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THE CURATIVE ACTION OF SULPHARSPHENAMINE IN EXPERIMENTAL SYPHILIS.

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In a previous paper by Voegtlin, Johnson, and Dyer (1922), experiments were reported which showed that treatment with single doses of sulpharsphenamine (15 to 50 mg. per kilo) leads to a prompt disappearance of *Treponema pallidum* from the scrotal lesions in rabbits and causes a marked improvement of these lesions. From the practical standpoint of the efficacy of sulpharsphenamine in the treatment of human syphilis, it is, of course, important to know whether this drug is able to sterilize the animal, i. e., to cause the death of all the parasites: The question is, What shall be the criterion of sterilization? Clinical relapse usually occurs after a sufficiently long time has elapsed following treatment with subcurative doses, but this criterion alone furnishes insufficient proof, and, furthermore, requires a very long period of observation.

Pearce and Brown (1922) have recently shown that *Treponema pallidum* has a strong tendency to localize in lymph glands, and in the experience of these investigators, transplantation of macerations of lymph glands into the scrotum of normal rabbits yields fairly good evidence as to the presence or absence of syphilitic infection in the donor. We have, therefore, used this method on some of our rabbits treated with sulpharsphenamine and neoarsphenamine. The control numbers of these rabbits are the same as those given in the previous paper. Unfortunately, three of the animals (Nos. 4, 6, and 7) died of intercurrent infections before transplants could be made. However, in none of these three animals was there any recurrence of syphilitic lesions before death occurred. The history of these three rabbits is, briefly, as follows:

Rabbit No. 4.—October 23, 1922: Scrotal lesions completely healed. November 29 (sixty-fifth day following treatment with 27 mg. neoarsphenamine per kilo): Animal has developed an infection of the respiratory tract, causing a purulent nasal discharge; chloroformed. Necropsy: Both testicles normal; infectious process of upper respiratory tract; mucous membrane of trachea congested and hemorrhagic; no other gross lesions.

Rabbit No. 6.—October 23, 1922: Scrotal lesions healed. November 29 (sixty-fifth day after treatment with 36 mg. sulpharsphenamine per kilo): Found dead. Necropsy: Purulent discharge from nostrils and ears; both testicles normal; no other gross lesions.

Rabbit No. 7.—December 1, 1922 (sixty-seventh day after treatment with 15 mg. sulpharsphenamine per kilo): Found dead. Both testicles normal; far advanced post mortem changes.

We may conclude from these observations that the three rabbits did not develop a clinical relapse for a period of 65 to 67 days following treatment.

The histories of the remaining four animals used for lymph node transfer are given below. In addition, there is described an experiment with an untreated animal which was infected the same day (July 17, 1922) as the other animals of this series with the same suspension of the Nichol's strain of *Treponema pallidum*.

Rabbit No. 2.—October 23, 1922: Scrotal lesions completely healed. April 9, 1923, (one hundred and ninety-sixth day following treatment with 27 mg. sulpharsphenamine per kilo): Has shown no evidence of recurrence of any syphilitic lesions to date. Lymph gland and testicular material transferred to left scrotum of rabbit No. 2a.

Rabbit No. 3.—October 10, 1922: Scrotal lesions healed. April 9, 1923 (one hundred and ninety-sixth day following treatment with 36 mg. neoarsphenamine per kilo): Has shown no evidence of recurrence of any syphilitic lesions to date. Lymph gland and part of testicle transferred to right scrotum of rabbit No. 3a.

Rabbit No. 5.—April 9, 1923 (one hundred and ninety-sixth day following treatment with 50 mg. sulpharsphenamine per kilo): Has shown no evidence of recurrence of any syphilitic lesions to date. Lymph gland and piece of scrotum transferred to right scrotum of rabbit No. 5a.

Rabbit No. 8.—April 9, 1923 (one hundred and sixty-ninth day following treatment with 15 mg. neoarsphenamine per kilo): Has shown no evidence of recurrence of syphilitic lesions to date. Lymph gland and part of testicle transferred to rabbit No. 8a.

Control rabbit X.—Inoculated July 17, 1922. Never developed well-marked scrotal lesions. April 9, 1923: Lymph glands and testicular material transferred to scrotum of a normal rabbit, Xa.

Result of transplantations.—At the time that this is being written, i. e., on the seventy-first day following transplantation of the lymph nodes, none of the animals, except control rabbit Xa, has shown any signs of syphilitic infection. The glands are normal, except one of rabbit 3a, which shows a small nodule (scar tissue (?)), free from spirochetes on three different days (June 2, 4, and 19). Rabbit Xa showed a well-developed chancre on June 4, and dark field examination revealed the presence of numerous spirochetes. On June 19 the chancre had reached very large size.

It is evident, then, that in none of the treated animals was it possible to establish any evidence of infection by means of lymph-gland transfer. This fact is all the more significant in view of the long time (196 days) intervening between treatment and lymph-node transfer, which should have given the infection a chance to reestablish itself in the lymphatic system. These observations on a small series of animals suggest that treatment with a single injection of sulpharsphenamine is sufficiently effective to prevent a clinical relapse and to produce sterilization of the lymph glands, which,

according to Pearce and Brown, always harbor spirochetes during the latent stages of the disease. Work is now in progress on a large number of animals which it is hoped will yield absolutely conclusive evidence of the relative curative action of sulpharsphenamine, neo-arsphenamine, and arsphenamine in rabbit syphilis.

THE NOTIFIABLE DISEASES.

PREVALENCE DURING 1922 IN CITIES OF OVER 100,000.

The following tables were compiled from data furnished by the health officers of the cities. They include all cities of 100,000 population or over in the United States except Kansas City, Kans.

The following is a list of the diseases included:

The populations given, and which were used in computing the rates, were estimated as of July 1, 1922, except where otherwise stated.

Medians¹ of the total number of cases reported annually during the years 1913 to 1921 are given for cerebrospinal meningitis, diphtheria, measles, pellagra, poliomyelitis, scarlet fever, smallpox, and typhoid fever. The column headed "Number of years" shows the number of years for which data were available for each city.

In comparing the figures for 1922 with the medians for preceding years, it should be borne in mind that for several years there has been a gradual improvement in the reporting of communicable diseases. An increase in the number of cases reported may be due to better reporting rather than to an increase in the number of cases occurring.

In studying these tables it should be kept in mind that a relatively large number of reported cases of a communicable disease as indicated by a high case rate (and more especially when accompanied by a relatively small number of deaths, as indicated by a low fatality rate) usually means that the health department of that city is active and that the cases of the disease are being well reported by the practicing physicians. It does not usually mean that the disease is more prevalent in that city than in other cities. A high fatality rate may mean that the disease was unusually virulent in a city; that the physicians did not treat the disease in that city with the success usual elsewhere; or that the practicing physicians did not report all of their cases to the health department. On the other hand, an unusually

¹ The median has been defined as the magnitude of the middle item in an array. If the numbers of cases reported are arranged so that the greatest number reported in any one year is first, the second greatest number is second, and so on, then the number of cases in the center of the array is the median. The following illustration shows the method followed when data for five years are available: In a city reporting 60 cases in 1915, 79 cases in 1916, 71 cases in 1917, 58 cases in 1918, and 53 cases in 1919, the median is 60 cases.

low fatality rate may be due to the fact that the disease in the city was unusually mild; that the physicians treated it with unusual success; that the practicing physicians reported their cases satisfactorily; or that the registration of deaths was incomplete or the assignment of the causes of death inaccurate.

Cities which did not report either cases or deaths of a certain disease in 1922 are not included in the table for that disease.

Seventy-three cities reported 65,539 cases of diphtheria, which is an increase of about 6 per cent over the median number reported during recent years by these cities.

Measles shows an increase over the median of 22 per cent in the number of cases reported. For the year 1921, 68 cities had a combined case rate of 2.53 per thousand population. In 1922, 72 cities had a combined rate of 5.26, an increase over 1921 of more than 100 per cent in the rate.

The number of reported cases of scarlet fever in 73 cities was more than 26 per cent higher than the median.

Fewer cases of smallpox were reported than last year, and several cities which usually have cases of small pox at some time during the year did not report any in 1922. However, the number of deaths from this disease showed a decided increase over recent years. This increase was confined to a few of the cities. Denver, with 248 deaths from smallpox, had more than half of the deaths reported. Kansas City, Mo., reported 63 deaths; Chicago, 15; Los Angeles, 5; Bridgeport, 4; and Salt Lake City, 3. No other city in the table reported more than 2 deaths from smallpox.

The decrease in typhoid fever which has been evident for several years continued during 1922, as is shown by the fact that 73 cities reported only a little more than half as many cases of this disease as the median for recent years. The case rate for 1922 was 0.19 per thousand population, a decrease of nearly 27 per cent from the rate for the year 1921, which rate was based on reports from 67 cities.

CHINA.

Plague—Chinese Eastern Railway and Transbaikal Siberian Railway.

In Public Health Reports of March 23, 1923, page 653, and in subsequent issues, the occurrence of seven cases of plague was reported at Harbin, Manchuria, China, during the period January 29 to February 4, 1923. Later information shows that these reported cases occurred within the endemic plague area of Transbaikal Siberia and were reported through the North Manchuria Plague Prevention Service at Harbin.¹

Under date of June 27, 1923, the director and chief medical officer of the North Manchuria Plague Prevention Service reported the occurrence, May 31 and May 16, 1923, respectively, of two fatal cases of bubonic plague, one at Yakosih, a small station on the Eastern Chinese Railway between Hailar and Mentuho, and one at Haranhor, a village situated well within the endemic plague area in the Transbaikal region of Siberia. Both cases occurred in tarabagan (marmot) hunters. Two plague cases were reported at Yakosih station during the plague epidemic of 1920–21, with origin stated to have been traced to Mentuho.

A scientific expedition sent out by the North Manchuria Plague Prevention Service and operating during May and June, 1923, ascertained the existence of endemic foci in the Transbaikal region of Siberia, which is connected by the Transbaikal Railway with the Eastern Chinese Railway. It was stated that at localities in the vicinity of stations from Matsievskaya to Borzia, a distance of over 100 versts, cases of plague have been of almost yearly occurrence among the inhabitants. In the vicinity of stations No. 83 and Soktu outbreaks of plague were noted during recent years among marmots.

RAT CATCHING IN HONGKONG—YEAR 1922.

The annual report of the health department of the colony of Hongkong shows that during the year 1922, 109,296 rats were caught, of which 25 were found plague infected. The methods employed consisted of traps, bird-lime boards, and rat poison. A certain number of the rats caught in street rat bins, warehouses, and private dwellings were taken to the bacteriological institute for examination. Special campaigns were undertaken in January and November, when rat poison was distributed throughout urban districts.
