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TREATMENT OF MALARIA.

The following letter and report have been received from Asst. Surg. Gen. H. R. Carter, secretary of the National Malaria Committee:

Report of the Subcommittee on Medical Research of the National Malaria Committee, November, 1919.

"The subcommittee on medical research of the National Malaria Committee presents the following as a standard method of treatment of malaria for the purpose of curing the patient of his infection and recommends its general use by the medical profession. We believe that this treatment will, in the great majority of cases, prevent relapses in the patients themselves and also prevent transmission of infection to others. Our opinion is based largely upon the results of the treatment by this method, under average conditions, in their homes, of a large number of persons infected with malaria.

"For the acute attack 10 grains of quinine sulphate by mouth three times a day for a period of at least three or four days, to be followed by 10 grains every night before retiring for a period of eight weeks. For infected persons not having acute symptoms at the time only the eight weeks' treatment is required.

"The proportionate doses for children are: Under 1 year, one-half grain; 1 year, 1 grain; 2 years, 2 grains; 3 and 4 years, 3 grains; 5, 6, and 7 years, 4 grains; 8, 9, and 10 years, 6 grains; 11, 12, 13, and 14 years, 8 grains; 15 years or older, 10 grains.

"It is not claimed that this is a perfect or even the best treatment in all cases, but it is our belief that it is a good and satisfactory method for practical use to prevent relapse and transmission to other people.

REGISTRATION OF NURSES IN ENGLAND.

A bill has been introduced into the British Parliament for the purpose of securing the registration of nurses and the institution of a general nursing council. The latter is to comprise 25 members, as follows:

(a) Two persons, who shall not be registered medical practitioners, or nurses, or persons concerned with the regular direction or provision of the services of nurses, appointed by the privy council.

(b) Two persons appointed by the board of education.

(c) Five persons appointed by the minister of health, after consultation with persons and bodies having special knowledge and experience of training schools for nurses, of the work of matrons of hospitals, of general and special nursing services, and of general and special medical practice.

(d) Sixteen persons who are or have at some time been nurses actually engaged in rendering services in direct connection with the nursing of the sick, appointed by the minister of health after consultation with the central committee for the State registration of nurses, the College of Nursing, the Royal British Nurses' Association, and such other associations or organized bodies of nurses or matrons as represent to the minister that they desire to be consulted in the matter.

The foregoing council will act for a term not exceeding three years, after which time the council will consist of nine persons appointed by the privy council, board of education, and the minister of health respectively, and 16 others, registered as nurses under the act, who will be elected in accordance with the prescribed scheme. This body will hold office for five years.

The work of the council will include the formation and maintenance of a register, divided into five sections:

(a) All nurses other than those mentioned below.

(b) Male nurses.

(c) Mental nurses.

(d) Nurses trained in the nursing of sick children.

(e) Any other prescribed class.

And its further duties will consist of the drafting of rules for regulating the formation, maintenance, and publication of the register; the conditions of admission; the conduct of examinations; the removal of the names of nurses from, and their restoration to the register; and generally for making provision for carrying the act into effect, with provision for the issuance of certificates to registered nurses and establishing the uniforms or badges to be worn. The rules must further prescribe the qualification of candidates for admission to the register. A fee not exceeding one pound and one shilling will be charged for registration, and two shillings six pence per annum thereafter.

Nurses trained in the colonies and dominions may be admitted to register, and appeals may be made to the high court in cases of removal from the register, or of refusal on the part of the council to approve an institution for training purposes.

A CALL FOR NATION-WIDE HEALTH CONSERVATION.

In a letter sent recently by Surg. Gen. Blue to State and city health officers, to the head of the American Red Cross, the American Public Health Association, the American Medical Association, the National Tuberculosis Association, the International Health Commission, the National Safety Council, the American Child Hygiene Association, and other health agencies, the suggestion was made to hold a conference in Washington to consider a health program prepared by the Public Health Service. Practically all of these agencies have under consideration some plan of health conservation and unless the work can be coordinated and properly directed, little will be accomplished, and there will be much overlapping of effort and waste of funds.

The response to the bureau's suggestion was most favorable, as can be seen from the excerpts printed below. Accordingly a call has been issued designating January 26, 1920, as the date on which the conference will meet, and invitations have been extended to health officers, sanitarians, and representatives of important national health organizations to participate in its deliberations.

The public does not realize what has already been accomplished in the field of preventive medicine or what can be done by carefully executed health program which is cumulative and continuous rather than spasmodic and desultory in character.

In 1900 the general death rate from all causes in the registration area of the United States was 17.6—in 1917, the latest period for which figures are available, it had been reduced to 14.2. Had the

1900 death rate prevailed in 1917, there would have been in the United States, with an estimated population of 110,000,000, 374,000 more deaths than actually occurred.

The record of other years leaves little room to doubt what may be done in saving life. In 1900 typhoid fever caused a death rate of 35.9 per 100,000 population. In 1917 the rate had been reduced to 13.4. Diphtheria was reduced from 43.3 to 16.5 in the same period. Tuberculosis declined from 201.9 deaths per 100,000 of population in 1900 to 146.4 in 1917. Had the 1900 rate prevailed in typhoid fever, diphtheria, and tuberculosis, in 1917 these three diseases alone would have caused 115,280 more deaths than actually occurred.

The success of the plan will be determined largely by its direct applicability to the conditions in the different local communities, and for this reason Federal, State and local health officers must cooperate most closely in order to direct the campaign in each community and set a definite objective.

For instance, a southern city would be more interested in a campaign against the mosquito and malaria than it would be in Rocky Mountain spotted fever. A northern industrial city would be more interested in the control of pneumonia and respiratory diseases. All, however, have cancer, tuberculosis, and venereal diseases; all would be benefited by public health nursing, medical supervision of school children, conservation of the lives of mothers and children, adequate sewage disposal, the provision of pure water and pure milk. So, while each city and rural community will have as a definite objective the most vital need in that particular place, the various health agencies will have definite objectives according to the particular problem they set for themselves to solve.

That the proposed health program of the Public Health Service is feasible is shown by the successful termination of the extra-cantonment work which was carried on so efficiently through the cooperative efforts of the American Red Cross, State and local health authorities, and the United States Public Health Service. The lesson taught by this splendid demonstration of team work should not be lost to the country. For this reason, the American Red Cross, which has set aside millions of dollars for health work in the United States, has been asked to take an active part in translating the health program into action. Its thousands of local chapters are counted on to arouse and maintain interest in health work and actively cooperate with Federal, State and local health officers in accordance with the announced policy of the American Red Cross to cooperate with existing health agencies.

THE NOTIFIABLE DISEASES.

PREVALENCE DURING 1918 IN CITIES OF 10,000 TO 100,000.

ANTHRAX, CEREBROSPINAL MENINGITIS, DIPHTHERIA, GONORRHEA, INFLUENZA AND PNEUMONIA, MALARIA, MEASLES, POLIOMYELITIS, RABIES IN ANIMALS, RABIES IN MAN, SCARLET FEVER, SMALLPOX, TUBERCULOSIS (PULMONARY), TUBERCULOSIS (ALL FORMS), TYPHOID FEVER; CASES AND DEATHS REPORTED, AND INDICATED FATALITY RATES PER 100 CASES.

The tables shown on the following pages were compiled from data furnished by health officers of cities of the United States in response to requests from the Public Health Service for information of the reported prevalence of disease during the calendar year 1918. These requests were sent to all cities of 10,000 population or over.

The data for cities of over 100,000 population have been published (Reprint from the Public Health Reports, No. 547). A similar publication for States, giving the reported cases and deaths by months, has been issued (Reprint 551).

The present article contains reports from cities of between 10,000 and 100,000 population which responded to the request for information. Many cities did not respond, and some stated frankly that the desired data were not available, as reports had not been received from physicians. It is believed that practically all cities are included which have records of morbidity from communicable diseases which are of value for statistical purposes.

Estimates of population for the year 1918 are not available, and for this reason it has not been possible to compute case and death rates.

In studying these tables it should be kept in mind that a relatively large number of reported cases of a communicable disease usually means that the health department is active and that the cases of the disease are being well reported by the practicing physicians. It does not usually mean that the disease is more prevalent in that city than in other cities. A high fatality rate may mean that the disease was unusually virulent in a city, that the physicians did not treat the disease in that city with the success usual elsewhere, or that the practicing physicians did not report all of their cases to the health department. On the other hand, an unusually low fatality rate may be due to the fact that the disease in the city was unusually mild, that the physicians treated it with unusual success, that the practicing physicians reported their cases satisfactorily, or that the registration of deaths was incomplete, or the assignment of the causes of death inaccurate.

Cities in which no cases of a disease were reported are not included in the table for that disease.

CHINA.

Rats Found Dead on Steamship Nagoya—Shanghai.

The finding of 299 dead rats as the result of a partial fumigation of the steamship *Nagoya* at Shanghai, China, August 1, 1919, has been reported under date of November 11, 1919. The occurrence of six cases of plague among the native crew of the *Nagoya* was reported at the port of London, England, October 27, 1919.¹

GUATEMALA.

Influenza—Yellow Fever—1918.

A report of health conditions in Guatemala for the year 1918, under date of November 22, 1919, shows 325,220 cases of influenza with 43,733 fatalities, and 609 cases of yellow fever with 255 fatalities. The cases of yellow fever were reported from 16 localities, the greatest number, viz, 183 cases, being reported at Coatepeque (population, 8,000); at Escuintla 126 cases were reported (population, 12,300); at Retalhuleu, 117 cases (population, 28,000).

MEXICO.

Malaria—San Luis Potosi and Huasteca District.

An epidemic of a fever which some reports indicated might possibly be yellow fever has existed for some time in the Huasteca or oil district of Mexico, in the States of Vera Cruz, San Luis Potosi, and Tamaulipas.

An officer of the Public Health Service recently visited this district. He reports under date of December 10, 1919, that the disease was found to be a widespread persistent malarial infection in which the mortality was exceptionally high.

Yellow Fever—Campeche.
