# UNITED STATES.

# THE CHOLERA SITUATION.

In so far as relates to the United States, the cholera situation remains in general unchanged, no cases of cholera having been reported as having developed in the United States since those recorded in the Public Health Reports July 28, 1911.

Information received indicates that from August 13 to 19, inclusive, there occurred in all Italy 1,604 cases of cholera, with 636 deaths.

In view of the quarantine imposed by the Argentine Republic against vessels arriving from Italy, a royal decree was promulgated by the Italian Government July 30, prohibiting Italian emigration to Argentina.

In response to a request made through the Department of State, there was received August 26 from the American consul at Marseille the following information:

Nine cases with 6 deaths from cholera since August 21; a total of 30 cases with 13 deaths in the month of August. Numerous cases in the lunatic asylum, but absolute statistics not known. Authorities are taking all necessary precautions.

#### NEW YORK.

Passed Asst. Surg. von Ezdorf reported August 25 the arrival of the steamship Europa, which sailed from Genoa August 9, and from Naples August 12, with 150 in crew, 104 cabin and 46 steerage passengers. One death clinically diagnosed as due to cholera occurred in a fireman who embarked at Genoa August 7, was taken ill August 16, and died August 23. Two sick firemen were isolated in hospital as suspicious of cholera. Since August 16 all firemen have been isolated on board in their quarters, with separate kitchen and other conveniences, and without contact with other members of crew or passengers. Disinfection of firemen's quarters was done under the direction of the Italian royal commissioner, a medical officer of the Italian Navy, who accompanied the vessel.

On August 28, Dr. von Ezdorf reported that bacteriological examination of steerage passengers and 126 members of crew on the Europa proved negative. The cases of illness on board on arrival, reported as suspicious, also proved negative. Cholera was confirmed in the case of the fireman who was taken sick August 16 and died at

sea August 23.

The foregoing table is a continuation of the table appearing on page 1194, Public Health Reports, August 11, 1911. Referring to the steamship Duca degli Abruzzi, of which record is made in that table, the five passengers mentioned in the column of remarks as remaining at Swinburne Island August 3 were still at Swinburne Island August 26. Referring to the steamship Moltke, of which record is made in the same table, the two passengers mentioned in the column of remarks were discharged, one on August 4 and one on August 10. The one member of crew mentioned as still at Swinburne Island was also discharged August 4. The 14 cholera bacillus carriers mentioned as still being at Swinburne Island August 3 were discharged, 9 on August 4, 1 on August 7, 1 on August 10, and 3 on August 12. Of the 11 passengers on the steamship Moltke who developed cholera at quarantine 8 died and 3 recovered.

# MUNICIPAL ORDINANCES, RULES, AND REGULATIONS PERTAINING TO PUBLIC HYGIENE.

[Adopted since Jan. 1, 1910.]

#### CHELSEA, MASS.

DISEASES DANGEROUS TO THE PUBLIC HEALTH-NOTIFICATION, PLACARDING, ISOLA-TION, DISINFECTION, RESTRICTIONS.

RULE 1. The following diseases, having been declared by the State board of health to be dangerous to the public health, must be reported to the local board of health immediately, in writing, by the physician having knowledge of such disease, or in case no physician has been called, by the householder, giving name of disease, name, age, and residence of patient:

Actinomycosis, anterior poliomyelitis, Asiatic cholera, cerebro-spinal meningitis, diphtheria, glanders, leprosy, malignant pustule, measles, ophthalmia neonatorum, scarlet fever, smallpox, tetanus, trachoma, trichinosis, tuberculosis, typhoid fever, typhus fever, varicella, whooping cough, yellow fever.

RULE 2. In every case of smallpox, diphtheria, or scarlet fever, the board of health

shall immediately placard the house where such disease exists at one or more entrances with a notice specifying the disease, and such notice shall not be removed except by a duly authorized agent of the board of health.

A house in which any other disease dangerous to the public health exists may be

placarded as the board of health shall determine.

Rule 3. Any and all persons sick with any contagious disease, or with a disease dangerous to the public health, and all persons in attendance upon such persons shall, during such sickness or attendance, be subject to the control of the board of

RULE 4. No person in whose house there exists a disease dangerous to the public health shall, without consent of the board of health, permit any clothing or other articles to be removed from such house, nor shall any occupant of such house take up a residence elsewhere without consent of the board of health. No person shall cause or permit any such occupant to be removed without consent of the board of health.

RULE 5. All persons sick with smallpox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, or measles shall remain in a room apart from the rest of the household until such time as the board of health shall determine that the danger of conveying the disease to others is passed, and no other person than the physician or regular attendants of the patients shall be allowed to enter such room without permission of the board of health. No dog, cat, or other animal shall be allowed to enter such room.

RULE 6. The librarian of the public library shall be immediately notified by the board of health of the occurrence of contagious diseases, and no books or magazines shall be sent to or received from any house where such disease exists until permission

Rule 7. No member of a family in which there is a case of contagious disease, or disease dangerous to the public health, who is employed in such place, or in such manner, as in the opinion of the board of health is liable to spread the contagion, shall

continue such employment during the time that the said family is in quarantine

without written consent of the board of health.

RULE 8. No person owning or having charge of any hackney carriage, public conveyance, private automobile, hack, or carriage shall receive or permit to be placed therein or conveyed in or upon the same any person or inmate of any household sick or infected with any contagious or other disease dangerous to the public health, or the body of any person dead of such disease, without permission of the board of health.

Rule 9. No person sick with a contagious disease shall be removed from a house,

except in such manner as the board of health shall direct.

RULE 10. Upon the death, recovery, or removal of a person sick with diphtheria, scarlet fever, smallpox, tuberculosis, or other contagious disease, or any disease dangerous to the public health, as the board of health may decide, the room in which said person was confined and such rooms, as in the opinion of the board of health may have been contaminated, shall be fumigated by the board of health, and the placard removed from the house. The charge for fumigation shall be \$1 for first room and 50 cents for each additional room.

RULE 11. Recovery shall mean: In case of diphtheria, when two successive negative cultures have been obtained, the second under the direction of the board of health; in case of scarlet fever, when desquamation has ceased, and the board of health has so

certified.

RULE 12. Householders shall give immediate notice to the board of health of the removal, recovery, or death of persons sick with pulmonary tuberculosis. Upon such notice the board of health shall fumigate such room or rooms, with their contents, as in their opinion have been exposed to infection.

RULE 13. No person or article liable to spread a disease dangerous to the public health shall be brought within the city limits without the permission of the board of

health, and only in such manner as it shall direct.

Rule 14. No person shall make, procure, or cause to be made, any clothing, wearing apparel of any description or kind whatsoever, in any house or building wherein any person is sick with smallpox, scarlet fever, diphtheria, or other contagious disease, except for the personal use or wear of some one of the inmates of said house, and no person shall sell or expose for sale any clothing or wearing apparel of any kind which has been made in any house or building in which there shall have been at the time when said clothing was made any person sick or infected with any such disease, until such wearing apparel has been disinfected to the satisfaction of the board of health.

RULE 15. No store which connects with any house or apartment in which there exists a case of smallpox, scarlet fever, diphtheria, or other contagious disease small be used for business purposes during the period of quarantine without written per-

mission from the board of health,

RULE 16. No child or teacher living in a house in which there is a person sick with diphtheria, scarlet fever, or any disease placarded by the board of health shall return to school until the placard has been legally removed, and not without written permission from the board of health.

No child living in a house in which there is a person sick with measles shall return

to school while the catarrhal symptoms exist.

Rule 17. No person who has been sick with scarlet fever or diphtheria shall return to school until the school committee has been notified by the board of health that danger of contagion is over. Persons who have been sick with other contagious diseases shall not return to school, except as follows: (a) Measles, on subsidence of catarrhal symptoms; (b) varicella, when the skin is free from crusts; (c) whooping cough, when cough has ceased; (d) mumps, when the swelling has subsided. [Regulations board of health, adopted May 10, 1910.]

#### BURIAL AND REMOVAL OF THE DEAD.

Rule 18. An undertaker or other person having in his care or possession the body: of any person who has died of cholera, typhus fever, smallpox, diphtheria, or scarlet fever shall give immediate notice to the board of health. Within 24 hours after the death of a person from one of the foregoing diseases a private funeral shall be held at which none but the immediate adult relations and clergyman shall be present. body shall be conveyed immediately to the place of burial and in no other vehicle. than a hearse

RULE 19. The body of any person who has died of a contagious disease shall not be placed or kept in any receiving vault, in any cemetery or burying ground within the city limits, unless such dead body shall be first inclosed in a hermetically sealed

zinc-lined or other metallic casket.

RULE 20. No disinterments or removal of dead bodies shall be allowed between May 15 and October 15, except by special permit, and then only under the direction of the board of health.

RULE 21. No person shall bury or inter, or cause to be buried or interred, the body or ashes of any dead person at any other time of the day than between sunrise and

sunset, except in accordance with a permit from the board of health.

Rule 22. No person shall remove, or cause to be removed, the body of any dead person from its casket or coffin for any purpose whatever, at any cemetery or burial ground within the limits of the city, without a permit from the board of health.

Rule 23. In all interments every box containing a dead body shall be placed at

least three feet below the surface of the ground surrounding the grave.

Rule 24. The body of a person who has died of any contagious disease shall be thoroughly disinfected and shall not be exposed to the view of any person who is not necessarily engaged in the preparation of the same for burial. It shall be wrapped in a sheet saturated in a solution of bichlorid of mercury 1-1000 and placed in a casket which shall be hermetically sealed and which shall not be reopened.

RULE 25. The undertaker, or his assistant or agent, shall notify the board of health of the time of removal of such body and sign a certificate containing a true statement of the facts that he has complied with the provisions of the board of health in regard to bodies dead from contagious diseases. No permit, either for the burial or removal of the body, shall be issued until such certificate is filed with the clerk of the

board of health.

RULE 26. The use of wall draperies in any room or place used for a funeral or for the preparation or retention of any human body before or in connection with such funeral is forbidden. [Regulation board of health, adopted May 10, 1910.]

#### DISPOSAL OF WASTE-CARE OF PREMISES.

Rule 27. The owner, agent, or occupant of any premises or building used as a dwelling place, store, office, factory, or for any purpose where waste matter may become a source of filth if allowed to leak or collect in a building or about the premises, shall furnish the same with suitable fittings to drain and carry away such waste to a suitable underground drain or cesspool or into the public sewer (when ordered so to do) or to such other place as may be approved by the board of health, where its deposit will not become obnoxious or a source of danger to health. All pipes and fittings from any building for the discharge of waste water, liquid matter, or filthy water from bathtubs, wash trays, sinks, and bowls shall be trapped as required by the plumbing ordinance of the city.

RULE 28. No owner, agent, or occupant of any building or premises shall cause or allow to be caused the accumulation of any stagnant water, animal, vegetable, or other matter which may become a source of filth or cause of disease in and about such

premises.

Rule 29. A tenant of any premises used as a dwelling, or otherwise, shall be held responsible for its sanitary condition at all times and such tenant shall not cause or permit any nuisance or source of filth to arise thereon from his neglect or otherwise.

Rule 30. All cellars must be kept dry by drainage or otherwise. If, upon inspection, the board of health at any time should find tenements or other buildings in an uncleanly or filthy condition, it will be considered a violation of these regulations, and will be deemed a sufficient cause to order such tenements vacated without further notice.

RULE 31. Owners or tenants of premises abutting on alleyways shall keep such part of said alleyway as abuts on their premises clean and free from swill, ashes, and rubbish of any and all kinds. Any neglect so to do shall be punished by a fine of not

less than \$5 nor more than \$20.

Rule 32. The owner of any structure used as a dwelling house, boarding house, factory, or for any other purpose where people dwell or are employed, shall furnish such premises with privy vaults or water-closets and sinks as may be determined by the board of health, so constructed that they shall not leak or cause any offensive odor, or sickness, or nuisance, and which shall be so made as to be easily and properly cleansed and purified, and all such privy vaults and water-closets shall be sufficient in capacity to accommodate conveniently the number of persons who may have occasion to use the same.

Rule 33. No person shall void urine, evacuate excrement, or commit any nuisance whatsoever in any doorway, hall, stairway, alleyway, passageway, yard, cellar, cellar-

way, or court opening out of, into, or adjacent to or in any public street.

Whoever violates any of the provisions of this rule shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$100 for each offense.

RULE 34. The owners of dwellings and tenements are required to see that the same are not crowded; that they at all times are kept in a cleanly condition; that they are well ventilated.

Sleeping rooms will be considered overcrowded unless they shall have at least 300 cubic feet of air space for each person occupying the same.

Kitchens shall not be used as sleeping rooms.

RULE 35. No person shall make use of any land within the bounds of a street, highway, or other public place, or of any brook, drain, or catch basin, for the deposit of any waste water, sink slops, rubbish, offal, beef brine, or refuse material of any kind.
Rule 36. No person shall make use of the land belonging to any person, corporation,

or others as a dump for the deposit of any offensive matter or refuse material of any kind without permission of the board of health, and without special permission of the owner, who will at all times be held responsible for the condition thereof.

Rule 37. Any person wishing to deposit or cause to be deposited waste material for the purpose of filling must first obtain permission from the board of health to maintain a dump, and will be required at all times to keep the surface in a cleanly and

sightly condition.

RULE 38. No person shall collect any house offal, or the contents of privy vaults or cesspool or clean out the same, nor shall they bring into the city any fat, bones, putrid decayed meat, fish, or any other animal or vegetable matter, nor transport the same through any street, highway or public place. except in water-tight securely covered vehicles, from which no odor can arise, unless by special permission of the board of

Rule 39. No person shall throw any animal or vegetable substance, dead animal, or fowl into any well, reservoir, pond, or stream within the city limits, or cause any animal to be drowned in the waters of the same.

RULE 40. No person shall sweep the dirt or refuse from any store or house into or

upon the street or throw any paper or other waste material thereon.
Rule 41. In all cases of repapering the walls shall be thoroughly cleaned of all old papers before putting on the new. [Regulation board of health, adopted May 10, 1910.]

#### ASHES, GARBAGE, AND REFUSE-DISPOSAL OF.

RULE 42. Ashes must be put in suitable receptacles not larger than an ordinary flour barrel and must be kept free from all other refuse matter. Barrels must not be filled within more than 4 inches of top. No waste paper or other refuse shall be placed on barrels unless tied in bundles to prevent same from being scattered on streets.

Rule 43. House offal and garbage must be kept free from all other refuse matter and in galvanized receptacles, with covers. All other refuse matter, such as papers, rags, excelsior, straw, old clothes, pasteboard boxes, etc., must be kept free from ashes and garbage and placed in suitable packages or barrels to prevent being scattered in roadways.

Rule 44. No person shall overhaul the contents of receptacles for waste material

set upon sidewalks to be removed.

RULE 45. The owner, agent, or lessee of a building occupied as a dwelling by two or more families shall provide suitable receptacles for ashes, rubbish, and garbage, and shall not allow any ashes, rubbish, or garbage to be thrown in or about the yard or premises.

RULE 46. Ashes, house offal, and garbage shall be removed at least once each week by the contractors employed by the board of health, and no other person shall remove or cause to be removed such material without written permission from the board of

health.

Rule 47. No receptacles for ashes or offal shall stand on any sidewalk, street, or

alleyway except during the time for the collection of ashes and offal.

Rule 48. Earth, gravel, bricks, mortar, stones, lime, plaster, cement, concrete, or refuse material from repairs or construction of buildings, or the cutting of trees, will not be removed by the health department. [Regulation board of health; adopted May 10, 1910.]

## PLAGUE-PREVENTION WORK.

#### INFECTED GROUND SQUIRRELS.

During the week ended August 12, 1911, the finding of three plague-infected ground squirrels was reported. The squirrels were found as follows: In Contra Costa County, Cal., at Peoples Water Company land, August 5, one squirrel; August 8, one squirrel, and August 9, one squirrel.

#### DISTRIBUTION OF POISON.

In connection with the making of a squirrel-free zone around the cities of California on San Francisco Bay, 1,430 acres of land in Alameda County and 1,024 acres in Contra Costa County were covered with poison during the week ended August 12, 1911.

During the same period 400 acres of land in Merced County, 630 acres in San Joaquin County, and 470 acres in Stanislaus County were covered with poison for the purpose of eradicating plague foci.

# SMALLPOX IN THE UNITED STATES—Continued. Reports Received During Week Ended Sept. 1, 1911.

Great Britain.—Week ended August 5, 1911.

England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 77 great towns correspond to an annual rate of 15.9 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 16,157,797.

Ireland.—The deaths registered in 21 principal town districts correspond to an annual rate of 16.8 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,149,495. The lowest rate was recorded at Galway, viz, 7.9, and the highest at Newtownards, viz, 22.9 per 1,000.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns correspond to an annual rate of 13.8 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,710,291. The lowest was recorded at Perth, viz, 7.3, and the highest at Greenock, viz, 18.7 per 1.000. The total number of deaths from all causes was 452, including diphtheria 6, measles 11, scarlet fever 1, typhoid fever 3.

Jamaica.—Month of July, 1911. Population, 50,000. Total number of deaths from all causes, 138, including measles 1, tuberculosis, pulmonary, 7.

Malta.—Two weeks ended July 29, 1911. Population, 213,395. Total number of deaths from all causes 259, including measles 15, tuberculosis 6, typhoid fever 1.

SOUTH AFRICA.—Johannesburg.—Two weeks ended July 8, 1911 Population, 220,304. Total number of deaths from all causes 176, including diphtheria 1, tuberculosis 25, typhoid fever 3.

Turks Islands.—Five weeks ended August 12, 1911. Population, 1,681. Total number of deaths from all causes 3. No contagious diseases.
