## UNITED STATES.

### MUNICIPAL ORDINANCES, RULES, AND REGULATIONS PERTAINING TO PUBLIC HYGIENE.

#### NEW HAVEN, CONN.

##### POLIOMYELITIS—NOTIFICATION, ISOLATION, DISINFECTION.

SECTION 1. Every physician practicing within the city of New Haven shall report in writing to the board of health, within 12 hours after he has discovered the nature of the disease, every case of anterior poliomyelitis for which he has prescribed or attended, giving the name, age, address, and the school attended or the shop, factory, or place said patient is employed, if known.

SEC. 2. Whenever no physician is employed, every lodging-house keeper, hotel keeper, householder, or person having charge of any public or private institution, or master of any vessel within the city of New Haven, shall report to the board of health within 12 hours every case of anterior poliomyelitis coming to his knowledge.

SEC. 3. After the recovery, removal, or death of any person from anterior poliomyelitis, every room, garment, or article that has been exposed to the contagion of said disease, shall be disinfected as prescribed by said board of health. There shall be no public funeral of any person dead from anterior poliomyelitis, except under the conditions prescribed and with the permit of the board of health through its properly constituted officer.

SEC. 4. Every person suffering from anterior poliomyelitis shall be strictly isolated for a period of four weeks.

SEC. 5. Every person violating any of the provisions of this regulation shall pay a penalty of not more than \$100. [Regulation, board of health, adopted Sept. 13, 1910.]

#### FALL RIVER, MASS.

##### MEDICAL INSPECTION OF SCHOOLS.

*Rules for the medical school inspectors.*—The inspector shall visit each school in his district once a week during each school term. The principal of the school and the medical inspector should agree upon the hour of inspection, which should as far as possible serve the best interests of all the schools to which the inspector is assigned.

The objects of the medical inspection of school children are: Identification of all school children requiring medical care; prompt exclusion from school of all children suffering from communicable diseases; detection of ailments and diseases other than communicable diseases; detection of defects of sight, hearing, teeth, or other disability injurious to pupils.

Remarks on heating, ventilation, seating in the schools, and any other hygienic conditions which present themselves as worthy of note to the inspector, will always be greatly appreciated and cheerfully received by the board of health.

Medical inspectors will vaccinate such children as need it. Medical inspectors will use their own judgment about the acceptance of family physicians' certificates. The medical inspector has the right to ignore such certificates if such action is justified by a personal investigation of the cases at school. The board prefers that the family physician, where there is one, should perform the vaccination. No child shall be

vaccinated against the consent of parents or guardians. No unvaccinated child may be admitted to school except as the law provides. A report of the number of primary vaccinations, revaccinations, the number of attempted vaccinations on primary subjects resulting in failure to take, and the number of vaccinations in previously vaccinated subjects resulting in failure to take, as well as any other important facts noted regarding vaccination or revaccination, shall be made to the board of health. The inspector will vaccinate free of charge any child or pupil who needs vaccination and applies for it, and must issue a certificate of vaccination to those entitled to the same. It is presumed that an unvaccinated child presenting himself or herself at school comes prepared to comply with the rules of the board of health. In cases, however, in which the inspector has an honest doubt on this point he may postpone vaccination and send an exclusion card, giving the reasons therefor, to the parents or guardians.

In making throat examinations the wooden tongue depressors supplied by the board of health must be used to the exclusion of all other depressors. Each tongue depressor must be used only once. Swabs should be taken by the inspector from all suspicious throats. Aseptic methods must be used in all examinations.

Children showing symptoms of the following diseases should be sent home immediately: Smallpox, scarlet fever, measles, chicken pox, tuberculosis, diphtheria, influenza, tonsillitis, whooping cough, pediculosis, mumps, scabies, trachoma, ringworm, impetigo contagiosa.

An exclusion card is to be filled out, put in a sealed envelope, and given to the child to take home. Where any of the above-mentioned diseases are found the board of health is to be notified at once.

Inspectors should keep in close touch with the board of health, so that they can be reached without delay when wanted. Inspectors should familiarize themselves with the health regulations of the board of health. In making inspections, care must be used to disturb the child as little as possible. No prescription or medical treatment is to be given to any child by the inspector while in the performance of his duties except as follows:

In special cases prescriptions furnished by the health department are provided free of charge for the following diseases: Impetigo contagiosa, ringworm, scabies, animal parasites in the hair.

Inspectors should remember that as inspectors they have no jurisdiction beyond the thresholds of the schools of their respective districts. One and all should bear in mind the following orders: Do not examine pupils at your office or any place outside of the school. Use great discretion in examining pupils. Do not keep them waiting any longer than necessary. Do your best at all times to maintain harmony and cooperation with the principals. Remember that you are a public servant, held to a strict account for the faithful discharge of your duties, and that as such it is your duty to give the full benefits of your scientific training to the examination of the children of the public.

If ill, or suffering from an accident, or for any other reason unable to be on duty, the inspector should notify the board of health.

The inspector may be required to do extra work at any time upon a request from the board of health, the superintendent of schools, or any school principal in his district.

Each inspector will submit a written report of his work to the board of health for each school term, within four days from the end of each term. [Rule, board of health, adopted Feb. 21, 1911.]

#### FALL RIVER, MASS.

##### MILK—PRODUCTION, CARE, AND SALE.

**Regulation 71.**—SECTION 1. All persons, firms, or corporations in the city of Fall River engaged in the production of milk, cream, ice cream, butter, or cheese intended for sale in the city of Fall River, shall annually on or before the first day of June make written application to the inspector of milk, on forms prescribed by the board of health, for a license.

SEC. 2. All persons, firms, or corporations in the city of Fall River engaged in selling milk, skimmed milk, cream, ice cream, butter, and cheese in a store, booth, stand, market-place, or milk depot, shall annually on or before the first day of June make written application to the inspector of milk, on forms prescribed by the board of health, for a license.

SEC. 3. All persons, firms, or corporations in the city of Fall River engaged in the business of canning, bottling, or otherwise preparing milk, skimmed milk, cream, or the manufacture of ice cream, butter, or cheese for sale, or intended for sale in the city of Fall River, shall annually on or before the first day of June make written

application to the inspector of milk, on forms prescribed by the board of health, for a license.

SEC. 4. All persons, firms, or corporations in the city of Fall River engaged in peddling milk, skimmed milk, cream, ice cream, butter, or cheese from a wagon, vehicle, or otherwise for the purpose of selling, delivering, or distributing milk, skimmed milk, cream, ice cream, butter, or cheese, shall annually on or before the first day of June make written application to the inspector of milk, on forms prescribed by the board of health, for a license. And shall at all times at the request of the inspector of milk present for inspection, wagons, vehicles, or other conveyances, cans, bottles, or other containers, measures and such other utensils as are used on said wagons, vehicles, or other conveyances, in conducting said business.

SEC. 5. No person, firm, or corporation in the city of Fall River may engage in the business of producing milk, skimmed milk, cream, ice cream, butter, or cheese for sale, or in the sale of milk, skimmed milk, cream, ice cream, butter, or cheese, or in the distribution, delivery, peddling, bottling, canning, or other methods of preparing milk, skimmed milk, cream, ice cream, butter, or cheese intended for sale in the city of Fall River without a license issued by the inspector of milk under these regulations and such other conditions as the board of health may impose.

SEC. 6. No person, firm, or corporation in the city of Fall River shall engage in the production of milk for the purpose of sale or distribution in said city until such person, firm, or corporation shall have made application to the board of health for permission to keep cows for the purpose of producing milk for sale in said city.

SEC. 7. No person, firm, or corporation will be granted permission to keep cows in the city of Fall River for the purpose of producing milk for sale in said city until such person, firm, or corporation shall have provided suitable cow stables, milk rooms, utensils, and appliances that will conform to the sanitary requirements of the board of health.

SEC. 8. No person, firm, or corporation may bring milk, skimmed milk, cream, ice cream, butter, or cheese into the city of Fall River for the purpose of sale, distribution, or delivery, or distribute milk, skimmed milk, cream, ice cream, butter, or cheese intended for sale in the city of Fall River until such person, firm, or corporation shall have complied with all provisions of these regulations satisfactory to the board of health and shall have been granted a license issued by the inspector of milk under these regulations.

SEC. 9. All farms, dairies, or other places where milk, skimmed milk, cream, ice cream, butter, or cheese is produced, mixed, bottled, canned, tubbed, or otherwise prepared for the purpose of sale or distribution in the city of Fall River shall provide a suitable room with proper apparatus for cleansing and sterilizing all utensils, apparatus, appliances, and vessels used or employed in the care, preparation, and distribution of milk, skimmed milk, cream, ice cream, butter, or cheese to be sold or distributed in said city, and all such utensils, apparatus, appliances, and vessels shall be thoroughly washed and sterilized by heat regularly after being so used.

SEC. 10. All milk produced for the purpose of sale in the city of Fall River shall be strained, aerated, and cooled to a temperature not exceeding 45° F. as soon as it is drawn from the cow, and shall be stored in a suitable place where it will be kept at a temperature not exceeding 45° F.

SEC. 11. All milk, cream, ice cream, butter, or cheese produced or manufactured for the purpose of sale in the city of Fall River shall be strained, cooled, mixed, canned, stored, bottled, or manufactured in buildings or rooms suitably constructed, to the satisfaction of the board of health of said city, and shall not be used for any other purpose whatever; and all such buildings or rooms shall be properly lighted and ventilated, and shall be provided with tight floors and walls of such construction as will allow of easy and thorough cleansing, and all such buildings and rooms shall be kept constantly clean.

SEC. 12. Milk shall not be sold, offered for sale, or distributed in the city of Fall River which was drawn from a cow within 15 days before calving or 5 days after calving; or from a cow whose afterbirth has been retained more than 24 hours after calving, until 7 days after the retained afterbirth shall have been completely removed; or from a cow whose udder is affected with any form of disease or accident.

SEC. 13. Milk, skimmed milk, or cream shall not be sold or distributed in the city of Fall River in any but separate containers approved by the board of health.

SEC. 14. Every person, firm, or corporation who holds a license to sell, distribute, or deliver milk, skimmed milk, cream, ice cream, butter, or cheese in the city of Fall River shall, at all times when required to do so, furnish the bacteriologist of the board of health with a sample of the milk, skimmed milk, cream, ice cream, butter, or cheese from every dairy, farm, or place of business where such milk, skimmed milk, cream, butter, or cheese is produced for a bacteriological examination. If such

examination shows the milk, skimmed milk, cream, ice cream, butter, or cheese to contain more than 200,000 bacteria per cubic centimeter, or any other microorganism that would render such milk, skimmed milk, cream, butter, or cheese unfit for food the licensee shall, when ordered to do so by the milk inspector, immediately suspend the delivery, sale, and distribution in the city of Fall River of all milk, skimmed milk, cream, ice cream, butter, or cheese from the farm, dairy, or place of business from which such sample was taken until authorized by the board of health to resume the same; otherwise, his license will be revoked.

SEC. 15. No person by himself, or agent or servant, or any other person, firm, or corporation shall, in the city of Fall River, sell, exchange, or deliver any milk, skimmed milk, cream, butter, or cheese which contains more than 200,000 bacteria per cubic centimeter, or any other microorganism which would render such milk, skimmed milk, cream, butter, or cheese unfit for food.

SEC. 16. Before a license is issued to an applicant for the sale or delivery of milk, skimmed milk, or cream in the city of Fall River, said applicant shall produce to the milk inspector a certificate (of form prescribed and furnished by the board of health) for every cow whose milk is brought by him, or his servants or employees, into the city of Fall River, or kept, delivered, or distributed with the intent to sell the same in said city, from a veterinary surgeon licensed to practice in Massachusetts, stating that he has given said cow a careful physical examination, and in his opinion the cow is free from tuberculosis or any disease dangerous to public health; and further stating that every such cow has placed in one of her ears a tag (of form prescribed and supplied by the board of health) having a number corresponding to a number to be written on the said certificate, unless said cow shall already have a tag in her ear designated by the cattle bureau of this State.

SEC. 17. No cow or bull shall be kept as a part of a dairy herd whose milk or other products or service is to be sold or distributed or used in the city of Fall River until such cow or bull shall have been given a careful physical examination by a veterinary surgeon as hereinbefore mentioned, and all other requirements of the preceding section shall have been complied with. And every animal which fails to successfully pass such examination shall be immediately removed from the herd and reported by the veterinary surgeon making the examination to the board of health; and the product of such animal or the use of such animal shall not be sold or offered for sale or for service in the city of Fall River until permission is given in writing by the board of health; furthermore, such an animal shall not be permitted to be used for dairy purposes, either by itself or as a part of a herd, whose products are to be sold or offered for sale or for service in the city of Fall River until such animal shall have been tested with tuberculin by a veterinary surgeon, as hereinbefore mentioned, and declared in his opinion to be free from tuberculosis or other diseases dangerous to public health and shall have been tagged as described in section 16.

SEC. 18. No cattle shall be added to any herd, nor shall any new herds be established, for the purpose of producing milk, skimmed milk, or cream in the city of Fall River until after they shall have been tested with tuberculin by a veterinarian qualified as set forth in these regulations, and certified by him to be free from tuberculosis or any other disease that might cause the milk or flesh of such an animal to be injurious to public health, excepting such cattle as have been tested with tuberculin within one year by the cattle bureau of this State or a veterinary surgeon acceptable to the board of health; and all such cattle shall have placed in their ear a tag designated by the cattle bureau of this State or the board of health.

SEC. 19. Milk, skimmed milk, cream, ice cream, kept for sale or stored in any store, shop, restaurant, market, milk depot, bakery, or other establishment, shall be stored in a properly constructed refrigerator, approved by the board of health. No vessel containing milk, skimmed milk, cream, or ice cream for sale shall be allowed to stand outside said refrigerator. Every such refrigerator shall be kept properly drained and cared for, and shall be kept tightly closed except during such intervals as are necessary for the introduction or removal of milk, skimmed milk, cream, or ice cream, or ice, and shall be kept in such locations and under such conditions as shall be approved by the board of health.

SEC. 20. Skimmed milk shall not be sold, exchanged, or delivered within the city of Fall River unless the provision of the revised laws shall be observed, and that the words "skimmed milk" shall appear on all cans or vessels used to convey or hold such milk in letters 2 inches in length and one-half inch in width and in some contrasting color to that of the can or vessel.

SEC. 21. Milk, skimmed milk, cream, ice cream, butter, or cheese adulterated in any way, or containing an adulterant or preservative of any kind, or milk the chemical composition of which does not conform to the laws of the Commonwealth and the requirements of the State board of health, shall be deemed unfit for food, and shall be

condemned; and any person, firm, or corporation having in his possession for the purpose of sale, delivery, or distribution, or with the intent to sell such milk, skimmed milk, cream, butter, or cheese shall be prosecuted according to the provisions of law, and the license of any such person, firm, or corporation shall be immediately revoked. Any person, firm, or corporation having been convicted in any court in this Commonwealth for violating any of the provisions of this section may be granted a license to sell, deliver, or distribute milk, cream, ice cream, butter, or cheese in the city of Fall River only at the discretion of the board of health.

SEC. 22. All cans, bottles, or other vessels of any sort used in the sale, delivery, or distribution of milk, skimmed milk, or ice cream shall be cleansed and sterilized before they are again used for the same purpose, and all wagons used in the conveyance of milk, skimmed milk, cream, ice cream, butter, or cheese shall be kept in a cleanly condition and free from offensive odors. No person shall use a milk vessel as a container for any other substance than milk, skimmed milk, cream, or ice cream, and all cans, measures, or other utensils, made of metal, must be kept clean and free from rust, otherwise they will be condemned.

SEC. 23. Every person, firm, or corporation engaged in the production, storage, transportation, sale, delivery, or distribution of milk, skimmed milk, cream, or ice cream shall immediately on the occurrence of any case or cases of contagious or infectious disease, either in himself or his family or among his employees, or their immediate associates, or within the building or upon the premises where milk is stored or distributed or sold, notify the board of health, and at the same time shall suspend the sale, distribution, or delivery of milk, skimmed milk, cream, or ice cream until authorized to resume the same by the said board of health. No vessel used or handled by a person suffering from any such disease, or by any person caring for or nursing such person, shall be used to hold or convey milk, skimmed milk, cream, or ice cream until such vessel shall have been thoroughly sterilized.

SEC. 24. No urinal, water-closet, privy, vault, cistern, or cesspool shall be located in a building or room where milk, skimmed milk, cream, or ice cream is mixed, strained, cooled, aerated, skimmed or separated, bottled, canned, manufactured, or stored, or in a building or room where vessels, bottles, utensils, apparatus, or appliances used in the mixing, straining, aerating, skimming, or separating, washing or sterilizing are used, kept, or stored; nor shall such urinal, water-closet, privy, vault, cistern, or cesspool be so situated as to pollute the atmosphere of such building or room or the well or other source of water supply from which the water used in connection with said buildings or rooms is obtained.

SEC. 25. Every person, firm, or corporation having a license to sell, deliver, or distribute milk, skimmed milk, cream, ice cream, butter, or cheese in the city of Fall River, shall keep a copy of the same constantly posted in a conspicuous place on their premises; and every such person, firm, or corporation shall have their name, the number of their license, and their place of business marked in plain, uncondensed Gothic letters, not less than 2 inches in height, on all vehicles used by them in the conveyance of said milk.

SEC. 26. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this regulation shall be liable to a fine of \$100, and shall be liable to such penalties as are provided by the general laws of the Commonwealth now or hereafter in force. [Regulation, board of health, as amended March, 1910.]

#### *Rules to be observed by milk dealers.*

RULE 1. Every milk producer, when making any addition to his herd, according to this regulation is required to notify the milk inspector.

RULE 2. Before collecting and distributing milk from any source other than that stated in his application for a license, every dealer licensed to convey milk in the city of Fall River is required to notify the milk inspector and get his approval.

RULE 3. Bottles or other milk containers must not be left with any family in which there is a case of typhoid fever or any contagious disease, but the milk may be delivered by pouring it from the container into a vessel provided by the family.

RULE 4. No bottle or other milk container previously left with any family in which a case of typhoid fever or any contagious disease appears shall be removed therefrom except by the board of health, to whom the milkman should report. [Board of health, March, 1910.]

**INDIANA.**—Month of January, 1911. Population, 2,700,876. Total number of deaths from all causes 3,259, including diphtheria 35, measles 17, scarlet fever 26, tuberculosis 389, typhoid fever 39. Cases reported: Diphtheria 279 in 51 counties, scarlet fever 818 in 54 counties, smallpox 155 in 12 counties, typhoid fever 115 in 35 counties.

**KANSAS.**—Month of January, 1911. Population, 1,690,949. Total number of deaths from all causes not reported. Deaths from contagious diseases include diphtheria 6, measles 5, scarlet fever 19, tuberculosis 55, typhoid fever 10. Cases reported: Diphtheria 92, measles 787, scarlet fever 579, smallpox 160, tuberculosis 258, typhoid fever 46.

**MARYLAND.**—Month of December, 1910. Population, 1,295,346. Total number of deaths from all causes 1,043, including diphtheria 22, measles 2, scarlet fever 1, tuberculosis 101, typhoid fever 38. Cases reported: Diphtheria 76, measles 70, scarlet fever 54, typhoid fever 246.

Typhoid fever was distributed as follows: Potomac River watershed 114 cases, Patapsco River watershed 11 cases, Patuxent River

watershed 2 cases, Choptank River watershed 2 cases, Herring Run watershed 3 cases, Baltimore city water system 7 cases. Three epidemic centers were reported, viz, Cumberland, Allegany County (91 cases), Eastport, Anne Arundel County (5 cases), and New Market, Frederick County (7 cases).

NEBRASKA—*South Omaha*.—Month of February, 1911. Population, 26,259. Total number of deaths from all causes 45, including tuberculosis 1. Cases reported: Diphtheria 2, smallpox 9, tuberculosis 1.

NEW YORK—*Troy*.—Month of February, 1911. Population, 76,813. Total number of deaths from all causes 149, including diphtheria 3, scarlet fever 8, tuberculosis 21, typhoid fever 1. Cases reported: Diphtheria 16, measles 7, scarlet fever 14, tuberculosis 12, typhoid fever 3.

NORTH CAROLINA.—Month of December, 1910. Reports from the State board of health show diphtheria present in 38 counties, measles in 13 counties, scarlet fever in 30 counties, smallpox in 23 counties, typhoid fever in 35 counties, malarial fever in 3 counties, pernicious malarial fever in 4 counties, hemorrhagic malarial fever in 3 counties.

OREGON.—Month of October, 1910. Population, 672,765. Total number of deaths from all causes 504, including diphtheria 2, tuberculosis 22, typhoid fever 6. Cases reported: Diphtheria 54, measles 42, scarlet fever 45, smallpox 7, tuberculosis 30, typhoid fever 66.

Month of November, 1910. Total number of deaths from all causes 487, including diphtheria 6, scarlet fever 6, tuberculosis 38, typhoid fever 23. Cases reported: Diphtheria 45, measles 66, scarlet fever 76, smallpox 2, tuberculosis 24, typhoid fever 93.

Month of December, 1910. Total number of deaths from all causes 543, including diphtheria 4, scarlet fever 4, smallpox 4, tuberculosis 43, typhoid fever 17. Cases reported: Diphtheria 36, measles 150, scarlet fever 70, smallpox 11, tuberculosis 32, typhoid fever 73.

TEXAS.—Month of December, 1910. Population, 3,896,542. Total number of deaths from all causes 2,048, including diphtheria 38, measles 2, scarlet fever 4, tuberculosis 210, typhoid fever 69.

# FOREIGN AND INSULAR.

## MODIFICATION OF RESTRICTIONS ON ACCOUNT OF CHOLERA.

The Department of State was requested on April 1 to cable to consular officers in Germany, Belgium, Holland, Great Britain, France, Italy, and Austria-Hungary to discontinue the detention of emigrants for the United States at foreign ports of departure on account of cholera, unless said emigrants came from cholera-infected districts.

### ARABIA.

#### MASKAT—Plague.

The American consul reported April 1 the presence of plague at Maskat.

### CANADA.

#### OTTAWA—Further Relative to Typhoid Fever Outbreak.

Consul General Foster reports March 20:

During the week ended January 7 there were reported 8 cases of typhoid fever; during the week ended January 14, 16 cases; and during the weeks ended January 21 and 28, 65 and 284 cases, respectively. During the month of February 385 cases were reported, and for the weeks ended March 4, 11, and 18, there were 81, 66, and 33 cases, making a total since the beginning of the outbreak of 938 cases with 194 deaths. There are at present 194 cases in the several hospitals of the city. The number of cases not in hospital is not obtainable.

A thorough investigation is being conducted by the health officer of the Dominion conservation commission.

### CHINA.

#### HARBIN—Status of Plague.

Consul Greene reports February 28:

During the week ended February 25 the number of plague deaths in the city of Harbin showed only a slight decline as compared with the previous week, the daily average being 11.9 instead of 12.5. In Fuchiatien the change for the better was very marked, the average mortality per day being 8.7 as compared with 30 in the previous week. On February 25 the number of deaths was 2 in Harbin and 3 in Fuchiatien.

The total of 1,458 for Harbin includes 195 bodies found in the city and 324 bodies found in the suburbs. Both Europeans who died during the week were connected with the plague staff.

It is impossible to obtain accurate reports of the total plague mortality in this consular district outside of Harbin and Fuchiatien, but fragmentary reports are received through Chinese official sources from Pinchow, Shuanchengpu, Asiho, Yushuting, Hulan, and Suihuafu. The situation at Suanchengpu is admitted to be very serious. The official reports place the number of deaths to February 8 at 2,338, a report of February 18 gives an additional number of not less than 900, and it appears that from 100 to 150 deaths have been recently occurring daily. It is estimated that about 5,000 deaths have occurred. Official reports from Hulan show that about 600 bodies have been burned. Reference is made to 929 burials and the number of plague deaths for the week ended February 20 is given as 33. At Suihuafu and Tunken the situation is reported as serious, but no figures are given for those localities.

#### ECUADOR.

##### Plague and Yellow Fever.

The following information is taken from sanitary bulletins issued by the director of public health of Ecuador:

Month of February, 1911:

*Plague.*—At Guayaquil there were reported 36 cases with 11 deaths, and at Milagro 2 new cases.

*Yellow fever.*—At Guayaquil there were reported 51 cases with 15 deaths.

#### GREAT BRITAIN.

##### SHEFFIELD—Epidemic Measles.

Consul Daniels reports March 14:

Epidemic measles is still raging in Sheffield. The total number of deaths from this disease registered during the past week was 96, an increase of 11 over the number registered during the week ended March 4 and an increase of 26 in the number for the fortnight ended March 14. The health officer states that the great majority of the deaths occurred among children under 3 years of age and the proportion was large in children under 1 year. More than a third of the deaths have occurred in the district inhabited by the poorest class in the city.

The origin of the outbreak has not been determined. For a number of years epidemic measles has occurred in Sheffield every two years. The present epidemic is unusually violent. The total number of cases that have occurred can not be determined, as notification

of cases of measles is not required, only fatal cases being reported. The total number of deaths from all causes during the week ended March 14 was 212, the weekly average for the year 1910 being 123. Of this number 55 deaths were of children under 1 year of age and 81 between 1 year and 5 years.

#### GREECE.

##### Cerebrospinal Meningitis—Inspection of Emigrants.

A medical officer has been detailed to assist the American consul general at Piræus, Greece, in the inspection and detention of emigrants for the United States departing from districts where cerebrospinal meningitis exists. An additional physician was authorized for similar duty at Patras, Greece. Arrangements are being effected for the departure of all emigrants from Greece at either the port of Piræus or Patras, and their detention under inspection by the medical officers attached to the American consulates.<sup>a</sup>

#### HAWAII.

##### Cholera Outbreak at Honolulu Terminated.

The last case of cholera in Honolulu was reported on March 14. From February 25, when the first case was reported, to March 14, 1911, the date of the last case, there had been reported a total of 31 cases with 22 deaths. Twenty-four days having elapsed since the occurrence of the last case, Honolulu may properly be considered to no longer harbor the disease.

##### Record of Plague Infection.

Last case of human plague at Honolulu occurred July 12, 1910.

The last plague-infected rat was found at Aiea, 9 miles from Honolulu, April 12, 1910.

At Hilo the last case of human plague occurred March 23, 1910. A fatal case occurred at Honokaa, 60 miles from Hilo, December 17, 1910, and 2 fatal cases were reported January 31, 1911.

The last plague-infected rat was found at Honokaa February 2, 1911.

## INDIA.

## BOMBAY—Precautions Against Plague.

Consul General Michael at Calcutta reports March 2:

There was a slight increase in plague throughout India during the past week. The health officer of Bombay has addressed a letter to the press calling attention to the increase of plague in that city and asking for the cooperation of the public in measures to prevent the spread of the disease. Free inoculation against plague is provided at 10 dispensaries, where it is administered by duly qualified and specially instructed physicians. Facilities are also provided for inoculations at private houses.

## CALCUTTA—Cholera, Plague, and Smallpox.

Acting Assistant Surgeon Allan reports March 1:

During the week ended February 11 there were reported 46 deaths from cholera, 13 from plague, and 2 from smallpox in Calcutta; in all Bengal, 3,097 cases of plague with 2,994 deaths; in all India, 24,715 cases of plague with 22,278 deaths.
