

ART. 13. Persons violating the sanitary regulations will be punished by 12 to 15

months' imprisonment (art. 2711, penal code).

ART. 14. Let this be published for public knowledge.

VENEZIELA.

PUERTO CABELLO-Yellow Fever.

The American consul reported October 12 to the Department of State that yellow fever had appeared.

Brazil—Ceara.—Month of August, 1910. Population, 50,000. Total number of deaths from all causes 130, including typhoid fever 8, measles 9, tuberculosis 18.

Rio de Janeiro.—Two weeks ended September 4, 1910. Population, 850,000. Total number of deaths from all causes not reported. One death from typhoid fever, 23 deaths from measles, 4 from diphtheria, and 150 from tuberculosis reported.

East Africa—Lourenço Marquez.—Month of August, 1910. Population, 10,000. Total number of deaths from all causes 53, including tuberculosis 3.

GREAT BRITAIN.—Week ended August 27, 1910.

England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 77 great towns correspond to an annual rate of 12.1 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 16,940,895.

Ireland.—The deaths registered in 21 principal town districts correspond to an annual rate of 17.1 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,151,790. The lowest rate was recorded at Sligo, viz, 8.4, and the highest at Drogheda, viz, 25.2 per 1,000.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns correspond to an annual rate of 13.6 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,865,571. The lowest rate was recorded at Edinburgh, viz, 9.7, and the highest at Greenock, viz, 17.7 per 1,000. The total number of deaths from all causes was 492, including typhoid fever 2, scarlet fever 4, diphtheria 6.

ISLE OF PINES—Nueva Gerona.—Ten days ended September 30, 1910. Population, 892. No deaths. Two cases of typhoid fever and 45 of tuberculosis reported.

ITALY—Genoa.—Two weeks ended September 15, 1910. Population, 279,163. Total number of deaths from all causes 164, including typhoid fever 3, tuberculosis 21.

Milan.—Two weeks ended August 31, 1910. Population, 900,000. Total number of deaths from all causes 82, including typhoid fever 13, diphtheria 2, tuberculosis 67.

MAURITIUS.—Month of June, 1910. Population, 373,071. Total number of deaths from all causes 1,025, including diphtheria 1, plague 2, tuberculosis 59.

Christchurch.—Population, 78,605. Total number of deaths 55, including tuberculosis 1.
