Cape Charles Quarantine.

The following dispatches have been received from Acting Assistant Surgeon Clarkson, in charge of Cape Charles quarantine station :

August 22, 1891.—British steamship *Chittagong*, 9 days from Vera Cruz, 1 seaman with fever, claimed to be malarial; diagnosis not positive; vessel held for observation and disinfection.

August 24, 1891.—Master British steamship *Chittagong*, after 2 days quarantine, receiving orders for Baltimore, claimed privilege of local quarantine and left for Baltimore, under my protest, after fumigation.

The health commissioner at Baltimore, being notified as above, by telegram from this Bureau, replied as follows, August 24 :

Steamship *Chittagong* arrived at quarantine at 8 a. m. to-day, and has been detained to await further developments.

Gulf quarantine.

The following reports, under dates prefixed, have been received from Surgeon R. D. Murray, in command :

August 15, 1891.—A case of yellow fever developed this day, in the person of a sailor of the French ship *Emil Postel*, from Vera Cruz via Pensacola, which vessel arrived at this station on the 8th instant. The man had been working in the hold, discharging sand ballast, and it is presumed the *focus* of infection is in the ballast.

The patient has been brought ashore and isolated.

August 19.—Two more cases of yellow fever developed this day, in the persons of a seaman and a cabin boy of the French ship *Emil Postel*, from Vera Cruz via Pensacola. The patients have been brought ashore and isolated.

I would state that this vessel received clean bills of health from the Mexican authorities and French consul at Vera Cruz, while the American consul issued a foul bill to her.

August 20.—Another case of yellow fever developed this evening, in the person of a seaman belonging to the French ship *Emil Postel*. The patient has been brought ashore and isolated.

Final report on the case of lupus under treatment with tuberculin.

The medical officer in command at Cincinnati, under date of August 20, reports as follows :

I have the honor to inform you that the use of tuberculin has been discontinued in the case of lupus of 17 years' standing, transferred from Washington, D. C., to this station, for a continuation of treatment with tuberculin commenced by Assistant Surgeon Geddings, February 11, 1891. The destruction of tissue by advancing ulceration and sloughing was more marked in the last fortnight of treatment than at any time during the entire period of the existence of the disease. In view of the condition of the lupus patch it was deemed advisable to abandon the use of tuberculin. * * *

Reports of States, yearly and monthly reports of cities.

CALIFORNIA.—Reports to the State board of health from 66 cities and towns, having an aggregate population of 695,866, show a total of 1,096 deaths, including phthisis pulmonalis, 141; enteric fever, 38; diphtheria, 34; scarlet fever, 5; measles, 7; croup, 10; and whooping cough, 5.

MASSACHUSETTS—*Worcester*.—Month of July, 1891. Population, 84,655. Total deaths, 147, including phthisis pulmonalis, 3; enteric fever, 1; diphtheria, 1; and measles, 1.

MICHIGAN.—Week ended August 15, 1891. Reports to the State board of health, Lansing, from 60 observers, indicate that diphtheria, typho-malarial fever and cerebro-spinal meningitis increased, and that inflammation of brain, pneumonia, tonsillitis, typhoid fever, scarlet fever, and inflammation of bowels decreased in area of prevalence.

Diphtheria was reported present during the week at 27 places, scarlet fever at 33 places, enteric fever at 25 places, and measles at 10 places.

MISSOURI—*Kansas City*.—Month of July, 1891. Population, 132,716. Total deaths, 168, including phthisis pulmonalis, 22; enteric fever, 5; and whooping cough, 2.

OHIO—*Cleveland*.—Month of July, 1891. Population, 261,353. Total deaths, 645, including phthisis pulmonalis, 27; enteric fever, 20; diphtheria, 19; croup, 6; and whooping cough, 6.

FOREIGN.

(Reports received through the Department of State and other channels.)

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales.*—The deaths registered in 28 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended August 8 corresponded to an annual rate of 19.1 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 9,405,108. The lowest rate was recorded in Portsmouth, viz, 14.0, and the highest in Preston, viz, 30.9 a thousand. Diphtheria caused 2 deaths in Manchester, 2 in Sheffield, and 3 in Salford.

London.—One thousand six hundred and forty-six deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 29; scarlet fever, 5; diphtheria, 24; whooping cough, 38; enteric fever, 7; and diarrhoea and dysentery, 247. The deaths from all causes corresponded to an annual rate of 20.3 a thousand. Diseases of the respiratory organs caused 191 deaths. In greater London 1,992 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 18.4 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included whooping cough, 11, and diphtheria, 9.

Newcastle-upon-Tyne.—Two weeks ended August 1, 1891. Population, 186,500. Total deaths, 132, including 1 from scarlet fever.

Sunderland.—Two weeks ended July 25, 1891. Population, 131,302. Total deaths, 111, including 2 from scarlet fever.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended August 8, in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland, was 15.8 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Armagh, viz, 6.3, and the highest in Waterford, viz, 24.0 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 113 deaths were registered, including influenza, 1; enteric fever, 1; and whooping cough, 4.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended August 8 corresponded to an annual rate of 15.9 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,338,314. The lowest mortality was recorded in Leith, viz, 8.9, and the highest in Paisley, viz, 19.5 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 410, including measles, 7; scarlet fever, 5; diphtheria, 3; whooping cough, 14; fever, 2; and diarrhoea, 19.

INDIA—*Singapore.*—Month of June, 1891. Total deaths, 548, including smallpox, 2; fevers, 167; and beri-beri, 30.

Malta and Gozo.—Four weeks ended July 15, 1891. Total deaths, 503, including 9 from enteric fever.

MEXICO—*Guaymas*.—Month of July, 1891. Population, 6,600. Total deaths, 30. No deaths from contagious diseases.

NEW ZEALAND.—Month of May, 1891. Reports to the registrar general from the 4 principal cities and towns having an aggregate population of 97,981 show a total of 93 deaths, including phthisis pulmonalis, 11; enteric fever, 4; diphtheria, 2; influenza, 1; and whooping-cough, 5.

RUSSIA—*Moscow*.—Month of May, 1891. Population, 753,469. Total deaths, 2,523, including phthisis pulmonalis, 338; enteric fever, 19; scarlet fever, 13; diphtheria, 44; smallpox, 7; croup, 4; whooping-cough, 3.

SAINT HELENA.—Four weeks ended July 10, 1891. Population, 3,900. Total deaths, 6, including 1 from enteric fever.

TURKEY IN ASIA—*Aleppo*.—*Cholera*.—The United States consul at Beirut, under dates of July 22 and 29, reports 234 deaths from cholera during the two weeks ended July 29, 1891.

WEST INDIES—*St. Thomas*.—Quarter ended June 30, 1891. Total deaths, 97, including phthisis pulmonalis, 13.

Trinidad.—Three weeks ended August 1, 1891. Population, 189,566. Total deaths, 99. No deaths from contagious diseases:
