Smallpox at Nashville.

NASHVILLE, January 14, 1894.—SIR: I have the honor to report 2 new cases of smallpox. These, as well as the 5 previously reported, have been properly isolated, and are doing well. City authorities have ordered general vaccination, which was begun yesterday.—RICHARD DOUGLAS, Acting Assistant Surgeon, M. H. S.

### Smallpox in Pennsylvania.

PHILADELPHIA, January 11, 1893.—The Reading, Berks County, board of health reports that 7 new cases of smallpox occurred in that city during the two weeks ended January 9, 1894, making a total of 710 cases in that city to date with 18 deaths. Twenty-nine cases remain under treatment in the emergency hospital. There are now no houses under quarantine. Cases are also reported in Berks County at Fritztown, West Leesport, and Gibraltar, and at Friedensburg, Schuylkill County. Two new cases are reported at Mechanicsburg, Cumberland County, making a total of 10 in that borough with 1 death to date. One case also exists at Carlisle, Cumberland County, and 2 at Willow Grove, Allegheny County.—Benjamin Lee, M. D., Secretary, State Board of Health of Pennsylvania.

# Senegal free from cholera.

U. S. CONSULATE, Goree-Dakar, December 19, 1893.

SIR: The colony of Senegal has been declared free from the epidemic of cholera, and clean bills of health are given in all the ports. The sanitary state of the colony is, in general, very satisfactory.

### Smallpox in Havana.

HAVANA, CUBA, January 8, 1894.

SIR: Referring to my cablegram of the 6th instant, in which I stated that smallpox was increasing in Havana and adjacent towns, I have now the honor to inform you that there are 15 cases of the disease in the military hospital, and although no reports whatever are made of the cases in the city itself, I am confident that 25 or more exist in different parts of its limits.

In the outlying towns there are cases, particularly at a watering place 5 or 6 miles from here, called Santa Maria del Rosario, and on the whole the disease is believed to be increasing, notwithstanding vaccination is

being performed to some extent.

On Friday, 5th instant, when we went aboard the American schooner Angie L. Green, to inspect her as well as the officers and crew, for a bill of health for Pensacola, one of her negro sailors was found to be developing smallpox. He was sent ashore, the remainder of the persons vaccinated, and the forecastle and different compartments of the vessel were fumigated with strong dioxide of sulphur, and the schooner left for Pensacola. This vessel discharged at Tallapiedra wharf near the mili-

tary hospital.

As smallpox may be found in any part of the city, especially in the more unsanitary portions of it, and may exist in any of the suburban towns, our consul-general agrees with me that cigar-makers as well as their families, also second cabin passengers generally, should give evidence of immunity from the disease or be vaccinated before they take their passage. This is regarded as particularly important for the protection of that part of the United States which lies as near Havana as Florida does. Tourists and first class passengers usually are well vaccinated; moreover, they stop at first class hotels in healthy parts of the town.

Smallpox is being constantly brought here by steamers from northern Spain, as I have told you in former communications, and I am informed that health officers of ports on this island regard the disease substantially as an endemic, thus practically permitting the sick to go where they like and in any way they choose, and the other passengers, as well as officers and crew of the vessel, are placed under no restrictions whatever.

# Report of cholera.

Under date of December 16, 1893, the U. S. consul at Sivas writes as follows: "The official report gives 6 deaths from cholera at Amassia during the last two weeks. I think the number should be considerably larger. The rate of death at Trebizond from cholera is officially stated to be about 15 per day."

ARGENTINE REPUBLIC—Buenos Ayres.—Month of October, 1893. Population, 575,587. Total deaths, 1,238, including smallpox, 1; enteric fever, 10; scarlet fever, 7; diphtheria, 54; and measles, 7.

Brazil—Ceara.—Month of November, 1893. Population, 40,379. Total deaths, 97, including measles, 2; and whooping cough, 2.

Canada—Nova Scotia—Windsor.—Month of December, 1893. Population, 2,750. Total deaths, 4, including 3 from phthisis pulmonalis. Cuba—Nuevitas.—Month of December, 1893. Population, 4,056. Total deaths, 6. No deaths from contagious diseases.

FRANCE—Lille.—Month of November, 1893. Population, 200,329. Total deaths, 373, including enteric fever, 2; diphtheria, 8; and whooping cough, 2.

St. Etienne.—Two weeks ended December 20, 1893. Population, 133,443. Total deaths, 126, including enteric fever, 2, and diphtheria, 2.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended December 30 corresponded to an annual rate of 22.6 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,327,846. The lowest rate was recorded in Preston, viz, 15.6, and the highest in Plymouth, viz, 49.3 a thousand.

London.—One thousand nine hundred and twenty deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 49; scarlet fever, 27; diphtheria, 79; whooping cough, 67; enteric fever, 17; and diarrhea and dysentery, 7. The deaths from all causes corresponded to an annual rate of 27.4 a thousand. In greater London 2,480 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 22.1 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included diphtheria, 12; whooping cough, 22; scarlet fever, 10; and measles, 6.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended December 30 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 33.5 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Lisburn, viz, 8.5, and the highest in Wexford, viz, 90.3 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 247 deaths were registered, including scarlet fever, 2; measles, 2; whooping cough, 6; and enteric fever, 6.

Hull.—Four weeks ended December 16, 1893. Population, 208,639. Total deaths, 435, including enteric fever, 9; scarlet fever, 3; diphtheria, 5; and whooping cough, 18.

RUSSIA—Riga.—Month of October, 1893. Population, 215,000. Total deaths, 451, including phthisis pulmonalis, 46; enteric fever, 7; smallpox, 3; scarlet fever, 17; diphtheria, 4; "cramps," 26; measles, 15; croup, 2; and whooping cough, 12.

Turkey—Constantinople.—Month of November, 1893. Total deaths, 1,396, including cholera, 303; and smallpox, 9.
