AUSTRALIA.

SYDNEY-Examination of rats for plague infection.

The following information is taken from bulletins issued by the

department of public health of New South Wales:

During the month of September, 1910, there were destroyed 5,602 rats, of which number 1,174 were examined for plague infection. No plague-infected rats were found.

The last case of human plague at Sydney was reported May 29,

1909. The last plague-infected rat was found April 25, 1910.

CANADA.

QUEBEC-Cholera on steamship Royal George.

On November 18, 1910, the bureau received telegraphic advice from Acting Asst. Surg. C. A. Bailey at Quebec, of the arrival at that port of the steamship Royal George from Bristol, England, with a Russian immigrant ill with gastro-enteritis. It was stated that the ship with all hands on board was sent to the quarantine station to be held pending the determination of the diagnosis by a bacteriological examination, the disease from which the Russian immigrant was suffering being supposedly cholera.

On November 19 the bureau was notified that the case of gastroenteritis above referred to was determined to be cholera by Professor

Adami of the McGill University at Montreal.

The history of the case is as follows:

The patient, a third-class passenger, left the village of Michelsdorf, Russia, on October 18 for Libau, Russia, the journey lasting two days. His baggage consisted solely of a hand basket in which he carried provisions; that is, bread, sugar, tea, and boiled meat.

En route to Libau he purchased at the railroad station at Briszez

four apples and some bottled beer.

He was detained at Libau twenty-four hours in an immigrant boarding house where there were about thirty other Russians. At Libau he embarked for London on a Danish ship, the voyage requiring eight days. He remained in London eight days and proceeded to Bristol, sailing immediately for Quebec on the Royal George. On November 12 he sickened with severe cramps in extremities and abdomen, vomiting and great thirst, followed next day by an exaggeration of these symptoms, with weakness and diarrhea. These symptoms continued until November 17, when the vomiting and diarrhea ceased.

Investigation is being made by the Canadian authorities to ascertain whether this immigrant's infection was derived from the food

carried by him in his hand basket.

The acting assistant surgeon at Quebec has been given definite instructions as to exclusion of foodstuffs on the persons and in the baggage of immigrants bound for the United States.

FRANCE.

Sanitary passports.

Consul Beecher at Havre reports, October 27:

Passengers or travelers coming from contaminated countries or vessels, as provided for by the terms of the sanitary conference of 1903 and the sanitary regulations applicable to French ports, may, when it is not considered necessary to place them in quarantine or send them to lazarettos, be permitted to land immediately on condition that they subject themselves, during a period varying from 5 to 10 days to a special sanitary supervision exercised in the locality or localities where they go.

To that intent a sanitary passport, mentioning in detail the imposed conditions, is delivered to each. This passport is detached from a stub book in which the name and nationality of the bearer are inscribed, as well as his address and the name, occupation, and address, either in France or abroad, of a person who could give information of the bearer's whereabouts should he fail to comply with the

requirements imposed.

The bearer of the above passport is enjoined, by virtue of the law of March 3, 1822, the penalties for the infraction of which are on the reverse side of this document, to subject himself to the sanitary control visits which the municipal authorities of his place, or temporary place, of abode are compelled to make on his arrival or his passing through.

If the place of destination can not be designated at the time of crossing the frontier, or if on account of unforeseen circumstances that which has been indicated on the passport is changed en route, the same penalties are applicable to the traveler who, in such an instance, fails to declare his exact address at the city hall as soon as he arrives.

In Paris the declaration is to be made at the bureau of hygiene of the prefecture of police, No. 2 Quai du Marché Neuf.

A detailed advice is also detached from the same book and sent by mail to the mayor of the town where the traveler is going.

Chief of the Sanitary Service.

In conformity with the regulations applicable to persons coming from foreign countries where contagious diseases exist, the municipal authorities of the place where said persons go, either to reside or to remain temporarily, must exercise in regard to them a special sanitary surveillance which will be of a character to determine if, during a prescribed period, they do or do not show symptoms of a suspected disease, and to adopt if necessary all prophylactic and isolating measures.

The above advice is intended to give to the authorities the means of immediately applying said surveillance and to visé the sanitary passport delivered to the person who is the object of it; every act in violation thereof being punishable by article 14 of the law of March 3, 1822, on public health, which provides that whoever shall have violated, in regard to sanitary measures, the general or local regulations, or the orders of competent officials, shall be punished by an imprisonment of from 3 to 15 days and by a fine of from 5 to 50 francs.

In case of suspicious symptoms of plague the mayor must telegraph to the Pasteur Institute, No. 25 Rue Dutot, Paris, for a supply of antiplague serum, to be placed at the disposal of the doctors.

The special surveillance prescribed has for its object the safeguarding of the public health by preventing cases of contagious diseases from spreading through their being unknown or not treated from the beginning. On account of the interest to all which the measure presents no exception to it can be made.

The authorities are requested to discharge their duties with the greatest courtesy and to cause the public the least possible inconvenience. On the other hand, the most severe measures are to be taken to discover and punish those who may attempt, by making false or inexact declarations, to evade the foregoing prescriptions, for which, having been duly informed, there can be no excuse.

The passport must be viséed by the local authorities, not only as an immediate control, but to eventually relieve from responsibility the bearer and other interested persons. For the same reason the passport must be kept for at least one month.

On the reverse side of the passport is a blank space for the seal, date, visé, and signature of the official to whom the bearer must present himself.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Plague.

Minister Reid, at London, reported November 2 to the Department of State:

From September 16 to 29 there occurred at Preston in Suffolk County 4 fatal cases of a disease certified as pneumonia, but which was later bacteriologically verified as plague. The deaths occurred in a group of closely associated persons. Subsequently rats and hares from the same locality were examined and found to be infected with plague. Every effort is being made to destroy rats, especially those in stables, slaughterhouses, bakeries, granaries, and in receptacles for domestic refuse. No suspicious cases have occurred since September 26.

HAWAII.

Last case of human plague at Honolulu occurred July 12, 1910. The last plague-infected rat was found at Aiea, 9 miles from Honolulu, April 12, 1910.

At Hilo the last case of human plague occurred March 23, 1910.

The last plague-infected rat was found at Piihuona, 4 miles from Hilo, April 9, 1910.

INDIA.

Bombay-Plague, Cholera, and Smallpox in 1909.

Consul Dennison reports, October 16:

During the year 1909 no disease was present in epidemic form, with

the exception of plague.

The number of deaths from plague declined from 18,185 in 1898 to 13,285 in 1900; from 18,736 in 1901 to 13,820 in 1902; from 20,788 in 1903 to 13,538 in 1904; from 14,198 in 1905 to 10,823 in 1906; and from 6,398 in 1907 to 5,197 in 1909, the lowest on record since the beginning of plague, the decline being progressive and uninterrupted since 1906.

The number of deaths registered from all causes during the year was 34,878, giving the death rate of 35.66 per 1,000 living, against 38,271, with the death rate of 39.13 in 1908. There were thus 3,393 deaths fewer than in the previous year and 9,176 less than the average of the preceding five years.

Never before since the appearance of plague in the city has there been recorded such a low total mortality, the contribution of plague to which was also the lowest on record, being 5,197, against 5,361 in

1908.

It will, however, be found from the statement of plague attacks and deaths in the different years that, in spite of the steady shrinkage of plague as a cause of death from year to year, there has not been a concurrent abatement in the virulence of the disease, as evidenced by the recorded case mortality which, with annual fluctuations, stood for 1909 at 88.62 per cent, next only to that for 1901 (89.19) and 1903 (89.05), which were most fatal years in the history of the disease, recording, respectively, 18,736 and 20,788 deaths.

In 1909, to the end of January, the incidence of plague was low, and only 79 attacks and 65 deaths were registered; but it rapidly increased, and there were recorded 335 attacks and 277 deaths in February, so that the daily average for the two months was 7 attacks and 5 deaths, against 9 attacks and 7 deaths in the preceding year.

Plague was most severe in the month of April, as in the previous year, and registered 2,010 seizures and 1,793 deaths, against 2,064

seizures and 1.817 deaths in 1908.

The mortality fell from 987 in May to 161 in June—a decline more rapid than the rise—to 113 in July, then rose to 140 in August, and fell steadily to 75 in September, 47 in October, and 25 in November and December. For the same months in 1908 it stood at 953, 204, 135, 143, 107, 62, 28, and 26, respectively. For all months except March and May the number of plague deaths was less than in the previous year. The highest number of seizures on one day was 93, returned on March 23, the maximum number of deaths on a single day being 81, registered on April 24.

Cholera.

A factor in swelling the annual mortality in the city was the frequent importation of cases of cholera from outside localities, chiefly Nasik, reviving the infection from time to time, with the result that the disease is found to have occasioned 727 deaths during the year under report, being 632 more than in the previous year. The figure, however, represents the gross mortality from the disease, and therefore includes 231 deaths among persons newly arrived in the city and not belonging thereto.

A similar allowance has to be made in the case of plague also, as 76 new arrivals from the mofussil (rural district) died of it, the total number of deaths from all causes among such persons being 754.

The history of cholera in the city is, like that of smallpox, a history of continual importations from outside. For 1909 it practically commenced at the time of the issue of government resolution directing the district magistrate of Nasik and the authorities of different railways to do all in their power to prevent cholera-stricken people from proceeding on their journey to Bombay by rail. On certain Hindu holidays the rush of pilgrims is very great at Nasik, and there is every probability of infectious diseases being imported into this city by pilgrims who pass through it on their way to Nasik and return.

In the whole year there were 853 attacks and 727 deaths, of which 358 cases and 270 deaths were among new arrivals, who introduced the disease from outside and acted as foci for the spread of infection.

Smallpox.

Though smallpox was very prevalent during 1909 and was imported as usual by the returning pilgrims from Mecca and by others from the mofussil (rural district), the disease did not attain the epidemic

stage as was the case in 1908.

Smallpox is characterized by seasonal prevalence and is worse in the first quarter of the year, because largely fed by continual importations, and the spread is favored by the cold weather; it is less severe in the second quarter and least so in the third and fourth quarters. During the year 940 attacks and 473 deaths were registered, against 1,857 attacks and 1,026 deaths in 1908, the corresponding figures being 211 and 86 for 1907 and 511 and 276 for 1906. Of the seizures, 75 were imported—52 by returning pilgrims to the Hedjaz and 23 from other places. The seizures and deaths, though very much fewer than in 1908 (seizures 1,859, deaths 1,026) and 1905 (seizures 3,202, deaths 2,161), during which years smallpox raged with epidemic severity, are yet sufficiently numerous to indicate a high prevalence and mortality.

Of the total number (473) of smallpox deaths, nearly half (222) were among children 1 to 5 years old. The disease was most fatal to infants and occasioned 134 deaths among them, being 28.3 per cent of the total figure; and in the age group of 1 to 2 years, 48 deaths were registered. Persons between 15 and 25 years contributed

115 deaths.

Vaccination is now a routine duty of the health department and is performed throughout the year. During the first and toward the end of the last quarter of the year, when smallpox is generally imported and begins to spread, strenuous efforts are made to search out unvaccinated children and adults and remedy the omission, and also to revaccinate as many as possible. The ten registrars make house-to-house visits in infected localities and elsewhere and induce and carry out vaccination and revaccination.

Malaria.

The measures taken by the health department against the spread of malaria have been (1) to examine wells in and out of houses, collect samples and treat the water wherever practicable, a weekly report of such wells, with the result of treatment being submitted to the executive health officer; (2) to treat during the break in the rains all storm-water entrances, all gully traps and catch-pits and collections of water on the roads, weekly reports being forwarded as above; (3) to detail a special officer in each ward for systematic inspection of compounds and storage tanks over water-closets and other tanks in houses, reports being submitted as above, if necessary, daily; (4) to acquire a sickness index in the city inquiries are made by the registrars in all dispensaries and hospitals, in schools and factories, at railway docks, and other places where large numbers of people congregate. Samples of blood and varieties of mosquito larvæ are daily examined in the laboratory.

CALCUTTA-Cholera, Plague, and Smallpox.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Allan reports, October 20:

During the week ended October 1 there were reported in Calcutta 16 deaths from cholera, 8 from plague, and 1 from smallpox; in all Bengal, 89 cases of plague, with 60 deaths; in all India, 4,222 cases, with 2,981 deaths.

JAPAN.

Cholera.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Moore at Kobe reports, October 19: During the week ended October 15 there were reported at Kobe 26 cases of cholera with 18 deaths. The total number of cases reported at Kobe since the outbreak is 232 with 105 deaths.

At Osaka the epidemic of cholera continues. To date 593 cases have occurred. The disease has spread over a wide area of the rural districts. In all Japan more than 800 cases have been reported.

Sanitary Inspector Bowie at Nagasaki reports, October 19: Two cases of cholera have occurred at Nagasaki—one in a sailor who was landed from the steamship *Chicago Maru* just prior to the sailing of the vessel for Manila and the other in a local resident.

To date 44 cases of cholera have been reported at Moji with 25 deaths. The disease seems to be spreading steadily along the line of railroad.

MEXICO.

Yellow Fever at Campeche.

The following information, dated November 14, was received from

the president of the superior board of health:

During the week ended November 12 there was reported at Campeche 1 case of yellow fever, with 1 death. The case was reported on November 6 and the death on November 7.

MOROCCO.

Status of cholera.

Minister Rockhill at St. Petersburg reports October 24 to the

Department of State:

In the Official Messenger dated October 21 the total number of cases of cholera in all Russia to October 15 is given as 208,707, with 98,050 deaths.

ODESSA-Cholera and plague.

Consul Grout reports October 31:

On October 28 there remained 1 case of cholera in hospital. From the beginning of the epidemic to date there have been reported 604

cases, with 340 deaths.

During the week ended October 28, 1 new case of plague was reported. At the close of the week there were 13 cases of plague in hospital. From the outbreak to date there have been reported 132 cases, with 39 deaths.

Emigration.

Consul Grout further reports:

The number of emigrants leaving this port for the United States is scarcely one-half the number which left during the year 1909. As there is no direct communication between Odessa and the United States, emigrants generally ship via Libau or a German port.

TURKEY.

SMYRNA-Cholera.

Information was received from the Department of State November 21 that cholera was present in Smyrna.

Cholera among troops on steamship.

Bulletin of the superior council of health of Constantinople dated October 31 states that 30 cases of cholera, with 14 deaths, occurred among troops on the steamship *Garb*, detained at the lazaretto of Touzla, Ottoman Empire. The troops, 3,000 in number, were returning from the military maneuvers at Eregli, on the Sea of Marmora.

Ireland.—The deaths registered in 21 principal town districts correspond to an annual rate of 16.9 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,151,790. The lowest rate was recorded at Drogheda, viz, 4.1, and the highest at Clonmel, viz, 41 per 1,000.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns correspond to an annual rate of 12.9 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,865,571. The lowest rate was recorded at Aberdeen, viz, 9.8, and the highest at Dundee, viz, 17.5. The total number of deaths from all causes was 468, including typhoid fever 2, measles 3, scarlet fever 4, diphtheria 14.
