STATISTICAL REPORTS OF MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY, STATES AND CITIES OF THE UNITED STATES (untabulated)

FLORIDA.—Week ended December 24, 1910. Reports from the State board of health show typhoid fever present in 2 localities (Tampa and Pensacola) with 2 cases, smallpox in 6 counties (Alachua, Gadsden, Leon, Madison, Osceola, Polk) with 39 cases, diphtheria in 5 localities with 6 cases, malaria in 4 localities (Tampa, Ybor City,

Jacksonville, Gainesville) with 23 cases, tuberculosis in 3 localities with 3 cases.

Pensacola.—Month of November, 1910. Population 23,000. Total number of deaths from all causes 46, including tuberculosis 4.

Massachusetts.—Week ended November 5, 1910. Population of reporting towns 2,594,239. Total number of deaths from all causes 686, including typhoid fever 16, measles 1, scarlet fever 3, diphtheria 14, tuberculosis 68.

Week ended November 12, 1910. Total number of deaths from all causes 750, including typhoid fever 9, measles 1, scarlet fever 3, diphtheria 16, tuberculosis 87.

Week ended November 19, 1910. Population of reporting towns 2,578,518. Total number of deaths from all causes 696, including typhoid fever 8, scarlet fever 2, diphtheria 4, tuberculosis 54.

Week ended November 26, 1910. Population of reporting towns 2,581,344. Total number of deaths from all causes 716, including typhoid fever 12, scarlet fever 1, measles 1, diphtheria 8, tuberculosis 63.

Morbidity.—During the month of November, 1910, cases of communicable diseases were reported as follows: Typhoid fever 300, measles 354, scarlet fever 451, diphtheria 613, tuberculosis 442.

New Jersey.—Month of December, 1910. Population 1,183,699. Total number of deaths from all causes 2,977, including typhoid fever 38, measles 11, scarlet fever 8, diphtheria 81, tuberculosis 333.

PENNSYLVANIA.—Reports from the State department of health show as follows:

Mortality.—Month of September, 1910. The total number of deaths reported was 9,453, including typhoid fever 272, scarlet fever 55, diphtheria 156, measles 41, whooping cough 126, influenza 18, malarial fever 13, tuberculosis of the lungs 616, tuberculosis of other organs 122, cancer 412, diabetes 43, meningitis 49, infantile paralysis 64, pneumonia 437, diarrhea and enteritis under 2 years 1,499, diarrhea and enteritis over 2 years 237, Bright's disease 415, early infancy 776, suicide 79, accidents in mines and quarries 94, railway injuries 131, other forms of violence 468, all other diseases 3,330.

Morbidity.—Month of October, 1910. Cases of communicable diseases were reported as follows: Anterior poliomyelitis 197, anthrax 1, cerebrospinal meningitis 5, chicken pox 311, diphtheria 1,666, epidemic dysentery 2, erysipelas 71, German measles 7, hýdrophobia 1, malarial fever 16, measles 793, mumps 103, pneumonia 338, puerperal fever 4, scarlet fever 724, tetanus 12, trachoma 12, tuberculosis 1,259, typhoid fever 2,310, whooping cough 754. Total, 8,586.

UTAH.—Month of November, 1910. Population, 346,873. Total number of deaths from all causes 337, including typhoid fever 16,

scarlet fever 4, diphtheria 11, tuberculosis 8. Cases reported: Typhoid fever 155, smallpox 91, measles 30, scarlet fever 293, diphtheria 116, tuberculosis 5.

VIRGINIA—Petersburg.—Month of December, 1910. Total number of deaths from all causes 50, including tuberculosis 10. Cases reported: Typhoid fever 1, diphtheria 9, tuberculosis 4.

BERIBERI ON STEAMSHIP

Washington—Seattle.—Dr. Elmer H. Heg, commissioner of health, reports December 30, 1910, the occurrence of 8 cases of beriberi on the steamship Beachy among Hindu and Lascar firemen shipped at Singapore in January, 1910. Two of the cases ended fatally. The diet of the patients had consisted largely of polished rice.

FOREIGN AND INSULAR

BULGARIA

Cholera at Varna

Consul General Harvey, at Bucharest, Roumania, reported Novem-

ber 29 to the Department of State:

Information received November 25 from the Bulgarian foreign office shows the occurrence at Varna of two fatal cases of cholera on November 14 and 15, respectively. These cases occurred among a group of passengers who arrived at Varna from Constantinople on the steamship La Bulgarie. The tavern in which these passengers lodged and in which the cholera deaths occurred was immediately vacated and all the inmates were removed to hospital, where they were isolated and held under observation. A third case of cholera occurred in the same group November 18.

Later official information shows that the cholera bacillus was found in the feces of two members of the group of persons among whom the

cholera cases developed.

According to advices contained in the official publication of the imperial bureau of health at Berlin issued December 14, 1910, the third case of cholera which occurred at Varna ended fatally November 28. Varna was declared free from cholera December 1, 1910.

ECUADOR

Guayaquil-Plague and Yellow Fever

Passed Asst. Surg. Parker reports December 19:

ARGENTINA—Buenos Aires.—Month of October, 1910. Population, 1,288,980. Total number of deaths from all causes 1,850, including typhoid fever 7, smallpox 6, measles 8, scarlet fever 7, diphtheria 21, tuberculosis 209.

Rosario.—Month of October, 1910. Population, 197,135. Total number of deaths from all causes 443, including typhoid fever 4, smallpox 5, measles 1, scarlet fever 1, diphtheria 8, tuberculosis 36.

Ireland.—The deaths registered in 21 principal town districts correspond to an annual rate of 18.1 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,151,790. The lowest rate was recorded at Sligo, viz, 4.8 and the highest at Lurgan, viz, 44.3 per 1,000 of the population.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns correspond to an annual rate of 17.5 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,891,936. The lowest rate was recorded at Aberdeen, viz, 11.2, and the highest at Leith, viz, 22.2 per 1,000. The total number of deaths from all causes was 633, including typhoid fever 2, measles 2, scarlet fever 5, diphtheria 11.
