One case of smallpox on the steamship Kronprinz Frederick Wilhelm.

NEW YORK, October 16, 1894.

SIR: I have the honor to report that the North German Lloyd steamship *Kronprinz Frederick Wilhelm* is detained in quarantine at this port on account of a case of smallpox having been discovered among her steerage passengers.

The vessel arrived Sunday night, and although the ship's surgeon declared there had been no sickness on board and that all the passengers were in good health, Deputy Health Officer Talmadge was suspicious of a case which the ship's surgeon pronounced to be acne, and had him removed to the sick bay for further investigation.

Yesterday morning Dr. Talmadge invited Drs. Dillingham and Benedict, of the New York board of health, to examine the case, both of whom

pronounced it smallpox.

The man was removed to North Brother Island, and the 498 steerage passengers, except 7 who had suffered with the disease, were to day removed to Hoffman Island for observation; the cabin passengers were allowed to proceed to the city, and the ship is now being disinfected and washed down with bichloride solution.

Smallpox in Wisconsin.

MILWAUKEE, October 22, 1894.

SIR: I have the honor to report that since my last communication, dated October 8, 1894, the following, concerning smallpox in this State, has been reported at this office: Ellsworth, Pierce County, 1 case (now recovered); Wonewoc, Juneau County, 6 cases; Liberty, Outagamie County, 1 death; Wauwatosa. Milwaukee County, 4 cases, 1 death; Milwaukee Township, Milwaukee County, 1 death; Milwaukee City, Milwaukee County, 107 cases, 39 deaths. Total number of cases on hand in the city of Milwaukee at the present writing, 123. Since the outbreak in January the disease has appeared in 42 different localities in the State; it now exists in only 6 places in the State.

Status of cholera in Europe and Asia.

LONDON, October 10, 1894.

SIR: I have the honor to make the following report relative to the progress of cholera in Europe and Asia for the period from September 26 to October 3. This with later though nonofficial information will bring the report up to October 9. The figures offered have been delayed for three or four days owing to the nonarrival of data from Germany. There has been a distinct remission of the cholera epidemic during the past ten days and every day brings more favorable reports.

Germany.—Between September 24 and October 1, at midday, the following cases and deaths from cholera occurred in the German Empire.

East Prussia: 14 cases, none fatal. Of these, there were in Wehlau and one other small place in the same district 12 cases and in 2 small places of the district of Allenstein 2 cases.

District of the Vistula: 4 cases and 2 deaths, distributed as follows: In 2 villages of the district of Marienburg, 2 cases and 1 death, and in the same number of places in the district of Elbingland, also 2 cases and 1 death.

District of the Netze-Warthe: 5 cases and 3 deaths. All of these occurred in Nakel.

Upper Silesia: Between September 23 and 29 there were 35 cases and 11 deaths. Of these, in 10 communities of the district of Kattowitz, occurred 34 cases and 11 deaths, the additional case being reported in Oppeln. Later on 1 other case was registered in Konigshütte, district of Beuthen.

District of the Elbe: 1 case and 1 death, reported from a village in the district of Lüchow.

The following dispatch from Berlin is dated October 2:

The death is announced from Asiatic cholera of Dr. Oertel, who was an assistant at the Hygeian Institute at Hamburg. The deceased was making experiments with infected water drawn from the Vistula. He had been successful in breeding bacilli in this medium, but unfortunately contracted cholera, from the effects of which he died.

Berlin, October 8: Owing to the disappearance of the cholera in Galicia, the restrictive measures hitherto in force on the German-Austrian

frontier at Myslowitz have been repealed. It is proper to add that the report of the disappearance of cholera from Galicia has not yet been confirmed, although there is no doubt that it is rapidly diminishing.

Berlin, October 9: 3 deaths from cholera and 7 fresh attacks, in addition to 1 suspected case, were reported in the Silesian district of Oppeln on the 7th instant. Happily, the epidemic is considerably diminishing in Silesia, and the number of deaths and cases in the week ended on the 6th instant were only about half the total of the week before.

Austria-Hungary.—From September 17 to 23 there were reported in Galicia 725 cases and 434 deaths. During the same period in the Bukowina there were 35 cases and 29 deaths. The political districts of Bohorodczany, Kalusz, Kolomea, Kosow, Nadworna, Podhajce, Sniatyn, Stanislau, Chrzanow, Wieliczka, and the city and political district of Cracow have been pronounced by the minister of the interior as centers of cholera infection since September 18. The details, as usual, are given in tabular form:

Belgium.—Between September 9 and 15, in the province of Liege, therwere 92 deaths from cholera reported. Besides these, there were 2 cases each in Mechlin, province of Antwerp, and Tongres, province of Limeburg. Additional cases also occurred at Marche and La Roche, province of Luxemburg, and Hongaerde, province of Brabant, 1 case in each.

Netherlands.—Between September 17 and 26 the following cases were reported as occurring in this country: At Zwiggelte, district of West-

erbork (Drenth), 1 case, a laborer; at Jutphen, near Utrecht, 2 cases, and in Utrecht itself 1 death, all being cattlemen. One case was reported at Rotterdam, with several others at Ysselmünde, near Rotterdam, of which 1 died. In Amsterdam and its suburbs several cases are reported daily. In this city the total number of cases of Asiatic cholera from August 3 to September 29 has been 93, of which 33 died. Eight of these cases, 7 fatal, were reported September 28, and 4, 1 fatal, September 29, the 8 cases of September 28 occurring in one house. The particulars of these cases have been furnished me through the kindness of Mr. Edward Downes, consul of the United States at Amsterdam:

A woman and child lived on the first floor; both were stricken with cholera. On the second floor lived one of the city disinfectors, his wife, and 5 children. The disinfector's wife assisted those afflicted on the first floor. The result was she and all her children contracted the disease and died. The child on the first floor also died. All of these deaths occurred within forty-eight hours.

The following additional cases were officially reported in Holland: September 19, Helder, 1; September 25, Utrecht, 2 cases, 1 fatal; Breukelen, St. Pieters, 1 death; September 26, Burgeveen, 1 case, and Zaandam, 1; September 29, unofficially, 4 cases reported at Groningen. Amsterdam, October 1: During the past week 20 cases of cholera and 17 deaths occurred in 14 communes throughout the entire country. Of this number, 4 cases and 7 deaths occurred in Amsterdam.

Rotterdam, October 6: The first case of cholera occurred in this city July 27, and up to date there have been 10 cases and 7 deaths. There have been 3 cases in all at Kralingen, one of the suburbs of Rotterdam. One case has recently been reported at the Hague.

Amsterdam, October 8: 16 cases of cholera and 8 deaths were reported in 10 communes throughout Holland during the past week. Of these, 6 cases and 1 death occurred in Amsterdam.

Russia.—In the city of St. Petersburg, from September 18 to 24, there were 34 cases and 19 deaths. In Narva and its environs, between September 7 and 20, there were reported 10 cases, and in Joachimsthal, In Podolia during the last few weeks the epidemic has increased very greatly. Between August 13 and September 15 there were in this province 1,300 cases and 523 deaths. In Volhynia, from August 7 to September 3, there were 156 cases and 54 deaths. In the city of Kieff, from September 13 to 23, 8 cases and 4 deaths. City of Warsaw, September 20 to 24, 3 cases and 2 deaths. Government of Warsaw, September 17 to 20, 11 cases and 4 deaths. Lomza, September 18 and 19, 2 cases and 1 death. Kalish, September 16 to 18, 13 cases and 6 deaths. Petrikov, September 17 to 20, 48 cases and 33 deaths. Kielce, September 13 to 18, 73 cases and 47 deaths. Radom, September 17 to 19, 8 cases and 2 deaths. Lublin, September 16 to 20, 21 cases and Siedlec, September 15 to 19, 25 cases and 14 deaths. Kovno. September 9 to 15, 10 cases and 8 deaths. Grodno, September 2 to 8, 181 cases and 80 deaths.

St. Petersburg, October 6: The following cholera returns are published to-day: In St. Petersburg, between the 30th ultimo and 5th instant, 25 fresh cases and 16 deaths. In the government of Warsaw, between September 23 and 30, there were 6 cases and 6 deaths; in Kalish, between 16th and 22d ultimo, 18 cases and 11 deaths; in Kielce, 56 cases and 25 deaths, and in Bessarabia, 143 cases and 67 deaths. From the 16th to the 29th ultimo there were in the government of Saratoff 162 cases and 96 deaths and in the government of Kieff 44 cases and 41 deaths. From the 23d to the 29th ultimo there were in the government of Podolia 290 cases and 142 deaths and in Bessarabia 157 cases and 63 deaths. From

the 10th to the 15th ultimo there were 28 cases and 21 deaths in the government of Courland, and from the 13th to the 26th ultimo there were 9 cases and 4 deaths in the government of Taurida.

Turkey.—In the vilayet of Angora, from September 1 to 12, there were reported 12 cases of Asiatic cholera and 9 deaths. In the vilayet of Kastamounia on September 8 there was 1 case and 1 death. In Marmoret el Aziz (Awebkir), from September 5 to 11, 42 cases and 20 deaths occurred. In Erzroum, not including Erzingian, from September 6 to 12, there were 214 cases and 133 deaths. In Sandjak Ismid, August 29 to September 10, 38 cases and 33 deaths. In vilayet of Hudavendkjar, August 31 to September 12, 43 cases and 40 deaths; of these, 30 cases and 18 deaths occurred in Broussa between September 7 and 12. In the vilayet of Adrianople, September 7 to 11, there were 7 cases and 5 deaths, and 5 of these cases and the 5 deaths occurred in Mustapha Pacha. Several new cases were reported on September 15 in Nebk. October 2, cholera reported in Constantinople.

East Indies.—In Calcutta, between the 19th and 25th of August, there occurred 9 deaths from cholera.

QUARANTINE NOTICES.

Saigon, September 6: Quarantine upon vessels from Hongkong has been raised.

Malta, September 29: Quarantine from Mediterranean ports of France removed.

Christiania, September 29: Russian ports in the Arctic and White seas are now included in the list of places considered as infected with cholera.

Constantinople, September 30: In consequence of the representations made by the Italian Government, the port has abolished the quarantine measures against arrivals from Naples, at the same time acknowledging that the restrictions were enforced owing to a misunderstanding.

Madrid, October 2: Minimum of three days' observation on arrivals from Algiers.

Constantinople, October 3: Quarantine against Naples suppressed. Medical observation on arrivals from coast between Enos and Maronia also suppressed.

Lisbon, October 4: Hongkong and all ports in province of Canton free from plague from September 1.

Cyprus, October 4: Quarantine on arrivals from Kilindria to Beirut will be replaced by medical inspection. Naples and Deutheropolis to Karadjali released from quarantine.

Madrid, October 5: Minimum of three days' observation against arrivals from Constantinople.

Constantinople, October 5: Quarantine on arrivals from Lith and

Loheya will be replaced by medical inspection. Quarantine on arrivals from Antwerp, Rotterdam, and Hague, and observation, Marseilles, will be replaced by medical visit in a port with sanitary officer.

Rio de Janeiro, October 6: Ships which left German Baltic ports on

or before September 1 ordered to quarantine station.

Malta, October 6: Quarantine from European-Turkish ports between Marona and Enos, inclusive, and ports in Turkey in Asia, Black Sea, removed.

Gibraltar, October 9: Arrivals from Marseilles obtain free pratique,

subject to medical inspection.

LONDON, October 13, 1894.

SIR: I have the honor to furnish the following report on the progress of cholera in Europe and elsewhere for the period from October 3 to 10. There is a steady decrease in the epidemic everywhere, amounting in the case of Austria-Hungary to nearly 50 per cent. The decrease in Russia is remarkable, too, and it is hoped that the advent of cold weather will put an end to this epidemic entirely. There are still many cases being reported in Holland, Belgium, and France, but they seem mostly of a sporadic nature and nowhere assume an epidemic form.

Germany.—From October 1 to 8, at midday, the following cases and

deaths were reported as having occurred in the German Empire:

East Prussia: 7 cases, of these 4 occurred in Wilnau and 3 in

Lapsau, district of Königsburg.

District of the Vistula: 12 cases and 2 deaths. Of these, 10 cases and 2 deaths happened in Tolkmit, district of Elbingland, and 2

cases in Platenhof, district of Marienburg.

Netze-Warthe district: 16 cases and 1 death, all occurring in Nakel. Upper Silesia: From September 30 to October 6 there were 18 cases and 6 deaths; of these, 3 cases and 2 deaths occurred in 2 small places in the districts of Beuthen and Gros-Strelitz; 13 cases and 2 deaths were reported in 6 small places in the district of Kattowitz. Later on 7 more cases occurred, 1 case each in Beuthen and Gros-Strelitz and 5 cases in 4 villages in the district of Kattowitz.

District of the Rhine: 1 case only was reported, occurring on a river

boat at Ruhrorter Harbor, coming from the Netherlands.

Finally, a physician died of cholera on the night of September 22 in Hamburg. He had been engaged in bacteriological work and became infected while making culture experiments. This case was reported in my last and is now confirmed officially.

Austria-Hungary.—In Galicia, between September 24 and 30, there were 446 cases of cholera and 271 deaths. During the same period

SIR: The official report just received from Dr. Salter, the director of the sanitary service of Amsterdam, shows that the total number of cases of Asiatic cholera from August 3, 1894, to date is 93, the total number of deaths 33. Eight of these cases, 7 fatal, were reported yesterday; 4, 1 of which was fatal, were reported to-day. The 8 cases reported yesterday occurred in the same house.

RUSSIA.

Cholera in Russia.

St. Petersburg, October 3, 1894.

SIR: The official report of cholera in the hospitals of this city for the twenty-four hours ending at noon, October 2, is as follows: New cases

4, deaths 2; remaining under treatment, 24.

The reports from the provinces show a generally more favorable condition, as shown by the number of deaths from disease in the governments cited below. These are the same governments mentioned in the last report of cholera from this legation, and it will be noticed that, except in Podolia, there is a considerable diminution in the number of fatalities.

September 16 to 22, Warsaw, 7 deaths; Petrokov, 62 deaths; Minsk, 23 deaths; Podolia, 173 deaths; Bessarabia, 67 deaths. September 10 to 15, Kielce, 85 deaths; Grodno, 45 deaths. September 10 to 22, Radom, 71 deaths.

The proportion of deaths to new cases remains about the same as at the time of the last dispatch upon this subject.

TURKEY.

Cholera cases in Sivas and vicinity.

Under date of September 30, 1894, the U. S. consul at Sivas writes: A few cases and deaths of an illness that is said to appear to be cholera have occurred during the past few days at Sivas. A few cases of cholera are also said to continue to occur in the surrounding towns and villages.

PROMULGATION OF FOREIGN QUARANTINE REGULATIONS.

Official notification has been received that the quarantine regulations made by the Secretary of the Treasury have been posted in the offices of the U. S. consuls at the following named ports for ten days: Macassar, Manila, Penang, and Sourabaya.

STATISTICAL REPORTS.

Australia—Melbourne.—Two weeks ended September 1, 1894. Population, 1,140,405. Total deaths not reported. Two deaths from diphtheria.

BAHAMAS—Governors Harbor.—Two weeks ended October 13, 1894. Population, 1,161. One death.

BRITISH COLUMBIA—Victoria.—Month of September, 1894. Population, 18,000. Total deaths, 31. No deaths reported from contagious diseases.

FRANCE—Roubaix.—Month of September, 1894. Population, 120,000. Total deaths, 160, including scarlet fever, 1; diphtheria, 3; measles, 3; and whooping cough, 2.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended October 6 corresponded to an annual rate of 16.0 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,458,442. The lowest rate was recorded in Croydon, viz, 10.7, and the highest in Liverpool, viz, 23.7 a thousand.

London.—One thousand two hundred and eighty-seven deaths were registered during the week, including smallpox, 1; measles, 9; scarlet fever, 9; diphtheria, 66; whooping cough, 7; enteric fever, 13; and diarrhea and dysentery, 33. The deaths from all causes corresponded to an annual rate of 15 4 a thousand. In greater London 1,641 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 14 4 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 14 from diphtheria and 8 from measles.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended October 6 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 21.0 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Kilkenny, viz, 0.0, and the highest in Galway, viz, 37.8 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 158 deaths were registered, including smallpox, 4; enteric fever, 1; scarlet fever, 1; typhus fever, 1; and diphtheria, 1.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended October 6 corresponded to an annual rate of 15.9 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,447,500. The lowest mortality was recorded in Aberdeen, viz, 13.8, and the highest in Perth, viz, 25.8 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 454, including smallpox, 2; measles, 4; scarlet fever, 1; diphtheria, 12; and whooping cough, 5.
