Smallpox in Wisconsin.

MILWAUKEE, *September 24, 1894.*

SIR: I have the honor to report that since my last communication, September 10, the following concerning smallpox in this State has been reported to this office: Dover, Racine County, 1 case; La Crosse, La Crosse County, 1 case; Wauwatosa, Milwaukee County, 9 cases, 2 fatal; Milwaukee, Milwaukee County, 79 cases, 14 fatal; Two Rivers, Manitowoc County, 2 cases; total number of cases reported in Milwaukee since the outbreak of January last, 315, of which there were fatal, 74; total number of cases now existing in the city of Milwaukee, Milwaukee County, 103; total number of cases reported in the State since the outbreak, 427, of which there were fatal, 107.

ILLINOIS—Chicago.—Month of August, 1894. Estimated population, 1,600,000. Total deaths, 2,252, including phthisis pulmonalis, 185; enteric fever, 52; scarlet fever, 19; smallpox, 53; diphtheria, 55; croup, 33; measles, 17; and whooping cough, 35.

MICHIGAN.—Week ended September 22, 1894. Reports to the State board of health from 64 observers indicate that inflammation of bowels and cholera infantum in increased in area of prevalence. Phthisis pulmonalis was reported present during the week at 237 places, enteric fever at 64, scarlet fever at 32, diphtheria at 30, measles at 4, and smallpox at 2 places—Detroit and Rivers Township.

MINNESOTA—St. Paul.—Month of August, 1894. Estimated population, 155,000. Total deaths, 149, including phthisis pulmonalis, 8; enteric fever, 4; scarlet fever, 1; diphtheria, 1; and whooping cough, 4.

NORTH CAROLINA.—Month of August. Reports to the State board of health from 30 towns having an aggregate population of 146,654—white, 86,750; colored, 59,904—show a total of 187 deaths; white, 93; colored, 94; including phthisis pulmonalis, 19; enteric fever, 17; diphtheria, 3; and measles, 1.

VIRGINIA—*Petersburg*.—Month ended September 26, 1894. Estimated population, white, 12,000; colored, 13,000; total, 25,000. Deaths, white, 18; colored, 42; total, 60, including phthisis pulmonalis, 7; enteric fever, 2; and whooping cough, 2.

Status of cholera in Europe and Asia.

LONDON, September 16, 1894.

SIR : I have the honor to submit the following report on the progress of cholera in Europe and Asia for the period from September 5 to 12, with later intelligence to include September 15. The epidemic has increased slightly in Germany and considerably in Austria-Hungary; elsewhere it appears about the same as last week. The intelligence from France, as usual, is unreliable.

Germany.—In the German Empire, between September 3 and 10, the following cases and deaths were reported :

East Prussia : 5 cases and 3 deaths. These cases were distributed as follows : In Winkenhagen, district of Mohrungen, 3 cases and 2 deaths. In some small places of the districts of Labiau and Allenstein, together, 2 cases and 1 death.

District of the Vistula : 17 cases and 4 deaths. These were in the following places : Stutthoff, district of Dantzig, 1 case ; Tollkmit, district of Elbing, 2 cases and 1 death. In Tiegenhof and in Platenhof, district of Marienburg, together, 10 cases and 1 death. In Thorn, 2 cases and 1 death. In Mocker, district of Thorn, 1 case, and a small place in the district of Briesen, 1 case and 1 death.

District of Netze Warthe : 3 cases and 3 deaths, as follows : Nakel, 2 cases and 2 deaths, and Usch, district of Kolmar, 1 case and 1 death.

District of the Oder : 1 case and 1 death occurring in a small place in the district of Königsberg. District of Oberschlesien, 1 case and 1 death, occurring in a small place in the district of Kattowitz.

District of the Elbe : 2 cases and 2 deaths, as follows : 1 case and 1 death in Torgan, and the same in Charlottenburg ; both cases were in the persons of boatmen, the man at Torgan having come from Stettin, in the Netze Warthe district, where he probably received the infection.

District of Hesse-Naassau : 4 cases and 1 death occurring in Burgeln, district of Marburg.

Province of the Rhine : 3 cases in Aix la Chapelle. These cases most probably originated from a beggar woman who came with the infection from the Netherlands.

The following was reported at Berlin, September 10 : 10 fresh cases of cholera are reported from Kattowitz, in Silesia. In consequence of the spread of the disease, it is stated that a request has been addressed to the Government to give orders for the complete closing of the frontier.

Berlin, September 11 : 15 cases of cholera, 4 of them fatal, have been officially reported in the village of Grieslienen in East Prussia.

Berlin, September 13 : To-day, fresh cases of cholera are reported from Breslau, Thorn, Laurahütte, and Mysłowitz. In consequence of the spread of the cholera in eastern Germany, the frontier of the district of Marienwerder has been closed against traffic from Russia, except at Ottlotschin for railway passengers and at Schilno for water traffic. Further, the Russian dealers have been prohibited from visiting, as usual, the weekly market in Posen. Two more fatal cases occurred a few days ago at Duisburg, on the Rhine, on board a vessel from Rotterdam.

Berlin, September 15 : Prof. Pfeiffer, of the German Imperial office of health, has been sent to Upper Silesia to ascertain the progress of the cholera there. The epidemic in that province is, in reality, considerably more severe than appears from the official reports. A death from cholera has just occurred in the city of Breslau.

Austria-Hungary.—In Galicia there were reported, between August 27 and September 2, 1,508 cases and 749 deaths. In Bukowina, for the same period, 144 cases and 62 deaths. The total number of cases reported since the beginning of the epidemic has been 5,367 cases and 2,693 deaths. In Bukowina, for the same period, 591 cases and 307 deaths. One case of cholera was treated in the hospital at Dzieditz, in Silesia, a girl who was taken ill while traveling from Cracow to Ellgoth.

Vienna, September 9: The epidemic in Galicia has extended to three further districts, which have up to the present been free from the disease. One of these immediately joins that in which the chief town of the province is situated. Exactly half of the departments into which Galicia is divided are now affected. According to the latest report, there were, on September 7, 146 cases and 70 deaths. In the Bukowina the number was 23, with 10 deaths.

Vienna, September 10: The last official cholera bulletin embraces three days. In that time there occurred in Galicia and Bukowina 533 fresh cases and 304 deaths. The fatalities were, therefore, about 60 per cent of the number of attacks.

To-day, for the first time, 8 cases and 4 deaths are reported to have occurred in the city of Lemberg, where the Austrian Emperor is now on a visit to the exhibition.

Vienna, September 12: Two further deaths are reported from the Lemberg district, in Galicia, the total number of cases in the province being 118, with 75 deaths. In the Bukowina there were 12 cases and 4 deaths.

Vienna, September 13: The number of cholera cases is constantly on the increase in Galicia and Bukowina. This morning's report for the previous twenty-four hours announces 200 new attacks and 133 deaths in that interval. This includes 3 fatal cases in the town of Lemberg, among the civil population, but there have also been deaths among the troops of the garrison. The malady has now made its appearance in the county of Pressburg, in Hungary.

Italy.—On August 31, it was reported that 1 case of cholera had occurred at Procida, in the province of Naples.

Belgium.—The number of deaths from cholera in the province of Liege, registered between August 19 and 25, was 56. Other cases were reported at Chatelineau, province of Hainault, Lanaeken, and Neupelt, province of Lemberg, and Spotin, province of Namur, each 1 case.

Brussels, September 13: The Journal de Bruxelles announces that the cholera epidemic at Liege shows a recrudescence, 15 fresh cases and several deaths having occurred there yesterday.

Netherlands.—Between August 30 and September 3 there were reported at Maestricht 4 cases only. In the neighborhood of Maestricht and the Belgian frontier, 1 death at Hengun, and 1 case at Elsloo. Of the cases just given, 2 were in the army. Another fatal case occurred at Goch, in the west of Boxmeer.

In Smilde, in the province of Drenthe, 1 doubtful case was reported. Within several hours' distance by rail from Rotterdam, at a place called Leck, 1 suspected death occurred, a brickmaker. Several other cases were reported in the west coast district. The infected English schooner, before reported at Flushing, sailed, leaving 1 of the crew ill at the hospital. In Spykenisse, southwest of Rotterdam, there were 4 cases reported, 2 of which were fatal. In Amsterdam, up to September 1, there had been 51 cases. In Landsmeer, north of Amsterdam, there were 3 cases and 2 deaths.

Amsterdam, September 8: To-day's official cholera bulletin reports 2 cases and 1 death at Amsterdam, 1 death at Maestricht, 3 cases and 1 death at Papendrecht, 1 death at Nieuwerkerk, on the Yssel, and at Jutfaas, and 1 case at Burgerveen.

September 9: At Haarlemmermeer 1 case of cholera has occurred, and 1 death is reported from Kuilenburg and from Jutfaas.

September 10: The official cholera bulletin to-day reports 1 case and 1 death each at Amsterdam and Maestricht.

September 11: The cholera bulletin to-day reports 1 death from the disease at Papendrecht and 1 case at Wykermeer.

Under date of September 8, Edward Downes, esq., consul of the United States at Amsterdam, furnishes the following information: Between August 29 and September 8, at Amsterdam, there were 14 cases of cholera, with 3 deaths. Outside of this city the following cases were reported: Landsmeer, 3; Barsingerhorn and Harlemermeer, each 1.

St. Petersburg, September 10: The cholera is still raging severely in many parts of Russia. According to the latest official bulletin, 146 cases and 101 deaths occurred in the capital from the 1st to the 7th instant. From August 26 to September 1, there were 607 cases and 359 deaths in the government of Petrikau, 289 cases and 114 deaths in the government of St. Petersburg, 229 cases and 109 deaths in the government of Novgorod, and 1,126 cases and 527 deaths in other parts of the country. In the period between August 19 and September 1, 1,333 cases and 640 deaths occurred in the government of Warsaw, and from August 19 to 25, 1,017 cases and 571 deaths in the government of Kielce, and 718 cases and 360 deaths in the Government of Radom.

Turkey.—In the city of Adrianople, from August 11 to 23, there were reported 56 cases of cholera and 45 deaths; of these, 13 cases and 9 deaths occurred among the garrison. In Mustapha Pacha, from August 11 to 19, there were 12 cases and 6 deaths. In Tzokia, on August 22, 1 case was reported.

Asia Minor.—In the villayets of Hudavendkiar (Broussa), from August 7 to 19, there were 180 cases and 100 deaths. In Kastamouni, from August 7 to 20, 13 cases and 10 deaths. In Sivas, from August 5 to 12,

63 cases and 26 deaths. In Angora, from August 5 to 24, 159 cases and 92 deaths. In Kouia, from August 1 to 22, 111 cases and 57 deaths. In Marmuret-el-Aziz, from August 7 to 18, 189 cases and 56 deaths.

Constantinople, September 12: On account of the outbreak of cholera at Broussa, the porte desired to impose on all arrivals from that place a quarantine of ten days, to be carried out at Tonzla. The foreign members of the sanitary board refused, however, to agree to this, as there is no lazaretto at Tonzla, and the Turkish Government has consequently given directions that no arrivals from Broussa shall be allowed to enter Constantinople.

East India.—In Calcutta, between July 29 and August 4, there were 23 deaths from cholera.

The following extract from the Times of September 12 relating to the epidemic at Lucknow and to the experiments of Haffkine are of special interest at this time:

During the recent cholera epidemic at Lucknow several men of the East Lancashire Regiment who were inoculated with Dr. Haffkine's protective virus were attacked, and the proportion of fatal cases among them was about the same as among the noninoculated patients. This is directly contrary to Calcutta experience, but all the facts regarding the Lucknow epidemic are not yet sufficiently known to justify a condemnation of Dr. Haffkine's experiment.

A later dispatch on the same subject appeared in the Times on the following day, as follows:

Fuller details which have been recently received of the cholera epidemic in the East Lancashire Regiment at Lucknow tend to show that the supposed failure of protective inoculation was more apparent than real. The epidemic was of an exceptionally severe type, while the conditions under which Dr. Haffkine made his inoculations there last year were somewhat unfavorable, as there were no arrangements to keep the vaccine in full strength, and it is certain that the vaccine used was much weaker than the strength of the epidemic required. Moreover, it is doubtful whether the figures which were originally furnished were correct, and the revised figures show a death rate considerably lower among inoculated than among noninoculated patients.

Some very valuable evidence in favor of Dr. Haffkine's method was obtained lately during the severe epidemic in the Gya jail. Experience proves the necessity of keeping the vaccine matter fixed at the highest strength, and attempts are now being made to introduce modifications, with a view to lessening the period of ten days required for its full protective effect.

Burmah.—Rangoon, September 9: The cholera has broken out in Mandalay jail, and 13 cases and 7 deaths are reported. The jail population is being reduced by moving the prisoners condemned to short terms into two Government vessels moored in the river.

QUARANTINE NOTICES.

Lisbon, September 8: Quarantine on arrivals from province of Liege; declared to be infected with cholera.

Sofia, September 10: Commercial travelers, arriving by sea from Russia direct at Bourgas and Varna subjected to strict medical inspection, with disinfection of luggage, and subject further to five days' medical observation at domicile.

Athens, September 10: Forty-eight hours' quarantine against Naples.

Cyprus, September 12: Five days' quarantine on arrivals from Alexandria to Beirut, excluding the latter place, and medical inspection of arrivals at Beirut and the coast south thereof.

Belfast, September 12: The schooner *Volunteer*, of Fowey, from Antwerp for Belfast, arrived in the Lough yesterday, and was placed in quarantine, being infected with Asiatic cholera.

Madrid, September 13: An official decree will be gazetted to-morrow declaring arrivals from Dordrecht to be infected by cholera.

Cyprus, September 13: Ten days' quarantine on arrivals from Marmaritza to Cape Cavaliere, inclusive.

Lisbon, September 13: Dordrecht declared infected with cholera from September 1. September 14: Haarlem free from cholera from September 6.

AUSTRIA-HUNGARY.

Cholera in Galicia and Bukowina.

VIENNA, AUSTRIA, September 5, 1894.

SIR: Respectfully referring to my dispatch, dated August 17, I have the honor to submit the following facts:

The official cholera reports only give the total number of cases and deaths of cholera for each political district without mentioning the name of the infected communes; cholera has become epidemic in two large districts in Galicia and Bukowina. The western part embraces 16 district captaincies and extends from the Silesia-Galician frontier to the line of demarcation. The cholera infected places in Silesia are right on the border of the above district. The eastern district embraces 17 Galician and 7 Bukowinan captaincies. During the last twenty-four hours 10 fatal cases were reported in the western district and 110 in the eastern.

The 4 following districts show the highest death rate for the twenty-four hours: Buczacz, 25 deaths; Tlumacz, 21 deaths; Stanislaw, 11 deaths; Horodenka, 11 deaths.

During the week ending August 28 there were 1,057 new cases and 544 deaths of cholera in Galicia and 144 cases and 79 deaths in Bukowina.

Since the beginning of the disease, April 7, there occurred 3,759 cases and 1,924 deaths in Galicia, 447 cases and 245 deaths in Bukowina, and 4 cases and 2 deaths in Silesia.

CUBA.

Yellow fever at Santiago.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, September 22, 1894.

SIR: Yellow fever has prevailed in this city for the last two months with more or less intensity, and I have on my notes the record of about 63 cases, causing about 25 deaths.

Yellow fever is also prevalent at the Quragua iron mines, where the ore is extracted and shipped for the United States on board the Earn line of steamers, averaging about 8 or 10 boats monthly. The mines are about 18 kilometers from the wharf where the ore is shipped, and in constant communication by railway with the mines. For the week ending September 22, we have 3 deaths and 12 cases of yellow fever on record. Diphtheria has caused 1 death and typhoid fever another. Deaths from different diseases 17.

*Cholera at Stettin.*STETTIN, *September 1, 1894.*

SIR: In confirming my dispatch of yesterday, I beg to state that 2 of the cases of Asiatic cholera mentioned therein have proved fatal. There is still 1 other case under treatment, but recovery is unlooked for. Thus far to date no other cases have been reported.

The cases above mentioned are river raftsmen, and have come to Stettin from the upper country, carrying the dreadful disease with them. As far as the city of Stettin is concerned, it is free from the disease.

*Cholera in Silesia.*BRESLAU, *September 12, 1894.*

SIR: I have the honor to report as follows on the condition of cholera in Upper Silesia for the information of the Surgeon-General of the Marine-Hospital Service:

The disease is still confined to the small border district which includes the towns and villages of Myslowitz, Laurahütte, Hohenlohehütte, Siemianowitz, and Josefsdorf-Domb, with the exception of 1 case which has occurred at Zabras, a town a short distance west of the previously mentioned localities.

The number of cases in this border district is slightly increasing day by day, and, to quote the statement of one of the newspapers—

While no immediate danger of its further spreading exists, it is, on the other hand, to be feared that it will not speedily subside in the places already affected.

A telegram of yesterday states that the borders have been completely closed, and mention is made of a large party of Polish laborers who were turned back to Galicia under police escort. The utmost precautions are being exercised, and the poor are supplied at request, and free of charge, with disinfectants.

For the past week the weather has been considerably colder, which gives a prospect of the disease being checked by natural causes.

*Relative to the spread of cholera in Europe.*MUNICH, *September 14, 1894.*

SIR: I have the honor to transmit for your information the following notes on the cholera situation in Europe: On my arrival in Budapest I immediately called on our consul for any information which he might have concerning the cholera in Galicia. I was informed that no information had come to him through the official channels, and it was his belief that the disease was making no headway towards Hungary.

During the sessions of the Congress of Hygiene and Demography I

was fortunate to make the acquaintance of several physicians from or near the infected districts. The information obtained was to this effect: Cholera was prevailing to an alarming extent in Russian Poland (a fact which has before this been brought to your notice), and that the epidemic was on a westward march in Galicia. Prof. Loeffler, I learned, was summoned to Breslau on September 8 on account of several suspicious cases having occurred in that city during the few days prior to the date above mentioned. Cholera has also been reported at or near Marburg, and also exists in northwestern Prussia. Hamburg and Bremen are still free from any suspicion, but one of the officers of these cities informed me that he was under promise to return just as soon as any suspicious case occurred, and as none had been reported, it was safe to say that there was no trouble. In Budapest and Vienna there is an apprehension that cholera may at any moment make its appearance. All cases of severe diarrheas are required to be returned and bacteriological examination made. So far, those cases which have occurred have proven to be cholera nostras. Both cities are in a better condition to cope with the disease than they were last year. Prague and Munich are both free, so I am informed by those whose duty it is to make the bacteriological examination and report the same to the Government.

I am informed that there is little or no emigration from Bohemia or Bavaria. Some is from Croatia and the adjacent country, and this goes to Bremen or Hamburg via Prague. There are many reasons why the cholera has not become more widely disseminated than it is. The chief among these are little or no emigration, and that the disease is confined almost entirely to the rural districts among the farming classes, etc.

Quarantine regulations with regard to the plague.

BANGKOK, August 14, 1894.

SIR: I have the honor of inclosing a copy of quarantine orders issued by the Siamese Government to protect Bangkok from the bubonic plague at Hongkong.

I regard this as a matter of interest to the Department, because this action was taken largely as result of the agitation and recommendation of the foreign representatives.

We met and urged that immediate steps be taken, as the shipping exchange between Hongkong and Bangkok is very extensive, and as the Siamese authorities were apparently establishing no quarantine regulations for the city's safety. Once let a plague become well started in Bangkok, and it would run a long and destructive course.

In our discussions I had the honor of describing and commenting in detail upon the excellent quarantine laws of the United States, which were highly commended by the other foreign representatives.

LOCAL QUARANTINE REGULATIONS—PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT, BANGKOK.

[Copy of translation as furnished by the Siamese official himself.]

Temporary instructions to official doctor with regard to measures to be taken with vessels infected with the epidemic known as the bubonic plague.

1. Every vessel arriving at Paknam should be boarded by the official doctor, who shall thoroughly examine all passengers and crews as to whether any one of them is suffering from the plague or not.

2. If a case of the plague is detected on board of any vessel, orders should be immediately given her to clear from Paknam and to proceed en route to Koh Phai, an island opposite Bang Phra, where she must be quarantined until such time as the doctor shall think fit to admit her to free pratique.

3. Whenever any vessel is found to be infected, or any of the passengers and crew on board to be attacked by the plague, the matter should be at once reported to the public health department and also to the consular officer under whose jurisdiction the vessel belonged.

4. Susceptible articles on board of any vessel with or without the plague should invariably be subjected to fumigation or purification, unless it is deemed unnecessary by the doctor.

5. If a passenger or a crew of any vessel is ill, and being thereby suspected of having the plague, that vessel may be detained until such time as the doctor shall be able to ascertain the nature of the illness.

TURKEY.

Cholera in Constantinople.

The Department of State was officially notified by cable, on October 2, 1894, that cholera had appeared in Constantinople.

PROMULGATION OF FOREIGN QUARANTINE REGULATIONS.

Official notification has been received that the quarantine regulations made by the Secretary of the Treasury have been posted in the offices of the U. S. consuls at the following-named ports for ten days: Bagdad, Bangkok, Beila, Caldera, Portsmouth, and Port Stanley.

STATISTICAL REPORTS.

AFRICA—*Mozambique*.—Month of July, 1894. Population, 12,000. Total deaths, 23, including 1 from measles.

FRANCE—*Rouen*.—Month of August, 1894. Population, 111,847. Total deaths, 265, including smallpox, 3, enteric fever, 2; scarlet fever, 1; diphtheria, 3; measles, 3; and whooping cough, 5.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales*.—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended September 15 corresponded to an annual rate of 15.9 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,458,442. The lowest rate was recorded in Nottingham, viz, 12.1, and the highest in Sunderland, viz, 24.5 a thousand.

London.—One thousand two hundred and forty-one deaths were registered during the week, including smallpox, 3; measles, 9; scarlet fever, 15; diphtheria, 55; whooping cough, 20; enteric fever, 10; and diarrhea and dysentery, 62. The deaths from all causes corresponded to an

annual rate of 14·7 a thousand. In greater London 1,598 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 14·0 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 12 from diphtheria.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended September 15 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 20·4 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Drogheda, viz, 4·4, and the highest in Lisburn, viz, 46·8 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 146 deaths were registered, including 2 from enteric fever, 3 from scarlet fever, and 2 from smallpox.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended September 15 corresponded to an annual rate of 15·5 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,447,500. The lowest mortality was recorded in Leith, viz, 10·8, and the highest in Greenock, viz, 24·2 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 442, including smallpox, 2; measles, 2; scarlet fever, 11; diphtheria, 10; and whooping cough, 5.

RUSSIA—Riga.—Month of July, 1894. Estimated population, 215,000. Total deaths, 361, including enteric fever, 6; scarlet fever, 6; diphtheria, 4; croup, 2; measles, 4; and whooping cough, 2.

SPAIN—Barcelona.—Month of July, 1894. Estimated population, 318,000. Total deaths, 592, including phthisis pulmonalis, 100; smallpox, 11; enteric fever, 24; and diphtheria, 14.

SWITZERLAND—Lucerne.—Month of August, 1894. Population, 22,000. Total deaths, 32. No deaths from contagious diseases.
