TYPHOID FEVER.

PREVALENCE IN CITIES DURING 1916.

The table which follows shows the recorded prevalence of typhoid fever during the year 1916 in cities of the United States having over 100,000 population. The cities have been divided into groups according to their populations and arranged in each group in the order of the prevalence of the disease as indicated by the recorded cases. Data are given for all the cities of the United States having an estimated population of 100,000 or over as of July 1, 1916, with the exception of Des Moines, Iowa, Cambridge, Mass., and Memphis, Tenn. Typhoid fever is not a notifiable disease in Iowa; therefore there is no record of its prevalence. Nor has it been possible to obtain data for Cambridge or Memphis.

ANOPHELINE MOSQUITOES.

THEIR DISTRIBUTION AND INFECTION UNDER FIELD CONDITIONS.

In a series of studies, previously reported by the writer, it was found practicable to establish the period at which infected anophelines made their initial appearance in spring.

The present investigations, undertaken primarily for the purpose of ascertaining the relative distribution of anophelines under field conditions, included also an effort to determine, for a particular locality, the seasonal period at which parasitism of mosquitoes could no longer be demonstrated.

The region selected (Talladega Springs, Ala., about 34° N. latitude) was previously investigated as to its parasite index, the maximum of which was ascertained to be 18.6 per cent among 200 persons. Here, beginning September 17, and extending to November 15, anopheline mosquitoes were collected extensively, special attention being given in this regard to habitations known to harbor malaria in either acute or chronic form.

Relation of A. punctipennis and A. quadrimaculatus to the environments in which they are found.—It has been previously observed by Carter ¹ that A. punctipennis is not found commonly in human habitations in the daytime (at least during the summer) and is probably not as important a factor in malaria dissemination as is A. quadrimaculatus.

It has been suggested that A. punctipennis is of but slight importance because of its remote associations with man; that it is rarely or never found in houses, thus having but limited opportunity to convey infection.

It has been definitely proved that, under experimental conditions, A. punctipennis may serve as a vector of malaria; there remains to be determined whether conditions exist in nature in the presence of which this insect may be of epidemiological significance. For this study, a total of 1,377 specimens of two species of Anopheles, namely, A. quadrimaculatus and A. punctipennis, were collected during the period of September 18-November 15, 1916. The mosquitoes were captured with the aid of an electric flashlight by using Griffitt's mosquito collecting device. When a convenient number of specimens were assembled they were transferred into a copper-screened wooden cage made for this purpose.. As many as 200 specimens could be transported simultaneously in this manner and held in the collecting cage until ready for examination. Water was supplied in a gauze-covered cotton pad placed under the cage and the mosquitoes were observed to obtain moisture by piercing the meshes of the pad. These moistened pads also served to cool the air in the container en route, when the cages thus provided were forwarded by post to the New Orleans laboratory, a distance of 400 At least 85 per cent of the specimens arrived in an uninjured condition, suitable for dissecting.

It is indicated that in the three sources of direct human influence, namely, inside dwellings, under dwellings, and in privies, the last produced the greatest number of specimens of A. punctipennis. This

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species comprised less than one-third (30 per cent) of the catch in houses, while under dwellings 62 per cent of the mosquitoes collected proved to be A. punctipennis. That the preponderant numbers of A. punctipennis infesting houses are found usually in an engorged state resting under the flooring of dwellings, is interesting. It has been observed by service officers, conducting malarial surveys, that although A. punctipennis rarely bites while inside a dwelling, it is found to attack persons seated on the porch or gallery of the house, after which these mosquitoes seek rest, presumably under the house in preference to the interior. Mr. Le Prince (in a personal communication) reports as follows: "While the occurrence of engorged A. punctipennis in bed rooms is relatively rare it has been observed in the same regions that A. punctipennis frequently bites persons resting on the house porch." This is not an unusual habit of an anopheline mosquito. Ross 1 states that Anopheles (Pyretophorus) costalis, a malaria carrier incriminated experimentally in Mauritius, prefers verandas to inner rooms and also bites in the open.

The presence of blood-engorged specimens of A. punctipennis in houses and privies justifies the assumption that the source of the blood was probably human, and suggests an active agency in malaria dissemination.

Of the material collected it was feasible to dissect and examine 709 specimens which had been transported from time to time to the New Orleans laboratory and kept three to five days to permit bloodengorged mosquitoes to digest the last blood meal. The first two infected specimens were seen early in the investigation: A specimen of A. quadrimaculatus, on September 21 (collected September 18), and a specimen of A. punctipennis examined on September 29 (collected September 26). The first appeared with three typical oocysts onehalf to three-fourths grown $(35\mu-45\mu$ in size) on the caudal end of the midgut. The development in these oocysts had not reached the sporoblastic stage and no malarial pigment was observed. oocyst containing characteristic granules was seen distinctly projecting from the stomach wall. All of the six lobes of the salivary glands of this mosquito were normal in appearance. The second infected mosquito was found September 29, and proved to be a specimen of A. punctipennis. In this specimen only a single oocvst was located. It contained a small amount of malarial pigment and appeared to be less than six days in growth—in size nearly 35 μ . salivary glands in this mosquito were likewise uninfected.

An effort was made in this region of Alabama to determine when malaria ceased to exist in a transmissible form before the termination of the active period. For this purpose collections were made from as many houses as possible where known cases of malaria had been obApril 13, 1917 540

served. Finally, toward the end of October, attention was concentrated on a particular locality, heavily infested with anophelines, and specifically on a plantation, the residents of which were clinically ill of the disease. An interesting situation was presented in the finding of the nine members of this family with malaria, both clinically and microscopically. Thirty-three specimens of anophelines were taken from this house and examined during the period between October 26 and November 21. Some of these were retained under laboratory conditions for an additional two weeks to afford an opportunity for complete parasite development. One infection was noted in a specimen of A. quadrimaculatus of this series examined on November 15. A single oocyst apparently of stunted development (size $35-40\mu$) was observed, but no other evidence of infection was presented. The oocyst was recognized as similar in character to those seen in mosquitoes kept in the laboratory at low temperatures for two months or longer, and which were observed not to develop to maturity during this period.

PREVALENCE OF DISEASE.

No health department, State or local, can effectively prevent or control disease without knowledge of when, where, and under what conditions cases are occurring.

MEASLES.

Alabama-Birmingham.

Asst. Epidemiologist Harrington reported that during the month of March, 1917, 1,573 cases of measles, with 21 deaths, were notified in Birmingham, Ala., and that during the period from January 1 to March 31, 1917, 2,908 cases, with 32 deaths, were reported.

California.

The California State Board of Health reported that during the month of March, 1917, at least 3,600 cases of measles occurred in the State of California. During the month of February 3,305 cases were notified and for January 1,606 cases were notified, making a total of over 8,500 cases reported during the first three months of 1917. During the year 1916 there were 4,268 cases reported, and 13,114 cases were reported during 1915.

California-Los Angeles.

CHINA.

Examination of Rats-Shanghai.

During the period from January 21 to February 24, 1917, 1,321 rats were examined at Shanghai. No plague infection was found. The last plague-infected rat at Shanghai was reported found May 6, 1916.

Plague Among Rats-Hing Ning.

Plague among rats was reported February 24, 1917, at Hing Ning, Kwantung Province, China.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Anthrax-Longwood, England.

A fatal case of anthrax was reported March 8, 1917, as occurring at Longwood, in the vicinity of Huddersfield, England, in an employee in a woolen mill at that place. The patient was a man who had been working at a shaking machine at which dust was shaken from the wool and carried by a fan into another room. The wool originated mostly in the East Indies. The type of the disease in the case reported was internal or pulmonary anthrax.

MEXICO.

Typhus Decreasing—Aguascalientes.

The prevalence of typhus at Aguascalientes, Mexico, was stated, March 20, 1917, to be decreasing, only a few cases being reported.
