COLORADO—Colorado Springs.—Month of September, 1910. Population, 539,700. Total number of deaths from all causes 29, including tuberculosis 12. Cases reported: Typhoid fever 8, scarlet fever 10. Month of October, 1910. Total number of deaths 39, including typhoid fever 2, tuberculosis 7. Cases reported: Typhoid fever 4, measles 3, diphtheria 1, scarlet fever 6.

FLORIDA.—Week ended December 17, 1910. Reports from the State board of health show typhoid fever present in 4 localities with 6 cases, smallpox in 12 counties (Calhoun, Duval, Escambia, Gadsden, Hillsborough, Jackson, Leon, Manatee, Madison, Orange, Putnam, and Washington) with 35 cases, diphtheria in 3 localities with 3 cases, malaria in 4 localities with 31 cases, tuberculosis in 5 localities with 7 cases.

Indiana.—Month of October, 1910. Population, 2,732,550. Total number of deaths from all causes 2,761, including typhoid fever 159, diphtheria 46, tuberculosis 326. Cases reported: Typhoid fever 701 in 78 counties, smallpox 2 in 2 counties (Dekalb and Wayne), diphtheria 441 in 52 counties.

Iowa.—Month of November, 1910. Population, 2,192,608. Total number of deaths from all causes 1,620, including typhoid fever 35, measles 1, scarlet fever 10, diphtheria 23, tuberculosis 104.

Dubuque.—Month of November, 1910. Population, 47,585. Total number of deaths from all causes 45, including typhoid fever 1, diphtheria 2, tuberculosis 1. Cases reported: Typhoid fever 4, scarlet fever 4, diphtheria 16.

New York.—Month of October, 1910. Population, 8,871,720. Total number of deaths from all causes 10,942, including typhoid fever 170, measles 12, scarlet fever 53, diphtheria 122, pellagra 1, tuberculosis 1,210. Cases reported: Typhoid fever 1,293, smallpox 1, measles 722, scarlet fever 924, diphtheria 1,509, tuberculosis 2,684.

NORTH DAKOTA.—Month of November, 1910. Population, 536,103. Total number of deaths from all causes 273, including typhoid fever 1, diphtheria 1, tuberculosis 1. Cases reported: Typhoid fever 42, smallpox 5, measles 4, scarlet fever 29, diphtheria 41, tuberculosis 2.

OHIO—Youngstown.—November 15-30, 1910. Population, 56,413. Total number of deaths from all causes 40, including measles 1, diphtheria 1. Cases reported: Typhoid fever 2, measles 1, scarlet fever 6, diphtheria 13.

December 1-15, 1910. Population, 56,413. Total number of deaths from all causes 48, including typhoid fever 2, scarlet fever 3, diphtheria 5. Cases reported: Typhoid fever 1, measles 1, scarlet fever 7, diphtheria 19.

OKLAHOMA— Watonga.—Month of November, 1910. Population, 20,000. Total number of deaths from all causes 10, including typhoid fever 1. Cases reported: Typhoid fever 8, smallpox 1, scarlet fever 1, diphtheria 1, tuberculosis 1.

OREGON—Portland.—Month of October, 1910. Population, 265,000. Total number of deaths from all causes 202, including typhoid fever 5, diphtheria 1, tuberculosis 19. Cases reported: Typhoid fever 10, smallpox 7, measles 8, scarlet fever 20, diphtheria 41, tuberculosis (pulmonary) 27.

PENNSYLVANIA.—Reports from the State board of health show as follows:

Morbidity.—Month of August, 1910. The total number of deaths reported was 10,879, including typhoid fever 199, scarlet fever 70, diphtheria 136, measles 73, whooping cough 188, influenza 7, malarial fever 5, tuberculosis of the lungs 667, tuberculosis of other organs 129, cancer 438, diabetes 44, meningitis 64, infantile paralysis 58, pneumonia 427, diarrhea and enteritis under 2 years 2,415, diarrhea over 2 years 335, Bright's disease 461, early infancy 798, suicide 82, accidents in mines and quarries 58, railway injuries 119, other forms of violence 454.

Morbidity.—Month of September, 1910. Cases of communicable diseases were reported as follows: Anterior poliomyelitis 378, anthrax 1, cerebrospinal meningitis 16, chickenpox 61, diphtheria 1,165, epidemic dysentery 11, erysipelas 53, German measles 12, hydrophobia 1, malarial fever 3, measles 421, mumps 72, pneumonia 177, puerperal fever 7, scarlet fever 596, smallpox 6, tetanus 16, trachoma 62, tuberculosis 1,133, typhoid fever 2,637, whooping cough 956. Total, 7,803.

TEXAS—Fort Worth.—Month of October, 1910. Population, 60,000. Total number of deaths from all causes 113, including typhoid fever 6, pellagra 1, scarlet fever 1, tuberculosis 4. Cases reported: Typhoid fever 8, measles 1, scarlet fever 4, diphtheria 10, tuberculosis 4.

FOREIGN AND INSULAR

BRAZIL

PERNAMBUCO-Sanitary Conditions-Plague and Smallpox

Consul Griffiths reports, December 3:

The prevailing diseases at Pernambuco are smallpox, tuberculosis, and malaria. Yellow fever, plague, leprosy, and beriberi occur occasionally. There were 12 deaths from bubonic plague from July 1 to October 31, 1910. Smallpox appears to be epidemic and to exist in the most virulent form. The same conditions with regard to smallpox are stated to have been present for years past. During the month of September 177 deaths from smallpox were reported. The total number of deaths from smallpox reported from July 1 to October 31 is 573.

ECUADOR

GUAYAQUIL-Plague and Yellow Fever

Passed Asst. Surg. Parker, reports December 5:

The following information was received from the director of public health:

Month of November, 1910

Plague.—During the month of November, 1910, there were reported 104 new cases of plague, with 45 deaths, a decrease of 64 as compared with the previous month. The disease is generally disseminated throughout the city, but the season is approaching when it may be expected to disappear. A considerable decrease in the number of fleas is observed. The months of August, September, October, and November are the months when fleas prevail to a much larger extent than in the other months of the year, so that it is not surprising that with the advent of plague these months should show a definite relation to the prevalence of the epidemic.

Yellow fever.—During the month of November there were reported

18 new cases of yellow fever, with 8 deaths.

The total number of deaths from all causes during the month was 310. For the same period in 1909 there were reported 368 deaths from all causes. The estimated population of Guayaquil is 70,000.

HAWAII

HONOLULU-Smallpox on Steamship from Manzanillo

Chief Quarantine Officer Ramus reports, January 3, the occurrence of 3 cases of smallpox on steamship *Kiho Maru* from Manzanillo.

Smallpox at Puuene, Maui¹

Doctor Ramus reports, January 4:

Ten additional cases of smallpox are reported at the detention camp at Puuene, Maui. The patients are Filipinos.

INDIA

CALCUTTA-Cholera, Plague, and Smallpox

Acting Asst. Surg. Allan reports, December 1:

Week ended October 29. At Calcutta there were reported 16 deaths from cholera and 7 from plague; in all Bengal, 183 cases of plague, with 115 deaths; in all India, 5,928 cases of plague, with 4,271 deaths.

Week ended November 12.1 At Calcutta, 19 deaths from cholera, 11 from plague, and 1 from smallpox; in all Bengal, 317 cases of plague, with 200 deaths; in all India, 7,305 cases of plague, with 5,359 deaths.

MADEIRA ISLANDS Summary of Cholera Epidemic

Chargé d'Affaires Lorillard at Lisbon, Portugal, forwarded the following official statement to the Department of State December 5:

The epidemic of cholera in Madeira is limited to the following-named districts: Funchal, Camara dos Lobos, Ponta do Sol, Machico, and Santa Cruz. The districts of Calheta, S. Vicente, Sant'Anna, and Porto Moniz, are free from the epidemic. The total number of reported cases to date is as follows:

MANCHURIA Plague

Minister Rockhill at St. Petersburg reported, November 28, to the

Department of State:

The Trans-Baikal Provinces and all Manchuria having been officially declared plague infected, the plague commission decided November 16 to prohibit the admission of Chinese workmen from Manchuria into the maritime provinces. No Chinese will be allowed to board trains on the Trans-Baikal Railway except at established observation points and upon presentation of certificates showing that they have been under observation for a period of 5 days.

Consul Greene at Harbin reports November 25:

The epidemic of plague appears to be spreading, most of the cases still occurring at Manchuria station and at the Jalai Nor coal mines, though there have been cases also at Jalai Nor station, at Hailar, Jalantun, and lately at Fuchiatien, the Chinese settlement adjoining Harbin, but situated outside the railway lands. During the period from November 10 to 23 the cases and deaths discovered at places within the railway concession, all on the western line, have been as follows:

In Fuchiatien the situation is becoming serious. It is stated that up to November 23 there had been 12 deaths in Fuchiatien, with 4 additional deaths occurring November 24. A sanitary committee made up of representatives from all classes of residents in the town has been formed, and compulsory cleaning is being enforced, 2 Russian physicians and 10 old-school Chinese doctors being retained to care for the patients. A hospital for the sick, and isolated quarters for persons who have been in contact with them, have also been arranged.

There is continual intercourse between Fuchiatien and the Pristan, as the lower part of Harbin is called, and where the sanitary conditions are highly unsatisfactory. The advisability of cutting off all communication between Fuchiatien and Harbin is being considered.

PERU

CALLAO-Plague-Smallpox at Salaverry

Acting Asst. Surg. Castro-Gutierrez reports December 6: The following statement of plague at Callao and Lima was received from the director of public health:

Smallpox in epidemic form exists at Salaverry. All steerage passengers for Ancon, Canal Zone, or any port in the United States,

are required to be vaccinated before embarkation.

Bills of health from ports south of Callao show as follows: Talcahuano, Chile, November 19, 9 cases with 1 death in previous 2 weeks; Mollendo, Peru, November 29, 3 cases of plague with 1 death in previous two weeks.

RUSSIA

Status of Cholera

Minister Rockhill at St. Petersburg reported to the Department of

State, November 28 and December 3:

The official statement of cholera in Russia for the week ended November 12 shows 85 cases with 35 deaths, of which 6 cases with 7 deaths occurred in St. Petersburg. During the week ended November 19 there were 101 cases with 47 deaths in all Russia, of which 8 cases with 2 deaths occurred in St. Petersburg.

From the beginning of the epidemic to November 19 there had been

reported for all Russia 215,566 cases with 100,679 deaths.

LIBAU-Smallpox-Examination of Emigrants

Acting Asst. Surg. De Forest reports, December 11:

During the week ended December 4 there occurred 1 case of small-

pox at Libau.

For the steamship *Kursk*, sailing December 17, there have been examined 190 emigrants. No case of quarantinable disease was found among them.

Cholera Outbreak in Province of Lublin

Consul Heenan at Warsaw reports, November 29:

An outbreak of cholera has occurred in the Janowski district of the Province of Lublin. Official reports show 33 cases with 14 deaths to November 27. The disease has been bacteriologically verified. The governor of the province has forbidden the use of river and lake water in the infected district. House disinfection has been thoroughly carried out. Inspection of the neighboring villages has been ordered and a Government medical inspector has been sent to the infected district to take measures against the spread of the disease.

ODESSA-Plague

Consul Grout reports, December 5 and 12:

On December 2 there remained 8 cases of plague in hospital; on December 9, 4 cases. From the outbreak of the epidemic to date there have been 140 cases with 43 deaths.

VENEZUELA

CARACAS-Yellow Fever-Plague Rat Found

Chargé d'Affaires Whitehouse reported, December 10, to the Department of State:

During the two weeks ended December 3 there were reported 5 deaths from yellow fever.

During the same period 213 rats were examined for plague infection.

Of this number 1 rat was found infected.
