Smallpox in Pennsylvania.

PHILADELPHIA, November 27, 1894.

DEAR SIR: The following is a statement of the smallpox status in this State: Philadelphia—number of cases reported October 22, 3; number of cases reported since October 22, 34; total, 37; number of deaths since October 22, 3; number of cases at present in quarantine, 34. One case of smallpox exists at Ridley Park, Delaware County, 6 miles outside of Philadelphia. No other cases now exist in the State within the knowledge of the board. One case of cerebro-spinal meningitis is also reported in Philadelphia.

ALABAMA—*Mobile*.—Month of October, 1894. Population, 31,076. Total deaths, 71, including phthisis pulmonalis, 12; enteric fever, 1; diphtheria, 1; and croup, 1.

IOWA—*Keokuk*.—Two weeks ended November 22, 1894. Estimated population, 20,000. Total deaths, 8, including phthisis pulmonalis, 1; and enteric fever, 1.

MICHIGAN.—Week ended November 17, 1894. Reports to the State board of health, Lansing, from 64 observers, indicate that intermittent fever, erysipelas, and pneumonia increased, and that typho-malarial fever, typhoid fever, whooping cough, and pleuritis decreased in area of prevalence. Phthisis pulmonalis was reported present during the week at 231 places, enteric fever at 50, diphtheria at 36, scarlet fever at 52, measles at 5, and smallpox at 6 places—Cheboygan, Detroit, Manchester Township, Royal Oak Township, Sebewa Township, and St. Johns.

NEW HAMPSHIRE—*Manchester*.—Month of October, 1894. Estimated population, 50,000. Total deaths, 99, including phthisis pulmonalis, 6; enteric fever, 1; diphtheria, 5; croup, 7; and whooping cough, 1.

PENNSYLVANIA—*Lebanon*.—Month of October, 1894. Estimated population, 15,000. Total deaths, 12, including 2 from enteric fever.

WISCONSIN—*Milwaukee*.—Month of October, 1894. Estimated population, 270,000. Total deaths, 406, including phthisis pulmonalis, 27; smallpox, 82; enteric fever, 10; scarlet fever, 1; diphtheria, 18; croup, 8; and whooping cough, 4.

CHINA.

Cholera in Peking.

PEKING, October 11, 1894.

SIR: I regret to have to report the existence, in a sporadic form, of Asiatic cholera in Peking. While it usually prevails in this city in the autumn, the season of abundant and cheap vegetables and fruits which are largely eaten by the poor, this year its ravages have been unusually severe.

The disease first made its appearance about the middle of September. The unusual prevalence is supposed to be due to the presence of large numbers of students attending the Government examinations. It is

noticeable that it has been more violent in those parts of the city where dens occupied by students are most numerous. Fortunately it has arrived too late in the year to become epidemic. It will soon be checked by the cold weather of October.

Those cases which have fallen under the notice of missionary doctors have been exceedingly fatal. In most cases but a few hours elapse between the first symptoms of the disease and death. The Chinese are entirely unable to cope with it, believing in acupuncture rather than medicine for its cure. Some patients whose abdomens were already pierced, have been brought, as a last resort, to foreign hospitals, usually too late. The rapid emaciation of cholera patients is remarkable. In a few hours the flesh wastes away and leaves a robust man thin, sunken, and deathlike. Many people seized by the disease are reported to have died upon the street. No foreigners have been attacked.

I am informed by Dr. Caltman, of the American Mission Hospital at the An Sing Gate, that those cases which have come under his observation have been true Asiatic cholera, differing in no essential respects from the epidemics of former years. The symptoms are vomiting, purging, and collapse, with muscular cramp and spasmodic contractions.

Every facility seems afforded for the spread of the disease. Disinfection of houses, clothing, and patients is unknown.

The examinations held by the government every three years in this city, and those held annually at the provincial capitals, afford an effective method for the spread of epidemics and contagious diseases. At the Peking examinations the students, from 10,000 to 20,000 in number, with friends and attendants, form a body of not less than 40,000 people, from all parts of the Empire, gathered here several weeks at the worst season of the year. Not only do they bring diseases with them, but they carry back to the provinces the germs of maladies contracted from others. They are under no sanitary control whatever and offer a vehicle for the spread of contagion comparable to the pilgrimages to Mecca, though on a smaller scale.

GERMANY.

Relative to stations for emigrant inspection on the frontier between Germany and Russia.

NEW YORK, November 22, 1894.

DEAR SIR: The North German Lloyd Steamship Company and the Hamburg-American Line have established five control stations for the disinfection and inspection of Russian emigrants on the frontier between Russia and Germany at Bajohren, Eydtkuhnen, Prostken, Illowa, and Ottlotschin. These disinfection and inspection stations have now been opened and are in use. These stations have been placed under the supervision of a physician. All emigrants from Russia and intended for the steamers of the North German Lloyd Steamship Company and of the Hamburg-American Line pass through these disinfecting stations, in which their baggage is disinfected by the most approved methods, and the passengers are bathed and carefully examined by the

physician. The passengers that pass this rigorous examination receive a passport that entitles them to continue their journey to the port of embarkation, and that is taken up on the train. On the way from the disinfecting station to the port another medical examination of the passengers is held. All those passengers who are found to be afflicted with contagious disease or to be such as would be debarred from landing in the United States are turned back and not allowed to pass.

The steamship companies exact the small sum of 50 cents from each passenger as disinfection or inspection fee, and are obliged by the German Government to bear the expense of the maintenance and treatment of all passengers while in the disinfection or inspection station, and are also liable for the return of those passengers who are found by inspection not to be entitled to land here. * * *

Detention of emigrants at Hamburg discontinued except in the case of Russians and Galicians.

HAMBURG, *October 29, 1894.*

SIR: * * * I beg to take this opportunity * * * to inform you that as a result of conference with my colleagues at Bremen, Amsterdam, Rotterdam, and Antwerp, I have to-day given notice to the proper steamship companies here that, for emigrants going by their steamers on and after November 1, no five days' detention will be required by this consulate for the present, except for such emigrants as arrive here from Russia and Galicia, which latter, as I have written you, are already being detained here under the requirements of the city.

As no emigrants from Belgium and Holland go to the United States via this port, I understand the agreement with my colleagues to exclude the question of detaining such emigrants, and to refer only to those from Russia, Galicia, Hungary, and Germany.

SIR: I have the honor to report that the Tiflis and Baku newspapers report the following cases of cholera during the month of October: Tiflis, October 20, 2 cases, 2 deaths; October 21, 1 case; October 22, 1 case; October 23, 2 cases; October 25, 1 case. Baku, October 24, 3 cases, 2 deaths. Since the 25th of October no cases have been reported, and some of the above cases were reported as "cholera-like" illness.

SAN SALVADOR.

Yellow fever at Salvador.

Under date of November 8, 1894, the U. S. consul at San Salvador reports that during the two weeks ended on that date there were 167 cases of yellow fever, of which 94 were fatal. He writes as follows:

Yellow fever is causing great havoc in the towns of Nigapa, Quelzal-tepequi, San Martin, Ilopango, and others near this city. About 28 per cent of the inhabitants of Chinamesa have perished. It is impossible to ascertain the number of deaths in all the country. At Santa Ana a strange malady has become epidemic, consisting of boils and tumors all over the bodies of the patients. The ports enjoy very good health. Besides yellow fever, which has become epidemic in this city, the prevailing diseases are dysentery, bilious, remittent, and other malarial fevers. It was expected that the cold winds of October would have brought a change for the better, but it has turned out to be for the worse.

STATISTICAL REPORTS.

AFRICA—*Mozambique*.—Month of August, 1894. Population, 12,000. Total deaths, 21. No deaths from contagious diseases.

ARGENTINE REPUBLIC—*Buenos Ayres*.—Month of August, 1894. Population, 596,075. Total deaths, 1,386, including enteric fever, 9; scarlet fever, 14; diphtheria, 38; measles, 2; and whooping cough, 7.

BRITISH COLUMBIA—*Victoria*.—Month of October, 1894. Population, 18,000. Total deaths, 27. No deaths reported from contagious diseases.

CUBA—*Nuevitas*.—Month of October, 1894. Population, 4,112. Total deaths, 3. No deaths from contagious diseases.

FRANCE—*Roubaix*.—Month of October, 1894. Population, 120,000. Total deaths, 164, including scarlet fever, 1; diphtheria, 2; and whooping cough, 4.

GREAT BRITAIN—*England and Wales*.—The deaths registered in 33 great towns of England and Wales during the week ended November 10 corresponded to an annual rate of 16.9 a thousand of the aggregate population, which is estimated at 10,458,442. The lowest rate was

recorded in Birkenhead, viz, 11·8, and the highest in Preston, viz, 24·8 a thousand.

London.—One thousand two hundred and forty-nine deaths were registered during the week, including measles, 13; scarlet fever, 9; smallpox, 1; diphtheria, 42; whooping cough, 10; enteric fever, 24; and diarrhoea and dysentery, 16. The deaths from all causes corresponded to an annual rate of 16·3 a thousand. In greater London 1,616 deaths were registered, corresponding to an annual rate of 14·2 a thousand of the population. In the “outer ring” the deaths included 19 from diphtheria and 7 from measles.

Ireland.—The average annual death rate represented by the deaths registered during the week ended November 10 in the 16 principal town districts of Ireland was 21·4 a thousand of the population. The lowest rate was recorded in Kilkenny, viz, 0·0, and the highest in Sligo, viz, 40·6 a thousand. In Dublin and suburbs 153 deaths were registered, including smallpox, 4; enteric fever, 2; whooping cough, 3; and scarlet fever, 1.

Scotland.—The deaths registered in 8 principal towns during the week ended November 10 corresponded to an annual rate of 20·3 a thousand of the population, which is estimated at 1,482,767. The lowest mortality was recorded in Perth, viz, 12·0, and the highest in Greenock, viz, 25·0 a thousand. The aggregate number of deaths registered from all causes was 578, including smallpox, 3; measles, 16; scarlet fever, 8; diphtheria, 13; and whooping cough, 13.

JAMAICA—Kingston.—Month of October, 1894. Population, 34,314. Total deaths, 140, including phthisis pulmonalis, 10; and whooping cough, 1.

SPAIN—Barcelona.—Month of September, 1894. Population, 325,000. Total deaths, 528, including phthisis pulmonalis, 98; enteric fever, 38; and diphtheria, 10.
