Inspection of vessels at Cape Charles Quarantine to be discontinued from November 1, 1894, to May 1, 1895.

The following circular letter has been mailed to the health officers at Washington, D. C., Baltimore, Md., Richmond, Norfolk, Newport News, and Alexandria, Va.:

SIR: I have to inform you that the inspection of vessels at the Cape Charles Quarantine Station will be entirely discontinued during the winter season, November 1 to May 1. The station, however, will be kept in readiness to receive any infected vessel which may be remanded to that station for disinfection and the treatment of sick. The medical officer in command Cape Charles Quarantine Station, Fortress Monroe, Va., should be notified immediately upon the arrival of such vessel. The inspection of vessels from foreign ports during the winter season will devolve upon the local quarantine officer.

Vessels arriving at the Break water with quarantinable disease on board, or having had quarantinable disease on board during the voyage; vessels from foreign ports calling at the Break water; and fruit vessels specially authorized to be inspected at the Break water upon signal of the master of the vessel.

SIR: In obedience to your telegram of October 25, 1894, detailing me for special duty in this city as inspector to investigate and report upon a threatened invasion of smallpox in Washington, D. C., I have the honor to report as follows:

Arriving here on October 26, I learned that the first case, resulting in death, occurred at No. 433 Fourth street NE., in the person of a child, the daughter of Mr. P. J. Coston, assistant attorney in the In

terior Department, who contracted the disease, it is believed, while in Vermont or in the cars while en route home early in October. Following this case was that of Mary Mundel, a colored servant in the Coston family, who was removed to the quarantine hospital in the southeastern suburbs of the city, where she subsequently died. In quick succession the following cases were reported to Dr. Wm. C. Woodward, health officer of the District, who had already begun necessary precautions to prevent the spread of the disease: Mary Thomas, colored, No. 243 Fourteenth street NE.; Mary Brown, colored, No. 202 D street NW.; Judge E. M. Rucker, No. 1104 Twelfth street NW.; William Owens, No. 302 Fourth street SE.; Judge James J. Parker, No. 1810 Fourth street NW.; George Anderson, No. 632 G street NW.; Samuel Mundel, colored, No. 433 Fourth street NE.; and Charles E. Williams, colored, No. 915 Eighth street NW., which was reported to the health officer October 28, and is the last case up to date. All the above cases, except Mr. Coston's child, who died at its home, No. 433 Fourth street NE., were removed to the quarantine hospital as soon as reported to Dr. Woodward, who recognized the necessity of minimizing the foci of infection.

In tracing the course of the disease it was found that every case had its origin from direct or indirect communication with Mr. Coston's child or himself. The center of infection was in the office of the Assistant Attorney General in the Patent Office. Interior Department, where Mr. Coston was employed as a law clerk. The disease was communicated through Mr. Coston to Messrs. Rucker, Parker, and Anderson, who were in adjacent rooms, and also to Mr. Owens, who met and conversed with Mr. Coston upon the street. Mr. Owen's case was malignant, and

he died in hospital on the 30th.

The Commissioners of the District met immediately upon the announcement of the appearance of the disease in the city, which, unfortunately, was not recognized at first, having been diagnosed by the attending physicians as chicken-pox, and established a smallpox hospital in the suburbs of the city, to which all cases were immediately removed. Commissioner Ross and Health Officer Woodward were untiring in their efforts to stamp out the disease, and orders were issued that all school children, the poor of the city, and immates of the hospitals and jail should be immediately vaccinated. Subsequently the Patent and Census offices were closed and disinfected, and at this date all fear of the disease becoming epidemic has been materially allayed. Total cases in the District, 10; deaths, 3.

I also visited Hyattsville, Md.. where a suspicious case had been reported. Upon investigation I found that Mr. Van Buren Norwood, a messenger in the Interior Department, had been in close communication with George Anderson the day previous to the appearance of the eruption in Anderson's case; but as he had been successfully vaccinated on the 25th instant and showed well-defined vesicular papules upon his arm, with enlargement of the glands in his axilla, the chance of immunity is greatly in his favor. All the members of the household with whom he came in contact had been vaccinated by Dr. G. A. Richardson, of Hyattsville, whom you had notified by telegraph regarding his case the day previous, so that in the event of the disease appearing, no spread of the contagion is anticipated.

One case of smallpox near Glymont, Md.

WASHINGTON, D. C., October 31, 1894.

Sir: I have the honor to report that, in accordance with your verbal orders of the 29th instant, I visited Glymont, Md., on the 30th instant for the purpose of investigating the reported death from smallpox at that place.

On my arrival I learned that the woman, a colored woman, Mundel

by name, was not dead, but was, on the contrary, recovering.

The following are the facts in the case: The woman, who was a relative of one Mary Mundel, who died from smallpox in this city about ten days ago, and by whom she was probably infected, left Washington, D. C., on Sunday, the 21st instant, by the steamer Harry Randall, for Glymont, Md., that being the nearest landing to the home of the Mundel woman's mother. On arrival she walked from the landing to her mother's house, a distance of about $3\frac{1}{2}$ or 4 miles.

The mother lives on the farm of Mr. Roe, and has (besides the daughter who came from Washington) three children—one a baby. Mr. Roe, whose house is about half a mile from the infected house, has a family consisting of a wife, two sons, and an adopted boy. They have also one servant, who carries food to the Mundel family, leaving it about 200 feet from the house, when they come out and take it. These have possibly been exposed, as, before the recognition of the disease, the Mundel woman's mother visited the Roe house once. Of these 10 persons, Mrs. Roe and Mrs. Mundel were the only ones who had ever been vaccinated. I vaccinated them all. The Mundel woman was feeling badly

when she left Washington, and when Dr. Compton—the physician who attends her—first saw her, on the 25th instant, the pustules were formed. The case has been a very light one, of the discrete variety, and she has been confined to bed only for a day and a half. When I saw her the crusts were beginning to form and she expressed herself as feeling fairly well. The children living in the house—a log cabin about 10 feet square and about the same height—were all well when I saw them, as were Mr. Roe and family also.

I gave some vaccine points to Dr. Compton and also to Dr. Mitchell (another physician living in that vicinity), as they expressed themselves desirous of having them, and vaccinated all whom I saw who were desirous of being vaccinated. Owing to the isolation of the patient, an isolation of accident more than of intention, as the house is at least a quarter of a mile from any other house, and to the fear of the colored people of the disease, I think the danger of spread is very little except in the case of the children living in the same house. In that case the

natural isolation of the house will again prove of benefit.

The possibility of infection of the steamer Harry Randall and of the passengers who were distributed at various points as far as Maddox Creek, on the 21st instant, and since, is an interesting one and can only be shown by subsequent developments. The only other person who may be presumed to have been infected is a child whom this Mundel woman is said to have held in her arms for a while on the trip to Glymont. I was told that this child lived at Indian Head, and that all persons there had been vaccinated by the resident physician. Dr. Compton has promised to send reports to this office, and on the recovery of the patient, if no new case has occurred in the Mundel house, to disinfect the house and premises, giving information to this office of such disinfection. For his use in such disinfection I left for him at the landing 50 pounds of roll sulphur and 1,000 cubic centimeters of alcohol.

ILLINOIS—Galesburg.—Months of August and September, 1894. Estimated population, 20,000. Total deaths, 38, including phthisis pulmonalis, 5; enteric fever, 2; and diphtheria, 1.

MICHIGAN.—Week ended October 20, 1894. Reports to the State board of health from 58 observers indicate that inflammation of kidney, intermittent fever, and influenza increased, and that inflammation of bowels decreased in area of prevalence. Phthisis pulmonalis was reported present at 234 places, enteric fever at 65, scarlet fever at 40, diphtheria at 33, and smallpox at 4 places—Manchester, Norvill, and Rives townships.

MISSOURI—Kansas City.—Month of September, 1894 Population, 132,716. Total deaths, 131, including phthisis pulmonalis, 4; scarlet fever, 1; diphtheria, 6; croup, 1; and measles, 4.

NEW JERSEY—Hudson County.—Five months ended September 30, 1894. Estimated population, 310,022. Total deaths, 2,782, including phthisis pulmonalis, 277; enteric fever, 56; scarlet fever, 13; diphtheria, 98; measles, 3; and whooping cough, 22.

TENNESSEE—Chattanooga.—Month of September, 1894. Population, white, 27,000; colored, 13,000; total, 40,000. Deaths, white, 17; colored, 15; total, 32, including phthisis pulmonalis, 5; and enteric fever 3.

Clarksville.—Month of September, 1894. Population, white, 6,000; colored, 4,000; total. 10,000. Deaths, white, 2; colored, 10; total, 12. No deaths from contagious diseases.

Knoxville.—Month of September, 1894. Population, white, 31,273; colored, 9,112; total, 40,385. Deaths, white, 35; colored, 18; total, 53, including phthisis pulmonalis, 4; enteric fever, 2; and whooping cough, 2.

Status of epidemic diseases in Europe and Asia.

LONDON, October 20, 1894.

SIR: I have the honor to submit the following report on the progress of the cholera epidemic in Europe and Asia for the period from October 10 to 17. There is no great change since my last report. A decrease in the number of cases reported in Russia, Germany, and Holland continues, but there has been an increase in Austria Hungary.

Germany.—During the week from October 8 to 15 the following cases and deaths were reported as having occurred in the German Empire:

District of the Vistula: 9 cases and 2 deaths. All of these cases occurred in the district of Elbingland.

District of the Netze-Warthe: 4 cases and 1 death. Of these, 3 cases occurred in Nakel and 1 death-in a small place in the district of Bromberg.

Upper Silesia: 12 cases. Of these, 7 cases were reported in 2 small places in the district of Kattowitz, 2 cases each in Beuthen, and Gros-

Strelitz, and 1 case in the district of Plesz.

Rhine district: 1 case and 1 death occurred in a boat which had arrived at Neuwied. This boat left Ruhorter Haven on October 9, and upon arrival, in addition to those cases mentioned, a dead body was found on board, the man having died on October 2. On a post-mortem examination being made, the cholera bacillus was found in secretions from the intestines.

Last report from Germany of cholera showed 47 cases and 10 deaths as a total for the previous week, while this report gives 26 cases and 4 deaths.

On the night of the 16th instant snow fell in several of the infected districts. At Thorn the thermometer fell to 27° F. and all the mountains of the Thuringian Forest and of the Swabian Alps are covered with snow. It is hoped, therefore, that the epidemic in Germany is practically at an end.

A dispatch from Berlin dated October 19, is as follows:

At Königsberg a sailor belonging to the steamer Albertus has been taken to the hospital, and his disease has been ascertained to be cholera. The German Imperial office of health has ordered a thorough investigation of the question of the conveying of infection by corpses or carcases.

Austria-Hungary.—In Galicia there were reported officially, between October 1 and 7, 571 cases of cholera and 321 deaths. In Bukowina for the same period there were 23 cases and 14 deaths. The minister of the interior on October 3 declared the following political districts of Galicia to be infected by cholera, and ordered the usual precautions to be taken, viz: Rohatyn, Kamionka, Strumilowa, and Zlczow. The following table furnishes the details:

Netherlands.—Between September 29 and October 6 the following cases were reported in Holland: Another case occurred in the family at Jdskenhuizen, in Friesland, already reported. In Scheviningen, South Holland, a doubtful case was reported. At The Hague, and also in the district of Grevelduin-Capelle, south of the Maas, each, 1 case was noted, and in North Brabant also 1 case. In the country near Utrecht, 2 cases In Amsterdam, from October 1 to 6, there were 8 cases and 1 death. Altogether in this city, up to October 4, there have been and 3 deaths. 94 cases and 34 deaths. In Purmerend there was 1 case and in Giesendam 2 cases. In Kralingen, near Rotterdam, finally, there was 1 case and 1 death. A correspondent also informs me that an additional case occurred last week at Capelle-on-Yssel, 10 miles from Rotterdam.

Russia.—Up to and including September 22 the Imperial department of health reports the following cases and deaths, arranged in tabular form:

The latest reports obtainable are as follows: City of St. Petersburg, from October 3 to 8, 19 cases and 8 deaths. Narva: The cholera epidemic in this government has entirely disappeared. On September 21 only 1 case was reported in Joachimstahl and Kränholm. From the beginning of the epidemic at these places there has been a total of 168 cases and 92 deaths. City of Warsaw, October 1 to 7, 5 cases and 3 deaths. Government of Warsaw, October 1 to 5, 26 cases and 7 deaths. Kalisch, September 25 to October 3, 19 cases and 11 deaths. Petrikau, September 29 to October 5, 46 cases and 23 deaths. Kielce, September 28 to October 2, 19 cases and 8 deaths. Radom, September 27 to October 4, 2 cases and 2 deaths. Lublin, September 28 to October 2, 16 cases and 10 deaths. Siedlec, September 29 to October 4, 2 deaths.

In Sandjak Ismid, in three villages, on September 11 and 13, there were 3 cases and In vilayet Hudavenkiar, in Broussa, from September 13 to In 7 different places, from September 10 to 22, 12 24, 22 deaths. In vilayet Adrianople, in Mustapha Pacha, Djisri cases and 11 deaths. Erkene, Eski-Erghéné, Ourli, Derwisch Tepé, and Tschorlu, there were, from September 12 to 23, a total of 50 cases and 32 deaths. later reports have been received showing that at Lule Burgas, from September 29 to October 2, there were 24 cases and 14 deaths. Musch and Bitlis (vilayet Ezeroum) cholera is reported to be very A report from Smyrna, on October 5, states that cholera has disappeared from the vilayet of Kouia. Finally, in Uschak, near Smyrna, and in several places of the vilayet Aidira, several doubtful cases have been reported.

East Indies.—In Calcutta, from August 26 to September 8, there were

14 deaths from cholera.

QUARANTINE NOTICES.

Copenhagen, October 8: In consequence of an outbreak of dysentery at the port of Elsinore, clean bills of health are not granted to vessels.

A dispatch has been published from Montevideo reporting that eight days' quarantine is imposed on arrivals from Russia.

Cypress, October 16: Arrivals from Marseilles get pratique without

restriction.

Madrid, October 18: Arrivals from Rotterdam admitted to free pratique, date of departure being later than September 22.

Lisbon, October 19: Dutch ports free from cholera October 18, with

exception of Amsterdam, which is still infected.

BRAZIL.

Sanitary report of Rio de Janeiro.

RIO DE JANEIRO, September 18, 1894.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit report for week ended September 15, 1894: The deaths from accesso pernicioso were 4 less than in the week before, from yellow fever 3, as against none in the previous week; there were 2 more from smallpox, being 6 in all; 2 from typhoid fever, being 1 more; 1 from beriberi, being 1 less, and 1 from influenza, which is 1 less. The total from all causes was 192, being 66 less than in the previous week. This is the lowest total during the current year. In fact, the health of Rio is hardly ever better than at present. Yellow fever

is almost always here in what is considered to be a sporadic form, and usually smallpox is more prevalent at this time of the year. The influenza still continues, but I believe it to be much abated. Since last report 1 have visited and given bills of health to the following-named ships:

September 13, steamship Mexican Prince, British, for New York, from Rosario, B. A., a visé; September 14, steamship Manitoba, English, for New York, from Rosario, B. A.; September 15, steamship Hogarth, British, for New York; and September 17, Steamship Cora, American,

for Barbados, West Indies.

RIO DE JANEIRO, September 25, 1894.

SIR: I have the honor to inclose report for week ended September 22, 1894:

During the week there were no deaths reported from yellow fever; there were 3 from accesso pernicioso, an increase of 1 over the previous week; 5 from typhoid fever, an increase of 3; 4 from smallpox, a decrease of 2; 2 from beriberi, an increase of 1; and none from influenza. The total from all causes was 265, being 73 more than in the former week. The increase I believe to be due to the more numerous deaths from diseases of the air passages and lungs, which usually occur at this season when there are many rainy, windy, and damp days, as at present.

Health of Rio.—The health of this port can now be considered in a normal state, but I am afraid that with the proximate hot season we will again have a yellow-fever epidemic, for I see and hear of nothing being done to prevent it, though the question is being agitated in Congress to unite under one direction the three health departments now existing, which are nearly independent of each other. They are the health department of the port, the municipal health department, and the sanitary institute, which is principally occupied with statistics. This would be a step in the right direction, but is not all that is required. I believe that a thorough flushing of the nearly level drains of the town, made regularly and frequently, would have a good effect.

Yellow fever in Santos.—Many ships leave Santos and enter here to complete their cargoes, and remain usually not more than four or five Of course they receive a supplemental bill of health, and are not inspected except in case of disease occurring aboard after leaving Santos with a clean bill of health, or should there be reason to suspect anything. I see all bills of health these ships bring from Santos, and I have particularly noted, not without some surprise, that not once during the present year has it been stated on them that there were cases of yellow fever in that port, the word "none" always appearing in the proper column, opposite the name of the disease. The health authorities in Santos have just published their semiyearly report for the first six months of the present year, and state therein (according to a notice in this morning's paper) that in said period there were 155 deaths from yellow fever in that town. I can only attribute the discrepancy to the excessive difficulty in obtaining "health" information in a port where the efficient organization of the health department is recent.

RUSSIA.

Cholera in Russia.

St. Petersburg, October 9, 1894.

SIR: It is noticeable that the number of new cases of cholera in the hospitals of this city is no longer daily reported in the local newspapers.

During the four days ending at noon yesterday there were 11 new cases received at the hospitals, and 4 deaths, 24 remaining under treat-

ment.

In the provinces the abatement of the epidemic is in general more marked than in this city since the last dispatch upon the subject from

this legation.

Governments: Warsaw, from September 23 to 30, 2 deaths; Kielce, from September 16 to 22, 25 deaths; Petrikov, from September 23 to 29, 38 deaths; Radom, from September 23 to 29, 2 deaths; Grodno, from September 16 to 22, 4 deaths; Minsk, from September 23 to 29, 19 deaths; Podolia, from September 23 to 29, 142 deaths; Bessarabia, from September 23 to 29, 63 deaths.

TURKEY.

Relative to the report of cholera in Constantinople.

Constantinople, October 4, 1894.

SIR: I have the honor to report that on the first day of this month Dr. Zavitziano, our representative on the sanitary board, reported to me officially that cholera had broken out in this city, whereupon I sent the following telegram:

State Department, Washington: Cholera.—Short.

Since that time there have been no new cases, and a part of those first reported as cholera have since been pronounced cholerine. Only 1 death occurred, and the health authorities now think that the disease has been checked.

STATISTICAL REPORTS.

Africa—Cape Town.—Month of September, 1894. Population, 53,-000. Total deaths, 102, including 2 from enteric fever.

BRAZIL—Ceara.—Month of August, 1894. Population, 42,000. Total deaths, 105, including 1 from whooping cough.

CUBA—Havana.—Under date of October 20, 1894, the United States sanitary inspector reports as follows:

There were 110 deaths in this city during the week ended October 18, 1894. Eight of those deaths were caused by yellow fever, with approximately 20 new cases, 2 were caused by typhoid fever, 3 by so-called pernicious fever, 1 by paludal fever, 2 by smallpox, 1 by glanders, 3 by enterocolitis, 3 by dysentery, 3 by cholera infantum, and 4 by pneumonia. Two of the deaths by yellow fever during the week occurred in the military hospital.

FRANCE—Rouen.—Month of September, 1894. Population, 111,847. Total deaths, 225, including smallpox, 5; enteric fever, 5; diphtheria, 6; measles, 5; and whooping cough, 3.

GREAT BRITAIN—England and Wales.—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended October 13 corresponded to an annual rate of 16·7 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,458,442. The lowest rate was recorded in Croydon, viz, 9·3, and the highest in Preston, viz, 26·2 a thousand.

London.—One thousand two hundred and ninety-one deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 10; scarlet fever, 12; diphtheria, 54; whooping cough, 13; enteric fever, 20; and diarrhea and dysentery, 30. The deaths from all causes corresponded to an annual rate of 15·5 a thousand. In greater London 1,646 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 14·4 a thousand of the population. In the "outer ring" the deaths included 7 from diphtheria and 5 from scarlet fever.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended October 13 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 22·3 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Newry, viz, 4·0, and the highest in Sligo viz, 91·4 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 144 deaths were registered, including smallpox, 2; enteric fever, 3; diphtheria, 1; and whooping cough 12.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended October 13 corresponded to an annual rate of 17.6 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,447,500. The lowest mortality was recorded in Leith, viz, 8.7, and the highest in Perth, viz, 24.1 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 501, including measles, 4; scarlet fever, 10; diphtheria, 10; and whooping cough, 5.

Dundee.—Month of September, 1894. Population, 158,719. Total deaths, 160, including phthisis pulmonalis, 7; enteric fever, 3; diphtheria, 1; croup, 1; measles, 2; and whooping cough, 4.

Jamaica—Kingston.—Month of September, 1894. Total deaths, 76, including phthisis pulmonalis, 15; diphtheria, 1; and whooping cough, 4. SWITZERLAND—Lucerne.—Month of September, 1894. Population,

22,000. Total deaths, 33, including 1 from diphtheria.
