A NOTE ON THE RELATIONSHIP OF TONSILLECTOMY TO THE OCCURRENCE OF SCARLET FEVER AND DIPHTHERIA.¹

The opinion is very commonly expressed by clinicians and pathologists that the tonsils are the usual portal of entry for various infections, among which diphtheria is commonly and scarlet fever sometimes mentioned. It is still more generally believed that hypertrophy of the tonsils definitely increases susceptibility to these infections, presumably by establishing conditions which are especially favorable for the lodgment, multiplication, and persistence of microorganisms. In accordance with this view, the removal of the chronically inflamed or hypertrophied tonsils, especially in children, is advocated not merely for the relief of immediate symptoms but equally or more as a means of protection against subsequent infection.

Concerning the protection, if any, which tonsillectomy actually affords against subsequent attacks of diphtheria and scarlet fever, the direct evidence appears to be quite fragmentary, consisting chiefly of statements by experienced clinicians that they have rarely or never observed these diseases in children whose tonsils had been completely removed, whereas children with hypertrophied and diseased tonsils have furnished a strikingly large proportion of their cases. For example, Welch and Schamberg (1), in support of their assertion that susceptibility to diphtheria is increased by hypertrophy of the tonsils, quote Lennox Browne as follows: " My personal experience leads me to say that diphtheria hardly ever, if ever, occurs in a child under 7 years of age who is not the subject of one or other of these forms of glandular overgrowth." Apropos of the occurrence of diphtheria in children whose tonsils had been removed. Perry (2) quotes the physicians in charge of several isolation hospitals as stating that they had never seen diphtheria in a patient who had had the tonsils enucleated, and as believing that diphtheria and scarlet fever are not found in such

persons. Likewise Browne and Hughes (3), writing from Australia, state that "from inquiries of certain medical officers who have seen a large number of cases of diphtheria we learn that no case of faucial diphtheria has come under their notice which has occurred in those children who had previously had thorough tonsillectomy and adenoidectomy performed." Such observations as the above, though stated only in general terms without the support of exact records are, nevertheless, impressive by reason of their consistency, because, especially as regards diphtheria, there seems to be no dissent from the view that inflammation and hypertrophy of the tonsils are conditions predisposing to infection.

Observations of similar import, based upon somewhat more definite records are reported by Kaiser (4) from Rochester, N. Y., where some 10,000 children are said to have had their tonsils removed in special clinics within a period of about five months. After an interval of about 10 months, 5,000 of these children were examined by Kaiser, who included in his examination an inquiry as to the occurrence of infectious diseases in the interval, with the result that diphtheria was reported in 18 and scarlet fever in 11 of the 5,000 children examined. It is stated that these figures represented an incidence of diphtheria equal to about one-half and of scarlet fever equal to less than one-half the rates prevailing generally in the city during the same period, but the data are not given in sufficient detail for exact comparisons.

A rather careful, but by no means exhaustive, search of the literature has failed to discover other systematic records of the relative frequency of diphtheria or scarlet fever among children whose tonsils had been removed; and while it is probable that some reference may have been overlooked, it would appear that such records are at least not common nor readily accessible. It has, therefore, seemed worth while to bring together the data here presented, comprising records of the frequency of complete tonsillectomy as observed in Baltimore in (1) a sample of the white children attending public and parochial schools in wards 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, and 10 of the city; (2) a consecutive series of cases of diphtheria as reported in children of school age resident in the same wards; and (3) a sample of scarlet fever cases in white children of school age likewise reported from this area.

1. FREQUENCY OF TONSILLECTOMY AMONG WHITE SCHOOL CHILDREN.

During the winter and spring of 1921-22 more than 5,000 white children attending schools in wards 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, and 10 of the city of Baltimore were examined by Doull and Fales (5) for the primary purpose of determining the proportion of carriers of the diphtheria bacillus; and incidental to this examination a record was made in each

instance of the condition of the tonsils. The children examined were selected from a school population of more than 25,000 and were so taken as to constitute a random sample. In the first two surveys every sixth and in the third survey every fourth child in order of standing on the school rolls was examined, or where no rolls were conveniently available, children were similarly selected according to seating order. The results of these examinations as regards frequency of tonsillectomy are shown in Table 1, from which it is seen that 15.2 per cent of the total examined had had their tonsils removed, the proportion increasing from 6.9 per cent at ages 5 and 6 years to 19.1 per cent at ages 13 Considering the size of the sample and the method of and 14 years. sampling employed, the percentages shown in this table may be regarded as applicable with considerable precision to the entire school population of the area.

2. FREQUENCY OF TONSILLECTOMY IN CASES OF DIPHTHERIA.

Since November, 1921, workers from this department of the School of Hygiene, and from the United States Public Health Service, in cooperation with the Baltimore City Health Department, have visited and investigated all cases of diphtheria reported in the same wards of the city in which the carrier surveys above mentioned were made. From this number the writer has taken a consecutive series of 264 cases of ages from 5–14 years, as reported to the city health department from January 11, 1922, to April 16, 1924. From this series 9 cases have been excluded because the diagnosis of diphtheria was regarded as doubtful, and 31 additional cases because particulars regarding the condition of the tonsils were not recorded, leaving 224 cases of fairly certain diagnosis in which a definite record concerning the tonsils was made.

If the chance of developing diphtheria were in no way associated with the circumstance of prior tonsillectomy, then we should expect

in this series of diphtheria cases to find evidence of tonsillectomy in approximately the same proportion as already observed in the same school population of corresponding age in the same area. The comparison presented in Table 2 shows, however, that such is not the Thus, according to data presented in Table 1, 6.9 per cent of case. school children aged 5 and 6 years have had their tonsils removed: and, applying this percentage to the 94 diphtheria cases of this age included in our series, we would expect to find among them about 6 children showing evidences of tonsillectomy if this operation had no relation to the occurrence of diphtheria. Making a similar calculation for each age group and summing up the figures as in Table 2 (column c) we should expect, in the series of 224 cases, to find about 26 children giving evidence of prior tonsillectomy if the liability to infection were equal in such children and in those whose tonsils had not been removed. However, instead of the expected 26 only 2 cases were found in which the tonsils had been removed, indicating that such children form a much smaller proportion of diphtheria cases than of the general population of corresponding ages. This difference. unless it can be accounted for as due to the chance fluctuations occurring in the process of sampling may be taken as indicating that children whose tonsils have been removed are less liable to diphtheria than other children in the same environment and presumably equivalent in other respects.

It is obvious from simple inspection of the figures given in Table 2 that the difference between the expected number (26) of children with tonsils removed and the actually observed number (2) is not likely to have occurred as a simple sampling error. The probability that it may have occurred by chance fluctuation may, however, be tested Considering the large size of the samples on which they statistically. are based, the percentages shown in column (b) and the expected cases shown in column (c) may be considered fairly stable: and the first method given by Pearson (6) for testing frequency distributions for goodness of fit is considered applicable. Using the nearest integrals of column (c) in comparison with the figures of column (d) in applying this test, a chi-square value of 21.6 is obtained, which, according to Pearson's tables (6, p. 26), indicates that a difference as great as or greater than that actually observed may be expected to occur in random sampling less than three times in 10,000 trials.

It may therefore be concluded that in this observation there is a significant negative association between tonsillectomy and the occurrence of diphtheria; in other words, when the tonsils have been removed children are distinctly less liable to contract diphtheria than other children of corresponding age under similar environmental conditions. The observations refer to only one locality and to a rather brief period of time; but, considering the agreement with general clinical experience, it seems probable that a similar negative association between tonsillectomy and liability to diphtheria may be more or less general.

3. FREQUENCY OF TONSILLECTOMY AMONG SCARLET FEVER CASES.

In order to secure material for a comparable study of the relationship of tonsillectomy to the occurrence of scarlet fever, the names and addresses of all the cases of scarlet fever notified in the same wards of the city during the year 1923, some 450 cases in all, were secured through the courtesy of the Baltimore City Health Department. Of these, 193 were located and identified in 15 different schools and examined by the writer between April 10 and April 18, 1924. Altogether 19 children were found who had had tonsillectomy performed prior to attack, the date of removal of the tonsils being verified in each instance from the school record card and from the parents, either by correspondence or by personal visits to the home. the most part the operations had been performed by well-known surgeons, and in 16 of the 19 cases no evidence of tonsillar tissue was noted. In each of the remaining three a small tag, which apparently was tonsillar tissue, was visible low down between the pillars.

The age distribution of the scarlet fever cases and the number with tonsils removed which would have been expected to occur among a random sample of 193 school children from this area are shown in Table 3.

The difference between the expected numbers, column (c), and the actual numbers, column (d), of children with tonsils removed is obviously insignificant. Applying the same test as in the series of diphtheria cases, the chi-square value is found to be 3.9, which, from Pearson's tables (6, p. 26), indicates that a difference as great or greater between the expected and the actual might be expected to occur in random samples about 40 times in 100 trials. There is, therefore, no significant association between tonsillectomy and the occurrence of scarlet fever.

This difference between scarlet fever and diphtheria as regards relationship to tonsillectomy is somewhat surprising in view of the clinical experience which has previously been cited; also in view of recent experimental work in scarlet fever, especially that of G. F. and G. H. Dick (7) and of Dochez (8), which has tended to revive the theory that this disease is analogous to diphtheria in that it is primarily a local infection in which the general symptoms are caused, as in diphtheria, by a toxin produced in the throat.

SUMMARY.

1. Surveys of the white school population of wards 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, and 10 of the city of Baltimore show that the percentages of children having had the tonsils removed varies from approximately 7 per cent at ages 5 and 6 to 19 per cent at ages 13 and 14.

2. A study of a consecutive series of 224 cases of diphtheria of school age and living in the same area of the city showed that only two (0.9 per cent) of the children had had tonsillectomy performed. This is a very much smaller number than would be expected in a sample of this size and age distribution selected at random from the school population. 3. In a sample of 193 cases of scarlet fever in children of school age, 19 (9.8 per cent) were found to have had the tonsils removed prior to attack. This number does not differ significantly from that expected in a random sample of the school population similarly constituted as to age.

CONCLUSIONS.

These results justify the conclusion that, in the area studied, children whose tonsils have been removed are distinctly less liable to diphtheria than those who have not had this operation performed; whereas in scarlet fever no significant difference is shown. General conclusions as to the relationship which tonsillectomy bears to either of these infections, diphtheria or scarlet fever, require more observations in other localities.

RESULTS OF OPERATION FOR ADENOIDS AND ENLARGED TONSILS IN A GROUP OF SCHOOL CHILDREN.

An investigation made to determine the average result of operation for the removal of enlarged tonsils and adenoids has recently been carried out at Leicester, England. In a report on a series of operations on unselected cases done at the school clinic at Leicester,¹ J. Keen, aural surgeon to the Leicester Education Committee, gives the results with regard to the following conditions of the child: Mental condition, symptoms, surgical results, increase in height and weight, and malnutrition. The investigation was begun in July, 1921, and the last child was reexamined in July, 1923. About 600 children were dealt with.

The data used were selected with a view to eliminating the personal element as much as possible, and such terms as "malnourished," "anemic," "debility," "poor physique," etc., that are vague and dependent upon individual judgment, were avoided. Definite weight and height measurements were made for a period before and after operations, and the child's mental progress was ascertained from the teachers. A circular letter was sent to the teachers in which the following four questions were asked:

- (1) Has the child's attendance been regular?
- (2) Is the child retarded in school work?
- (3) Do you find the child deaf?
- (4) Is the child dull, normal, or bright?

One letter of inquiry was sent at the time of the first examination and the second a year later. As a rule the first and second reports were made out by different class teachers who did not know whether the pupil reported on had been operated on or not.

Mental condition.—Complete reports were furnished by the teachers for 666 children. These reports showed an improvement in each particular, as follows:

(1) A reduction of 32 per cent in the number of children whose attendances were *irregular*.

(2) A reduction of 34 per cent in the number of those who were *retarded* in school work.

(3) A reduction of 45 per cent in those appearing *deaf* to the teachers.

(4) A reduction of 23 per cent in the number of those classified as dull.

Symptoms.—While it is noted that observation of symptoms may not be considered important because of the subjective character of the information and because any form of active treatment is likely to be regarded as beneficial, it is stated that in 600 cases for which records were complete, only 4 per cent were said to be not improved under the headings "coughs and colds," "breathing," and "general health." In those cases in which the hearing was impaired (about 50 per cent of the whole), only about 3 per cent were stated to be unchanged. The remaining 96 per cent of the total number were improved.

Surgical results.—No case of excessive scarring interfering with phonation was noted, and vestiges of tonsils remained in only 3 per cent of the cases.

Weight and height.—The weight and height results were tabulated according to sex and age groups 4-13 years and compared with figures given in the Tuxford and Glegg tables for urban districts. For each age group for both boys and girls the percentage of average increase was greater than that given in the tables used for comparison.

Malnutrition.—For determining malnutrition, the Wood standard tables were used, and all children under 10 per cent of the average "right" weight were considered to be suffering from malnutrition. While the objections to such an index were considered, and it was believed that, although the absolute number indicated as malnourished may not necessarily be accurate, the *change* in the ratio of cases before and after treatment would be free from the personal factor and would be of definite value.

It was shown that the number of malnourished children was reduced in every age group. The percentage reduction was 44 in the boys and 41 in the girls. Since the prevailing economic conditions in the homes of these children remained practically the same during the period of the study, it was considered logical to credit the improvement to the removal of the diseased tonsillar and adenoid tissue in the children concerned, in view of the fact that a septic focus or the continuous swallowing of mucus from the nasopharynx delays the assimilation and absorptive capacity of the alimentary canal. The author states that "Wood's standard of malnutrition is a severe one; if the beneficial effect of the operation is so definite among malnourished children, there must be many others (less severely affected and therefore not considered) benefited and improved in a similar consistent manner."

Although the number of children dealt with is comparatively small, unselected cases in a continuous series of routine work were considered; and it is remarked that whether the average increases in height and weight are considered, or whether malnutrition is used as an index, the results point consistently to the conclusion that this operation is followed by clearly definite improvements to the general health and physique, quite apart from the relief which the treatment affords to more local symptoms.

CURRENT WORLD PREVALENCE OF DISEASE.

REVIEW OF THE MONTHLY EPIDEMIOLOGICAL REPORT FOR JUNE 15, 1924, ISSUED BY THE HEALTH SECTION OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS' SECRETARIAT.

The principal points of interest in the world prevalence of disease, as revealed by the June Epidemiological Report of the League of Nations, are cholera in India, malaria in Russia, lethargic encephalitis in Great Britain, and a rather widespread epidemic of measles occurring in many countries of the world.

The Monthly Epidemiological Report of the health section, League of Nations' Secretariat at Geneva, Switzerland, contains current statistics of cases and of deaths, where mortality records are available, for 13 principal diseases ¹ in 69 countries and colonies and over 260 large cities.

Cholera.—The April returns for India indicate a serious increase in the prevalence of cholera and compare very unfavorably with the records for the two previous years, as shown in the following comparative statement:

Deaths from Asiatic cholera in India.

It is pointed out that the 1924 figures are higher even than those for 1921, which was an extraordinarily bad cholera year, 450,000 deaths from cholera having been recorded for the whole of India in that year. The report goes on to say, however, that "it does not follow, by any means, from the high April incidence that the summer will bring the explosive outbreaks which characterize serious cholera epidemics," and attention is invited to the cholera epidemic of 1922 in Southern Russia, where the relatively high incidence in winter and spring did not culminate in a more severe summer epidemic period. The present epidemic in India, which centered in the Ganges Valley, appeared in the United Provinces. Northwestern India, including the Punjab, the northwestern frontier Provinces, and Delhi, so far are free from cholera.

Lethargic encephalitis.—The unprecedented proportions to which the prevalence of lethargic encephalitis has risen in Great Britain is also remarkable, because in all countries save Italy the incidence of diseases has been considerably less in 1924 than in 1923. In Italy there are more cases than there were last year, but to date the

In England and Wales, however, there were 2,736 cases from January 1 to May 24, 1924, as against 660 cases during the same period of 1923, and 1,061 cases for the same period in 1921—the latter hitherto having been the year of highest incidence. The disease appeared first in epidemic form in Lancashire in February and has developed slowly and in an irregular way "like the recent influenza wave," as the report points out, "without being visibly connected with it, in widely separated districts of the British Isles." During the fifth four-week period of 1924, over 1,000 cases were reported. The League of Nations' review of the various comments which have appeared in the British medical journals calls attention to the fact that many cases are of a comparatively mild character and that abortive attacks are frequent. The fatality rate of the present epidemic ranges from 12 to 21 per cent of the notified cases.

Measles.-The widespread prevalence of measles throughout Europe is again commented upon, but no well-defined tendency seems to be manifested. In some countries a decline has set in, and in others indications of a decline may be expected to occur. An improvement in the measles situation in Great Britain was shown for May: but for the four weeks ending May 17, 497 deaths from this disease were registered in 105 large towns of England and Wales. In Denmark there were 4,608 cases of measles, while in Italy the outbreak continued unabated, nearly 9,000 cases having been notified during the four weeks ending May 3. A high mortality from measles in Spain was shown for the first three months of the present year, 865 deaths in all having been recorded. The number of cases of measles reported in France increased from 712 in January to 1,518 in March. Outbreaks have also been reported during the present year in Angora (Turkey) which spread to other Turkish cities, notably Adrianople. In Iraq (Mesopotamia) a considerable mortality from measles was reported in the first quarter of the current year, an improvement being indicated during April. A renewed outbreak of the disease has occurred in Egypt, 160 deaths having been reported during the four weeks ending April 19, against 75 in the previous four weeks. It will be remembered that there was a serious epidemic of measles during the summer of 1923 in Egypt. The widespread prevalence of measles in the United States during the spring is mentioned in the report, as well as the relatively high incidence of the disease in the Canadian Province of Ontario.

Malaria.—As regards malaria in Russia, the Monthly Epidemiological Report does not contain any more recent information than that published in the previous issue, but attention may be directed to the frequent reports appearing in the medical journals, as well as in the press, to the effect that the early information issued by the league health section has been fully borne out and that this year there is a situation in Russia which, so far as known, has been unparalleled. The situation is aggravated by the occurrence of the more severe forms of the disease which apparently found their way into the central and even northern parts of the country by reason of the migrations of the population in 1921 and 1922.

Plaque.-The plague situation, on the whole, is an encouraging one as compared with previous years. In India the number of deaths from the disease is considerably larger than in 1923, but it is far below the average for the period 1898-1922. Furthermore, the outbreak this year is localized largely in the Punjab, where nearly 35,000 out of a total of 53,000 deaths were reported during the four weeks ending April 19. More than half the remaining cases are reported from the United Provinces, and an extension of the plague area is shown in the west frontier provinces lying west of the Punjab. All of the other parts of India, however, show an unusually low prevalence of the disease for April. No immediate developments are reported from Turkestan plague outbreaks, the cases being well confined to a few localities. While several minor outbreaks were reported from various localities in Persia and in Iraq, no new cases have been reported in Syria or in Palestine. In Egypt the disease is much less prevalent this year than in 1923, and the outbreak which occurred in the Union of South Africa seems to have reached its maximum, and no further extension of the infected areas has been reported.

Smallpox.-It is interesting to note that the United States is among the few countries of the world where the prevalence of smallpox is unusually high. In Europe generally, including Russia, the number of cases reported so far this year is less than in 1923; the Swiss outbreak appears to be declining. In Turkey, in Egypt, in Algeria, and in Tunis, in the Union of South Africa, Basutoland, and northern Rhodesia the incidence is relatively low and has shown no marked or alarming increase. In Great Britain the notification of smallpox was again increasing somewhat, 454 cases having been reported during the four weeks ending May 17, as compared with 124 in the same period of 1923 and 199 for the four-weeks period ending February 23. In India the disease is more prevalent within the last year, particularly in Bombay Presidency, where the epidemic reached its maximum in the month of March, with 15,283 cases and 2,210 deaths. A decline, however, for the whole of India has set in since the end of March. The Hongkong epidemic has come to an end, and the outbreak in Japan was apparently declining in March. The Straits Settlements and the Malay States appear to be practically free from smallpox. In this connection it may be pointed out that a summary of weekly reports for 105 cities in the United States for the week ending June 21 shows that 345 cases were reported as against over 500 for the last week in April and the first week in May. The latest figure for the United States cities, however,

is nearly four times as high as the figure for the corresponding week in 1923. In 35 states 895 cases of smallpox were reported for the week ending June 21, 1924.

Other diseases.—No unusual feature is indicated for the other diseases in the list included in the Monthly Epidemiological Reports. The continued decrease of typhus and relapsing fever, the low incidence of dysentery, the passing of the influenza epidemic, the comparatively slight prevalence of poliomyelitis and cerebrospinal meningitis, as well as the absence of any serious outbreaks of scarlet fever, diphtheria, or whooping cough, are favorable indications.

The mortality figures given for the large cities of the world are without any particular feature except, perhaps, for tuberculosis in the German cities. For the four weeks ending April 19, 1924, 2,008 deaths from tuberculosis (all forms) were registered in the 46 cities of Germany (population, 16,681,000), as against 2,792 deaths for the corresponding period of 1923. The decline seems to be somewhat general, although it is shown that in Hamburg 153 deaths were reported, as against 149 in 1923 for the same four-weeks period. The infant mortality rate in these 46 German vities for the same period was 120 per thousand births, as compared with 103 for the 105 English cities. 67 for the 26 Swiss cities, and a rate varying from 65 to 106 for the five large cities in the United States. In Hamburg the rate was 169, and in Munich 151, which were the highest rates for any cities in the list published, with the exception of that for Cracow. The rate for Vienna was 127. The general mortality rate for all of the 260 cities for which statistics are published is comparatively favorable, with the exception of the Indian and Egyptian cities.

CURRENT COURT DECISIONS PERTAINING TO PUBLIC HEALTH.

Liability for serving unwholesome food.—In a tort action to recover damages for illness alleged to have been caused by the consumption of unwholesome food served on a dining car, the Court of Appeals of the District of Columbia in its opinion states as follows:

If the defendant knew that the meat was contaminated, we think no one would say that it should not be held responsible for the consequent damages; but its failure to know does not excuse it, if the failure was due to want of reasonable care in ascertaining the truth. A person may be held, not only for what he knows, but also for what he would have known if he had exercised reasonable care in the premises. 4.4 * We perceive no sound reason why the railroad company should not be held liable to the appellant, if it negligently served to her tainted meat and thereby caused her injury. (King v. Davis, Agent, 296 Fed. 986.)

Status of fees received by local registrar of vital statistics.-The California District Court of Appeals, third district, has held that fees

collected from the county of Sacramento by an official of the city of Sacramento while acting as local registrar of vital statistics are not public moneys belonging to the city. The court states in the opinion that local registrars of vital statistics are State officers performing State functions and that the compensation provided is in no wise connected with any function exercised as a municipal officer. (City of Sacramento v. Simmons, 225 Pac. 36.)

Municipal public-health work held governmental function; nonliability of city for negligence of employee.—The gathering and disposal, by a municipality, of refuse, including ashes, has been held by the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania to be a public-health matter and therefore a public or governmental function within the police power, as contrasted with a private or corporate function. Because of this fact, the court held that a city was not liable for personal injuries caused by the negligence of one of its employees while driving an automobile truck loaded with ashes. (Scibilia v. City of Philadelphia, 124 Atl. 273.)

ANTHRAX-LEFLORE COUNTY, MISS.

Six cases of anthrax with two deaths were reported in Leflore County, Miss., from June 29 to July 16, 1924. Many horses, cattle, and mules are said to have been attacked by the disease.

TYPHUS FEVER IN TEXAS.¹

A telegraphic report from Rio Grande City, Tex., dated July 21, 1924, stated that two new cases of typhus fever had been reported during the preceding week. The disease was said to be mild. The State health officer reported 19 cases for the State during the week ended July 12, 1924.

GENERAL CURRENT SUMMARY AND WEEKLY REPORTS FROM CITIES.

Diphtheria.—For the week ended July 12, 1924, 34 States reported 1,140 cases of diphtheria. For the week ended July 14, 1923, the same States reported 1,088 cases of this disease. One hundred and two cities, situated in all parts of the country and having an aggregate population of more than 28,600,000, reported 687 cases of diphtheria for the week ended July 12, 1924. Last year for the corresponding week they reported 673 cases. The estimated expectancy for these cities was 676 cases. The estimated expectancy was based on the experience of the last nine years, excluding epidemics.

Measles.—Twenty-nine States reported 2,663 cases of measles for the week this year and 4,859 cases for the week last year. One hundred and two cities reported 987 cases of measles for the week this year and 1,473 cases last year.

Scarlet fever.—Scarlet fever was reported for the week as follows: Thirty-four States—this year, 1,205 cases; last year, 1,031 cases. One hundred and two cities—this year, 556 cases; last year, 456 cases; estimated expectancy, 336 cases.

Smallpox.—For the week ended July 12, 1924, 34 States reported 525 cases of smallpox. Last year for the corresponding week they reported 225 cases. One hundred and two cities reported smallpox for the week as follows: 1924, 168 cases; 1923, 71 cases; estimated expectancy, 64 cases. Seven deaths from smallpox were reported for the week by these cities.

Typhoid fever.—Five hundred and fifty-six cases of typhoid fever were reported for the week ended July 12, 1924, by 33 States. For the corresponding week of 1923 the number was 579 cases. One hundred and two cities reported 142 cases of typhoid fever for the week this year and 163 cases for the week last year. The estimated expectancy for these cities was 149 cases.

Influenza and pneumonia.—Deaths from influenza and pneumonia (combined) were reported for the week by 102 cities as follows: 1924, 328 deaths; 1923, 290 deaths.

City reports for week ended July 12, 1924.

The "estimated expectancy" given for diphtheria, poliomyelitis, scarlet fever, smallpox, and typhoid fever is the result of an attempt to ascertain from previous occurrence how many cases of the disease under consideration may be expected to occur during a certain week in the absence of epidemics. It is based on reports to the Public Health Service during the past nine years. It is in most instances the median number of cases reported in the corresponding week of the preceding years. When the reports include several epidemics, or when for other reasons the median is unsatisfactory, the epidemic periods are excluded and the estimated expectancy is the mean number of cases reported for the week during non-epidemic years.

If reports have not been received for the full nine years, data are used for as many years as possible, but no year earlier than 1915 is included. In obtaining the estimated expectancy, the figures are smoothed when necessary to avoid abrupt deviations from the usual trend. For some of the diseases given in the table the available data were not sufficient to make it practicable to compute the estimated expectancy.

Typhoid Fever.

During the same period, typhoid fever was reported to be increasing slowly but steadily. The sanitary department was stated to be taking vigorous measures to check the spread of the disease.

Typhoid Fever-Santiago.

During the week ended July 12, 1924, 15 cases of typhoid fever with 1 death were reported at Santiago, Cuba. The prevalence of the disease was stated to be attributed to inadequate water supply. A number of unreported cases were believed to exist in the city.

EGYPT.

Status of Plague.

During the week ended June 17, 1924, 14 cases of plague, occurring in seven districts, were reported in Egypt, the highest number of cases reported in one district being 5. From January 1 to June 17, 1924, a total of 298 cases was reported, as against 1,036 cases reported for the corresponding period of the preceding year. For the period January 1 to June 26, 1924, the total number of cases reported was 316, with 156 deaths. For distribution of occurrence according to locality during the last named period, see page 1928.

Dysentery-Malaria.

During the period under report 20 cases of dysentery with one death and 71 cases of malaria were reported in Poland.

RUSSIA.

Communicable Diseases-Year 1923.

According to information received under date of May 22, 1924, the official report of health conditions in Russia during the year 1923 shows marked improvement over conditions reported during the the years immediately preceding. Improved conditions as regards typhus fever prevalence were noted. In all Russia there were reported in 1923, 242,890 cases of typhus fever and 258,271 cases of recurrent typhus as against 1,401,145 cases of typhus and 1,446,722 cases of recurrent typhus in the year 1922. The following case rates per 10,000 persons were given for typhus and recurrent typhus for the years 1919, 1920, 1921, 1922, and 1923:

The increase of typhus prevalence, after a diminution in 1921, was attributed to famine conditions and mass migration. The decrease in 1923 was stated to indicate improved living conditions.

Notwithstanding the generally decreased prevalence of typhus fever in Russia, certain regions of the country continued to show high degrees of prevalence in 1923, notably in the Volga and Ural Provinces and oblasts, particularly in the Ural and Votsk oblasts, and in the Bashkir Republic, the Ukraine and Siberia.¹

Cholera.—It was stated that cholera, which in 1918 was widely prevalent, showed only one small outbreak in 1923, occurring at Rostov with about 70 cases. In a number of other localities single cases were reported, and the disease was stated not to have had an epidemic character in any locality.

Typhoid fever.—There were reported during the year 1923, 912 cases of typhoid fever as against 307,951 cases in the preceding year. Dysentery.—There were reported 214,862 cases in the year 1923 as against 290,940 cases in the preceding year.

The decrease noted in intestinal infections indicates that the food supply of the population has improved, including the water supply. Starvation and the eating of food substitutes were stated to be now conditions of the past. These improved conditions explain the decrease in scurvy, of which in 1923 there were registered 47,571 cases as against 131,551 cases in the preceding year. Despite the decrease, intestinal disorders continued to be present in considerable numbers. The sanitary campaign of the near future is indicated to be improvement in the food supply of the people, better water supplies, and improved drainage.

Smallpox.—In 1923 there were registered 44,628 cases of smallpox, or 3.3 out of every 10,000 persons. The frequency of occurrence was stated to have diminished from that of former years and to have approached pre-war rates. Large outbreaks of smallpox were noted in the northern Provinces and oblasts, such as Archangel, North Dvina, the Volga Provinces, the Zyryan Republic, in districts in

which the population was mainly of non-Russian elements, and in Siberia. Vaccination was stated to be carried out in the central Provinces. In the large centers every individual was required to be vaccinated, whereas in the border Provinces the service of smallpox vaccination was stated to be poorly organized.

Scarlet fever.—Low figures have been reported for scarlet fever and diphtheria for a number of years, beginning with the year 1918, but for 1923 these diseases registered an increase. The number of cases of scarlet fever was 108,239 in 1923 as against 66,257 cases in the preceding year; diphtheria increased by 15,000 (47,870 against 32,398).

Influenza.—This disease was stated to have considerably increased, 1,083,016 cases having been reported in 1923 as against 537,520 in 1922.

Anthrax (Siberian plague).—In 1923, 7,081 cases were registered as against 3,904 cases in the preceding year.

Lethargic encephalitis.—The total number of cases of lethargic encephalitis registered in 1923 was 960. The greatest occurrence of the disease was in the Province of Moscow, in the Caucasus (Don Province) and in the Ukraine.

Malaria.—Malaria was stated to have greatly increased throughout the entire Federation, 5,556,856 cases being reported, a case rate of 42 per 1,000 population. In some localities, notably the northern Provinces, the Volga districts, and the Caucasus, malaria assumed very severe forms with a large percentage of deaths. Institutes for tropical medicine to combat the disease were opened in Moscow Kharkov, Erivan, Tiflis, and Bokhara, and over a hundred malarial stations were established. Economic organizations, trade-unions, and insurance organizations participated. Sanitary instruction was conducted on a large scale. A special moving-picture film was issued. Special weeks for malaria work were instituted in some localities, and at Orekhovo-Zuyevo for the destruction of mosquitoes. It is stated that this work will be facilitated by recent legislation which has rendered possible a wider campaign for combating this great health menace of the country.

UNION OF SOUTH AFRICA.

Plague-Orange Free State.

During the week ended June 7, 1924, one case of plague with one death, occurring in a European, was reported in the Orange Free State, Union of South Africa.
